## PREFACE

This Economic and Demographic Baseline Profile and the general socioeconomic characteristics data of San Luis **Obispo** County were prepared for the Pacific Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Region, Minerals Management Service, U.S. Department of the Interior under contract No. 14-12-0001-30164. The study develops a comprehensive socioeconomic profile as a baseline by which the impacts on the environment of future OCS oil and gas development can be assessed.

Federal Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) oil and **gas** leasing off the coast of California requires the development of Environmental Analyses that address the potential impacts of exploration, development, and production associated with the hydrocarbon resources in a sale area. Offshore oil and gas development may begin in the near future **in** the Santa Maria Basin north of Point Conception and would impact the primarily rural communities and region of northern Santa Barbara County and San Luis **Obispo** County.

Expansion of leasing activities to new areas has created the need to develop a Comprehensive Socioeconomic Profile (baseline) of San Luis **Obispo** County. This study reviews, analyzes and abstracts information available as a comprehensive socioeconomic profile of San Luis **Obispo** County. The profile contains information on demographics, employment, regional economic structure, **land** use, community structure and coastal zone resources. The development of this comprehensive baseline socioeconomic profile will eliminate the need to recreate a baseline for future validation efforts (not part of this study) of predictions related to Federal OCS oil and gas activities offshore of San Luis **Obispo** County, California.

The study was conducted by ECOS Management Criteria, Inc. with Terry L. Campbell as the Principal Investigator, Kay Collins as information management specialist and editor, and Karl J. **Fernandez** as Program Manager.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Located on the California coast midway between San Francisco and Los Angeles Counties, San Luis **Obispo** County is the fifteenth largest county in the state. The vast majority of the land use is for low and moderate **yield** agriculture. Most of the urban settlement of the County occurs along the coastal plain, with coastal communities comprising more than 61 percent of the total population. Urban land use within the County has more than doubled since 1960. However, County land use absorption estimates indicate a total population capacity twice that of the 1980 population for San Luis **Obispo** County. The total county population of 155,435 was approximately 86 percent white in 1980. **Age**-cohort based demographic forecasts indicate a relatively stable **2.1** percent annual average growth rate through the end of this decade. The median household size of 2.5 in 1980 reflects a total of 58,800 households in the County, of which 76 percent are located in incorporated areas.

The San Luis Obispo County **labor** force totaled 64,600 in 1980. Of this, approximately 60,000 **people** were employed indicating an average annual unemployment rate of 7.1 percent. The total labor force participation in 1980 was 55.7 percent with a **male** participation rate of 65 percent as compared to 46.5 percent for females. Government provides one out of four jobs in the County, with state and local education accounting for over half the government jobs. **Retail trade and services** provided 22.5 percent and 20.9 percent of the total jobs respectively as tourism **is** a relatively strong element of the local economy. Construction activity provided 11.4 percent of total jobs, followed by manufacturing at 6.4 percent, and transportation and public utilities at 5.6 percent. The finance, insurance and real estate sector provided 3.8 percent of total jobs as compared with agriculture at 3.4 percent. Wholesale trade is a relatively small part of the total economy at 3.0 percent of total employment. Mining continues as the smallest industry in San **Luis** Obispo County with 300 jobs. Although this category includes oil and gas production, there is currently no offshore production in state or federal waters along the coast of San Luis **Obispo** County.

However, potential offshore federal oil and gas leasing and development activities along the coast of San Luis Obispo County could result in increases in mining and related industries employment. Accordingly, the average wage rate in the County would increase proportionately from increases in direct and indirect oil and gas employment and related local tax subvention revenues. The higher average wage rates characteristic of the oil and gas industry would directly and indirectly influence both the level of employment and the average wage rate in San Luis **Obispo** County. Potential **local** employment development in related high technology industries would be enhanced by the presence of the educational facilities at California State Polytechnic University, San Luis **Obispo**.

Such increases would also result in a broader local tax base, and potential, effective **local** tax rate reductions from increases in economic export base associated with federal leasing and development of oil and gas resources.



## 1.0 INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 Study Background

The National Environmental **Policy Act** of 1969 requires an interdisciplinary approach to all planning and decision-making which may have an impact on man's environment. The Minerals Management Service (MMS) compliance with, and response to, this 1969 Act include Environmental Impact Statements (**EIS**), Environmental Assessment Teams, marine environmental data acquisition and analysis studies, socioeconomic baseline studies, socioeconomic analysis studies, public conferences, and specific technical studies (toxicity studies, spill trajectory analyses, etc.).

The purpose of these environmental studies is to provide information for management decisions concerning Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) offshore leasing projects. These decisions require information on economic consequences, socioeconomic and environmental degradation from oil spillage.

The present study parallels the data management approach of a recent MMS report entitled, Cumulative Socioeconomic Impacts of Oil and Gas Development in the Santa Barbara Channel Region: A Case Study. (Centaur Associates, Inc., 1984), to ensure data **base** consistency for both concomitant analysis and comparative evaluations. The structure of the data profile utilized in this 1984 Centaur study is not proprietary nor unique among socioeconomic data base profiles; a similar format was employed for consistency and for analytic comparability with ongoing MMS efforts.

### 1.2 Purpose of Study

The development of oil and gas resources off the coast of California requires environmental analyses of the impacts of exploration, development, and production. Expected offshore oil and gas development in the Santa Maria Basin north of Point Conception therefore requires impact analysis of the primarily rural region of northern Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County.

Expansion of oil and gas leasing activities in these areas has created a need for a Comprehensive Socioeconomic Profile data baseline of San Luis Obispo County. These data are presented in the following section. They contain information on employment, economic structure, land use, and community structure. A 1980 base period was selected for general profile focus because it is the most recent decennial **census** year and provides comprehensive federal agency data on a variety of socioeconomic factors. The 1980 **data** baseline for San Luis Obispo County is enhanced by the inclusion of current state, local, and county agency annual operational reporting data and related official projections. State and local agencies provide an alternative to federal agency data resources, and offer increased socioeconomic factor specificity, as well as increased data collection continuity because of the **annual** data reporting requirements of the state.

