## Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [ ] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 62d Congress, 1st session, is to be understood.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

Documents can not be supplied by this Office free to individuals, **nor can they be forwarded in advance of payment.**

Documents entered in this catalogue that are for sale by the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, are indicated by a star (\*) preceding the price named. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the Department, Bureau, or Division issuing the document, a double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is not obtainable, and whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary it will be found under the name of the Bureau. The Senate and House documents and reports are issued in limited editions and, unless otherwise indicated, may be obtained only through Members of Congress.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to over a million, of which several hundred thousand are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

## LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the L. C. catalogue cards will be found at the end of the titles of the more important monographic documents. The figure following the card number (separated from it by a slanting line) indicates the number of cards required for entries suggested (title entry not included) on the cards. The price of the cards is 2c. for the first card and  $\frac{7}{10}$ c. for each additional card for the same title ordered at the same time. **Remittances should be made to the Librarian of Congress.** Cards can not be furnished by the Superintendent of Documents.

## CUMULATIVE INDEX

The Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued separately each quarter and will cumulate for the twelve months ending June, 1912. That is, the September number of the Index will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for July, August, and September, the December number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for October to December, the March number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for January to March, and the June number will be the Index for the fiscal year 1912. ## NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Reprint no. 63 from Public health reports, vol. 26, no. 25, gives statistics of the continued prevalence of smallpox in this country which probably to most readers will seem startling. More than 30,000 cases were recorded in 1910. This seems a large number, but when it is remembered that it is the quota of a nation of 100,000,000, it will be seen that the percentage is small—infinately small when compared with the frightful ravages of this loathsome disease before the discovery of vaccination. It is also to be noted that of the 30,000 cases only 415, or about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent, resulted fatally. Though smallpox has not yet been exterminated, it certainly has been greatly diminished and modified, and the hope that it and other virulent diseases may in time be entirely extirpated no longer seems unreasonable.

Bulletin 5, series of 1910, Education Bureau, title, American schoolhouses, is one of those thorough-going, complete, satisfying treatises which illuminate their subjects and are soon accepted as authoritative handbooks. This, at least, is the estimate one is likely to place on it at a first hasty inspection, and the chances are that it will improve rather than otherwise on further acquaintance. It is not a discussion of education, but of the physical facilities for education, and it seems to leave no side of this subject untouched. It is distinctly modern and will be a revelation to all "old school" officials who may read it. It is much to be hoped that it will be read by many such officials, for the greater the number the greater the good that will follow. American schoolhouses is a stout pamphlet, for though it has only 133 pages of text its proportions are swollen by the 267 plates and 12 figures with which it is illustrated. The examples of convenient and sanitary and beautiful school architecture which it reproduces should excite the ambition of all school officials in the country to as close imitation as their means will permit. One of the lessons to be learned from this book is that good and useful buildings do not necessarily call for large outlay. This American schoolhouse handbook, in paper covers, may be bought from the Superintendent of Documents for 75 cents. The catalogue entry for this bulletin appears in the July Monthly catalogue, page 32.

A new public document has the title Natural history of the American lobster, carrying perhaps an ambiguous sound to the ears of readers who recall that in the United States language the subject word of this title has varied meanings. In this case it means an edible crustacean (*Homarus americanus*). The work, which is written by Dr. F. H. Herrick, professor of biology, Western Reserve University, is a separately printed advance chapter from Fisheries Bureau Bulletin, vol. 29, not yet published. The separate is known as Fisheries Bureau document 747. It

is a royal octavo of 259 pages and 20 plates, several of them colored to the life. The same author wrote the lobster chapter published by the Fish Commission in 1895, but he says that in the last 15 years so much more has been learned of the lobster that it is now perhaps the best known of the invertebrates. Its artificial propagation, at first unsuccessful, has now become highly successful and all fears of a lobster famine have vanished. This book literally turns the creature inside out and leaves the reader no excuse for failing to become lobster-wise. Sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 50 cents.

Another section of the classification of the Library of Congress has been published. It is class A, general works, polygraphy. Sold by the Superintendent of Documents, price 10 cents.

