Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 62d Congress, 1st session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

Documents can not be supplied by this Office free to individuals, **nor can they be forwarded in advance of payment.**

Documents entered in this catalogue that are for sale by the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, are indicated by a star (*) preceding the price named. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the Department, Bureau, or Division issuing the document, a double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is not obtainable, and whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary it will be found under the name of the Bureau. The Senate and House documents and reports are issued in limited editions and, unless otherwise indicated, may be obtained only through Members of Congress.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to over a million, of which several hundred thousand are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

Subscription price to individuals, \$1.10 a year, including indices. Back numbers can not be supplied. Please notify the Superintendent of Documents of any change in address.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the L. C. catalogue cards will be found at the end of the titles of the more important monographic documents. The figure following the card number (separated from it by a slanting line) indicates the number of cards required for entries suggested (title entry not included) on the cards. The price of the cards is 2c. for the first card and $\frac{7}{10}$ c. for each additional card for the same title ordered at the same time. **Remittances should be made to the Librarian of Congress.** Cards can not be furnished by the Superintendent of Documents.

CUMULATIVE INDEX

Beginning with July, 1910, the Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued separately each quarter and will cumulate for the twelve months ending June, 1911. That is, the September number of the Index is an index to the Monthly catalogue for July, August, and September, the December number is an index to the Monthly catalogue for October to December, the March number is an index to the Monthly catalogue for January to March, and the June number will be the Index for the fiscal year 1911. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

The second volume of the 1910 report of the commissioner of education has been published. It is the last report of Commissioner Elmer E. Brown, who has resigned to become Chancellor of the College of the City of New York.

Farmers' bulletin 450 tells some facts about malaria as seen in the light of the new medical science—a light which many good citizens have not yet seen. It is now known that there is but one source of the infection called malaria, and that is the bite of a mosquito which has previously bitten a person already infected. Malaria is caused by a parasite which attacks the red corpuscles of the blood and the mosquito carries the parasite. The whole story is told most compactly, concisely, and clearly by Dr. Leland Ossian Howard in Farmers' bulletin 450. He has been enabled to do so by the painstaking research and earnest study of many learned men, of whom he himself is by no means the least.

Even the busy bee has its diseases, so many of them that Farmers' bulletin 442 is devoted entirely to prescribing treatment for them.

The color of soils is the title of Soils Bureau Bulletin 79. The significance of color in studying soils is instructively explained.

Again a Farmers' bulletin puts the results of scientific research and experiment at the disposal of the public for the small sum of 5 cents. Bulletin 446 gives advice on The choice of crops for alkali land.

A brief recently filed and printed by consent of the Court is entitled The extent and character of the jurisdiction of the Commerce Court over cases brought to enjoin, set aside, annul, or suspend in whole or in part any order of the Interstate Commerce Commission. This is information which many persons have been wishing to have, and though there is an opposing brief, the one cited has apparently the sanction of the Court.

Another contribution to the reprinted literature of former days on the still vexed question of the tariff is Senate document 16, 62d Congress, 1st session, a reprint from the annual report of the Secretary of the Treasury (Robert J. Walker) for 1849 concerning the operation of the tariff of 1846.

The Canadian customs tariff has had its first official publication in the States as Senate document 15, 62d Congress, 1st session.

An important publication at the present moment is Senate document 17, 62d Congress, History of the reciprocity treaty of 1854 with Canada, by Chalfant Robinson, assistant professor of history at Yale. In 42 pages this interesting episode and its lessons for the present are concisely set forth. 5 cents.

