Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 62d Congress, 2d session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

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In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to over a million, of which several hundred thousand are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

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The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Bulletin 99, Statistics Bureau, Agriculture Department, is the 19th report on Wages of farm labor, made by that bureau in the 44 years last past. This latest report is based on investigations made in 1909, and shows that farm wages were then higher than they were shown to be by any other one of the 19 investigations. The bureau uses Bulletin 99 also as the medium for an indignant denial of the common report that farmers' wives are more prone to insanity than other women. Mr. George Kirby Holmes, the author of Bulletin 99, says that he has written to many editors, public speakers, and writers who had repeated the insanity statement, asking them for proofs of their assertions, but no proofs have been forthcoming, and Mr. Holmes believes that there are no such proofs and that the statements concerning the insanity of farmers' wives are calumnious. Statistics Bureau Bulletin 94, Supply of farm labor, is a good companion treatise for Bulletin 99. 10 cents each.

Two titles are erroneously printed in the Monthly list of publications for October, issued by the Agriculture Department, and listing the new publications of that Department only. Both are on page 2. One is Entomology Bureau Bulletin 118, The bean thrips, which is printed The pear thrips. The other is Forest Service Bulletin 112, Firekilled Douglas fir, which is printed Forest-killed Douglas fir.

During November the Interstate Commerce Commission published critical illustrated reports on the railroad accidents at Hyde Park, N. Y., Mar. 31, 1912, and near Antioch, Ill., Aug. 25, 1912. For sale by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents each.

United States Geological Survey Bulletin 507, The mining districts of the western United States, has been published also as House document 351, 62d Congress, 2d session. Bulletin 520 of the Survey is House document 845 of the same Congress. Its title is Mineral resources of Alaska, and it is the 8th annual report on that subject. The mineral industry of Alaska is in a stage of development where the results of even preliminary surveys and examinations have a value to miners and prospectors which is much increased by making the results of investigations available at the earliest possible date. This is the reason for the annual reports, which will be followed later by the complete reports and maps.

The Post Office Department has issued, under date of Nov. 1, 1912, a list of Post offices and stations designated as postal savings depositories, usually spoken of as postal savings banks. The actual number of these in operation Nov. 1, 1912, was 12,812.

Forest Service Bulletin 113, Methods and apparatus for prevention and control of forest fires, is authority for the statement that the losses of timber by forest fires, including those of forest products and young timber, greatly exceed the yearly use of wood in the arts. This bulletin has several interesting and informing pictures and sells for 10 cents.

The Office of Indian Affairs has issued a new edition, corrected to Nov. 1, 1912, of its Routes to Indian agencies and schools, with their post-office and telegraphic addresses and nearest railroad stations. The casual reader will be struck by the number of such schools and often by their remoteness from any center of population. Still each new edition shows that the railroad, telegraph, and telephone have come within reaching distance of more of them. 5 cents.

The Federal Horticultural Board has issued its 4th Notice of quarantine (domestic), this one being directed against the Christmas tree trade of the New England States. Because of the infection of those States with the gipsy moth and the brown-tail moth, the movement of coniferous trees (evergreens) from there to other States is prohibited.

Here are more statistics which, like all United States national statistics in our day, run into prodigious figures. These are from Forest Service Bulletin 118 and the subject is Prolonging the life of crossties. In the year 1909 American railroads bought 123,751,000 wooden ties at a total cost of \$60,320,700. Of these ties 16,437,000 were used in the construction of new lines and 107,314,000 were used for replacing worn-out ties in existing lines. This is equivalent to replacing 358 ties in every mile of track in the country. These ties so replaced required the cutting of about 710,000 acres of heavily timbered land. The amount of wood so cut equals the annual growth on about 55,000,000 acres of forest. Bulletin 118 maintains that by adopting three conservative measures, which are described in the pamphlet, fully one half of this enormous annual outlay might be saved. 15 cents.

