NOTE.—Nearly all of the departments of the Government make a limited free distribution of their publications. When an entry shows a * price, it is possible that upon application to the issuing office a copy may be obtained without charge.

Explanation

Words and figures enclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title pages of the publications cataloged. When place and printer are not given, it is to be understood that the publication is printed at the United States Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. When size is not given octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The date, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays.

The word "processed" as used in this catalog indicates publications which are reproduced by duplicating processes other than ordinary printing, e. g., mimeograph, multigraph, planograph, rotaprint, multilith, etc.

The L. C. card number appended to some of the entries is for those libraries ordering printed cards from the Library of Congress. The number at the extreme right of an entry indicates the classification of the publication in the Office of the Superintendent of Documents.

HOW TO ORDER PUBLICATIONS—FOLLOWS CONTENTS

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., is authorized by law to sell copies of Government publications and to allow a discount of 25 percent to book dealers and quantity purchasers on condition that the purchasers will adhere to the public sales price set by the Superintendent of Documents and that publications shall not be overprinted with any advertising matter (under a recent ruling, the 25 percent discount to dealers does not apply to Supreme Court reports which may, however, be sold by dealers at a price in advance of that charged by this Office; neither can the dealers' discount be allowed on the Federal Register).

Publications cannot be supplied free to individuals nor forwarded in advance of payment.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to several millions, of which over five million are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold regardless of their age or scarcity. Many of the books have been in stock some time, and are apt to be shopworn. In filling orders the best copy available is sent.

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A general price list of public documents is not available, but numerous lists have been prepared on special subjects and any of these will be furnished free, on application, if the person interested will state the subject or subjects concerning which information is desired. It will also be noted that current publications which are for sale are listed in this catalog.

WEEKLY LIST

In addition to the Price lists, the Documents Office issues a Weekly List of Selected United States Government Publications for sale by the Superintendent of Documents. Each list is arranged alphabetically by subjects, with annotations and prices, and may be obtained free upon application to the Superintendent of Documents.

HOW TO ORDER PUBLICATIONS

Publications entered in this catalog that are for sale by the Superintendent of Documents are indicated by a star (*) preceding the price. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the department, bureau, or division issuing the document. A double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is printed for official use. Whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary, it will be found under the name of the bureau by which it was published.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents, give (if known) the name of the publishing department, bureau, or division, and the title, together with the classification number which is added to the entry at the extreme right; order the congressional documents and reports by the title, together with the document or report number and the Congress and session, e. g., H. doc. 383, 74-2.

Do not use the L. C. card number in ordering a publication.

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Remittances for the documents marked with a star (*) should be made to the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., by coupons, postal money order, express order, or check. Currency may be sent at sender's risk. Foreign remittances should be made either by international money order or draft on an American bank.

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No charge is made for postage on documents forwarded to points in United States, Alaska, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Puerto Rico, Samoa, or to Canada, Cuba, or Mexico. To other countries the regular rate of postage is charged, and remittances must cover such postage. In computing foreign postage, add one-third of the price of the publication.

TO LIBRARIANS

The number given at the extreme right of each entry (except for congressional documents and reports) is the classification number by which the publication is arranged in the Library and in the sales stock of the Office of the Superintendent of Documents. It can be used as a classification number by such libraries as are using, for the departmental publications, the arrangement of public documents advocated in the Checklist of United States Public Documents, 1789-1909. In using this number as a classification number in a library, it should be noted that the shilling mark (/) is used to separate what would ordinarily be a superior number or letter (the numbers or letters immediately following the line) from the main classification number, it not being practicable to print these numbers and letters as superiors in the Monthly Catalog, e. g., the number A 1.23/a: So 96/4 listed in the Monthly Catalog would be A 1.23^a: So 96⁴ in a library.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the printed catalog cards of the Library of Congress are appended to entries for the more important publications. These are given at the left, with "L. C. card" prefixed. Do not confuse with the Documents Office classification number given at the right. Orders for these cards, remittances in payment for them, and requests for information about them should be addressed to the Librarian of Congress, *not* to the Superintendent of Documents.

MONTHLY CATALOG DISTRIBUTION

The Monthly Catalog is sent to public libraries free on application. Subscription price to individuals, \$1.00 a year, including index; foreign subscription \$1.60 a year. Back numbers cannot be supplied. Notify the Superintendent of Documents of any change of address.

