## Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering. but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 60th Congress, 1st session, is to be understood.

## NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Among the most interesting documents issued during September by the Government are two which were compiled as well as printed in the Government Printing Office. These are (1) the 7th volume in the Document catalogue series, listing the Government publications of the period of the 58th Congress, 1903-05, and (2) a new edition of the Manual of style, by which the copy-preparers, proof-readers, and compositors of the Government Printing Office are guided in their intricate and difficult work. The new catalogue is the largest yet published, but considerably smaller than either of those issued for the 55th, 56th, and 57th Congresses. This is not a contradiction in terms, though it sounds like it. The book is larger than its predecessors, because it contains several hundred more pages and records several thousand more publications, but it is smaller than the other volumes, because by the use of thinner and better paper the thickness and weight of the book have been much reduced. It is believed that all issues of the Document catalogue have been welcome in the chief libraries of the country, but no. 7 will perhaps be unusually so because of the hindrances which have delayed its publication. It will still be some days before it can be forwarded to the designated depository libraries, the work of binding it in full sheep as a Congressional document being not yet complete. It is House doc. 483, 58th Congress, 3d session, being v. 122 of that series and no. 4901 in the general series of volumes of Congressional documents. The provision of law that Congressional documents shall be bound in cloth will first take effect on documents of the 60th Congress. All delayed documents of earlier Congresses will be bound in sheepskin as in former years. A part of the non-documented clothbound edition of Document catalogue 7 has been received from the binders and sale orders can be filled at \$2 each. The new Manual of style of the Government Printing Office also has been somewhat delayed since the first announcement of its forthcoming issue, and many persons have been awaiting its publication with interest. As finally issued, the Manual is a compact pamphlet of only 91 pages presenting a great body of information without circumlocution or verbiage. The number of printers, publishers, writers, and editors who have good use for the Government Printing Office Manual of style is large. They can be supplied with copies by purchase from the Superintendent of Documents at 15 cents a copy.

Bulletin 76 of the Labor Bureau, dated May, 1908, but only recently issued, contains two papers of special importance and interest. Their titles are (1) The Canadian industrial disputes investigation act of 1907; (2) What is done for the unemployed in

European countries? Bulletin 77, the July issue, treats exhaustively these themes: Wages and hours of labor, 1890-1907; Retail prices of food, 1890-1907; Compensation for injured Government employees.

Another September issue is the Compilation of customs laws and digest of decisions by courts and general appraisers, brought down to Jan. 1, 1908, a book of 1383 pages which will no doubt be found very useful by importers and certain Government officials.

Treasury Department circular 62, series of 1908, giving information as to bonds, currency, precious metals, and so forth, has been issued in pamphlet form. It contains and extends knowledge of the subjects which were treated in Treasury Department circulars 123 and 136, series of 1896; 143, series of 1897; 113, series of 1900, and 72, series of 1904. All of these were issued as pamphlets and were distributed in great numbers. The bond and currency issues of the United States are so numerous and varied that knowledge of them is a matter of considerable intricacy, and the people have seemed thankful for information concerning them.

The provisions of law relating to the State Department, the diplomatic and consular services, and the relations of the United States with foreign countries have been collected and published in a pamphlet.

The Manufactures Bureau has issued a new report on trade conditions in Mexico.

There is a new print of "Suggestions to homesteaders," the pamphlet dear to the hearts of those who have joined the great movement toward the irrigated and other vacant public lands of the great West.

This month's Catalogue records another one of the numerous editions of the Act to regulate commerce, as amended, and acts supplementary thereto, including the safety appliance acts, acts requiring monthly reports of accidents, arbitration acts, and hours of service act.

Arbitration treaties with Japan and Sweden were proclaimed Sept. 1.

The edition of the Consular and diplomatic service corrected to Sept. 1 has been issued. It is an interesting manual of 88 pages, containing the names and stations of all ambassadors, ministers, consuls-general, consuls, and consular agents of the United States and their official records from the beginning of their service; also the laws and regulations governing the service, and samples of question papers used in consular examinations. Those who are curious as to the nature of these examinations may here satisfy their curiosity.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has issued no. 2 of its series entitled Conference rulings.