Much has been published concerning the boys' corn clubs organized in the Western and Southern States by the Agriculture Department, and they have gained great publicity through the visits of the prize winners to Washington and their entertainment there by agricultural officials. An equally important and even more interesting class of organizations, concerning which much less has been published, are the girls' canning clubs, in which 3,000 farm girls are already enrolled. The girls have specialized on tomatoes instead of corn and have usually canned the product as well as grown it. Each girl is allotted a tenth of an acre as a garden, and from these small plots many have realized more than 500 marketable cans of tomatoes, while a few have produced nearly 1,000 cans and have cleared as much as \$100 besides winning prizes. The Plant Industry Bureau has published instructions for the organization of girls' canning and poultry clubs and is encouraging their organization in all the broad extent of the fertile farming regions of the country. The returns of the work of the girls' clubs for 1912 are not yet in print. A report of unique interest may be expected in due season.

Exaggerated statements of the profits of blue-gum growing in California have been published by persons having lands in that State to sell. Forest Service Circular 210 (5 cents) has been issued for the purpose of correcting the false impressions thus created. Blue-gum is the common name of the variety of eucalyptus tree most generally grown in California. The Forest Service holds that raising these trees on land costing not more than \$60 an acre is a good investment, insuring a return of about 6 per cent. at the end of a term of 40 years growth. On land of greater value blue-gum growing is not recommended as an investment. The Service denies the truth of certain advertised statements that blue-gum groves will produce 100,000 board feet to the acre in 10 years. Half that growth in twice that time is a good yield.

Mr. South Trimble, Clerk of the House of Representatives, has issued, under date of November 15, an Unofficial list of members-elect of the House of the

63d Congress, with their places of residence so far as ascertained, printing the names of the Democratic Representatives in roman and the opposition Representatives, whether Republican or Progressive, in italics. Corrected editions of the list have been or will be printed on the receipt of later information.

Circular 40, Standards Bureau, Sodium oxalate as a standard in volumetric analysis, is on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents.

Reprint 99, from Public health reports, is entitled Transmission of poliomyelitis by means of the stable fly. Poliomyelitis is known to laymen as infantile paralysis. It is a disease of such malignity that it sets all ordinary treatment at defiance and has aroused the medical world to extreme effort to trace and expose its cause. No specific cure can be devised till the cause has been discovered. This leaflet describes the experiments of Drs. Richardson of the Massachusetts Health Board and Rosenau of the Harvard Medical School. The results of their experiments are, with scientific caution, summed up thus: "These results would seem to demonstrate conclusively that poliomyelitis may be transmitted to monkeys through the agency of the stable fly. It remains for further work to decide whether this is the usual or the only method of transmission in nature." 5 cents.

Special consular reports 57 has for its subject New Zealand, its resources, industry, and trade, with suggestions as to its development as a market for American merchandise. It describes many features of that interesting country which are but little known. This was listed in the Monthly catalogue for October, 1912, page 186.

The United States Government has in the Superintendent of the Hot Springs Reservation a most enthusiastic official. He believes in the Springs and he doesn't hesitate to say so. Here is a paragraph from his 1912 annual report: "I can not paint in too optimistic colors the many improvements which have and are constantly taking place, and as the curtain which separates the months from the years and the years from the centuries is shifted the past year will be memorable for many years to come to this resort for the reason that it saw the beginning of a new era in the administration under governmental control of these waters by the opening for service of three of as magnificent modern and palatial bathhouses as are in all the world." There is more, but this sample is sufficient to show the enthusiastic spirit of the report. Still room ought to be given for one sentence of comprehensive eulogy bestowed on the Government's most renowned health resort: "Hot Springs has no equal, either in curative waters, climate, mountain surroundings, or anything which adds to material comfort and happiness while one is engaged in rest, recreation, and the restoration of health." 5 cents.