The 1910 annual report of the Civil Service Commission, dated Mar. 3, 1911, finds the outlook for the merit system very gratifying. The number of positions subject to competition has increased from 13,924 in 1883 (when the civil service law was enacted) to 222,278 in 1910. The increase is due to several reasons, among them the extension of Governmental activities to new fields, such extensions having been facilitated by the merit system, which, in the opinion of the Commission, provides the only practicable method of obtaining qualified persons for scientific, technical, and professional work. But 19 special exceptions to appointment under the civil service rules were authorized by Executive order during the year and of these 17 had passed examinations. The President has directed that all applications to him for appointment by Executive order shall be referred to the Civil Service Commission for report.

Agriculture Department Circular 37 is in relation to a national law to prevent the importation of insect-infested or diseased plants. Such a law has been advocated by the Department for some time past, and the circular cites in support the law of a few years ago, barring out diseased or injurious birds or beasts, which has been of great value to the country.

Farmers' bulletin 470 is a compilation of the game laws for 1911. All Farmers' bulletins are sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents each. Title, contents, and index, for use in binding Farmers' bulletins 426-450 into a permanent volume, have been issued in a pamphlet which the Superintendent of Documents sells at 5 cents.

The beginning of a new series is Insecticide decision no. 1. It is signed by the four members of the Insecticide and Fungicide Board, Agriculture Department. The new board was created by Secretary Wilson's General order 143, Dec. 22, 1910, issued under authority of the act of Apr. 26, 1910, fortified by an appropriation granted Mar. 4, 1911. The purpose of the Board is to pass upon the purity and efficacy of commercial insecticides and fungicides. The members are Marion Dorset (chairman), M. B. Waite, A. L. Quaintance, and J. K. Haywood.

Six more interesting papers in the Yearbook of agriculture for 1910 have been printed in separate pamphlets and are on sale at 5 cents each. The titles are: Community work in the rural high school; Cooperation in the handling and marketing of fruit; Mountain snowfall observations and evaporation investigations in the United States; Nitrogen-gathering plants; The agricultural duty of water; The respiration calorimeter and

the results of experiments with it. Many other Yearbook separates are also now available.

Part 35 (Y to Zypkin) completes Animal Industry Bureau Bulletin 39, Index-catalogue of medical and veterinary zoology. Doubtless the 35 parts will some day be published as a volume, and a portly volume it will be. The aggregate of the prices of the parts is \$3.40. They contain the catalogue of authors. The completed catalogue will be in three subdivisions—Authors, Subjects, and Hosts. One part of the subject catalogue, Trematoda and trematode diseases, has been published as Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin 37 (401 pages, 30c.). No part of the Hosts catalogue has yet been published.

The food laws of the United Kingdom and their administration, by F. L. Dunlap, is the title on the cover of Chemistry Bureau Bulletin 143, though on the title-page "Great Britain" is substituted for "United Kingdom," a distinction without a difference. This is the publication spoken of in the Congressional investigation of the Chemistry Bureau as having been published while the publication of the United States food laws was prevented. The latest publication of the full text of the State and United States food laws by the Chemistry Bureau was revised to July 1, 1905 (Bulletin 69, in 9 pts.). The latest publication of any kind made by the Chemistry Bureau concerning United States food laws is Bulletin 121, Food legislation during year ended June 30, 1908. Bulletin 143 is on sale at 5 cents.

Entomology Bureau Bulletin 91 has for title The importation into the United States of the parasites of the gipsy moth and the brown-tail moth: a report of progress, with some consideration of previous and concurrent efforts of this kind. This is a long title and correctly descriptive of the contents of the bulletin, which has 312 pages and is illustrated by 28 plates and 74 text figures. The publication must have great interest for naturalists and economists, because it tells a new story, that of the pursuit and destruction of insect pests by the agency of their parasites, scientifically assisted on a scale and by methods unknown before. For a decade or more New England has been trying to exterminate the destructive moths by man power, but men have proved unequal to the task. Insects must be fought with insects, and the methods of carrying such a war to a successful end are outlined in this important bulletin. Sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 65 cents. Bulletin 92 was entered in the July Monthly catalogue, page 14. The title of Bulletin 92, White flies injurious to citrus in Florida, has an odd sound due to the fact that the word "citrus" has been used so much as an adjective that one hardly recognizes it when it appears as a noun. It is, however, all right. Its use by the Entomology Bureau is in itself a guarantee of that, and the dictionary backs it up, thus: "Citrus, n. A genus of trees, including the orange, lemon, citron, etc."