Cost of living in American towns is the title of a report following an inquiry made by the British Board of Trade and presented to the British

Parliament by command of His Majesty. The things inquired into were working class rents, housing, and retail prices, with rates of wages in occupations in New York and 27 other "towns" of the United States. The book is large—534 quarto pages—and gives room for many interesting details leading up to the final conclusion that workmen's wages are about 130 per cent higher in the States than in England, while here the expenditure for food and rent is but about 52 per cent higher. This, however, is on the assumption that the English standard of living should be adhered to in this country, which admittedly is not the case, the standard in this country being considerably higher. The report gives Americans a fine opportunity to see themselves as others see them. On the whole, the impression made upon the foreign inquirers was evidently favorable, and their report is both interesting and informing. The American reprint is Senate document 22, 62d Congress. A digest of this elaborate report, made for publication in Labor Bureau Bulletin 93 (not yet issued) has been published as Senate document 38, 62d Congress. This abbreviated edition contains also a comparative summary of the four earlier reports along similar lines made by the British Board of Trade for England and Wales, Germany, France, and Belgium.

Commercial relations of the United States with foreign countries, calendar year 1909, has just been issued. It is a large volume, made up of reports by American consuls on commercial conditions in their consular districts. It has interest and value, but of course would have more of both if it were possible to publish it a year or so earlier. Efforts have been made for earlier publication, but have not succeeded. There are too many reports required from officials too far away to make prompt compilation practicable. So well convinced is the Printing Committee of the impossibility of getting a prompt publication of Commercial relations that in the new printing bill, again introduced in the Senate, it is provided that the publication of this annual volume shall be discontinued altogether.

A new edition (1911) has been issued of the Comptroller of the Currency's Instructions relative to the organization, etc., of national banks. 5 cents.

The Pomona Valley is typical of localities in the citrus belt of southern California. Water is none too plentiful there, and the fruit-growers of the valley have learned how to use the scant supply wisely and skilfully. Their experience is therefore valuable for other fruit-growing regions, when clearly and carefully set forth in print, as it is in Office of Experiment Stations Bulletin 236, The use of underground water for irrigation at Pomona, Cal. 20 cents.

Bulletin 237, Office of Experiment Stations, Irrigation in California, is one of a series dealing with irrigation in all the arid States and Territories, and answering the questions which flow in upon the Government experts from all points of the compass as to conditions, opportunities, etc., in these yet undeveloped regions. Publications of this class are much needed. The correspondence of the Superintendent of Documents for some time past has clearly developed the fact that a wide-spread interest in the arid regions and their development by irrigation has been awak-

ened. The inquiry for just such publications as Experiment Stations Office Bulletin 237 has been persistent and the publication of a series descriptive of all the irrigated States will be helpful to the migratory industrial army ever moving on toward the virgin lands of the far West.

The Special agents series of the Manufactures Bureau is growing fast. No. 45, Trade development in Latin America, is one of the latest issues. The writer, Mr. John M. Turner, is a keen observer. His report is packed with interesting and useful details.

No limit has yet been put upon the range of subjects considered in the Farmers' bulletins. No. 449, Rabies or hydrophobia, by Dr. John R. Mohler, is a condensation of a chapter on the same subject in the 26th annual report of the Animal Industry Bureau. This sort of condensation is a favorite method in manufacturing the Farmers' bulletins. Whenever any one of the 3,000 scientists employed by the Agriculture Department composes an important report or thesis, one of the first thoughts is as to whether it supplies the material for a popular abstract which may be published as a Farmers' bulletin. The abstract which has been published as no. 449, brief though it is, is a convincing treatment of its theme. Dr. Mohler maintains that the evidence of the existence of rabies is beyond reasonable dispute, and that its terrible effects are not an illusion or due to imagination. He says the dreadful malady has been exterminated in several European countries simply by keeping the dogs muzzled for a sufficient length of time, and that it might be exterminated altogether by making muzzling universal.

May 17, 1911, the Senate ordered the publication as a numbered document of 5,000 copies of the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Standard Oil Company case, Mr. Justice Harlan's dissenting opinion to be included in the publication. This decision has been published as Senate document 34, of the 62d Congress. Copies are on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents.

The report of the North Atlantic Coast Fisheries Arbitration before the Permanent Court at The Hague, 1910, now in course of publication, will fill 8 octavo volumes, and will be denominated Senate document 870, 61st Congress, 3d session, parts 1-8.