The Government Roads Bureau (Public Roads Office) is encountering new problems since the automobile began sucking the dust out of the macadam roads and scattering it over the face of the landscape. The macadam road seemed to settle for all time the

question of the best country wagon road, but the automobile has made new contrivances necessary. The Public Roads Office has sensibly recognized that the auto has "come to stay" and that fighting it would be unwise, and has turned its attention to the difficult task of providing wagon roads that motor cars will not destroy. Bulletin 34, Dust preventives, is a contribution to this new practical study.

Naval Surgeon Barton L. Wright has aroused a wide interest in the medical world by two papers on Treatment of tuberculosis by administration of mercury, published in the April and July numbers of the United States naval medical bulletin, a quarterly periodical published by the Medicine and Surgery Bureau, U. S. N. Dr. Wright's papers are now presented in pamphlet form separate from the Bulletin.

The civil-service examinations announced for October include those for a hydrographic draftsman in the Coast Survey; a law examiner in the Forest Service; a trained nurse in the Indian service; an aid in the Division of Insects, National Museum; a librarian for the Naval War College; a laboratory aid in the Plant Industry Bureau; a library assistant for the Agriculture Department; cataloguers for the Documents Office—a tolerably varied assortment.

A new edition of the Register of the Department of State, corrected to August 12, 1908, is among the publications of the month.

A new disease, long a scourge in some parts of Europe, has recently invaded this country. Its popular name is an Italian word, pellagra, and it is supposed to be caused by eating spoiled corn. The Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service has issued a *présis* on the subject.

The report of the American Historical Association for 1906, 2 v., is now ready and can be supplied by the Superintendent of Documents.

Customs regulations of the United States, edition of 1908, is one of the September issues which interest a large number of citizens. It is supplied by the Superintendent of Documents, price \$1.75.

Volume 13, Decisions of the Interstate Commerce Commission, also called Interstate Commerce Commission reports, is a document which many have been awaiting. The volumes of this series, up to v. 12, were issued by a private publishing firm, but are now supplied by the Superintendent of Documents. The price of v. 13 is \$2.

#### PUBLICATION OF THE LAWS

There have been many compilers, many printers, many publishers, many editors, many editions, of the laws of the United States, but four series only have been compiled, printed, and distributed at Government charge, have been legally recognized as authoritative, and may rightfully be considered public documents within the accepted definitions. These are the Folwell edition, 1795-1815; the Bioren edition, 1815-45; the Little & Brown edition, 1845-73; the State Department edition, from 1873. Besides these four, the only

important edition of the text of the public and general laws beginning with the foundation of the Government is the "Story edition," published at Boston, 1827, by Wells & Lilly, "under the inspection of Joseph Story, Justice of the Supreme Court." It was in three volumes, and two volumes in continuation were issued at Philadelphia, 1837 and 1848, edited by George Sharswood. Before 1795 the only statutory provisions as to printing the laws were those of Sept. 15, 1789, giving the Secretary of State custody of the originals and directing him to supply one printed copy to each Senator and Representative; of June 14, 1790, directing the Secretary to publish the treaties; and of Feb. 18, 1791, which permitted "Andrew Brown or any other printer" intending to publish the laws to compare his prints with the original rolls in the office of the Secretary of State. Pamphlet editions of the laws of each session were, however, issued by several printers, and for many years also by the Secretary of State under authority of Congress.

*Folwell edition.*—Mar. 3, 1795, President Washington approved the act which led to the issue of the so-called Folwell edition, the first collected edition of the laws. It was entitled "An act for the more general promulgation of the laws," and provided that the Secretary of State should cause to be printed, at public expense, an edition of the Constitution, treaties, and laws then in force, with index, 4,500 copies to be printed, 500 for Congress and 4,000 to be apportioned among the States and Territories on the basis of their representation in Congress, and that future laws and treaties should be printed and distributed in like manner. Under this sanction a three-volume edition was printed at Philadelphia by Richard Folwell. All of the volumes bear the imprint date 1796, though vol. 3 contains the legislation of the 4th Congress, which continued until Mar. 3, 1797. In this edition each law is numbered as a chapter and in vols. 1 and 2 a new set of numbers begins with each session. In the later volumes one set of numbers runs through a whole Congress. Each private act has a number, but the text of private acts is not given. This is true also of acts which have been repealed or which have expired by the payment of appropriations or the expiration of dates. Folwell's volumes have no prefaces, introductions, notes, or other "apparatus," but the words "Published by authority" appear on the title-pages. Folwell issued in 1799 his vol. 4, containing the legislation of the 5th Congress. This volume was issued also by two other Philadelphia publishers, Mathew Carey and William Ross, and the latter's book appears to have been printed from Folwell's type, though it has not the same title-page. By act of Mar. 2, 1799, the edition was increased to 9,500 copies. In vol. 5 and the succeeding volumes the text of the private acts is given. Beginning with vol. 11 (12th Congress) the joint resolutions are numbered as chapters in the same series with the acts. Vol. 5 was printed at Philadelphia by Folwell, and Samuel Harrison Smith of Washington made an edition in which his title-page is pasted in before Folwell's. All the later volumes were issued at Washington. Vol. 6 was printed by William Duane and