### 1.3 Data Organization

The socioeconomic profile and its projections presented are based **on** time series data available from federal, state, and local governments. The profile represents a 1980 baseline, and includes narrative and tabular descriptions of the socioeconomic characteristics. Projections presented also use 1980 as the base year while various selected historic socioeconomic characteristics are used to establish trends. All dollar values are expressed in constant 1983 price levels. A summary of the CPI factors from 1960 to 1983 used for the constant dollar calculations is presented in Appendix 21.

The data include more than 100 county socioeconomic characteristics. The trends and projections are based on time series beginning with **1960** data points in most cases. These projections are presented in summary form in appendices.

The comprehensive socioeconomic data for San Luis Obispo County are grouped into the following seven major data resource profiles:

- o Land Area and Natural Resources Profile
- o Demographic Characteristics Profile
- o Economic Characteristics Profile
- o Land Use Profile
- o Public Finance Profile
- o Community Services Profile
- o Energy Consumption Profile



## 2.0 DATA SOURCES

The information used in this study falls into three broad categories: 1) basic government socioeconomic data series, 2) industry publications and documents on oil and gas exploration, development, and production, and 3) general background information reflecting the study region and its history. The following sections review each of these data categories. References are cited throughout the **report** and are also summarized in the Bibliography in Section 4.0. The citations used in this report are long and their inclusion in the text would make reading the report difficult. Therefore the text refers to each table, figure, and appendix where full citations are included.

### 2.1 Socioeconomic Information Sources

The socioeconomic information sources include both published and unpublished government data. Unpublished information included data obtained **in** interviews, letters, and personal visits. In addition, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Economic Impact Forecast System (**EIFS**) II (1984) was used to profile socioeconomic characteristics of the County and to provide estimates of selected "location quotients". This data is summarized in Appendix 13.

#### 2.1.1 Federal Government Sources

Data from the federal government were obtained primarily from the Bureau of the Census, the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), and from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (**BLS**). In addition, some statistics were obtained from the Council of Economic Advisors (**CEA**) publications. Data series from the Bureau of the Census include: the Census of Housing, Census of Population, Census of Manufacturers, Annual Survey of **Manufacturers**, Census of Construction, and the Annual Survey of Housing Units Authorized by Building Permits and Public Contracts. BEA data were used for certain economic variables including employment, wages, salaries, and personal income. BLS data were used for alternative sources of income and employment information. Data from the **CEA** provided corroborating and alternative sources of income data. Price conversion factors (1983 dollars) were developed from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; All Urban Consumer Price Index (**CPI**) for Los Angeles-Long Beach Area from 1960-1983.

#### 2.1.2 State Government Sources

Data were also obtained from the State of California. Sources include the California Statistical Abstract and the California County Fact Book. Other data sources include California Department of Motor Vehicles, Department of Economic and Business Development, the Employment Development Department, the State Lands Commission, the Conservation Department-s Division of **Oil** and Gas, and the State Water Resources Board.

### 2.1.3 Local Government and Other Sources

Socioeconomic data were **also** obtained from city and County agencies. These data were used to supplement state publications and records including statistics on local government finance, tourism, and land use. Selected offices contacted in San Luis **Obispo** County included the Planning Department, County Assessor's Office, Board of Supervisors, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Engineering, Office of Emergency Services, and the Rancho El **Chorro** Superintendent of Schools.

The San Luis **Obispo** Chamber of Commerce was contacted to gather information on tourism and the general characteristics of San Luis **Obispo** County. This organization provided information on the socioeconomic environments of the municipalities and in the County. Statistics were also obtained from the Port San Luis and Morro Bay Harbor Districts and from the public utilities. Other data sources, primarily used as bibliographic background for this study, include a computer search for comparable studies.

### 2.2 Background Documents

The majority of the data needed for this study were available in reports gathered directly from local San Luis **Obispo** County sources (e.g. County land use plans) or in sources already identified (e.g. Census). However, a computer search was instrumental in identifying supplementary data, analytical data and corroborating information.

Preliminary search of various Dialog databases allowed elimination of those which would not be useful or would duplicate existing sources of information. A cost effective search was then performed on several potential databases in an attempt to identify only:

- o those that might contain useful information;
- o those which have information on the specific local area of San Luis **Obispo** County;
- o preliminary sources of information which could be used to design additional computer searches.

The preliminary computer" data search confirmed a paucity of relevant information on socioeconomic studies specifically related to San Luis **Obispo** County. Therefore, most databases were searched using only those terms specific to San Luis Obispo County. Two data bases, National Technical Information Service, (Department of Commerce) and EDB (Department of Energy) were searched in more depth. Most of the items identified were of a supplementary rather than primary nature.



### 2.3 Data Limitations

There were no major shortcomings such as gaps, inconsistencies or availability apparent in the study area. There are, however, general consistency concerns involved with multiple agency data sources. The following highlight specific considerations:

- o State and county data are often inconsistent with federal census information because of differences in reporting frequency and estimation methods.
- o The definition and methods used to estimate employment and unemployment changes during the years under study and the Standard Industrial Classification (**SIC**) system have been revised during the time period considered. Changes of definitions and methodological procedures are noted in the text when the data are presented and again in the references for the socioeconomic profiles at the end of Section 6.0.
- o Inconsistencies exist because certain data may represent different parts of the calendar year. Some data (e.g., beach attendance) were available only for selected California fiscal years.
- o Data for some of the socioeconomic variables profiled were available for only a portion of the time period under study. In other instances, data that disclose the operations of an individual employer are not published, making projections more difficult.



### 3.0 ECONOMIC AND DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

#### 3.1 Regional Location

San **Luis Obispo** County is located on the California coast midway between San Francisco and Los Angeles. It is the fifteenth largest county in the state, encompassing 8,615 square kilometers (3,326 square miles). It is bordered by Monterey County on the north, Kern County on the east, **Santa** Barbara County on the south, and the Pacific Ocean on the west. A County map is presented in Figure 1.