The American ephemeris and nautical almanac for 1913 is now on sale, \$1.00.

An Outline of the organization and work of the Department of State, 1911, is a new pamphlet of interest to all who feel a proper curiosity as to the makeup and functions of the Government under which they live and move and have their being.

Usually it is required that when a new Congress begins the members shall find a new Congressional directory on their desks at the opening session. In the case of the 62d Congress the changes from the old Directory were so numerous that it was found impossible to get the new Directory ready for the opening day, April 4. It was, indeed, late in May before the new Directory was ready for use. It is more ornate in typography than its predecessors, but otherwise it does not vary greatly from the familiar lines of former Directories. It is a most useful book, giving more information concerning the personnel and the organization

of the Government than any other one volume. In cloth binding, sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 60 cents.

The Use book of the Forest Service is still to be issued for the Service, but the corresponding issue for the general public has assumed a more resounding title. It is now *The national forest manual*. The first issue of the Manual has the subtitle *Grazing and the second Special uses*. The Superintendent of Documents offers copies of *Grazing* at 10 cents each and of *Special uses* at 5 cents.

Chief Bibliographer Meyer, of the Library of Congress, has compiled and published Additional references relating to popular election of Senators. This is a very live question this summer, having been debated not only in Congress but in hundreds of other forums where young men and young women have been settling the fate of the nation as a part of their school exercises. The new list of references is supplied by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents a copy to statesmen and embryo statesmen alike without discrimination.

The Employers' liability laws of April 22, 1908, May 30, 1908, and April 5, 1910, have been printed together in a small pamphlet. 5 cents.

The report by the Tariff Board on the Pulp and news-print paper industry has been published as Senate document 31, 62d Congress. 134 pages. 15 cents.

The President's Commission on Economy and Efficiency, of which Frederick A. Cleveland is chairman and William F. Willoughby and Merritt O. Chance the other members, has become a publisher, having issued a set of circulars numbered 1-12, except nos. 4 and 7, which are to be issued later.

A new and enlarged edition of the Manual for the Medical Department of the Army is in press, but it may be a month before it will be on sale. It will be the first edition of this manual since 1906.

Part 1, Handbook of American Indians north of Mexico, comprising the titles beginning with the letters A-M, is out of stock and a reprint is in contemplation. May 11 the Senate by unanimous consent adopted concurrent resolution 2, authorizing the publication of 3,500 copies of both parts of the Handbook, 1,000 for the Senate, 2,000 for the House, and 500 for the Ethnology Bureau. May 12th the resolution was received in the House and referred to the Printing Committee. At the time of writing it had not been reported out of committee.

The Mines Bureau has issued its Bulletin 12 under the title *Apparatus and methods for the sampling and analysis of furnace gases*. It has also issued Technical paper 1, *The sampling of coal in the mine*, thus beginning a new series which in time may grow to be of considerable extent. Technical paper 2, *The escape of gas from coal*, is already announced. Miners' circular 3, the entry for which appeared in the April, 1911, Monthly catalogue, page 574, is an important little document on an important big subject. Title, *Coal-dust explosions*. Bulletin 7, the entry for which appeared in the April, 1911, Monthly catalogue, page 574, discusses details of recent researches and discoveries in the field of the conservation of energy under the title: *Essential factors in the formation of producer gas*.

PRODUCER GAS

This is a fuel gas. It is producer gas because it comes from a producer. This producer is a monster retort in which low-grade coals or lignites are burned by aid of a steam-blast and the gaseous products of the combustion confined. Subsequently the gas thus produced is burned in internal-combustion engines. Tests have established the fact that by this means inferior fuels may be made to yield a greater amount of energy than otherwise. The term producer gas appears so often in the public documents, and is so unusual in form, that a word of explanation seems to be called for.

CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Though the census documents announced for publication during the spring months are still somewhat in arrears, several important bulletins have been issued. In the Population series there is a new bulletin giving the population of all the States and Territories by counties and equivalent subdivisions, and also one giving the population of New York City by enumeration districts. In the Agriculture series the Wisconsin bulletin has been issued, and in the Manufactures series the Delaware bulletin. Each of these four is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents.

LAWS OF SIXTY-FIRST CONGRESS

The "session laws," being the pamphlet edition of the statutes enacted at the 3d and final session of the 61st Congress, have been published in 2 parts. Part 1 contains the public laws and part 2 the private laws and miscellaneous material, including resolutions, treaties, proclamations, etc. These volumes are now on sale at 75 cents each.

By the issue of the session laws for the 3d session the official indexed publication of the laws of the 61st Congress has been made complete, though scattered through five large pamphlets. The collected leather-bound edition, known as Statutes at large, remains to be issued to close the record for the 61st Congress.

NEW VOLUME CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

The permanent bound form of the Congressional record for the third and final session of the 61st Congress—Dec. 5, 1910–March 4, 1911—has been issued. Though it is in but one volume, it fills five large books. It is all vol. 46, but the volume is in five parts. Part 5 is a composite book of a kind unusual in the Congressional record series. It contains pages 4023–4342 of the Proceedings, covering March 3 and 4, 1911. Also, an Appendix of 247 pages, made up of speeches which were so long withheld for revision that it was not possible to print them in the daily edition of the Record or in their chronological order in the bound volume. Also, lists of the membership of the Senate and the House of Representatives. Also, an Index to the Proceedings of the entire session as contained in the 5 parts of vol. 46. Also, an Index to the Appendix. Also, a History of bills and resolutions.

It has been the rule since the publication of the Congressional record began in 1873 to print the Index in a separate volume. Only four times before—volumes 1, 6, 12, and 37—has the Index been printed with the Proceedings, and in each of these cases the proceedings were so brief that they were printed in a single book, leaving also ample room for the Index, and the two together making but a thin volume. In vol. 45 the Appendix and the Index were bound together. Never before has the Index been bound up with Proceedings forming a numbered part of a volume printed in several parts. By calling attention here and now to this peculiarity of the latest volume of the Record, perhaps some inquiries for the Index volume may be anticipated.

It may be well to mention again the fact that the daily edition of the Record and the permanent bound edition differ radically in important respects. While they record the same proceedings from the hands of the same reporters, some errors are made in the hastily prepared daily edition. These are corrected in the bound edition, and the biweekly indexes issued with the daily prints are combined in one general index for the permanent volumes. The paging of the two editions differs considerably, owing to the fact that the daily headings used in one are omitted from the other, and various lists and notices used in the dailies when needed in filling out signatures, etc., are also eliminated in reprinting and binding. The consequence is that the indexes made for the daily edition will not fit the bound edition and the combined index bound in one volume will not help in consulting the daily numbers. It happens rather frequently that persons who have saved their daily numbers would like to bind them and get a one-volume index to go with them. The methods of publication do not make this feasible.

Vol. 46, in 5 parts, is now on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at \$1.75 each for parts 1-4 and \$2.60 for part 5, which is the index volume.

TREASURY DECISIONS

As mentioned in the March Monthly catalogue, the Secretary of the Treasury, by Treasury decision 31368, dated March 10, 1911, ordered the discontinuance, April 1, of the free issue of the weekly Treasury decisions and Reappraisal circulars and informed the unofficial public that they would be supplied by the Superintendent of Documents at \$1.75 a year for the Decisions and 60 cents a year for the Circulars. This has resulted in gratifying accessions to the long list of Government periodicals supplied to subscribers through this office, while no citizen who really needs or desires the Decisions or Circulars has been required to do without them.

Now the improved situation has been further recognized by a change in the outward form of the Treasury decisions, giving the weekly issues a more magazine-like and business-like front, and carrying on the re-modeled title-page this new inscription: *Furnished gratuitously only to Government officials; to others interested, on subscription (\$1.75 a year) to be sent to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.*

This was first published in the number for May 18, 1911 (vol. 20, no. 20), and has been continued since.

