Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 61st Congress, 2d session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

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In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

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The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to over a million, of which several hundred thousand are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

MONTHLY CATALOGUE DISTRIBUTION

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

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CUMULATIVE INDEX

Beginning with July, 1910, the Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued separately each quarter and will cumulate for the twelve months ending June, 1911. That is, the September number of the Index is an index to the Monthly catalogue for July, August, and September, the December number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for October to December, the March number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for January to March, and the June number will be the Index for the fiscal year 1911. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

HOW TO REMIT

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No charge is made for postage on documents forwarded to points in United States, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, or to Canada, Cuba, or Mexico. To other countries the regular rate of postage is charged, and remittances must cover such postage.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

All of the documents mentioned under this heading are catalogued in this number of the Monthly catalogue.

The 1910 annual report of Dr. L. O. Howard, Entomologist of the Agriculture Department, has been published. One does not need to be a scientist in order to be impressed by the extent and varied character of the operations of Dr. Howard's bureau.

The annual report of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury is rather rapidly growing in size and importance and is already a substantial volume. The 1910 number, just issued, states that the Public buildings appropriation act approved June 25, 1910, provided for the purchase of 140 new sites for public buildings, the construction of 115 buildings on old sites, the purchase of 114 other sites and the erection of buildings thereon, and 24 extensions of old buildings—393 building projects in one bill. The same act also increased the limit of cost on several buildings. During 1910, fiscal year, 61 new buildings and 14 extensions to old buildings were completed and occupied. There are now in course of construction 118 new buildings and 55 extensions. The Government has bought or authorized the buying of 166 sites for which no buildings have yet been ordered. At the beginning of the fiscal year 1910 the Government owned and occupied 522 public buildings, not including those in Washington or the marine hospitals and quarantine stations. Add the 61 completed during 1910, the 229 authorized by the Act of June 25 last, the 118 in course of construction, and those to be built on the 306 sites for which buildings have not yet been authorized, and we have the rather magnificent total of 1,236 United States public buildings adorning as many thrifty towns of the great republic, to say nothing of the various extensions and increases of cost enumerated by the Supervising Architect. These are interesting statistics, and recall the ancient newspaper story that no call for more public buildings was coming from a certain New England State for the very good reason that no towns unprovided with such a building remained. The time can hardly come when such a condition will affect the whole country, for no matter how rapidly public buildings may be built, towns to use them spring up even more rapidly.

The 1910 annual report of Col. Scott, superintendent of the Military Academy, is illustrated by several plates, giving glimpses of the new constructions which are making West Point the best equipped military school in the world.

Senate document 656, 61st Congress, 2d session, presents the addresses made on the occasion of unveiling the statue of Francis Harrison Pierpont as one of the contributions of the State of West Virginia to the national

statuary gallery in the Capitol. It contains historical material worth saving. One of the facts thus brought out is that Pierpont was never Governor of West Virginia. By a war title he was Governor of old Virginia, though by Confederate title there was another Governor of Virginia at the same time.

Addresses which were worth while were made when the statue of John Caldwell Calhoun was unveiled as one of the contributions of South Carolina to the national statuary gallery. Perhaps the most notable one—certainly one of fine literary quality—is that of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts, who, while representing a State which in national politics has been always at the opposite pole from South Carolina, and coming of a family which for generations had followed Hamilton, Webster, and Sumner, the great opponents of Calhoun and the doctrines of which he was the chief advocate, was still able to pay a most eloquent tribute to the character and qualities of that great man. The Calhoun speeches are printed as Senate document 647, 61st Congress, 2d session, and illustrated with a picture of the statue.

Statistics Bureau Bulletin 78, Agricultural graphics, will be a boon to the numerous persons to whom masses of figures are merely bewildering. It is in fact difficult for most persons to form any sort of mental picture of millions, no matter in what terms such vast numbers may be expressed. In Bulletin 78 crop and live stock statistics for each State and the United States and for the principal countries of the world are graphically presented by discs of proportionate sizes. The discs show at a glance the proportionate results indicated by the figures, which are also given. Agricultural graphics is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 15c.