Geomorphic Region. The County **lies** near the Southern Coast Range mountain complex, which extends northeast to southeast. Within the County, five mountain ranges and five principal drainage basins can be defined. The majority of these geomorphic regions extend beyond the County's boundaries. The principal geomorphic features are identified in Figure 2.

The five ranges are the Santa Lucia Range, the **Temblor** Range, the **Caliente** Range, the La **Panza** Range and the San Luis Range. These ranges are generally oriented along a northwest to southeast axis. None are particularly high, although extensive sections are quite rugged and act as effective barriers to transportation. The higher peaks, many of which exceed 3,000 feet, are located in the Santa Lucia and **Caliente** Ranges. The Santa Lucia Range is the most significant range. The range forms a gentle "S" curve from the north to south ends of the County. In the north, it affords an imposing barrier between the wet coastal belt and the dry interior. In the south, the Santa Lucia Range is joined by the La **Panza**, **Caliente** and San Luis Ranges to provide a wide, complex mountain region that trends toward the interior of the County.

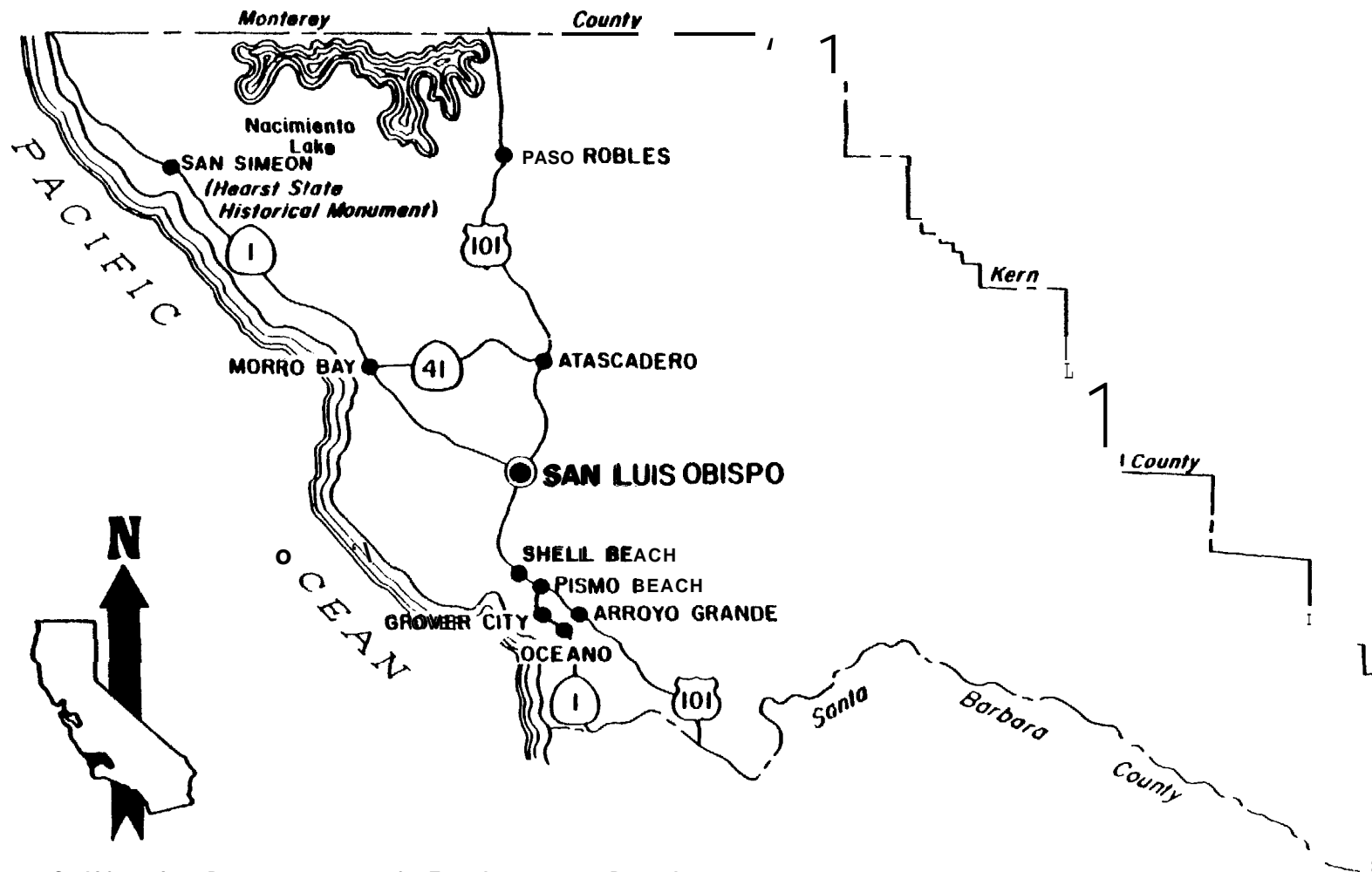
Most of the urban settlement of the County occurs in the coastal sector which comprises more than 61 percent of the total population. Projections of future population growth anticipate an even higher proportion of the total population in these coastal communities.

The **Salinas** River dominates a huge drainage basin in the northeast quarter of the County. This basin is characterized by vast, low, undulating hill lands and valleys. The extensive network of tributaries draining the area originate in the Santa Lucia range on the West and the **Temblor** Range on the eastern County boundary. San Juan Creek, a tributary to the **Salinas** River, extends south almost to the southern County boundary line near **Cuyama**. The **Salinas** River forms the largest single watershed in Central California.

