Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 63d Congress, 2d session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

Documents can not be supplied by this Office free to individuals nor forwarded in advance of payment.

Documents entered in this catalogue that are for sale by the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., are indicated by a star (*) preceding the price named. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the Department, Bureau, or Division issuing the document, a double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is not obtainable, and whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary it will be found under the name of the Bureau. The Senate and House documents and reports are issued in limited editions and, unless otherwise indicated, may be obtained only through Members of Congress.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents, give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to several millions, of which over a million are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

MONTHLY CATALOGUE DISTRIBUTION

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, Resident Commissioner, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

Subscription price to individuals, \$1.10 a year, including index. Back numbers can not be supplied. Please notify the Superintendent of Documents of any change in address.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the L. C. catalogue cards will be found at the end of the titles of the more important monographic documents. The figure following the card number (separated from it by a slanting line) indicates the number of cards required for entries suggested (title entry not included) on the cards. The price of the cards is 2c. for the first card and $\frac{1}{2}$ c. for each addi-

tional card for the same title ordered at the same time. Remittances should be made to the Librarian of Congress. Cards can not be furnished by the Superintendent of Documents.

INDEX

Beginning with July, 1913, an Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued at the end of the fiscal year, June, 1914. This will contain index entries for all the numbers issued from July, 1913, to June, 1914, and can be bound with those numbers as an index for the volume. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

HOW TO REMIT

Remittances for the documents marked with a star (*) should be made to the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., by postal money order, express order, or New York draft. Currency may be sent at sender's risk.

Postage stamps, foreign money, defaced or smooth coins will positively not be accepted.

To facilitate the payment of the cost of documents, the Superintendent of Documents will hereafter accept coupons issued by him instead of cash. Coupons of the value of 5 cents each are sold in sets of 20 for \$1.00. Address order to Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office.

No charge is made for postage on documents forwarded to points in United States, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, or to Canada, Cuba, or Mexico. To other countries the regular rate of postage is charged, and remittances must cover such postage.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

It is the unexpected that happens. Of all the things one has heard said of the routine annual reports of the United States Executive Departments which form so conspicuous a feature of the public printing during the closing months of every year, no person can be identified who ever recommended the reprinting of any one of them as a popular feature of a great magazine. Yet this is what has been done, and those who see it with its accompaniment of 32 of the superb illustrations which have made the National geographic magazine famous will recognize at once the fitness of its selection, while those who read it cannot fail to be impressed by its brilliant diction as well as by the vast importance of its subject. The title given to it by the editors of the Geographic magazine is "The nation's undeveloped resources." Under this significant title and in the attractive setting which the magazine has given it, it must secure a wide reading and it would even seem possible that every Senator and Representative might be induced to read it. Should this other unexpected incident occur, the effect upon the present legislation and the future development of the country could not fail to be most salutary. The official title of the striking magazine article in question is: Report of the Secretary of the Interior for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1913.

Vol. 1, in 2 parts, of the Transactions of the 15th International Congress on Hygiene and Demography, held in Washington in September, 1912, was issued in February, 1914, this completing the set, vols. 2-6 having been previously issued. As the readers of the Monthly catalogue have already been informed, this report is not a public document of the United States, though by an unusual arrangement it was printed at the Government Printing Office.

Income tax regulations, from the beginning to Jan. 5, have been collected in an indexed pamphlet of 127 pages, officially designated as series 7, no. 33, of the Regulations of the Internal Revenue Commissioner, which is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 15 cents for single copies, 10 cents each for 5 or more copies up to 100, \$35.00 for 500 copies, and \$65.00 for 1000 copies, and any larger number at the same rate. Yearly subscribers to the weekly Treasury decisions have received the same material as a Supplement to no. 7 of vol. 26 (Feb. 12, 1914). Its number as a Treasury decision is 1944.

The Agriculture Department has adopted the very sensible and useful plan of appending to the titles of the publications as given in its Monthly list of publications brief notes explaining the purpose of the particular publication annotated and naming the classes of readers to whom it will be most useful. These notes will also be used in the publications themselves, appearing as footnotes on the first page of the text. They will also be used by the Superintendent of Documents in his price lists.

The latest edition of the Ships' data book now in stock is that of 1912, but a new edition is in preparation by the Construction and Repair Bureau, Navy Department, and will be published in the near future.

Farmers' bulletin 575, another number bearing the title Agricultural outlook, is a statistical treatise on the important subject, Live stock of the United States, prepared in the Statistics Bureau. A footnote on the first page announces that

the next regular report of that Bureau will relate to corn, wheat, oats, and barley, and will be issued at 2.15 p. m., Mar. 7, 1914.