Geological Survey Bulletin 427, of about 300 pages, 2 maps, and numerous other illustrations, presents all available important information concerning the metal manganese, with which this country is not so plentifully endowed as it is with most other metals. Manganese ores are found in many places in this country, but the deposits are usually not large enough to be of high commercial value. The book is not intended to be an exhaustive study of manganese, but is chiefly an account of its principal sources of supply, its useful applications, the geology and chemistry of its ores, the methods of mining, and the nature and extent of the industries growing out of its use. Manganese has many uses, the most important being the making of alloys of iron and other metals. Bulletin 427 is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 40c.

Experiment Stations Office Bulletin 232 is another of the many useful contributions to education in the farming districts that have been made by the Agriculture Department. Its title is: Consolidated rural schools and organization of a county system. It reviews the plan of township consolidation of schools, by which a large central graded school takes the place of a dozen or more one-room schoolhouses in which one teacher teaches everything and the introduction of modern methods is impossible. Following this review, the document proposes the further development of consolidation into a county system. The price of Bulletin 232 is 15c. It is fully illustrated

The Board of Indian Commissioners have published their 41st annual report. Evidently the members have given more than a perfunctory consideration to the well-being of the Indian people. This is an unpaid Board, clothed only with advisory powers and hardly ever heard of by the general public. It is, however, made up of distinguished and philanthropical men, and its reports should be read by all who sympathize with efforts to assist the aboriginal race now rapidly emerging from savagery. Andrew S. Draper, formerly President of the University of Illinois and now Commissioner of Education for the State of New York, is Chairman, and Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia, Bishop Walker of Buffalo, Dr. S. A. Eliot of Boston, Albert K. Smiley of Lake Mohonk, and Dr. Merrill E. Gates of Washington are among the membership.

Notes on equitation and horse training is a really scientific work on horsemanship, translated from the French for the Office of the Chief of Staff of the Army, by which it is published; bound in imitation leather and sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 50c.

The new List of wireless telegraph stations of the world, including shore stations, merchant vessels, revenue cutters, and vessels of the United States Navy, corrected to October 1, 1910, is now on sale by the Superintendent of Documents. Price 15c.

Farmers' bulletin 410, Potato culls as a source of industrial alcohol, illustrated, will no doubt meet a large popular demand.

Many naturalists will be glad to know that another number of North American fauna has been issued. It is No. 31, Revision of the wood rats of the genus *Neotoma*. In this genus are many species, all restricted to North America. They are all grain eaters when they have opportunity and they are also suspected of being plague carriers.

A new principle in Federal penology, the paroling of prisoners, has been introduced by public act 269, approved June 25, 1910. The Department of Justice has now published regulations for paroling the Federal prisoners at Atlanta, Leavenworth, and McNeil Island. Under certain conditions, and on the recommendation of the parole board established at each prison, prisoners who have served at least one third of their sentences are set at liberty. They are required to live within certain limits prescribed in each case and to report once a month. With these exceptions they become free men. It is an experiment that will be watched with solicitude by advocates of prison reform.

All bird-lovers—and they are a numerous tribe—will be interested in Distribution and migration of North American shorebirds, which is the title of Bulletin 35, Biological Survey Bureau, Agriculture Department. The shorebirds are the snipe, plovers, curlews, sandpipers, and like species. The migration of birds has been a difficult subject for naturalists, but they are learning more about it of late, and this bulletin is a contribution to such learning.

Census Bureau Bulletin 108 is entitled Mortality statistics, 1909. It is not a final report, but it has much interesting material, including the statement that 1909 was the most favorable year on record, the death rate

or the registration area being only 15 per 1000, the lowest yet recorded. The price of the bulletin is 20c.