INDEX

An Index to the Monthly Catalog will be issued at the end of the calendar year. This will contain index entries for all the numbers issued from January to December, and can be bound with the numbers as an index to the volume. Persons desiring to bind the catalog at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate copies cannot be supplied.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

COMMODITY EXCHANGE ADMINISTRATION

The Grain Futures Act of September 21, 1922 (Public 331, 67th Congress) provided for the prevention and removal of obstructions and burdens upon interstate commerce in grain by regulating transactions on grain future exchanges. This act was administered in the Agriculture Department by the Grain Futures Administration, and the word "grain" was designated as applying to wheat, corn, oats, barley, rye, flax, and sorghum. On June 15, 1936, an act called the Commodity Exchange Act was approved. This act, H. 6772, 74th Congress (Public 675) amended the Grain Futures Act and provided, among other changes, that the word "commodity" should take the place of "grain" in all instances and that the word "commodity" should mean wheat, cotton, rice, corn, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed, grain sorghums, mill feeds, butter, eggs, and *Solanum tuberosum* (Irish potatoes). To carry into effect the provisions of the Commodity Exchange Act, a Memorandum (no. 700) dated June 30, 1936, effective July 1, 1936, was promulgated by the Agriculture Department establishing in the Department the Commodity Exchange Administration and abolishing the Grain Futures Administration. All employees of the Grain Futures Administration and also the books, records, and all equipment were transferred by this order to the Commodity Exchange Administration.

ATLAS OF AMERICAN AGRICULTURE

In January 1917, a map showing the average annual precipitation of the United States in inches from 1895 to 1914 was issued by the Agriculture Department as the first Advance sheet of a proposed Atlas of American Agriculture. This atlas was to be popularly known as the "big atlas", and it was announced that it would contain, in separate form as prepared, maps and descriptive matter, charts, etc., all relating to the movement of crops and the progress of agriculture generally. From then until October 1935, Advance sheets 2-8 were issued as large folio publications varying from 12 to 98 pages in size. These treated of climate (under the titles: Frost and the Growing Season; Precipitation and Humidity; and Temperature, Sunshine, and Wind), rural population, cotton crops, the physical basis of agriculture as indicated by natural vegetation, and the soils of the United States.

The bound Atlas has now been issued but omits the sections on Cotton and Rural Population, for while the original plan of the Atlas included sections relating to crops, livestock, size of farms and systems of farming, land utilization and tenancy, rural population and organizations, it was finally decided to confine the publication of data in atlas form to physical conditions which are more or less permanent, and which require presentation of the data by use of colors superposed on a black base to facilitate identification of locality. A small section has been added on Land Relief which was never published as one of the Advance sheets. Much of the material that had been assembled relating to the crops and livestock, land utilization, and farm tenancy, was used in the prep-

aration of a series of articles that were published in the Yearbooks of the Department of Agriculture from 1921 to 1925, inclusive. Other material has since been published in the Graphic Summary of American Agriculture.

The maps and graphs contained in the Atlas will be of most value to students of agriculture, of climate, soils, and natural vegetation. The maps should also be useful to persons who are considering farming from the commercial standpoint, or are seeking a home, and wish information as to climatic, topographic, and soil conditions in any given section of the United States. The Atlas may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents for \$17.00 bound in cloth. The different parts, as listed on p. 915 and 916 of this catalog, may also be gotten separately as there indicated.

TWO YEARBOOKS

One of the most popular publications of the United States Government is the Yearbook of Agriculture issued by the Agriculture Department. Proof of the above statement is given in the fact that there were printed 247,417 copies of the Yearbook, just off the press. 213,650 of these are for distribution by the House of Representatives and the Senate. It is also for sale by the Superintendent of Documents for \$1.25 in cloth binding.

The 1936 Yearbook of Agriculture differs in two ways from those published in recent years. For some time past the book has presented brief summaries of miscellaneous new developments in agriculture. This year it is devoted to exploring a single subject—the creative development of new forms of life through plant and animal breeding. The material is the outcome of a survey of superior germ plasm made by the Committee of Genetics. What this superior germ plasm is and how it is used constitute a story of surpassing importance to the modern world. The Foreword of the Yearbook reads: "Most of the voluminous statistics usually gathered together in the Yearbook are notably absent. These statistics, the tail of the book, had grown so large that they were wagging the dog. They have been severed, and beginning this year will be published in a separate volume. Primarily of use to specialists, they should be even more useful in the new form."

The other Yearbook is the Minerals Yearbook, 1936, issued by the Bureau of Mines. The primary function of the Minerals Yearbook is to provide in convenient form a comprehensive and accurate record of economic developments and trends in the mining industry of the United States for the information and use of producers and consumers of mineral commodities and of the general public. This annual report is based upon the fundamental statistics of production and marketing of minerals, supplied under a program of voluntary cooperation of industry with Government, which has produced results of expanding scope and increasing usefulness over a long period. Without such industrial annals the effective planning of policies and future operations of producers and consumers would lack effective guidance. The factual data regarding the operations of the mineral industry of the United States in 1935 are presented and interpreted in this edition of the Minerals Yearbook. It is sold by the Superintendent of Documents in cloth binding for \$2.00.