Plant Industry Bureau Circular 82, Crop plants for paper making, illustrates its subject by being itself printed on five kinds of paper. The paper on which pages 1, 2, 19, and 20 are printed is made from cornstalks and cotton hulls; pages 3, 4, 17, and 18, from broomcorn stalks; pages 5, 6, 15, and 16, rice straw and spruce wood; pages 7, 8, 13, and 14, from



broomcorn and poplar wood; pages 9, 10, 11, and 12, from cornstalks. All are fairly good white print paper.

The letter of Hon. Charles Nagel, Secretary of Commerce and Labor, advocating Federal charters for corporations, which is addressed to Hon. W. C. Adamson, Chairman of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, has been published in a pamphlet that can be procured from the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents a copy.

A Digest of circular instructions to consular officers, May 27, 1908, to Jan. 1, 1911, has been published by the Consular Bureau, State Department. The Superintendent of Documents can supply copies at 5 cents.

Special consular reports, no. 46, Optical-goods trade in foreign countries (10c.); no. 47, Australia, its resources, industries, and trade, with suggestions as to its development as a market for American merchandise (10c.); and no. 48, Railway situation in China (5c.), are the latest numbers in this series.

Devil Postpile national monument is the euphonious title of the latest reservation set aside by the President for the protection of natural wonders. It is within the Sierra national forest, California, and it cannot be entirely given over to the owner of the Postpile (whatever that may be) because it has Rainbow Falls also within its limits, and if names go for anything the Falls are the greater attraction.

The 1909 issue of that standard annual, Mineral resources of the United States, is now on sale in cloth, vol. 1, 60 cents; vol. 2, 75 cents.

Geological Survey Bulletin 480, just published, is Mineral resources of Alaska, report on progress of investigations in 1910. It has 13 plates, one of which is a large map in a pocket, and 19 text figures. Price, 40 cents.

Water-supply paper 273, Quality of the water supplies of Kansas, should be of much interest to dwellers in the Sunflower State. It presents a great number of analyses of waters in all parts of the State.

Recent publications of the Mines Bureau are: Technical series 3, Specifications for the purchase of fuel oil for the Government; Technical series 4, The electrical section of the Mines Bureau, its purposes and equipment; Miners' circular 4, The use and care of mine-rescue breathing apparatus.

Internal revenue regulations 16, revised to July 1, 1911, seems intended to discourage the use of opium. It relates to the enforcement of the law of 1890, providing that only citizens of the United States who can give bond of \$5,000 may manufacture opium for smoking and must pay a tax of \$10 a pound on their product. The law of 1909 prohibits the importation of any opium except for medicine, and imposes penalties of confiscation, fine, and imprisonment for violation.

The new edition of Cavalry drill regulations is now on sale at 50 cents.

There is a new edition of the Navigation laws, the first since 1907. Obsolete provisions have been eliminated as well as new ones incorporated. The law as now in force is presented complete in one volume. Cloth, \$1.

The American nautical almanac is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at the uniform price of 30 cents a copy. The second edition for 1911 and the first edition for 1912 are now in stock.



Vol. 20, Interstate Commerce Commission reports (decisions) is now on sale, in buckram, at \$1.50. The index has been published in a separate pamphlet, price 10 cents.

Vol. 1, Court of Customs Appeals reports, containing the decisions of this new court from Apr. 1910, to Apr. 1911, has been published. It is in buckram, and sold by the Superintendent of Documents, at \$1.00.

Vol. 20, Treasury decisions, Jan.-June, 1911, is now ready. Buckram, \$2.00.

In the general arbitration treaties with England and France, now pending in the United States Senate, occurs an unusual use of the word "national" as a noun, in the phrase: "Each of the High Contracting Parties shall designate three of its nationals to act as Members of the Commission of Inquiry." Two dictionaries of high repute were unsuccessfully consulted for the diplomatic meaning of the word national, but the third dictionary (the Standard) yielded this satisfactory definition: "National, n. One who is a member of a nation; in a republic, a citizen; in a monarchy, a subject."

Manual of classification of the German Patent Office, 141 pages, royal octavo, has been translated and published by the United States Patent Office and copies may be had for 15 cents. This publication was entered in the July Monthly catalogue, page 35.