There has been no month in the 15 years during which this Catalogue has been published that its pages have not recorded the titles of many public documents of popular interest and of permanent value. Though as one works over them each month it seems that the valuable publications must surely outnumber those of any preceding month, the fact really is that each month has its fair quota. Those who follow these notes and scan the catalogue entries will find no barren months in the record.

INDEX-CATALOGUE, LIBRARY OF SURGEON-GENERAL'S OFFICE, U. S. A.

Vol. 15, 2d series, of this monumental work is now on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at \$2.00 in the green cloth binding uniform with all the preceding volumes of the 1st and 2d series.

The titles covered by vol. 15 are those beginning with S and ending with Skin-grafting. It is well known by librarians and medical men that the Index-catalogue catalogues substantially all the medical literature of the world, in whatever language it may originally have been printed.

NEW VOLUMES IN IMPORTANT SERIES

During October vols. 16, 17, and 18 of the Library of Congress edition of the Journals of the Continental Congress have been received. The record has now been brought up to the close of the year 1780, leaving but little more than eight years to be covered. These volumes have been edited by Mr. Gaillard Hunt, who succeeded Mr. Ford as chief of the Division of Manuscripts, Library of Congress.

The eighth number in the series of Document catalogues published by the Superintendent of Documents appeared during the month. It records all the documents published by all the branches of the United States Government during the period July 1, 1905, to June 30, 1907. To any one who is familiar with the tremendous output of the Government Printing Office this may seem an extravagant claim, and it is indeed possible that a minor publication or two may have escaped the dragnet which is kept out, but the diligent and skilful compilers feel an extreme confidence that no issue of the Government presses of even moderate importance has evaded their vigilance. At any rate they have filled 1851 closely printed double-column pages with a catalogue of the titles of public documents printed during the two years specified. In its Congressional edition Document catalogue no. 8 is House document 830, 59th Congress, 2d session. This very large volume is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at \$2.75. Document catalogue no. 9, for the next succeeding two years term, 1907-1909 (60th Congress), is well under way. It may be even larger than no. 8. As these catalogues are the only printed volumes which undertake to preserve a complete record of the publishing activities of the Government, and as they have been commended by very high authority as "models of complete, clear, accurate, and intelligent cataloguing", it is evident that they may fairly be considered historical records of major importance.

Publications in the National Monetary Commission series continue to issue from the Government Printing Office. Two of the October issues are: Origin of the national banking system (Senate document 582, 61st Congress, 2d session) and Statistics for the United States, 1867-1909. The last named will be a choice morsel for those who revel in statistics. It shows the whole economical progress of the country from shortly after the close of the Civil War to the present time with probably more completeness and in closer compass than ever before. This is Senate document 570, 61st Congress, 2d session. A companion publication is Statistics for Great Britain, Germany, and France, 1867-1909 (Senate document 578, 61st Congress, 2d session). No. 582 is not statistical. It is a narrative, and an interesting narrative, of the origin of the banking system which drove the "wild-cat and red-dog" State bank currency out of the field and substituted the still-existing safe national-bank paper. It presents an unknown celebrity named Silas M. Stilwell as the real author of the national banking system instead of Treasury Secretary Salmon P. Chase, by whom it was adopted and to whom it is generally accredited. It gives also other unexpected information on its interesting subject. Another October issue in the National Monetary Commission series is The Canadian banking system (61st Congress, 2d session, Senate document 583). This is a volume of 185 pages and several folded tables describing a banking system quite different from ours and in some features believed to be superior. Appendix B is a sketch of the coöperative people's banks of Canada, a form of coöperation introduced about ten years ago in a French province of Canada and showing a healthy growth. A similar bank has been organized by French Canadian settlers in Manchester, N. H., and Massachusetts has passed a law to encourage them. From the National Monetary Commission comes also Senate document 580, 61st Congress, 2d session, its title being Laws of the United States concerning money, banking, and loans, 1778-1909. It will be noticed that its record does not begin at the beginning of Government under the Constitution in 1789, but 12 years earlier, taking in the financial operations of the Government under the Articles of Confederation and covering the greater part of the Revolutionary War period. The contents are grouped under four chief headings: Finance, banking, coinage, and paper money. Under the heading Finance is found all legislation on financial subjects not relating specifically to banking, coinage, or paper money. The book has been edited with marginal summaries, references, explanatory notes, and a very full index. All the documents of the National Monetary Commission are sold by the Superintendent of Documents.