DIGEST OF CUSTOMS AND RELATED LAWS

Of great use to those who are vitally interested in customs matters and in the tariff will be this 3 volume Digest of Customs and Related Laws and Decisions Thereunder. It is in a limited sense a revision of the Compilation of Customs Laws and Digest of Decisions Thereunder published in 1908, in that

it reprints such of the digest matter in that publication as embodies precedents or principles of contemporary value or historical interest, but the greater portion of the book is a digest of the decisions of the various courts of the United States and rulings of the Treasury Department during the period from January 1, 1908 to January 1, 1935. It is primarily a compilation of certain general specified tariff acts and a digest of rulings and decisions thereunder, but its scope includes also a reference or citation of what might be called related laws such as the National Industrial Recovery Act of 1933 (in part), the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933 (in part), the Antidumping Act of 1921, and many others, including sections of the Revised Statutes which are still in effect and which are now embodied in the United States Code. These 3 volumes are bound in cloth and are sold in sets at \$4.00 by the Superintendent of Documents.

OTHER PUBLICATIONS OF INTEREST

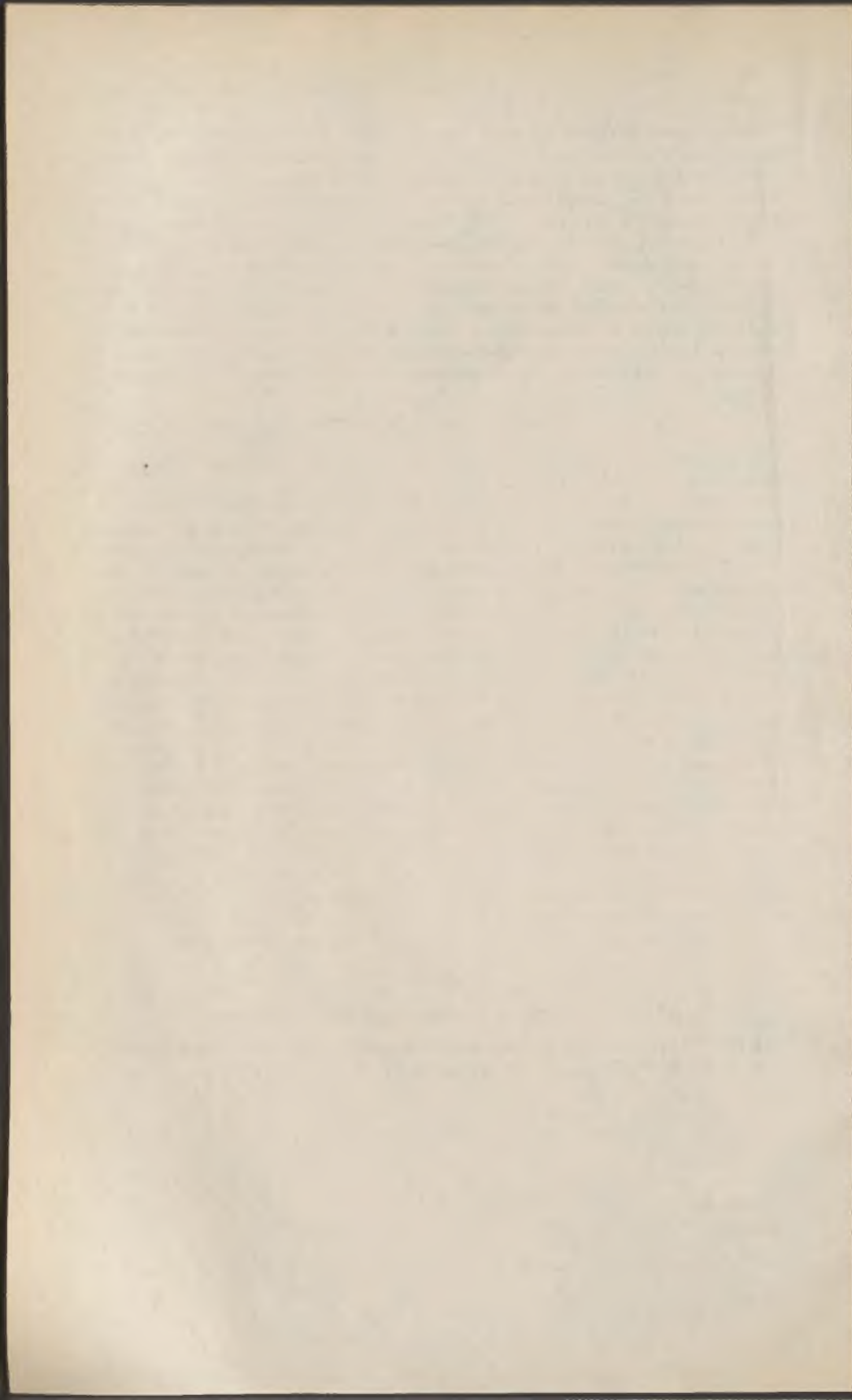
Two other publications listed in this Monthly Catalog will doubtless prove to be more than usually popular.