vol. 7 by Duane & Son. Vols. 8-12 have the imprint of Roger C. Weightman. Vols. 9-11 were also "Printed for the Department of State." Vol. 12 gives the legislation of the 1st and 2d sessions of the 13th Congress. Vol. 13 covers the 3d session of the same Congress, bringing the record down to Mar. 3, 1815. All, except the State Department print of vol. 9, have on their title-pages the words "Published by authority."

*Bioren edition.*—Apr. 18, 1814, President Madison approved an act looking to the issue of a more complete and satisfactory edition of the laws. It provided for a Government subscription to 1,000 sets of a new edition to be edited and compiled upon a plan presented by the Secretary of State and the Attorney-General, the editor to be selected by the Secretary; also that the succeeding laws be published in the same form and distributed in the same manner. Richard Rush, Attorney-General, under date of June 10, 1814, sent to James Monroe, Secretary of State, a long statement of his plan of publication, which the Secretary at once concurred in. In this statement it was said that "the want of a full and complete edition of the laws of Congress has long been felt." The new plan required that all laws, though obsolete, repealed, or private, be printed; but laws relating solely to the District of Columbia were necessarily excluded, because that requirement had been embodied in the law authorizing the publication. By this plan it was also required that every act published should be compared with the originals; that all important acts, ordinances, or resolutions of the "old Congress" (Continental Congress) be included; full marginal notes to be given; the "common figure" (Arabic) to be used for all numbers and dates; each volume to have an index; the last volume to have a very full general index to the whole; treaties, constitution, and historical documents to be indexed as well as the laws; "it would be better to put the same thing down more than once in the index," said Mr. Rush, "than indulge too freely the practice of referring from one head to another." Secretary Monroe appointed John B. Colvin as editor. Under his editorship the "Bioren edition," 5 volumes, was published, 1815, by John Bioren and W. John Duane, Philadelphia, and R. C. Weightman, Washington city. Vol. 1 contains the great historical documents, treaties, and reprints from the journals of the "old Congress." In this edition the chapter numbers run by volumes, not by Congresses or by sessions. A new set of numbers begins with each volume. The joint resolutions are numbered in a separate series, beginning a new set of numbers with each session. In vol. 1 chapter number 102 is duplicated, that number being given to the last act of the 1st Congress and also to the first act of the 2d Congress. In his first volume Mr. Colvin made a somewhat serious error by adding to his print of the Constitution a 13th amendment which was then pending, but had not been ratified by a sufficient number of States, and has not been so ratified to this day. Mr. Colvin admitted in his preface that he did not know that the amendment had been ratified, but he knew that it had been ratified by 12 States, and evidently he thought that at least one of