The third and concluding volume of the Report of the Commissioner of Corporations on transportation by water in the United States has been issued under the subtitle Water terminals. By the help of 45 tables, 18 maps, and 5 exhibits it makes a somewhat striking showing of the extent to which railroad interests have monopolized the water fronts of various seaports and lake ports. It is a volume of 435 pages, including, besides a general index, indexes of navigable streams and canals, ports and harbors, and cases cited. In paper covers, 65c.

Other volumes newly issued in continuation of important series are: Vol. 16, Decisions of the Comptroller of the Treasury (sheep, \$2.00); vol. 23, Official records of the Union and Confederate navies (cloth, 75c.); vol. 18, Interstate Commerce Commission reports (buckram, \$1.50).

INDEX TO DAILY CONSULAR REPORTS

The first number of the quarterly index which is published for the convenience of those who wish to bind and preserve their numbers of the Daily consular and trade reports has been published and is supplied by the Superintendent of Documents at 10c. a copy. It indexes the first 75 numbers of the new series of the Daily reports, being those published during the months of July, August, and September of the present year.

NEW NAME OF A BUREAU

By action of the Fourth International Conference of American Republics, which assembled at Buenos Aires in July and adjourned August 27 last, the name The International Bureau of the American Republics was changed to The Pan American Union, and consequently the monthly Bulletin of the International Bureau has become Bulletin of the Pan American Union, the new title first appearing in the October number.

FORTHCOMING DOCUMENTS

The Census Bureau is about to issue a report on the telephone industry, presenting statistics of the physical equipment, service, and financial operations of the commercial and mutual systems and independent rural lines for the calendar year 1907. This is the second census of its kind; the first was taken for the calendar year 1902.

Publications must necessarily follow the work of another Congressional commission which recently organized and began work in Chicago. It is to consider the question of employers' liability for injuries to employees and suitable compensation to workmen. The Commission is made up of two Senators, Messrs. Warner of Wisconsin and Hughes of Colorado, appointed by the Vice-President; two Representatives, Messrs. Denby of Michigan and Brantley of Georgia, appointed by the Speaker, and two unofficial citizens, Messrs. W. C. Brown, President of the New York Central Railroad, and Daniel L. Cease of Cleveland, Ohio, appointed by the President. Nothing has yet been published by this Commission, and very little has been published concerning it or its work.

The Immigration Commission, composed of three Senators, three Representatives, and three civilian members, has not published very much thus far, but has now in press a very extensive printing order, planned to fill 40 volumes. There will be one series of 18 volumes under the general title: Immigrants in industries, with a variety of subtitles. A series of 5 volumes has the title The Children of immigrants in schools. There is a 2-volume set entitled Immigrants in cities. Another 2-volume set is named Immigrant charity seekers. Single volume titles are: Immigrant delinquents, defectives, and dependents; Steerage conditions, immigrant

homes and aid societies, importation of women, contract labor, padrone system, and immigrant banks; Changes in the bodily form of descendants of immigrants; Statistical history of immigration, 1820-1910, and distribution of immigrants, 1850-1910; Occupation of immigrants and fecundity of immigrant women; History of earlier European immigration to the United States; Immigration history and legislation; Dictionary of races or peoples; Immigration situation in other countries; Peonage; Miscellaneous. Volume 1 of the whole collection will be called Abstract of reports. There are twelve of these monographic volumes and a mere reading of their titles and those of the four series is sufficient proof of the industry and intelligence with which the Commission has pursued its inquiries and the very broad scope of its investigations. A veritable cyclopedia of the great immigration question in all its varied aspects is evidently forthcoming. The majority of the volumes is already in type, and the proofs are in the hands of the readers. It is not thought that any of the books will be available for delivery till early in the new year and it may be the middle of the year before all will be ready.