#### PUBLICATIONS OF THIRTEENTH CENSUS

Requests for "the complete census of 1910," "abstract of the 13th census," "statistics of bonds and mortgages" in some special county, and such inquiries as "When will the complete census be ready?" "How many volumes in the 13th census and how can I get them?" continue to come to the Superintendent of Documents.

An answer here to these and similar questions may save some time and trouble in correspondence.

None of the final volumes or special reports of the new census has yet been printed, nor is any one of these expected for months or perhaps years to come. ## VAN BUREN PAPERS

Calendar of the papers of Martin Van Buren is the latest addition made by the Library of Congress to the important series of publications guiding investigators to its collection of historical manuscripts. The names of Franklin, Jones, Monroe, Vernon-Wager, and Washington were already in the list, and the name of one who was Senator, Secretary of State, Minister to England, and President is not an unworthy compeer.

The word "calendar" in the library sense is not adequately defined in the dictionaries. A calendar of manuscripts is a calendar no doubt because its entries are arranged in chronological order. But it has come also to mean that calendar entries are not the skeleton entries of a catalogue, but are brief summaries or digests of the contents of the several papers recorded. Thus they have a genuine historical value, not supplying in full the place of the text, but going a good step toward it.

The date of the earliest entry in the Van Buren papers is 1703 and of the latest is 1862. There are of course many gaps, but the amount of material is large, filling a book of 757 pages, and Mr. Van Buren played so large a part in large affairs that his papers are of necessity historically important.

The volume is most copiously and thoroughly indexed and handsomely printed and bound. It is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at \$1.00.

## NEW LIST ON WOOL

Few things are more certain than that the next session of Congress will be the scene of a battle royal over "Schedule K", which is the schedule of the present tariff law that imposes duties on the importation of wool and the products of wool.

Therefore a timely publication will be the Select list of references on wool, with special reference to the tariff, which the Library of Congress has now in press.

This list will be an unusually large one, filling about 150 pages. Its references will be grouped under various subject headings, as Wool trade and economics, with special reference to the tariff, this being further subdivided under United States, General, Germany, Great Britain, British



colonies, Other countries, and History. Sheep raising and Wool manufacture are similarly treated. References are given not only to books and periodicals, but also to the United States Consular reports and to the Congressional record for the recent called session of Congress. An author index and a subject index are supplied. The work will probably be out of press by the time this note reaches the reader.

This full and timely list will be sold by the Superintendent of Documents at a price not yet fixed, but sure to be very low, because, as required by law, it will be based on the cost of paper and printing only.

#### GREAT INVENTIONS DEDICATED TO THE PUBLIC

Major George Owen Squier, Signal Corps, U. S. Army, has had granted to him patents nos. 980,356, 980,357, 980,358, and 980,359, for "certain new and useful improvements in Multiplex Telephony and Telegraphy." All bear the same date of issue, Jan. 3, 1911. Each one, as published, is inscribed "Dedicated to the public," indicating that the inventor declines to make his inventions a monopoly for personal gain, but on the contrary throws them open unreservedly to public use. This is an act of remarkable generosity and public spirit. Similar inventions have heretofore yielded large profits to the inventors.

Major Squier sets forth several "claims" in his application for patents, but the chief one, and the only one readily grasped by the general reader, is in these words: "The invention has as its object the simultaneous transmission of a plurality of telephonic and telegraphic messages over a single telephonic circuit."

The history of the invention is given by the inventor in a recently-issued pamphlet of 102 pages entitled Multiplex telephony and telegraphy by means of electric waves guided by wires. It will not be attempted here to abstract the pamphlet. Only an electrical expert could do that. The Superintendent of Documents can supply copies at 15 cents in paper covers.

Major Squier's pamphlet is printed as Professional paper of the Signal Corps, U. S. Army, but without number. Beginning in 1881 and ending in 1885, the Signal Corps (then the Signal Service) printed Professional papers numbered 1-18. Evidently it is not intended that Major Squier's pamphlet shall be considered a continuation of that old series. Neither is a new series of Professional papers contemplated. If it were, Major Squier's pamphlet would be made no. 1 of that series. Is it intended that it shall be the lone and only unnumbered Professional paper of the Signal Corps?