Reprint 100 from Public health reports, by Assistant Surgeon General Rucker, entitled Whooping cough, its nature and prevention, a popular discussion of a widespread and dangerous disease for which familiarity has bred contempt, is noticeable on two grounds, (1) the unfamiliar idea it gives of the serious nature of whooping cough, and (2) the racy style in which it is written. Evidently, Gen. Rucker does not think that scientific facts are any less valuable when presented in graphic and attractive terms. Here is his opening paragraph: "Autumn has arrived. The wooded hills have put on the flaming pageantry of red and yellow. Summer, with its holidays, is gone, and with it the warmth that invited the open window. The fires are being lighted now and the windows are closed for

the greater part of the time. As the season advances people will crowd together more and more. Ventilation will become less and less, and contagious diseases will spread more rapidly." Among these dangerous communicable diseases the author classes whooping cough as one of the most serious and most highly contagious. Directions for avoiding exposure to the contagion are given and this is in part the concluding paragraph of the treatise: "Any disease which kills 10,000 children per annum is a serious one. If bubonic plague were to kill that many children in the United States in one year the whole world would quarantine against our country. A child dead of whooping cough is just as dead as a child dead of plague." Reprint 100 is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents a copy.

Accounting series circular 12e, Interstate Commerce Commission, dated Nov. 1, 1912, contains answers to important questions relative to the several classifications for steam roads, nearly all of them not heretofore published in any form. From the Superintendent of Documents. 5 cents.

Vol. 28, Official opinions of the Attorneys General of the United States, 1909-11, is out of press. From the Superintendent of Documents, in law sheep, \$1.50.

SUGAR AT A GLANCE

This is the catchy title of Senate document 890, 62d Congress, 2d session, for which the Documents Office has received numerous inquiries during the past few months. The document was ordered printed August 1st, but is only just now out of press.

It is an attractive and important document, but its title might more properly have been "Beet-sugar at a glance," as it relates only to that sort of sugar and the results following its production. The most remarkable feature of the work is its statements that American farmers can, and have, by growing sugar-beets in rotation with other crops, one year in four, doubled their production of cereal grains, and that Germany, the greatest beet-growing country, has in the last 30 years increased by 80 per cent. her yield per acre of wheat, rye, barley, and oats. These highly important statements are supported by what seem like convincing proofs, gathered mostly from official sources by the author, Mr. Truman G. Palmer.

"Sugar at a glance" is a 63-page pamphlet containing sundry data relating to national economy and the high cost of living. In addition to the text matter, the document contains 32 pages of charts in two colors and 4 pages of half-tone illustrations of the various phases of sugar-beet culture and manufacture. It discusses also the rise in price of farm and food products in the United States and various other countries, and gives as well a comparison of the agricultural progress of Germany and other European countries with that of the United States. 15 cents.

LARGEST SET OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

The index volume of the Congressional record for the 2d session of the 62d Congress, which convened Dec. 4, 1911, and adjourned Aug. 26, 1912, is now ready, completing the set, or volume, for, though there are 13 huge books in the set, the peculiar notation of the Record makes them all one volume—vol. 48, in 13 parts, each "part" being a book as large as half a dozen ordinary "volumes."

The 12 parts preceding the index part are priced at \$2.00 each and the index part at \$1.50, making the cost of the complete set, for the 62d Congress, 2d session, \$25.50. No previous set of the Congressional record for a single session has been of equal magnitude.

INTERNATIONAL MAP OF THE WORLD

The first sheet of the United States portion of the International map of the world has been issued by the United States Geological Survey and includes Rhode Island and portions of New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, and Nova Scotia. This world map, undertaken by agreement among the leading nations, is being prepared on the scale of 1 to 1,000,000—that is, 1 linear inch on the map represents 1,000,000 inches, or nearly 16 miles, on the earth's surface. The map is to consist of about 1,500 sheets, covering all the land areas of the world, each sheet representing 4 degrees of latitude and 6 degrees of longitude. It has been the dream of geographers for many years to have an international map, scientifically constructed on a uniform scale, and the work is now well under way. The unofficial maps, printed on all sorts of scales, in geographies and atlases, the most important areas being allotted the greatest space, lead to misconceptions as to the relative size of the different countries. With an international map on a uniform scale the study of comparative geography will become more fascinating and more instructive.