Bulletin 40, Bureau of American Ethnology, Handbook of American Indian languages, is so far advanced that three "separates" from its first part have been published. Two, both by Professor Franz Boas, are illustrative sketches on the Chinook and the Tsimshian languages, and the third, by Roland B. Dixon, is a similar sketch of the Maidu.

CAREY LAND LAW

In these days there are many inquirers for "the Carey law" and sometimes disappointment is felt at finding that this phrase is merely a popular title or "nickname" for a single section in an appropriation bill of the 53d Congress, 2d session, approved Aug. 18, 1894.

Senator Joseph M. Carey of Wyoming, when a member of the Public Lands Committee, became much interested in trying to promote the sale and settlement of the arid lands of which there were millions of acres in his own and other Western States. Feb. 12, 1894, he introduced a bill (Senate bill 1591, 53d Congress, 2d session) which was essentially the same as the later enactment now known as "the Carey law."

Bill 1591 was referred to the Committee on Public Lands, and on April 17, 1894, was reported back from that Committee by Senator Carey with a strongly favorable report backed up by a friendly letter from the Commissioner of the General Land Office (Senate report 332, 53d Congress, 2d session). The bill then went on the calendar, and July 18, 1894, was taken up and passed in the Senate.

Going thence to the House, it was referred to the Committee on Irrigation, by which it was not reported back, though Senator Carey said in debate that he understood a favorable report had been agreed on by that Committee.

Finally, Aug. 2, 1894, Senator Carey moved that an amendment, which was substantially his bill no. 1591, be added as section 4 to House bill 5575, the Sundry civil appropriation bill, then under consideration in the Senate. With little opposition this was agreed to without a roll call,

and the amendment thereafter successfully ran the gauntlet of two conference committees, and with but little amendment was accepted by the House Aug. 15, 1894. The House amendments were readily agreed to in the Senate, and the Appropriation act, including section 4, became law Aug. 18, 1894.

It was in the natural course of things that Senator Carey's name should be attached to the measure, but such attachment does not carry with it any information as to the character of section 4 or the purpose of its provisions. In brief, it provides that to aid in the reclamation of desert lands and their sale in small tracts to actual settlers such lands may be patented to the desert-land States, not exceeding 1,000,000 acres to each State, on condition that the State cause them to be irrigated, reclaimed, and operated, and that not less than 20 acres of each 160 acre tract sold be thoroughly cultivated within ten years. The Carey law does not provide for any dealing by individuals with the United States Government. It provides only for transactions between the general Government and State governments, and any persons wishing to acquire lands under the Carey act must arrange therefor with the governments of the States.

The full text of the Carey law may be found in the following public documents:

Statutes at large, vol. 28, pages 422 and 423; full leather, price \$2.25.

First report of Reclamation Service, 1902, containing also the Reclamation act and others of similar tenor; price 85c. in cloth.

Session laws, 53d Congress, 2d session, pages 422 and 423; paper, 75c.

Regulations concerning the selection of desert lands by certain States and Territories under the act of Congress approved Aug. 18, 1894, with amendments and the making of final proof for desert lands segregated thereunder.

This last-named pamphlet, issued by the General Land Office, is the best one for persons who wish to understand the Carey act, because it contains not only that act but also several subsequent acts by which the original act has been modified, and in addition a set of regulations and forms for operating under the Carey act as modified; price 5c.

An act appropriating the receipts from the sale and disposal of public lands in certain States and Territories to the construction of irrigation works for the reclamation of arid lands.

This is a Congressional publication, the title indicating the reclamation act only. It contains, however, the Carey act also; price 5c.

All of these are for sale by the Superintendent of Documents.