#### REPRINTED BULLETINS, MINES BUREAU

The investigation of mine accidents and fuels having been by law transferred from the Geological Survey to the Mines Bureau, the bulletins resulting from those important lines of work were also transferred. The first editions of some of them having gone out of print, new prints, with new numbers, are in course of being made by the Mines Bureau, with results as indicated in the list following:

## FEDERAL ANTI-TRUST DECISIONS

In the last moments preceding the final adjournment of the 1st session of the 62d Congress the House passed Senate concurrent resolution 3, providing for the compilation and publication of Federal anti-trust decisions, 1900-1911. Three thousand copies are ordered, 1000 for the Senate and 2000 for the House. The order will also carry with it automatically, under the printing law of 1895, an edition of nearly 500 copies for distribution to the depository libraries.

The dates fixed for the new compilation include those already covered by Finch's Federal anti-trust decisions, 1890-1906, published 1907, in 2 vols., and extend the period five years further, to 1911. The full title-pages of Finch's compilation read thus: "Federal anti-trust decisions; cases decided in United States courts, arising under, involving, or growing out of the enforcement of the anti-trust act of July 2, 1890 (26 Stat., 209) including a few somewhat similar decisions not based upon that act; prepared and edited by James A. Finch by direction of the Attorney General." Vol. 1 has the dates 1890-1899 and vol. 2 the dates 1900-1906.

These title-pages presumably indicate the scope of the new compilation, which, like the former one, is to be made under the direction of the Department of Justice. The character of the forthcoming publication is stated only in very general terms in the concurrent resolution.

## EXECUTIVE JOURNALS OF THE SENATE

In the Monthly catalogue for May, 1910, was published a note on the several issues of the Executive journals, which are the journals of the proceedings of the Senate when in executive (secret) session. It is in these sessions that the President's nominations to office and the treaties which he has negotiated with foreign countries are considered. As these two classes of acts of the Chief Executive can not be consummated without the "advice and consent" of the Senate, the official record of the Senate's action in secret session is a historical document of the first order. This at least is the opinion of librarians, collectors, and scholars. The Senate apparently is not so much impressed with this view. If it

were it would probably print larger editions of the Executive journals, so that at least the public libraries in the larger cities might have sets on file for consultation by all interested persons. This has been done only in the case of the first order for printing, made nearly a century ago.

The Executive journals are not currently printed like the Journals of the public proceedings of the Senate and the House. They are held in confidence until it is supposed no harm can result to the country or to individuals from their publication. The first order for such publication was made in 1828 and under it the Executive proceedings of the first 20 Congresses were printed in three volumes, the edition being 700 copies. The next order for publication was made in 1886 and called for the publication of the proceedings of the 21st-40th Congresses. One hundred copies were ordered and 125 copies were printed. This issue was in 13 volumes (numbered 4-16) but in 15 books, vols. 14 and 15 being each in 2 parts. The next order was made in 1901, and resulted in the issue of vols. 17-27, containing the executive proceedings of the 41st-51st Congresses. The number of copies was 250. The fourth order to print was adopted Jan. 10, 1911, providing for printing 250 copies of proceedings of the 52d-57th Congresses, Dec. 1891-Mar. 1903, and at the same time removing the injunction of secrecy therefrom.

The occasion for the note in the Monthly catalogue, May, 1910, was the appearance of vol. 28, the first one issued under the fourth (and thus far the final) order for printing. Vol. 28 contains the secret journals of the two sessions of the 52d Congress (Dec. 1891-Mar. 1893) and of a special session at the beginning of the 53d Congress (Mar. 4-Apr. 15, 1893). The occasion for the present note is the appearance of vols. 29-32, containing the Executive journals of the 53d-56th Congresses (Aug. 1893-Mar. 1901) and the special session of the Senate of the 57th Congress (Mar. 4-9, 1901). Vol. 29 (53d Congress) is in two parts or books, and so is vol. 31 (55th Congress). Vol. 30 (54th Congress) and vol. 32 (56th Congress) are single books. The whole set, from the 1st Congress to the 57th, is therefore 32 volumes in 36 books.

Vols. 29-32 are indexed in the same copious style first adopted in vol. 28. There are Alphabetical indexes, Geographical indexes, Diplomatic and consular indexes, Army indexes, and Navy indexes, one of each of these five for each session of Congress. Thus the volume for a Congress which has held three sessions has 15 indexes. In vol. 31, pt. 2 (55th Congress), these 15 indexes fill 1077 pages.