the five yet unheard from would turn up on the same side. The proposed 13th amendment was submitted to the States by the 11th Congress at its 2d session (May 1, 1810) and it was not until 1818 that it was ascertained that it had not been ratified. There were then 17 States, and the affirmative action of 13 was required. Twelve ratified promptly, four rejected, and Virginia was never heard from. In South Carolina the Senate approved, and if the House had concurred the amendment would have been ratified. It was in fact for many years the popular belief that it had been ratified. As lately as 1843 it so appeared in various histories. This popular misconception is no doubt largely due to the error in the first volume of the accepted and official edition of the laws. The proposed amendment was to deprive of citizenship any citizen who should accept a title or any form of emolument from a foreign power without the consent of Congress. Vol. 2 contains the laws, 1789-97 (1st-4th Cong.) as in "old volumes" (Folwell edition) 1-3. Vol. 3, laws, 1797-1805 (5th-8th Cong.) as in "old volumes" 4-7. Vol. 4, laws, 1805-1815 (9th-13th Cong.) as in "old volumes" 9-13. Vol. 5 is the general index. The volumes in continuation of the Bioren edition, which were contemplated and provided for by the act of Apr. 18, 1814, were issued as follows: Vol. 6, edited by John B. Colvin, published by Davis & Force, Washington, 1822. Vol. 7, published by W. A. Davis, 1827; this volume has a general index, 1789-1827, compiled by Samuel Burch, which was also published separately. Vol. 8, by W. A. Davis, 1835. Vol. 9, printed by order of Congress, 1839. Vol. 10, printed by J. & G. S. Gideon, 1845. All of these volumes after the 5th have on their title-pages this sentence: "Corresponding with, and intended as a continuation of, the edition of Bioren & Co."

*Little & Brown edition* (Statutes at large).—By 1845 Congress had apparently tired of the Bioren edition as it had formerly tired of the Folwell edition. From 1831, Duff Green, Richard Peters, and Little & Brown had been memorializing in favor of a new stereotyped edition, and in 1829, 1832, and 1842, there had been strongly favorable reports by Congressional committees. Finally, Mar. 3, 1845 (28th Cong. 2d sess.), a joint resolution was adopted and approved by which the Attorney-General was authorized to contract with Little & Brown, of Boston, for 1,000 copies (sets) of a new edition of the general laws in four volumes, with the private laws and the treaties in two additional volumes, all to be arranged in strict chronological order. The requirement of chronological arrangement, while the private laws were printed in a separate volume, forced upon the unwilling editor, Richard Peters, the hippity-skippity scheme of numbering the chapters which still obtains and makes the Statutes at large peculiar. The scheme thus begun in 1845 is that of arranging all the laws, both public and private, in chronological order and numbering them in that order, then separating the private from the public laws and printing them in separate places, the numbers necessarily being irregular and non-consecutive in both places. Little & Brown were required to

print from stereotype plates and to secure to the Government such an interest in these plates that it might be sure of having future editions free from hindrance or extortion. The new series of laws, like both its predecessors, went back to the beginning and reprinted the Declaration of Independence and all succeeding enactments. The series was called Statutes at large. The collective laws of a session were called a "Statute" and designated by the number of the session, while each law was numbered as a chapter, a new set of chapter-numbers beginning with each session. This method of numbering the chapters has been continued to the present time. The Statute headings were dropped out of the text after the 28th Congress, but are even now continued in the table of contents, the word "Statutes," however, having been in late years substituted for "Statute." Though the first contract with Little & Brown in 1845 was for but six volumes, successive contracts extended the work till 17 volumes of the Statutes at large had been issued. Vols. 1-5 contain the public laws to the end of the 28th Congress, Mar. 3, 1845; vol. 6, private laws, 1789-1845; vol. 7, Treaties with Indian tribes, 1778-1845; vol. 8, Foreign treaties and general index; vols. 9-17, Public and private laws, treaties, proclamations, etc., Mar. 4, 1845, to Mar. 3, 1873, the end of the 42d Congress. Richard Peters was editor of vols. 1-8, George Minot of vols. 9 and 10, George Minot and George P. Sanger of vol. 11, George P. Sanger of vols. 12-17. The main lines of the title-page read in vols. 1-8, "Public statutes at large"; in vols. 9-11, "Statutes at large and treaties"; in vols. 12-15, "Statutes at large, treaties, and proclamations"; in vols. 16 and 17, "Statutes at large and proclamations." During all the term of their contract for the publication of the Statutes at large, Little & Brown published, in identical form except the binding, the acts of each session separately ("pamphlet laws").