The sheet just issued, which is numbered "North K 19" in the general world scheme, but known as the "Boston sheet" in the United States section, is printed in six colors and shows all the principal cities and towns, railroads, main wagon roads, and other works of man, and the rivers, lakes, and other water features. The different depths of the ocean are denoted by contour lines, or "depth curves," and various shades of blue, and the relief, or altitudes of all parts of the land surface, by contour lines and color gradations, from pale green to brown, a different tint being used for each 100 meters of altitude.

The sheets for the completed map of the world would if combined cover an area about 150 feet by 75 feet or a globe 40 feet in diameter; the United States portion would be about 16 feet in width, a very large wall map. The Boston sheet is 24 by 25 inches and this will be the size of most of the United States sheets. The maps of areas at the far north covering 6 degrees of longitude will of course be much narrower than those of areas covering 6 degrees at the equator.

At the present rate of progress, the United States portion of the international map should be finished within eight or ten years. It will be by far the best map of the country in existence.

The Geological Survey states that there is no very accurate map of the United States as a whole, although the Geological Survey publishes a base map about 7 feet in width and the General Land Office has issued a similar map. Many of the commercial maps, though pretty to look upon, are full of gross errors.

The Boston sheet is a very accurate map and is a beautiful product of the engraver's and lithographer's art. It is sold by the Geological Survey at the bare cost of production, namely 40 cents, which will be the price of the other sheets as issued. Thus the entire map of the United States will cost \$20.80. As a preliminary to the issuance of the completed color sections of the United States portion of the world's map, the Survey is printing, in black and white, State maps on the scale of 1 to 500,000, being thus four times as large as the world's map of the same area. Already such maps have been finished and printed for Vermont, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Mississippi, and Georgia, and a dozen others are in process of publication. These are sold by the Survey at varying prices according to the size of the maps.

PARCEL-POST MAP

The new map of the United States, explanatory of the parcel-post service which is to go into operation at the beginning of the new year, is now in process of transmission to all postmasters throughout the country. It is the intention that before January 1st the map shall be posted not only in every post-office but also in every postal station and railroad station in the land. It will thus soon become a very familiar object, but at first sight it will be far from that. It shows the whole country divided into 3500 small oblong sections or areas. All post-offices located within one of these sections will require the same rate of postage on parcel-post mail, and it must be paid by red stamps of new design not used for any other classes of mail.

As there are 3500 sections, there are 3500 corresponding variations of the map. While the base map is the same in all cases, each one of the 3500 sections becomes in its turn the center of a series of 8 numbered zones indicated by bright red lines printed across the black-and-white face of the base map. Washington is area 1071, and has its own map and set of rates as have all the other areas.

It will take the people a little while to become acquainted with the necessary machinery of the parcel post, but all indications are that they will soon recognize it as one of the greatest conveniences and economies with which they have been provided in these days of the rapid extension of Government facilities and the curbing of private monopolies.

A SUMPTUOUS VOLUME

House report 2291, 61st Congress, 3d session, now just published, is one of the most sumptuous and costly volumes ever issued from the Government press or any other press. It is a large quarto in form, on paper of superlative quality, the type of generous 14-point size, the frontispiece in colors, the other plates, which are large and numerous, most skilfully and successfully printed on best plate paper, the binding material ruby buckram, the decorative binding design in gold leaf chaste and artistic, the complete product sumptuous and imposing. The title is: Report of the Commission to Direct and Supervise the Construction of the House Office Building.

It is a remarkable building, and it is remarkably commemorated.