HEALTH ACTIVITIES

As those who have attentively read these notes know very well, the reports of testimony given before the committees of Congress and printed under the general title "Hearings" are publications much wanted by the public, but difficult to supply, owing to the fact that there is no provision requiring them to be distributed or preserved or otherwise cared for. They are printed on the orders of the several committees and the whole editions are sent to the committees. Of course the committees are not organized for the purpose of preserving documents, and consequently

most of the Hearings, after a temporary distribution, disappear and leave no trace behind.

Notwithstanding these unfortunate conditions, the Superintendent of Documents is at present able to supply one of the most interesting and important sets of Hearings of the recent session, in a series of seven numbers, bearing this title. Hearings before the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce of the House of Representatives on bills relating to health activities of the general Government.

In these Hearings are reprinted that part of President Taft's annual message relating to the establishment of a bureau of health, and also the full text of all the numerous bills pending in the House which if passed would provide for a bureau or department of that kind, with other documents relating to health questions. These are preliminary to the main body of the hearings, which consist of the evidence of various witnesses, both pro and con, many of them being distinguished scientists in and out of the public service. Besides the seven pamphlets of Hearings there is a separately printed statement by Professor Irving Fisher, author of *The National vitality*.

The prices at which the Health activities hearings are sold are these: Part 1, 10c.; Part 2, 10c.; Part 3, 10c.; Part 4, 5c.; Part 5, 5c.; Part 6, 10c.; Part 7, 5c.; Professor Fisher's statement, 5c. The supply is small and those desiring copies would do well to order them promptly.

PHARMACOPŒIA FORMULARY

The Superintendent of Documents has been rather frequently receiving letters which have indicated that the writers suppose the United States Pharmacopœia and the National formulary to be United States public documents.

This erroneous supposition has probably grown out of the fact that the Hygienic Laboratory of the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, Treasury Department, has recently published three bulletins (nos. 49, 58, 63) under the general title *Digest of comments on the Pharmacopœia of the United States of America, 8th decennial revision*. Nos. 58 and 63 also include comments on the National formulary, 3d edition. These three public documents presenting and digesting criticisms on the Pharmacopœia and the Formulary have easily led to the supposition that these important publications were also public documents.

Though they are not documents, yet the Government has rather close relations with them. The Pharmacopœia is issued under the sanction of a Committee on Revision appointed by the United States Pharmacopœial Convention. The Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service has been always represented in this Convention and several of its members have served on the Committee on Revision. The United States Food and drugs act, approved June 30, 1906, recognized the Pharmacopœia and the Formulary as the legal standards for determining the purity and strength of drugs. Both the United States Pharmacopœial Convention and the American Pharmaceutical Association, which are

the owners of the two books under consideration, are incorporated in the District of Columbia.

The Pharmacopœia is published through the publishing house of J. Blackiston's Sons Co., Philadelphia. It is issued decennially, the latest issue being that of July, 1905.

The National formulary is published by the American Pharmaceutical Association, and inquiries concerning it should be addressed to Charles Caspari, Jr., secretary of the Association, Baltimore. The 3d edition, which is the latest, bears date 1906.

PRELIMINARY REPORT ON INCOME ACCOUNT OF RAILWAYS

The Preliminary report on the income account of railways in the United States was issued annually by the Interstate Commerce Commission, beginning with the fiscal year 1893 and ending with 1907.

With March, 1908, the Commission began the publication of the monthly Bulletin of revenues and expenses of steam roads in the United States, No. 1 covering the 9 months, July, 1908, to March, 1909, with comparative statistics for the same months of the fiscal year 1908. This Bulletin has since been issued continuously, one for each month, except No. 5, which comes between No. 4, June, 1909, and No. 6, July, 1909, but has no monthly date of its own, because it is an annual report, compiled from the monthly reports which the railroads began making to the Commission July, 1907, and presenting therefore the statistics for the two fiscal years 1908 and 1909. Bulletin 5 is thus in effect a substitute for the discontinued Preliminary report on the income account of railways.