YEARBOOK OF AGRICULTURE

The Yearbook of the United States Agriculture Department, bearing date 1910, but issued in 1911 and containing a considerable amount of 1911 statistical material, is now ready for delivery.

Besides the annual report of Secretary Wilson and the appendix packed with the latest and most important agricultural statistics, the volume contains 28 special articles, each of the 11 scientific bureaus of the Department being represented in the list, and the whole presenting in terse and untechnical language for popular instruction a view of the Department's most recent work in research and in application.

The frontispiece is a faithful portrait of the late Senator Dolliver of Iowa, who at the time of his death, Oct. 15, 1910, was Chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture. Forty-nine other full-page plates (8 in color) and 31 text figures are used in illustrating the special articles.

Altogether, the 1910 edition of the Yearbook is likely not only to maintain but to enhance the standing of this most famous and most widely circulated of all farmers' manuals.

NEW POLICY AS TO REVISIONS

In the letter of transmittal on page 2 of Farmers' bulletin 447 is found this sentence: "Since it is not now the policy of the Department to issue revised editions, it is recommended that this bulletin be issued under a new serial number."

In past years, the Agriculture Department has issued hundreds of revised editions, but a few months ago it was decided that when a publication was to be reissued with but few and immaterial changes it should be rated as a reprint and not a revision; if the changes were too many and too important for this course, then the new print should have a new number and stand on its own footing as a new and independent bulletin.

This change of method has been made mainly in the interest of libraries and collectors who have been binding the bulletins of the Agriculture Department for preservation. The numbering and indexing of these small pamphlets has made it almost a necessity to bind them in numerical order, and after binding it was troublesome to dispose of new prints issued under numbers which had already been used. It has not been possible to get such belated prints into their proper numerical order except by taking the bound volumes to pieces and rebinding them. The new method will enable the libraries to avoid this serious difficulty.

The Farmers' bulletins which have been issued under the new method are: no. 414, Corn cultivation, superseding Farmers' bulletin 199; no. 417, Rice culture, superseding Farmers' bulletin 110; no. 429, Industrial alcohol, superseding Farmers' bulletin 268; no. 431, The peanut, superseding Farmers' bulletin 356; no. 442, The treatment of bee diseases, superseding Entomology Bureau Circular 79; no. 447, Bees, superseding Farmers' bulletins 59 and 397.

SPECIAL CONSULAR REPORTS

In 1890 the publication of this series was begun by the Bureau of Statistics, State Department, as a set of volumes. Vol. 1 was made up of five unnumbered reports bound together. They were called Special consular reports because they were specially called for, after a fashion which still prevails in the State Department. When any American manufacturer or merchant or association representing any business or producing interest in this country thinks that official information concerning similar interests in foreign countries would be useful, application may be made to the State Department, and if the Department approves the application it sends an official circular instructing the United States consuls to give the Department such information relating to the specified subject as they can gather. If the information so received is deemed to be of sufficient public interest it is published as Special consular reports vol. so-and-so. It is seldom that the reports received on a single subject are sufficiently voluminous to fill a volume of ordinary size. Consequently it was for years the custom to bind several such sets of reports together as a volume, which often made companions of incongruous subjects. In other cases the reports, though really of only pamphlet size, were issued as volumes. Neither plan was quite satisfactory, but both have been followed intermittently, not only in the Statistics Bureau, State Department, but also in its successor, the Foreign Commerce Bureau, State Department, and in the Statistics Bureau and the Manufactures Bureau, Commerce and Labor Department, by all of which organizations the Special consular reports have been successively published. Some have been also published unnumbered, volume numbers having been subsequently announced.

The number of volumes had reached 43, some of them, especially the more recent ones, having been pamphlets so small that calling them volumes seemed an absurdity, and in several cases volumes having been split into parts. The Manufactures Bureau, which is the present publisher of the series, has now very sensibly dropped the series designation "volume" and substituted "number." The numerical series has not been broken, no. 44, Cotton-goods trade in China, immediately succeeding vol. 43.