Most of the basin's land is used for low and moderate yield agriculture. Urban development is concentrated along the edge of the **Salinas** River floodplain. Westerly tributaries to the **Salinas** River gradually transform the landscape from low hills into

# San Luis Obispo County Regional Location

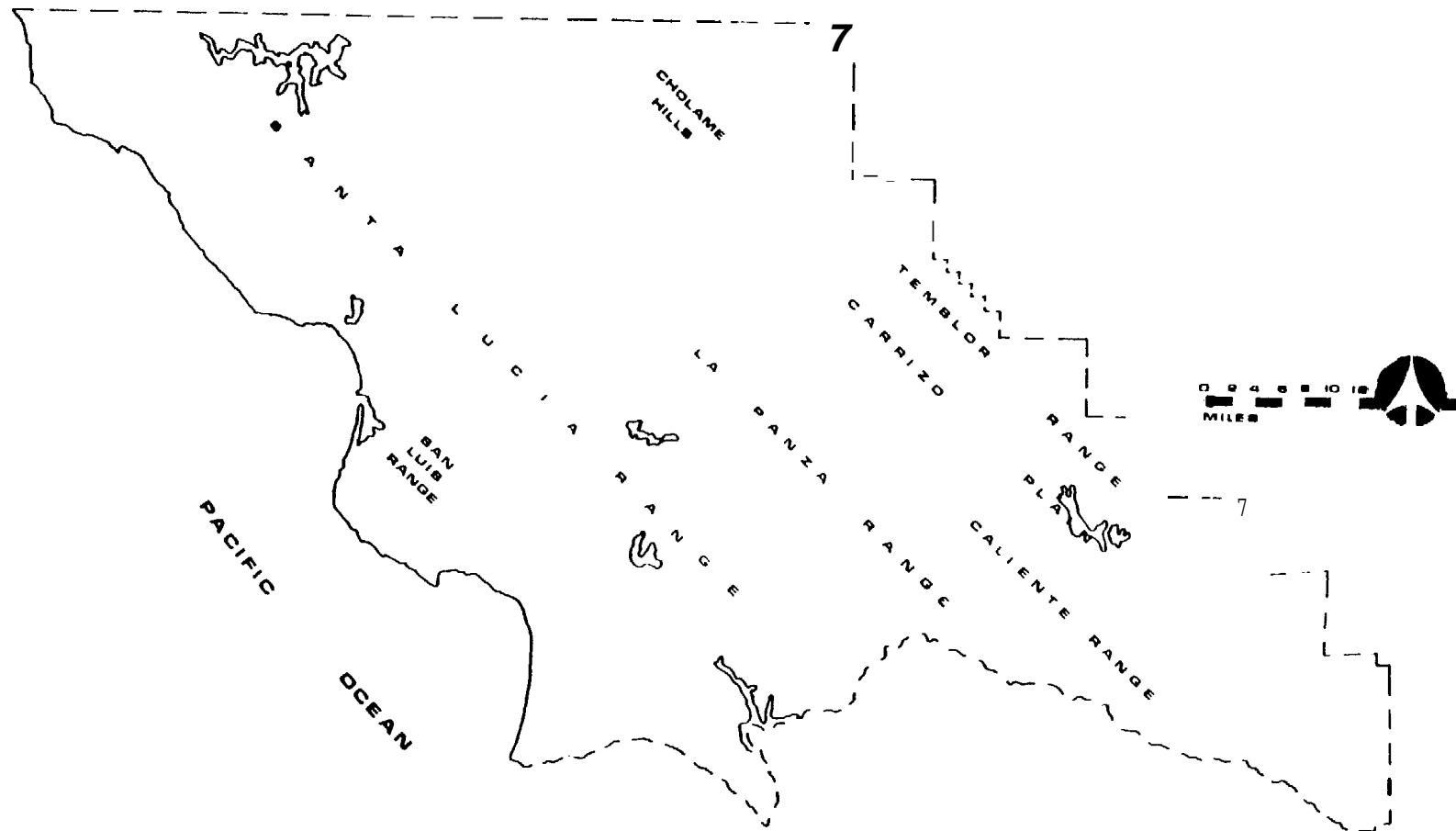

the precipitous Santa Lucia Mountains. The **Nacimiento** River is the largest of the **Salinas** River tributaries within the County.

The **Carrizo Plains** form an enclosed interior drainage basin. All drainage terminates in Soda Lake, a highly mineralized water body with a fluctuating water **level**. Toward the outer periphery of the basin, where the soil is **less** contaminated with mineral salts, the soil becomes more suitable **for** agriculture. Although the plains are the most arid region of the County, agriculture **is** extensive.

The **Cuyama** Valley drainage basin lies **along** the southeastern and **southcentral** portions of the County. About 45 percent of the basin is in San **Luis Obispo** County. It is drained by the **Cuyama** River and its tributaries. Since this river cuts across the **La Panza** and Santa Lucia complexes, a good portion of the valley is a narrow ribbon meandering through rugged terrain. In the south-east, where the valley widens, extensive agricultural activities are apparent.