House document 469, 63d Congress, 2d session, fills 127 pages with a minute account of the Expenditures for travel during the fiscal year 1913, by officials and employees of the Agriculture Department. The total outlay stated on this account was \$207,513.04, but this does not include the work of special agents, inspectors, or employees "who in the discharge of their regular duties are required to travel constantly." We can only conjecture the amount of travel by these exceptional ones who were on the wing all the time. As to those named in Document 469, all details are set forth in full—the names of the travelers, where they went, and what for. A glance through the pages gives one a new and broader idea of the incessant and wide-spread activities of this great department of more than 14,000 persons. Its agents penetrate to every nook and corner of the republic and everywhere they spread enlightenment and expert knowledge. The immediate results are no doubt many and salutary, but the future and collateral results may be greater still.

The Superintendent of Documents has found that the continued demand for copies of the report of the Commissioner of Corporations on the development of water-power requires a reprint of that important document, the first supply of which is now nearly exhausted. As, however, the number reprinted will be much less than the original edition, the cost will be proportionately greater, requiring an advance of the retail price to 75 cents a copy.

The Agriculture Department is giving "separates" from the Journal of agricultural research a wide distribution and has adopted for use in these prints a system of symbols for the purpose of identifying the "separates" with the bureaus by which they were prepared. A "separate," be it known, is a separate print of a chapter or other excerpt from a larger work. Each separate from the Journal of agricultural research carries in the lower right-hand margin of its first page a symbol like this: "A—10." This means that the publication is the 10th contribution from the Bureau of Animal Industry to the Journal of agricultural research. A similar symbol substituting a "B" for the "A" would mean that the contribution came from the Experiment Stations Office. Following out the scheme, we find that C stands for Weather Bureau, D for Public Roads Office, E for Chemistry Bureau, F for Forest Service, G for Plant Industry Bureau, H for Soils Bureau, K for Entomology Bureau, L for Statistics Bureau, M for Biological Survey Bureau, N for Markets Office, and O for Rural Organization Service.

The United States Geological Survey has begun the issue, in parts, of an annual volume which will have the general title Contributions to the hydrology of the United States, and will also have the series title Water-supply paper and a number in that series, while each one of the parts will have a subject title of its own. This is a somewhat complicated layout, but no more so than the Survey has had for some years in its popular annual volume in the bulletin series having the general title Contributions to economic geology, with also a bulletin number and a set of separates, with distinct subject titles for each. Recently the Survey has started another series within a series on the same plan, but called Contributions to general geology. Having "got away" with these two, of course the way seems clear for introducing a similar set in the Water-supply paper series. The Water-supply number of the 1914 Contributions to hydrology is 345. But one separate has thus far been issued. It is numbered 345—A and has for subject title: A preliminary report on ground water for irrigation in the vicinity of Wichita, Kans.

Both volumes of Mineral resources for 1912 are now for sale. Pt. 1 at 90 cents; pt. 2, \$1.00.

Index-catalogue of the library of the Surgeon General's Office, Army, 2d series, has now reached the 18th volume, in which are found the titles from Tetamore to Tzschirner. Sold by the Superintendent of Documents at \$2.00.

The complete report of the Dillingham Immigration Commission is in 41 volumes and its cost is too great for many who would like to have it. This objection, however, is largely met by the fact that vols. 1 and 2 are made up of abstracts of the larger volumes, so that in these two volumes the reader may get the most vital parts of the whole 41. Naturally, these volumes have sold more rapidly than the remaining 39 and the stock of them has become exhausted, though the demand continues. To meet this demand, vols. 1 and 2 have been reprinted and are on sale at \$1.25 a volume.

The session laws of the first session of the Alaska Territorial Legislature have been printed by the Bailey Empire Print of Juneau, Alaska, and issued in law sheep binding.

A revision of Chemistry Bureau Bulletin 107, Methods of analysis, is in contemplation, but it may be a year before it will be accomplished. Chemistry bulletins 122, 132, 137, 152, and 162 all relate to methods of analysis described in 107. Pending the expected revision, the Superintendent of Documents is making another reprint of Bulletin 107. 20 cents.

The Board of Food and Drug Inspection, Agriculture Department, has been abolished and its authority transferred to Dr. Alsberg, Dr. Wiley's successor as Chief of the Chemistry Bureau.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has published Specifications for maps and profiles as prescribed by the Commission, first issue, effective Feb. 1, 1914. Price 15 cents.

Education Bureau Bulletin 59, series of 1913, is Bibliography of education, 1910-11. Price 15 cents.