Hereafter the material formerly given in the Preliminary report will be given in the monthly Bulletin of revenues and expenses.

SLIP LAWS SUPPLIED TO SUBSCRIBERS

Librarians and most others usually wait for the text of the new laws enacted by the United States Congress until they are to be had in one of their collected forms, which are:

1. The pamphlets entitled Statutes of the United States of America, generally known as the Session laws, because they are issued at the close of each separate session and contain the enactments of one session only; known also as the Pamphlet laws because of the form in which they are bound.

2. The Statutes at large, which are issued at the close of each Congress, and contain the enactments of all the several sessions of that Congress, being virtually a consolidation of the several editions of the Session laws of one Congress.

These publications are reasonably familiar to all who have occasion to use the United States laws. Many do not know that there is an earlier print than these. It is a fact, however, that each law is separately printed and numbered as promptly as possible after it receives the Presidential approval. These separate prints, known as Slip laws, have been

printed heretofore in limited editions, have not been sent to the libraries, and have not been made widely known to the public. The Superintendent of Documents has now arranged to supply these early prints of the Public laws to subscribers at a flat rate of \$2.00 for the 3d session of the 61st Congress, to begin Dec. 5, 1910, and end Mar. 4, 1911, each law to be mailed to the subscribers immediately on its publication. There are others, known as Private acts, which are of interest only to those personally interested. These will not be sent.

This new method of distributing early prints of the Public Federal laws is somewhat experimental, and its continuance for future sessions of Congress will depend on the interest in it which may be shown by members of the bar and others who may be interested.

VOLUME FORTY-SIX

Before another issue of the Monthly catalogue has been distributed the best known and most famous daily paper in the United States, which has been taking a summer vacation, will have resumed its work of enlightening and informing the people. Before the dawn of December 6, 1910, vol. 46, No. 1, Congressional record of the United States, will be off the press and in the mails on its way to subscribers. No other paper has so numerous or so distinguished a staff of contributors. No other has equally skilled and experienced verbatim reporters. The work of its editor is strictly impersonal but shows for itself. The Congressional record will be supplied to advance-paying subscribers at \$1.50 a month or \$4.00 for the whole period of the next ensuing Congressional session, which will be the final session of the 61st Congress. Subscriptions are now being received by the Superintendent of Documents. Single numbers can also be supplied, not only for the coming session but for prior Congresses, back as far as March 15, 1897, the beginning of the 1st session of the 55th Congress. These are priced according to their size, fluctuating from 8 pages to nearly 100 pages. The price for single numbers is never less than 3 cents and very seldom more than 20 cents, the average being probably a little over 5 cents. Only in very exceptional instances would it be worth one's while to try to get free copies. The law directs the Public Printer to supply copies to certain officials named in the law, and adds these words, "and shall furnish gratuitously no others in addition thereto." Some officials get several copies, but probably not in any case a greater number than they need to supply public libraries and other like institutions in which they are interested. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1910, the Superintendent of Documents sold over 29,000 copies of the Congressional record. The 2d session of the 61st Congress was of great public interest. The 3d session, which is the one now soon to begin, promises to be no less interesting and important.

Topographic sheets

NOTE—The Geological Survey is making a topographic map of the United States. The sheets of which it is composed are projected without reference to political divisions, and are designated by some prominent town or natural feature found on them. Three scales are ordinarily used, 1:62,500, 1:125,000, and 1:250,000. These correspond, approximately, to 1 mile, 2 miles, and 4 miles to 1 linear inch, covering, respectively, average areas of 230, 920, and 3,700 square miles. For some areas of particular importance special large-scale maps are published. The size, unless otherwise given, is about 17.5 inches in height by 11.5 to 16 inches in width, exclusive of the margin, the width varying with the latitude. A description of the topographic map is printed on the reverse of each sheet.

More than one-third of the area of the country, excluding outlying possessions, has been mapped, every State being represented.