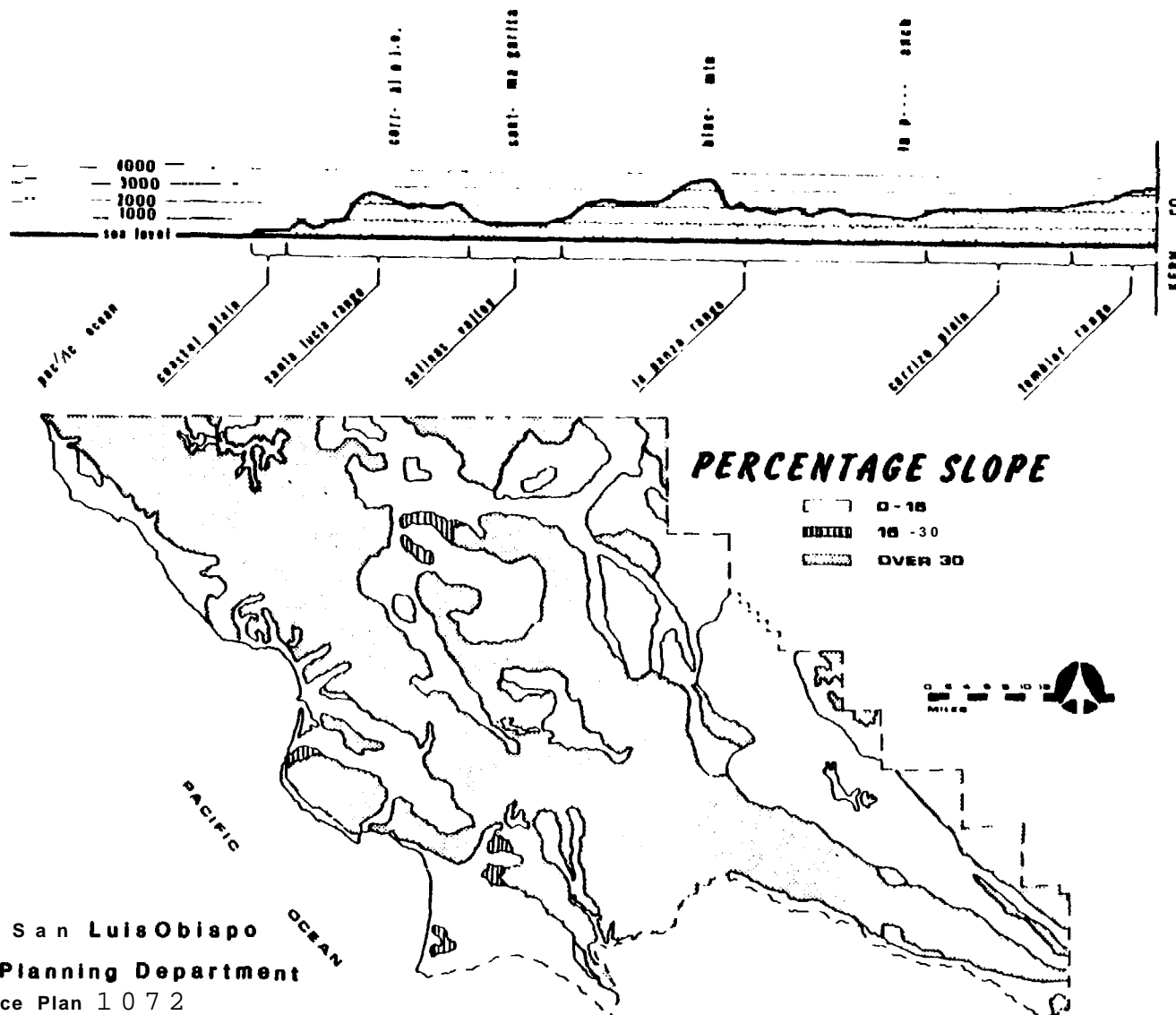
**Slope Characteristics.** There is very little level land except in some coastal valleys and along the northern border of the County. The prevalence of rolling or mountain terrain places approximately 60 percent of the County into the slope range of 30 percent or more. Another 23 percent occupies the 9 to 30 percent slope range, and **only** 17 percent can be considered gentle slopes to level (County of San **Luis Obispo**, Open Space Plan, June 1972). A percent slope range map is presented in Figure 3.

The **physiographic** cross-section: **slope** comparison is also presented in Figure 3. Steep slopes are a limiting factor for almost all types of land use. With limited gently sloping land, there is considerable competition for land in the 0 to 9 percent slope range.

**Geology.** San Luis **Obispo** County is an area that has been subjected to intense warping, folding and faulting. Literally scores of fault traces have been detected, but most have not been active in recent geologic time. Movement could occur along one of these minor faults, creating local damage, but the probability is lower than for movement along one of the two principal faults transversing the County. These two faults are the San Andreas and the **Nacimiento**. Medium intensity earthquakes along these faults have been registered.

Areas where concentrations of known landslides exist in the County include: several small canyons extending northeast of the **Estrella** River; along fault traces within the **Nacimiento** Fault Zone just west of Atascadero in the Las **Tablas** region; and, southeast of Santa Margarita. There is also a concentration of slides in a zone of clayey material overlying igneous and shale bedrock in the San Luis Range and along the coastal slopes of the Santa Lucia Range, Port San Luis and the hills behind **Cayucos**. Potential geologic hazards are identified in Figure 4.