A publication of very unusual interest, due both to its subject-matter and to its authorship, is entitled: Facts of interest concerning the military resources and policy of the United States, issued by Major-General Leonard Wood, Chief of Staff, U. S. Army. The Superintendent of Documents can supply copies at 5 cents.

The Foreign and Domestic Commerce Bureau has in press Special agents series 79, Commercial organizations in southern and western cities.

Professional paper 90, United States Geological Survey, will be Contributions to general geology, 1914. It will be made up of several short papers, each of which will also have a separate publication. The first, now in press, is Geology of the pitchblende ores of Colorado. These separate prints cannot be supplied by the Superintendent of Documents, but he will have on sale Professional paper 90 when issued as a complete publication.

The latest issue of the Census Bureau's decennial report on Wealth, debt, and taxation was for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903, and was published in 1907. The next issue in this series will embody the statistics of the fiscal year 1912-13 and the Bureau hopes to issue it complete early in the calendar year 1915. Advance sheets will be issued as the statistics become available. The one on Debt will probably be out early next summer.

THE NEW PRICE LISTS

The Superintendent of Documents received from the printers, during February, four new price lists, a liberal number of thousands of copies of each. The Price lists are the only documents he gives away and he is glad to have a liberal supply.

The new ones are:

A 7th edition of no. 15, Publications of the United States Geological Survey. This is one of the most popular and most called for lists in the whole series.

A 2d edition of no. 56, Smithsonian Institution reports. The Annual report is really the only publication of the Smithsonian Institution proper that is a public document of the United States, the others, including the two important series, Contributions to knowledge and Miscellaneous collections, being printed and published at the charge of the Institution's private endowment. The general appendix to the Annual report is made up of the most essential and notable published scientific papers of the year at home and abroad. These are all first published as separate pamphlets, known as "authors' editions." The Superintendent of Documents is not able to supply many of these prints, but the titles of all of them are brought out in the new list and the dates and prices of the volumes of the Reports in which they are to be found are given.

A 4th edition of no. 53, Maps published by the Government. This list is not so full as formerly, the Geological Survey having withdrawn its maps and folios from the Superintendent of Documents and taken to selling them itself. The Superintendent still offers the United States wall maps and the maps of the several States issued by the General Land Office. These in themselves are almost enough to stock a map shop. There are, however, other series of maps, from the Office of the Chief of Engineers of the Army, from the Hayden, Wheeler, and other western surveys, the atlases accompanying the big series entitled Official records of the Union and Confederate armies, the maps of the Forest Service, and many others advertised in Price list 53, as well as many books relating to maps. Still, it is far from being a complete list of Government maps. The three great Government map publishers are the Coast and Geodetic Survey, the Hydrographic Office, and the Geological Survey, though the Post-Office Department has become a strong competitor since the development of the rural free delivery and parcel post systems. All of these prefer to sell their own maps. It is believed that the United States Government, collectively, is the largest map publisher in the world.

A first edition of Price list 59, Interstate Commerce Commission publications. The Commission has become a profuse publisher and its documents of course enlist the intense attention of the transportation interests which are affected by them. The Commission, it is to be presumed, makes considerable free distribution, but notwithstanding this the Superintendent of Documents sells its publications by thousands. A separate list of these important documents has become a necessity. Some other bureaus, which are also active publishers, will soon be made the subject of similar lists.

The new Price lists now in press are: A 5th edition of no. 38, Animal Industry; a 6th edition of no. 44, Plant life; and a 2d edition of no. 54, Miscellaneous, a list which covers a variety of subjects, including pretty much everything that is not found in any of the other lists of the Document series.

New editions of no. 25, Transportation, no. 32, Noncontiguous territory, and no. 36, Government periodicals, are in course of preparation.

ADVERSE REPORT FROM PRINTING COMMITTEE

Feb. 4, instant, Senator Fletcher, chairman of the Committee on Printing, submitted an adverse report on Senate joint resolution 194, which if passed would provide for the reprinting of the Documentary history of the Constitution as a numbered Senate document. This work is in 5 volumes. Vols. 1-3 were printed as a Congressional document in the 56th Congress (House document 529) and 6000 sets were distributed by Senators and Representatives who

were members of that Congress and 1000 sets by the State Department. Vols. 4 and 5 were issued several years later and had no Congressional edition.