*State Department edition.*—June 24, 1874, Congress discontinued the contract with Little & Brown and directed the Secretary of State to publish the Revised statutes, the pamphlet laws, and the Statutes at large. The Secretary wisely made his series a continuation of that of Little & Brown, instead of reprinting everything from the foundation as had been previously done when a new series was begun. The first volume of Statutes at large issued by the State Department was vol. 18, part 3, containing the legislation of the 43d Congress and the treaties negotiated and proclamations promulgated during the term of that Congress, Mar. 4, 1873-Mar. 3, 1875. The "part 3" attached to vol. 18 has been a stumbling block, because parts 1 and 2 have no part numbers, nor even volume numbers, nor even the title "Statutes at large," on their title-pages. There is nothing whatever in the books themselves to connect them with vol. 18, part 3, of the Statutes at large. This very defective method of publishing has been a continual source of embarrassment since the volumes were issued in 1875. Part 1 is the first edition of the first volume of the Revised statutes. Part 2 contains three distinct collections, separately titled, paged, and indexed, namely: Revised statutes relating to the District of

Columbia; Revised statutes relating to post roads, and Public treaties of the United States in force Dec. 1, 1873. From the 43d Congress to the 56th, the State Department issued a new volume of Statutes at large for each Congress, the volume numbers being consecutive, 18 to 31. When the legislation of the 57th Congress, with the treaties and proclamations of its period, 1901-03, was collected, it was found too extensive for a single volume, and volume 32 was published in two parts, part 1 containing the public laws and part 2 containing the private laws, concurrent resolutions, treaties, and proclamations. Concurrent resolutions were first printed with the laws of the 53d Congress, in vol. 28, Statutes at large, and their publication has been continued, as directed by the law of Jan. 12, 1895 (Stat. L. v. 28, p. 615). The State Department series follows closely the methods of the Little & Brown series. The Department issues also after each session a pamphlet print of the laws, treaties, and proclamations of the session. The pamphlets are identical in size of page, method of numbering, annotation, etc., with the volumes of the Statutes at large.

*Revised statutes.*—As early as 1848 the bulk of the Statutes at large, then filling 9 volumes, led to a desire for a revision, excluding private and obsolete enactments and including the whole body of permanent general laws of the United States in one volume. In 1848 there was a strong report from the House Judiciary Committee in favor of revision, and other similar reports followed, but it was not till 1866 that three commissioners were appointed to make the revision. The efforts of this commission proved inadequate, mainly if not wholly because of the resignation of its chairman, Caleb Cushing, to go on a diplomatic mission to Bogota. In 1870 a second commission of three was chosen, and produced the code which was reenacted by Congress June 22, 1874, and published in 1875, the volume containing also, as an appendix, an act to correct errors and supply omissions, approved Feb. 18, 1875. In 1877 George S. Boutwell was appointed to make another revision preparatory to a 2d edition. This edition was published in 1878, and is the legal standard. A Supplement to the Revised statutes has been issued as follows: Vol. 1, 1881; Vol. 1, 2d edition, 1891; Vol. 2, no. 1, 1892; Vol. 2, no. 2, 1893; Vol. 2, nos. 1-5, 1895; Vol. 2, no. 6, 1896; Vol. 2, no. 7, 1897; Vol. 2, no. 8, 1899; Vol. 2, no. 9, 1901. The ninth number completed vol. 2 of the Supplement, which was thereupon issued in bound form with title-page and index. In neither edition (1875 and 1878) of vol. 1, Revised statutes, are the services of an editor recognized. Of the Supplement, both editions of vol. 1, 1881 and 1891, were edited by William A. Richardson. Of vol. 2 of the Supplement, parts 1-6 were edited by W. A. Richardson, assisted by George A. King and William B. King; parts 7-9 were edited by George A. King and William B. King with the cooperation of Edwin C. Brandenburg. The laws have never been published in the Congressional series of numbered documents.

*Skip laws.*—From the very outset there have been authorized prints of the individual laws separately and pamphlet editions of