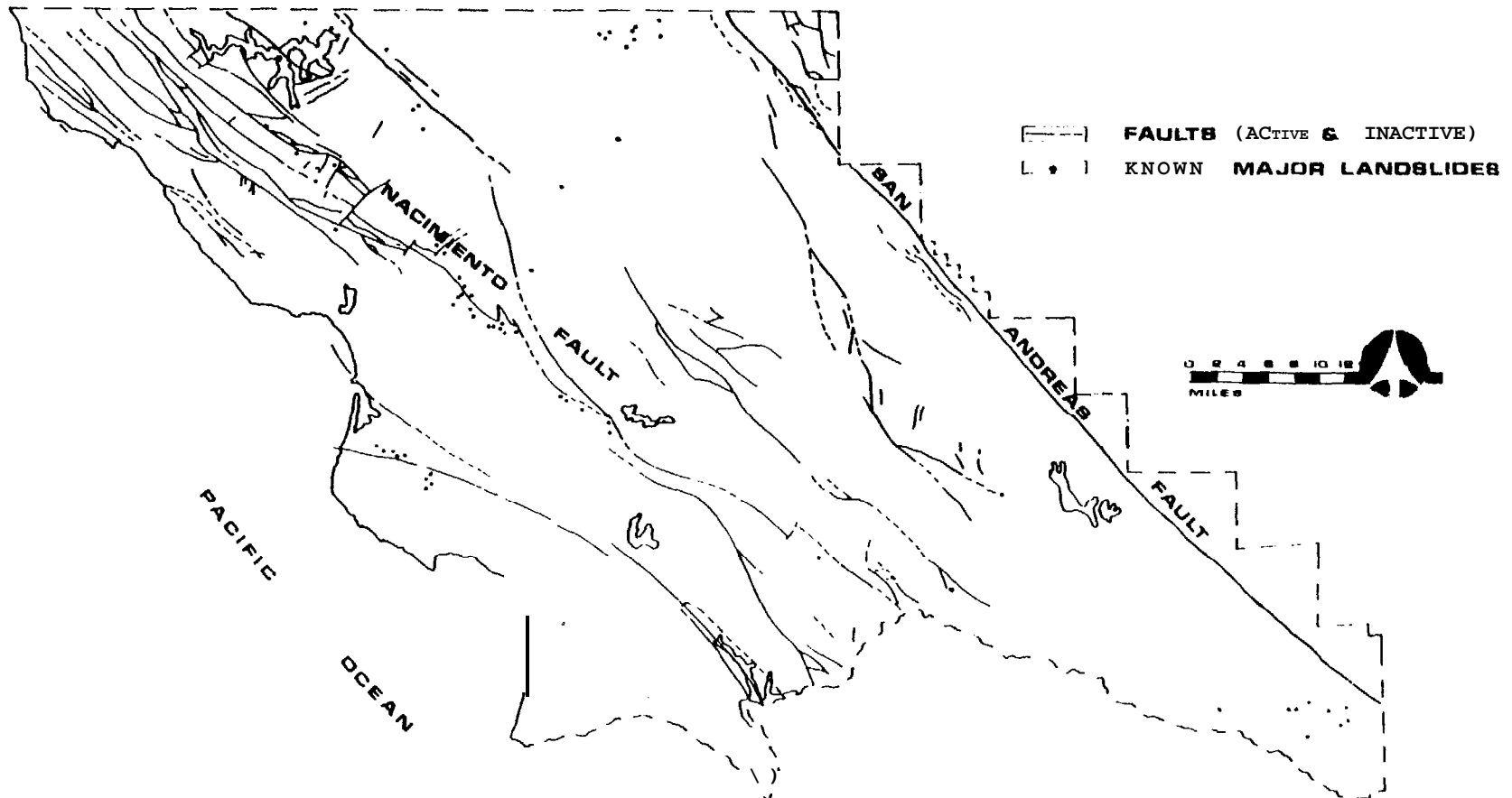

The U.S. Soil Conservation Service recognizes 12 major soil groups, each of which is **composed** of two or more soil association types. The soils in each group have certain qualities that make them similar to one another.

At a broader level of classification, these 12 soil groups fall into one of the following four categories: (1) geologically recent alluvial **soils** occupying **valley** floors and floodplains; (2) older alluvial soils found at higher elevations in the form of terraces and rolling hills; (3) shallow upland soils characteristic **of** steep slopes that overlie hard bedrock; (4) mixed land types such as dunes, river wash and rocky land. County location of general soil types is presented in Figure 5. The percentage of the total County land area in each category is:

Recent alluvium	10.5 percent
Older alluvium	13.0 percent
Upland soil	63.0 percent
Other land types	13.5 percent

### 3.1.1 Natural Vegetation

Natural vegetation associations in the County are broadly classified as: (1) grassland; (2) wooded-grassland; (3) woodland; and (4) chaparral-brush. These associations are generally identified with different kinds of open space uses, agricultural cultivation being an exception. The approximate amount of land area and the typical uses associated with each group can be described as follows:

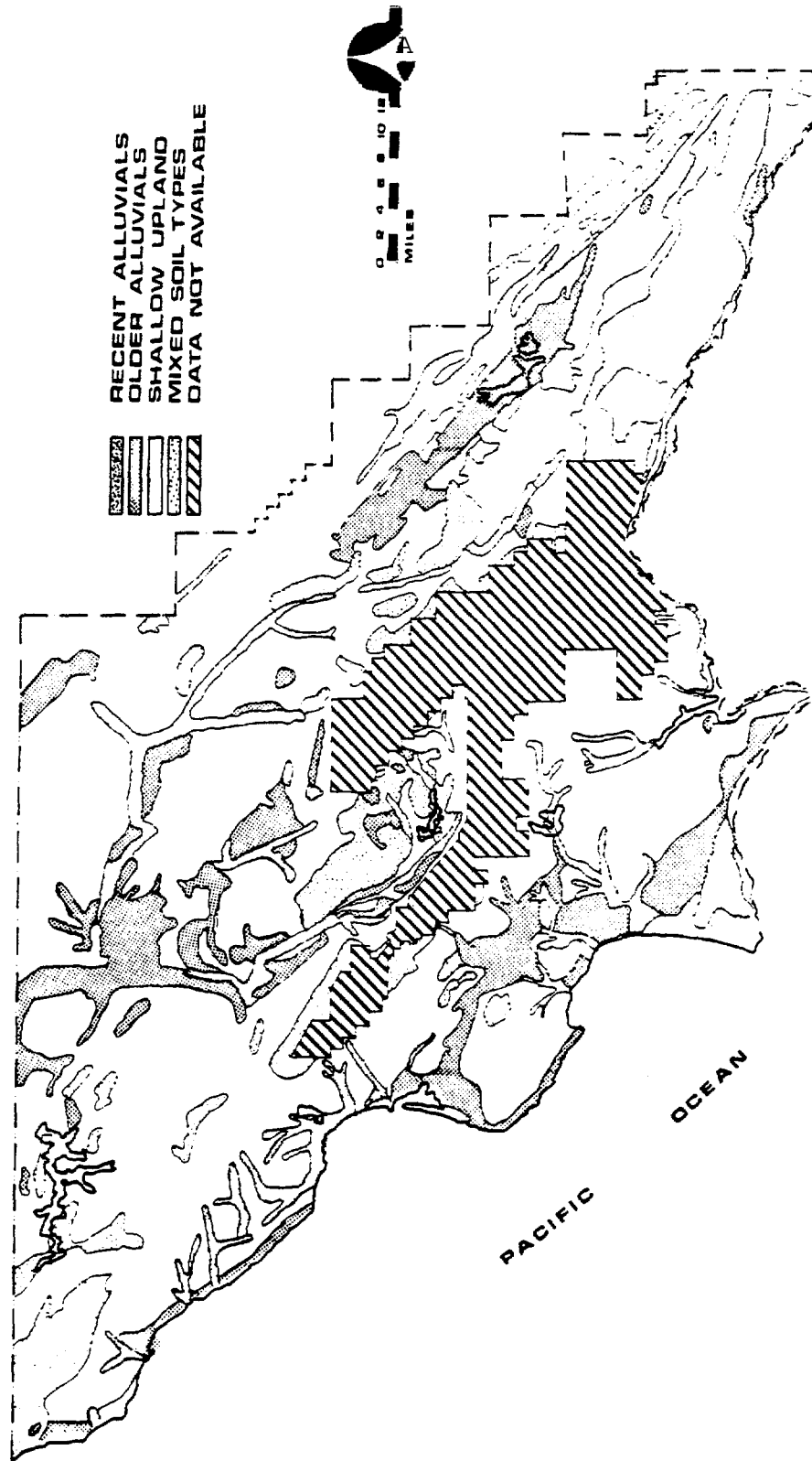
Vegetation within the County, by class, is presented in Figure 6.