HARRIMAN ALASKA SERIES OF THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION

In 1899 Mr. E. H. Harriman, the great railroad financier, financed a remarkable expedition to Alaska. Having chartered a steamship for a summer cruise for himself and family, he enlarged his plan by inviting numerous guests, among them 25 scientists, several of whom were and still are prominent in the scientific work of the United States Government. Finally, science became the predominant feature of the expedition, pleasure travel being made subordinate, and every opportunity being given the scientists for observation and collection. Artists, photographers, stenographers, hunters, packers, and other assistants were in the ship's company. Though the voyage was but two months long, its scientific results were of remarkable value. They have been perma-

nently recorded in a series of 11 sumptuous volumes, edited by Dr. Clinton Hart Merriam, for many years chief of the Bureau of Biological Survey, Agriculture Department, and published by Mr. Harriman through the book firm of Doubleday, Page & Co., New York.

Mr. Harriman, who died September 9, 1909, had paid the entire cost of this great enterprise, and now Mrs. Harriman, with equal munificence, has turned over to the Smithsonian Institution the entire series of publications commemorating the Alaska expedition. Nearly 10,000 volumes, many of them in finished bindings, and many others in printed sheets, were given to the Institution, along with the sets of electrotypes and everything connected with the series of publications.

Hereafter the series will be published by the Institution, and will be known as the Harriman Alaska series of the Smithsonian Institution. The Institution has never been able to afford so beautiful and costly a set as this which has now been added to its list. The books were evidently published quite regardless of cost. The print and paper are of the best, and the books profusely illustrated, colored plates being numerous and of fine quality. There is, preceding the scientific papers, a narrative of the expedition, by John Burroughs, of over 100 pages. Vols. 1-5 and 8-13 have been published, but vol. 12 is out of print. Vols. 6 and 7 are in course of preparation and will be published by the Smithsonian Institution. There are intimations that other volumes may yet be issued.

The Harriman Alaska series, like the other series of the Smithsonian Institution, the Contributions to knowledge and the Miscellaneous collections, are not public documents of the United States, being chargeable to the Institution's private funds. There is but one publication of the Smithsonian Institution proper that is a public document, namely, the annual report. All the publications of the Institution's subsidiary bureaus, the National Museum and the Bureau of American Ethnology, are, however, public documents and sold by the Superintendent of Documents.