JOURNALS OF THE CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

Vol. 19 in this important historical series from the Library of Congress is now available and will speedily be followed by vols. 20 and 21.

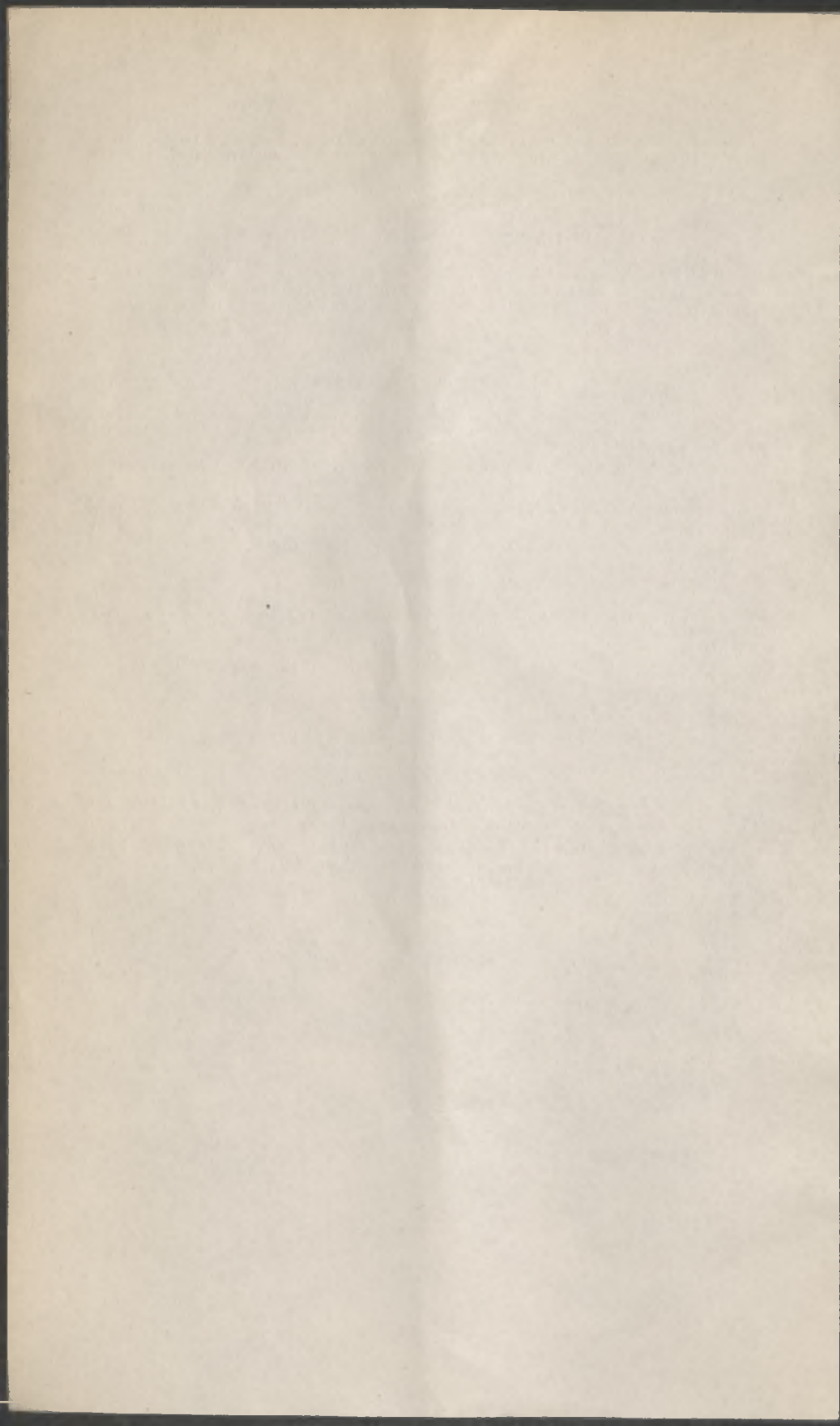

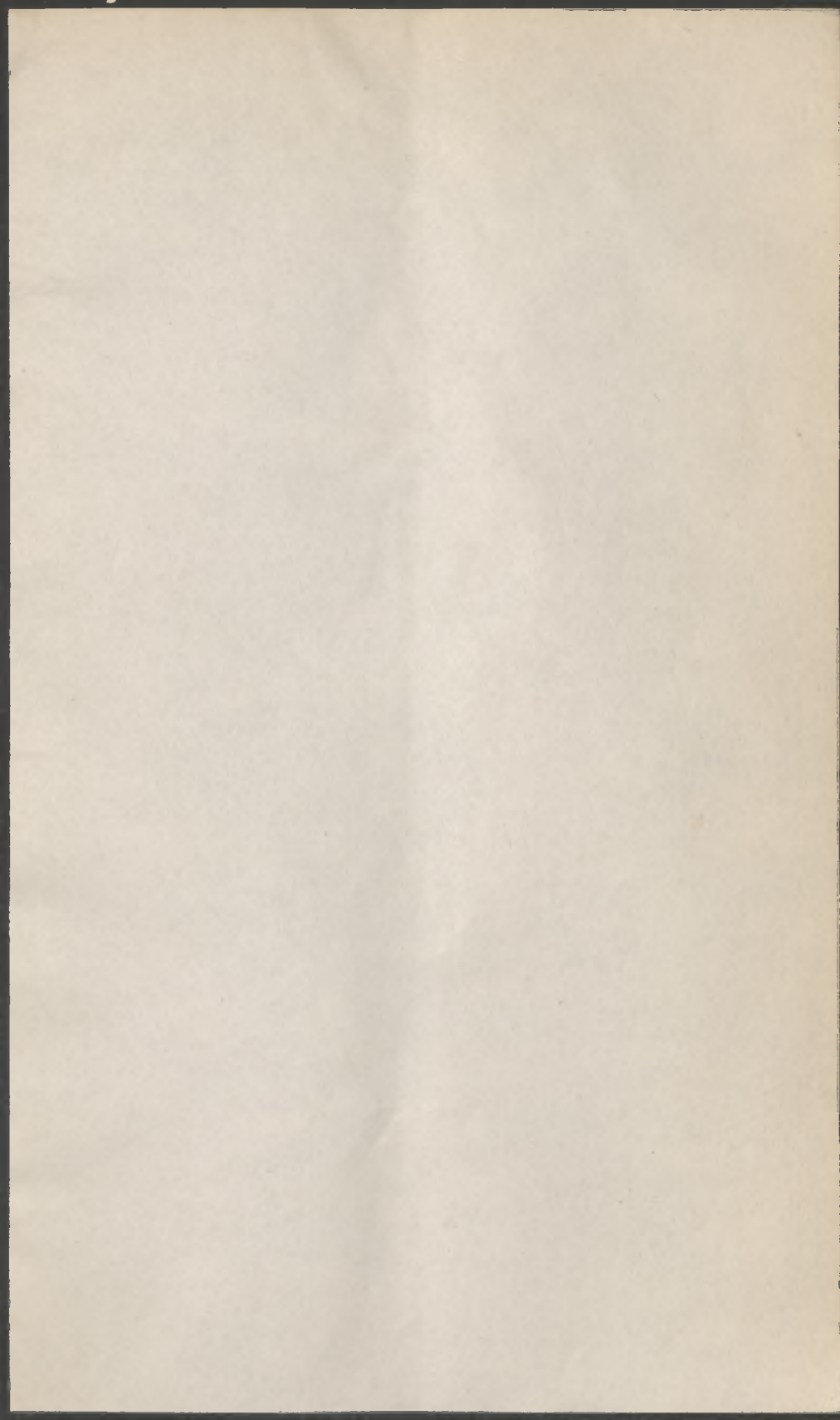