The note in the May, 1910, Monthly catalogue stated that the fourth order for printing the Executive journals was passed Apr. 20, 1910, and that it provided for printing to the end of the 58th Congress (Mar. 4, 1905). As the compilers of the Monthly catalogue do not have access to the manuscript Executive journals, this date was assigned on "information and belief," the information coming from a source believed to be authentic.

The apparent incorrectness of the date then given is now shown by printed copies of the resolution of Jan. 10, 1911, "tipped in" to vols. 29-32, evidently as an afterthought. This resolution, adopted in executive session, provides for printing only up to the end of the special session of the Senate of the 57th Congress, Mar. 9, 1901. Resolutions for printing



were, it is believed, adopted on both of the dates named, the later one superseding the earlier.

#### SPEECHES WITHHELD FOR REVISION

On August 4, Rule 7, relating to the publication of "deferred speeches" in the daily Congressional record, was changed to require that the Senate proceedings be printed first in order, the House proceedings second, and the deferred speeches, or speeches withheld for revision, last.

This is a salutary change. For many years it had been the custom to give the right of way to speeches which had not been printed in regular order in the proceedings of the day when they were delivered, or, if not delivered, when permission to print them was granted by the House or Senate. When the orators were ready to have their speeches printed, first place was given them in the daily Record, crowding the current proceedings back to the rear part of the publication. Sometimes the speeches were many and long, making the reports of the proceedings appear remote and obscure in comparison. Evidently this was bad form, and it is in accord with good publishing practice that it has been amended.

There were also various rumors of rivalry among the orators for the conspicuous place on the front page. Now that there isn't any front page for speeches, one cause of contention has been happily removed.

In the bound volumes of the permanent edition of the Congressional record the speeches which, because of their being withheld for revision, have been printed out of their regular order in the daily Record are restored to their proper places in the proceedings. The only exception to this rule is the few speeches which are withheld so long that they are not printed at all in the daily Record and are not received in time to find a place in the bound volumes of the permanent edition. For these speeches it is sometimes necessary to publish an Appendix.

#### HOW ERRORS GET INTO THE DOCUMENT INDEX

Vol. 1, Annual report of the American Historical Association for the year 1908, was issued early in August, 1910, in its usual form and with perhaps something more than its usual store of historical papers. On its title-page it carried the customary legend, "In two volumes, Vol. I." Everything was very simple, correct, and familiar.

By the time vol. 2 came along in August, 1911, complications had arisen. For several years the 2d volume of the Historical Association report has been given up to the reports of the Historical Manuscripts Commission. The 8th report of this commission is a collection of the diplomatic correspondence of the Republic of Texas, edited by the late Professor Geo. P. Garrison of the University of Texas. Part 1 of this report was published as vol. 2 of the 1907 report of the Historical Association. It was expected that part 2 of the Texan diplomatic correspondence would be published as vol. 2 of the 1908 report, and so it has been, but with a difference. After contents and index had been made ready for printing it was discovered that the concluding part of the Texan correspondence was far too voluminous to be contained in one book, and it was therefore decided to publish vol. 2 of the 1908 Historical Association

report in two parts or books, making it a 2-volume report in three books. The ordinary course would have been to divide the Texan correspondence into three parts, using the third part as the second volume of the 1909 Historical Association report. It was thought, however, that the index work, in which all of the Texan material was treated as belonging to the 1908 report, had progressed too far to permit of another arrangement.

This explanation seems due to librarians, because of the fact that the Historical Association report has never before been published in more than two books, and also because of the unusual methods adopted for indicating the division of vol. 2 into parts. On the title-page of the first part appears this somewhat complicated arrangement of volumes, parts, and titles:

Not even a librarian would be likely to understand at first glance that the figure 1 inclosed in parentheses means that vol. 2 is in two parts, of which this is the first. The librarian will, however, by consulting the table of contents, discover that the instalment of the Texan correspondence fills 1591 pages, while vol. II (1) has but 807 pages, indicating that there must be another book to follow.

Book 3 of the 1908 report has this for title-page:

Annual report of the American Historical Association for the year 1908  
In two volumes  
Vol. II (2)  
Diplomatic correspondence of the Republic of Texas  
Part III

The unusual is always a little troublesome, no matter how simple it may appear when explained.