One is *Diets to Fit the Family Income*, Farmers' Bulletin 1767, issued by the Home Economics Bureau of the Agriculture Department. It suggests a minimum-cost adequate diet for families with a limited amount of money to spend for food, a restricted diet for emergency use helpful in solving the difficult problem of families with extremely meager resources, and a liberal diet or a moderate-cost adequate diet for families with an income sufficient to meet all needs comfortably. For families with growing children, a well-rounded diet is especially important because of the relation of food to growth, development, and general well-being. Both nutritive value and cost have been considered in working out the four diet plans suggested in this bulletin. It is paper bound and obtainable at the Agriculture Department free or is on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at 5c.

The other publication is *Handbook for Recreation Leaders* issued by the Children's Bureau and is Publication 231. It was prepared by Ella Gardner and is based on her experience with recreational programs in rural areas, and was compiled in response to numerous requests for help in planning programs and in selecting games and other recreation material in the home and with club and community groups. The games are classified to assist in program building, and they are explained very fully in an attempt to include the answers to questions which have arisen in presenting them to untrained leaders. It is sold for 15c by the Superintendent of Documents and is bound in paper.

Each county map shows, in addition to the roads traveled by rural carriers, all post offices within the county at the time the negative was made and all other roads, houses, schools, and churches known at the time the map was originally drawn, together with an outline of the drainage. A list of the county maps on file will be furnished upon application to the Disbursing Clerk, Post Office Department, Washington, D. C. Rural delivery routes emanating from post offices in counties for which county maps have not been drawn are shown on local center maps. Blueprint copies of such maps are sold at 25 cents each. The serial publications of the Smithsonian Institution are as follows: 1, Smithsonian contributions to knowledge; 2, Smithsonian miscellaneous collections; 3, Smithsonian annual reports. No sets of these are for sale or distribution, as most of the volumes are out of print. Special publications are also issued from time to time. The papers issued in the series of Contributions to Knowledge and Miscellaneous collections are not public documents, but are printed in limited editions at the expense of the Smithsonian Fund. They are distributed without charge to public libraries, educational establishments, and learned societies in this country and abroad; and are supplied to other institutions, and to individuals at the prices indicated. Remittances should be made payable to the 'Smithsonian Institution'. A discount of 20 percent is allowed to bookdealers. The Smithsonian report volumes and the papers reprinted in separate form therefrom, are distributed *gratuitously* by the Institution to libraries and individuals throughout the world. Very few of the Report volumes are now available at the Institution, but many of those of which the Smithsonian edition is exhausted can be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. STATE DEPARTMENT

NOTE.—With the publication of the first number of the printed Press releases on Oct. 5, 1929, the Department of State inaugurated a new publication program. The daily mimeographed releases are made available to the public weekly in printed form; also, all publications (except laws and treaties) are numbered consecutively in the order in which they are sent to press. Publications of a similar character are brought within well-defined series, and each series publication bears a series number in addition to its publication number. The diplomatic correspondence of the United States is published in the volumes entitled Foreign relations of the United States. Laws are issued in separate series and are numbered within each series in the order in which they are signed. Treaties are issued in a separate series and are numbered in the order in which they are proclaimed. Treaties are also published in the compilation Treaties and other international acts of the United States of America, which contains literal copies of the documents, followed by notes of a textual and procedural character. Indexes to the Press releases are supplied semiannually, as of December 31 and June 30. The Department of State includes in the Press release series, each quarter, a complete list of its publications for the preceding quarter.

The list below frequently includes certain relevant publications issued by other agencies of the Government under requisition of the Department of State and certain relevant congressional documents.

Under the practice of the State Department prior to the inauguration of the Executive agreement series (no. 90 of which is listed below) the material would have been published in the Treaty series. Those desiring to maintain a joint file of the Treaty series and the Executive agreement series may insert each number of the Executive agreement series in its appropriate place in the Treaty series, which place will be indicated in each number of the Executive agreement series.