### Climate

The **climate** varies from the **mild** coastal zone with its wetter ocean exposure to the drier and warmer interior zone protected from the ocean influence by the Santa Lucia and La **Panza** Ranges. The summers are long and dry in both zones, but a narrower temperature range and frequent fogs typify the coastal areas. The

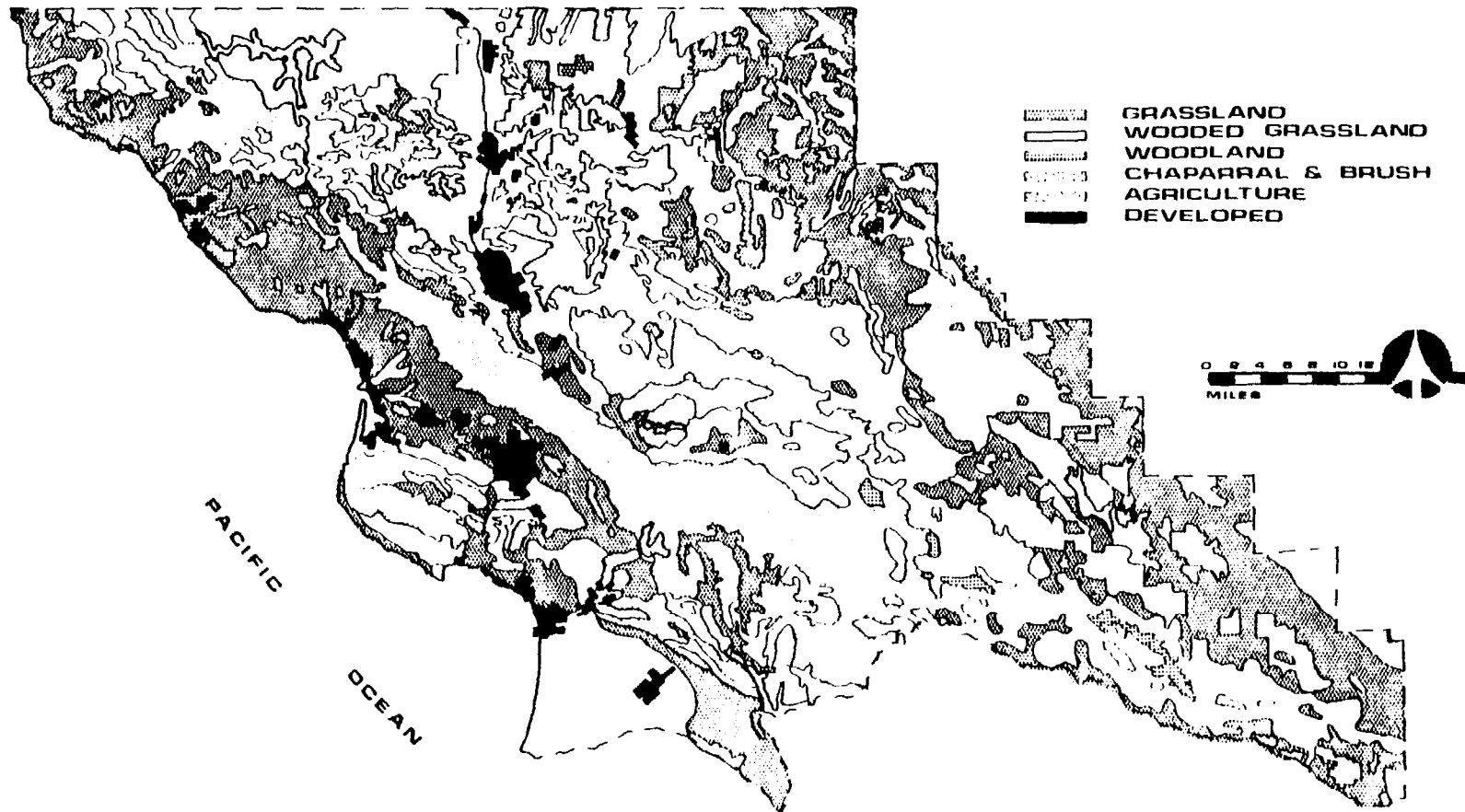
# San Luis Obispo County General Soil Types

interior areas experience a much greater annual and diurnal temperature range. **Rainfall** distribution within the County is presented in Figure 7.

The climate varies from the mild coastal temperatures **to** the warmer inland areas. During the summer, the temperature may be as much as 40 degrees cooler along the coast than in the interior. In the City of San Luis **Obispo**, the mean annual temperature is 54 degrees with an average **annual** rainfall of 22 inches. The average temperature is significantly higher with less rainfall in the inland areas.