This case, however, is not altogether simple. There is another print of the Historical Association report, which of course its compilers did not take into account in making the innovations just spoken of. This is the Congressional print, which bears a document number assigned in the Government Printing Office, though not by the Superintendent of Documents. In the Congressional print the Historical Association report for 1908 is House document 137 of the 61st Congress, 2d session. The Document index for that session has been compiled, printed, and distributed by the Superintendent of Documents. It is a volume of 396 pages, compiled with great care and labor and some expense. It indexes alphabetically, by their titles, by the names of the Senators and Representatives presenting them, by the Committees reporting them, and also in their numerical order, the 4,311 documents and reports published by and for the session of Congress indicated. Those concerning which correct information was obtained are correctly indexed. These, of course, are nearly all of them. The American Historical Association report for

1908 is a conspicuous exception. Though the final copy of the Index was not sent to the Public Printer till April, 1911, only vol. 1 of the 1908 report had then been received, and no hint that vol. 2 was for the first time to be split into parts had been whispered. Consequently the 1908 report was listed as House document 137, 2 parts, as vols. 124 and 125, and as serial numbers 5827 and 5828. If the Superintendent of Documents had been fully informed, the listing would have been House document 137, 3 parts; vols. 124, 125, and 126; serial numbers 5827, 5828, and 5829.

The indexes to the numbered Congressional documents are sent to some hundreds of public, scientific, and university libraries for their guidance in cataloguing, classifying, and shelving the public documents which the Government of the United States sends to them as gifts. So far as the Historical Association report for 1908 is concerned, it will prove a false guide. It is impossible now to supply to the libraries a pt. 3 of House document 137, or a vol. 126, or a serial number 5829. They must list and label vol. 125 twice—as 125, pt. 1, and 125, pt. 2, and serial number 5828 as 5828, vol. 1, and 5828, vol. 2.

These are awkward and inefficient notations, which the Documents Office never uses except, as in the present instance, upon dire compulsion.

The Superintendent of Documents has of necessity so much to do with the public documents that to withhold information from him is dangerous, in the sense that it is likely to lead to annoyance and loss for many good and unoffending people who depend upon the Superintendent and his publications for their knowledge of Government documents.

#### THREE MORE CORRECTIONS

Let every librarian get her or his red pen and take down Statutes at large, v. 35, pt. 1, serial 4430, and the file of Consular reports for August, 1911.

In the Statutes, turn to page 49, where, opposite the caption of Chap. 106, will be found the side note "H. R. 4922." This should be S. 4922. The chapter, before it became a law, was Senate bill 4922, not House bill.

In serial 4430 (which is vol. 15, Senate documents, 57th Congress, 2d session) turn to document 209, page 93. There will be found a footnote citing House ex. doc. 25, 32d Cong. 2d sess. Change 2d session to 1st session.

In Daily consular and trade reports, Aug. 29, 1911, page 942, in a list of new Government publications, is this entry: "Detection and determination of small quantities of ethyl and methyl alcohol and of formic acid, 8 pages. Circular 180, Bureau of Chemistry." There is no circular 180 of the Chemistry Bureau. The title given belongs to Circular 74 of that Bureau.

#### ANOTHER INSTANCE

Something has been said elsewhere in this number of the awkward errors into which Document index, no. 16, was led through lack of information as to an unheralded innovation in the methods of publication of



a number of the annual Report of the American Historical Association. A similar but not identical instance is among the month's document happenings.

A bureau issued a multigraphed circular announcing a forthcoming serial publication. This circular was apparently rather widely distributed. Among other things, it announced that under certain conditions the forthcoming publication would be supplied to applicants by the Superintendent of Documents. That official, however, had not been consulted, nor did the Bureau in question think it worth while even to send him a copy of its circular announcement.

Soon after the circulars were put in circulation the Superintendent of Documents began to receive letters asking for the new periodical. Answers were promptly returned stating that the Government had not issued such a publication. Fortunately, before this had gone very far an applicant inclosed in his letter the circular announcement which the bureau had sent him.

This was the first information received at this office as to the proposed new publication.

The Superintendent of Documents is in touch with the document-buying public, a fact worth remembering when a new Government periodical is to be launched.