The compilation was made in the Bureau of Rolls and Library, State Department. It is a literal reproduction, so far as possible in type, of many ancient manuscripts, including Madison's report of the proceedings of the Constitutional Convention of 1788 by which the Constitution was framed. Madison, it is said, was the only delegate who attended every session of the Convention during the 4 months of its existence, and also the only one who made a contemporaneous report of the debates. As the Convention sat with closed doors and had no official reporters, of course the historical value of Madison's notes is inestimable. The Journals of the Convention are also reproduced, but, like all journals, they give only the skeleton of the action taken.

The adverse report of the Printing Committee was based in part on the fact that the Superintendent of Documents has still on hand for sale about 300 sets of vols. 1-3 and has also authority of law to reprint vols. 4 and 5 should the demand for those volumes justify doing so. The question of reprinting is still under consideration and a list is being kept of inquiries for vols. 4 and 5 as a basis for decision. The sale price of vols. 1-3 is \$3.50.

The original cost of printing this work was large, owing in great part to the intricate and tedious work of showing in type all the erasures and interlineations of the original manuscripts. Reprinting would be cheaper, for an equal number, as the electrotype plates have been preserved and the slow and costly typesetting need not be repeated. The Committee found that 7,000 sets of vols. 1-3 printed in the 56th Congress cost \$24,592, being a fraction more than a dollar for each of the 21,000 books.

This, however, was not the first print. The Congressional print was not made till 1902 and was made from plates. The first print was made by the State Department in the years 1894 to 1900 in parts published as appendixes to Bulletins 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9 of the Rolls and Library Bureau. It was for these prints that the unusual and costly typesetting was done. If the Printing Committee were to look up the bills for these first prints it would probably find a considerable increase to add to its statement of the cost of the work.

The Committee report closes with this sentence: "Owing to the large expense involved, the committee does not believe there should be any further free distribution of the publication."

At the date of writing, resolution 194 was still "laid over" without action.

NEW SUBSCRIPTION LISTS OF THE MONTH

In February, the Superintendent of Documents added to his 30-odd lists of subscribers to an equal number of Government periodicals quite a string of new ones. Perhaps the most important of these—certainly the one for which the greatest number of subscribers is expected—is the Daily consular and trade reports, issued by the Foreign and Domestic Commerce Bureau, Commerce Department. This daily summary of business news from foreign countries, mostly supplied by the United States consuls in all parts of the world, is much sought for by manufacturers and distributors who have or hope to have an export trade. The method of distribution heretofore has been gratuitous, and the publishing bureau has tried to keep it within reasonable bounds by confining the list to "approved applicants." Notwithstanding the care exercised in this direction, the list has constantly been overrunning the limit to which the edition is confined by law and many times has been arbitrarily trimmed down. This trimming is not an agreeable task, for it is practically impossible to determine which names on the list are best entitled to copies

because making the best use of them. After much unsatisfactory experimenting with the free system it has at last been decided to apply the only infallible test, namely, distribution by sale. If a man buys and pays for a periodical (or anything else) we then know to a certainty that he wants it and values it and will try to make such use of it as to justify the outlay, whereas he may ask for a free publication out of mere curiosity, or merely because it costs nothing, for there are many who like to get something for nothing even though they may have no use at all for the something. These are not the only reasons going to show that the gratuitous distribution of public documents is both wasteful and ineffective and therefore one of those things foreign to the spirit of the times and sure to be outgrown and abandoned at no distant day.

The rate for yearly subscriptions to the Daily consular and trade reports to residents of the United States and its outlying possessions and of Canada, Cuba, Mexico, and Shanghai, is \$2.50, and to residents of other countries, to which postage must be paid, the rate is \$5.00 a year. Subscriptions begin immediately on receipt of remittance, and cannot be taken for a less term than one year. Back numbers cannot be supplied. The only free distribution hereafter will be to trade organizations, libraries, and like agencies of publicity.

The first number received of the new series of Service and regulatory announcements to be issued by the several bureaus of the Agriculture Department is that of the Animal Industry Bureau for the month of January, 1914, the date of issue being February 10. It supersedes the former Service announcements issued by this Bureau. It contains all that the former series did and considerably more. Service and regulatory announcements will be distributed free to the members of the Bureau and a few others and will be sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents a single copy and 50 cents for a yearly subscription. It is presumed that the terms will be the same for the monthly Service and regulatory announcements of each of the other agricultural bureaus. This first issue from the Animal Industry Bureau contains statistics of the slaughtering of cattle, calves, sheep, goats, and swine back to July, 1910; lists of convictions under the quarantine law, the 28-hour law, and the meat-inspection law; a list of the December, 1913, and January, 1914, publications of the Bureau, and other like material, amounting to a complete history of the meat-inspection service for the month of January.