the laws of each regular and special session. The first action in reference to the separate prints of the individual laws of which record has been found in the published documents is a joint resolution adopted by the Senate June 4, 1789, and by the House next day. It provides that within ten days after the passage of any law 22 printed copies of it shall be lodged with the President, two copies to be by him sent to the chief officer of each State. (There were then but 11 States, Rhode Island and North Carolina having not yet ratified the Constitution.) This is a very early resolution, but its terms imply that "slip laws" were already being printed at the time of its adoption. While files of them have not been preserved, and the history of their publication can not be clearly made out, there is little doubt that they have been regularly printed from the beginning of the Government. Under the present practice, the slip laws are carefully edited and proof-read in the Rolls and Library Bureau, State Department, and printed as promptly as possible after their passage. Each law, no matter what its length, is a separate publication. The public and the private laws are arranged in two numerical series, each series being separately numbered in chronological order. The edition printed is 2,110 copies of public laws and 760 copies of private laws, of which 500 copies of each kind go for distribution to the Rolls and Library Bureau, State Department, 60 copies to the Treasury Department, and the remainder to Congress. The "slip laws" are accepted as authoritative by the courts until the Statutes are published. As the "slip laws" are not collected in volumes, no title-pages or indexes are issued for them. They do not even show the Congress or session at which they were enacted, though that may be determined by the date of approval which appears at the end of each act. As the "slip laws" are numbered in two series, and the same laws, as chapters in the Statutes at large, are numbered in one series, the numbers do not agree, and reference from one to the other was difficult till the issue of vol. 32, Statutes at large (57th Congress). In this and succeeding volumes the slip number is given in a side note opposite the chapter number, as it is also in the pamphlet laws for the 57th and succeeding Congresses.

*Pamphlet laws.*—Under this name and that of "Session laws" are known the editions of the laws of each session of Congress which are issued in paper covers as soon as practicable after the close of the session, and are subsequently, and practically without change of form, incorporated in the Statutes at large. In some form or other, pamphlet laws have been issued and distributed at Government charge from the beginning of Government under the Constitution. In 1818, when the edition was increased to 11,000, it was stated that previously it had been 10,000. It remained at 11,000 for many years. Under the printing law of 1895 the edition is 11,500, including 1,000 to be sold by the Superintendent of Documents. In the 37th Congress, 1st session (1861), the laws of that session were printed as a numbered Congressional document, House mis. doc. 23.

This is the only instance of the publication of the pamphlet laws in a numbered series of Congressional documents.

*Newspaper publication.*—One of the provisions of the first statute in relation to publishing the laws directed the Secretary of State to have them printed in three newspapers. With various changes in the number of papers, this kind of publication was continued till Mar. 4, 1875, when it was prohibited by law.

*Indexes.*—The first general index to the laws was that made in accordance with the plan of Attorney-General Richard Rush. It is vol. 5 of the Bioren edition of the laws and was compiled by J. B. Colvin and published in 1815. The period covered is Mar. 4, 1789, to Mar. 4, 1815. It is not properly an index, but a digest. Its entries undertake to show not only where a law is but also all that is in it. Some of its entries are two pages long and many a page or half-page. It was found cumbersome and no other like it has been made. Mr. Colvin himself, in the preface to vol. 6, Bioren edition, condemns the too voluminous index in vol. 5 and follows quite a different method in making the volume index to vol. 6. The next general index was compiled by Samuel Burch under authority of a House resolution of May 15, 1824, and printed with vol. 7 of the Bioren edition, 1828, and also separately. It covers the period Mar. 4, 1789, to Mar. 3, 1827. It is full, but not unduly full, and was highly esteemed in its day. Jan. 11, 1849, the Senate adopted a resolution directing the Secretary of the Senate to "contract with a suitable person to compile a synoptical index to the laws and treaties in continuation of" Burch's index of 1828. Mar. 11, 1850, the Secretary reported to the Senate that the new index was complete. A contract was made with Little & Brown to publish it, and it appeared in 1852. Instead of being a continuation of Burch, it incorporates his index and thus covers the whole period, Mar. 4, 1789, to Mar. 3, 1851. It is similar in plan to Burch's index, and its references are to both the Bioren and the Little & Brown editions. There were reprints 1853 and 1856. With the 8th volume of the Statutes at large, 1867, was printed a general index to vols. 1-8 of that series, in which are contained the laws, treaties, and proclamations, 1789-1845. The revision of the laws, and the issue of the Revised statutes from 1873 onward, has done away with the urgent need for general indexes to the laws.

*Digests.*—The first general digest of the laws appears to have been Ingersoll's, 1821, and the next Thomas F. Gordon's, 1st edition 1827, 2d edition 1837, 3d edition 1844, 4th edition 1851. Gordon's Digest was for many years one of the books bought by Congress and supplied to its members. Brightley's Analytical digest was printed in successive editions, 1853, 1863, 1865, and 1869. There have been many collections and digests of the laws relating to particular subjects, as Heyl's Revenue laws, 1868; Mayo's Pension laws, 1833, and others, but these should be considered in connection with the subjects to which they relate.