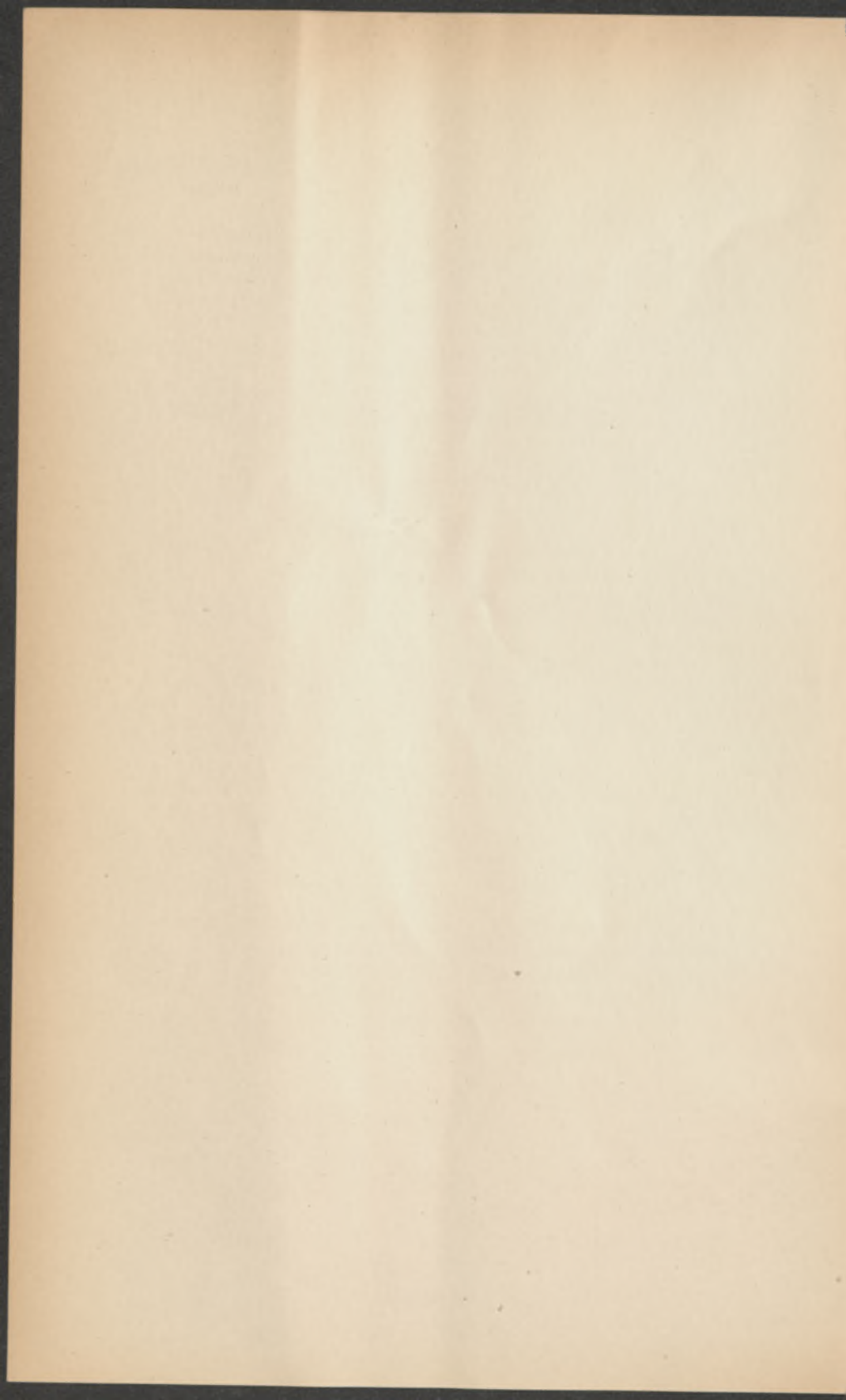
The Institution is now distributing the Harriman Alaska series to selected institutions which may be without sets in whole or in part. The work will also be on sale by the Institution.

Mrs. Harriman has placed in the custody of the Smithsonian a trust fund producing an annual income of \$12,000, which is to be devoted to the scientific study of animals, especially American mammals. By the terms of the trust, the investigator to be employed under the fund shall be Dr. C. Hart Merriam, during his whole life.

Topographic sheets

NOTE.—The Geological Survey is making a topographic map of the United States. The sheets of which it is composed are projected without reference to political divisions, and are designated by some prominent town or natural feature found on them. Three scales are ordinarily used, 1:62,500, 1:125,000, and 1:250,000. These correspond, approximately, to 1 mile, 2 miles, and 4 miles to 1 linear inch, covering, respectively, average areas of 230, 920, and 3,700 square miles. For some areas of particular importance special large-scale maps are published. The size, unless otherwise given, is about 17.5 inches in height by 11.5 to 16 inches in width, exclusive of the margin, the width varying with the latitude. A description of the topographic map is printed on the reverse of each sheet.

More than one-third of the area of the country, excluding outlying possessions, has been mapped, every State being represented. Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, and the District of Columbia are completely mapped. Sheets of the regular size are sold by the Survey at 5c. each; but in lots of 100 or more copies, whether of the same sheet or of different sheets, the price is 3c. each. In no case can orders be filled at the wholesale rate unless the sum remitted solely for topographic maps amounts to at least \$3.00.