While winters are characteristically wet in both zones, the amount of annual precipitation varies considerably. The north coastal area receives the greatest average rainfall with 50 inches falling along the crest of the Santa Lucia Range. In contrast, the south coastal area averages between 12 and 16 inches annually. Toward the interior, the amount of annual precipitation declines from 17 inches at Paso **Robles** to 8 inches in the **Carrizo** Plains.

Freezing temperatures occur much more frequently in the interior zone than along the coast. However, the growing season is sufficient to allow a large variety of crops to be grown. Killing frosts are infrequent in the Arroyo **Grande** and Santa Maria Valleys and the relatively mild climate permits double and triple cropping practices.

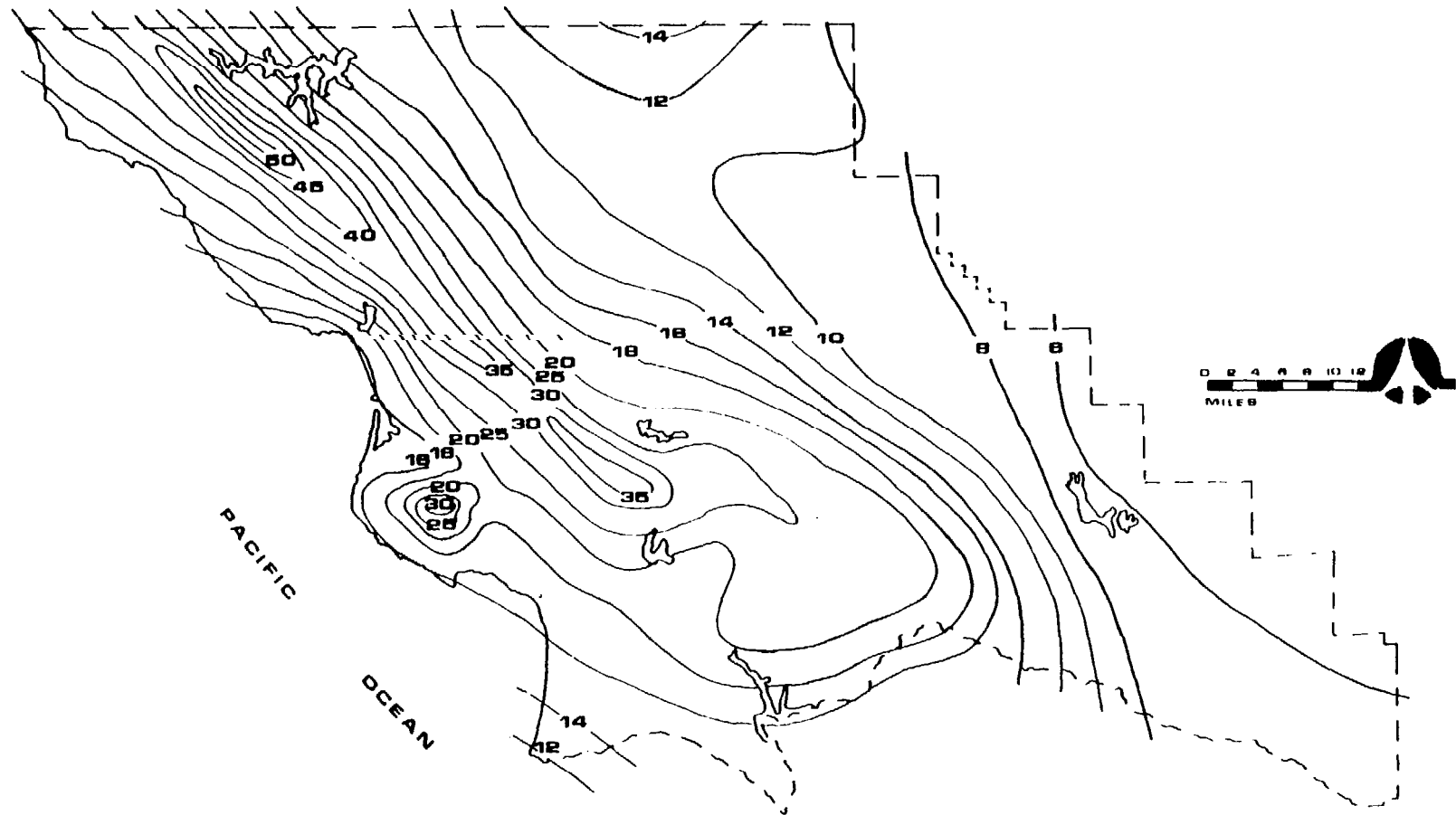
Characteristics of the **groundwater** basin. Major hydrologic features within the County are presented in Figure 8. Within the coastal area extending from the north County line to **Baywood-Los Osos**, the local groundwater basins are typically small. They currently support the urban population and limited agricultural use. It is unlikely that either could be greatly expanded without jeopardizing the safe yield of each groundwater supply. Supplemental sources will be necessary for future growth. In the San Luis **Obispo** area, including San Luis Obispo Bay, the present groundwater supply cannot meet current demands. The additional water needs are being met by Whale Rock and **Salinas** Reservoirs.

In the South County area, water releases from the Lopez Reservoir serve the urban areas and replenish the groundwater basin. Ground water basin supplies are estimated to be adequate to accommodate projected urban **and** agricultural demands until the year 2000. The major problem appears to be that not all communities within the water district have contracted for sufficient Lopez water, **while** others have more than they actually need on the basis of present population projections.

Anticipated agricultural expansion in the citrus fields on the Nipomo Mesa **will** place a greater demand on the groundwater basin. **While** the present safe yield of the basin cannot sustain the current expansion, the safe yield of the larger **Nipomo** area is five and one half times as great. This fact suggests that a redistribution of the underground water resources could facilitate extended land uses in the area.

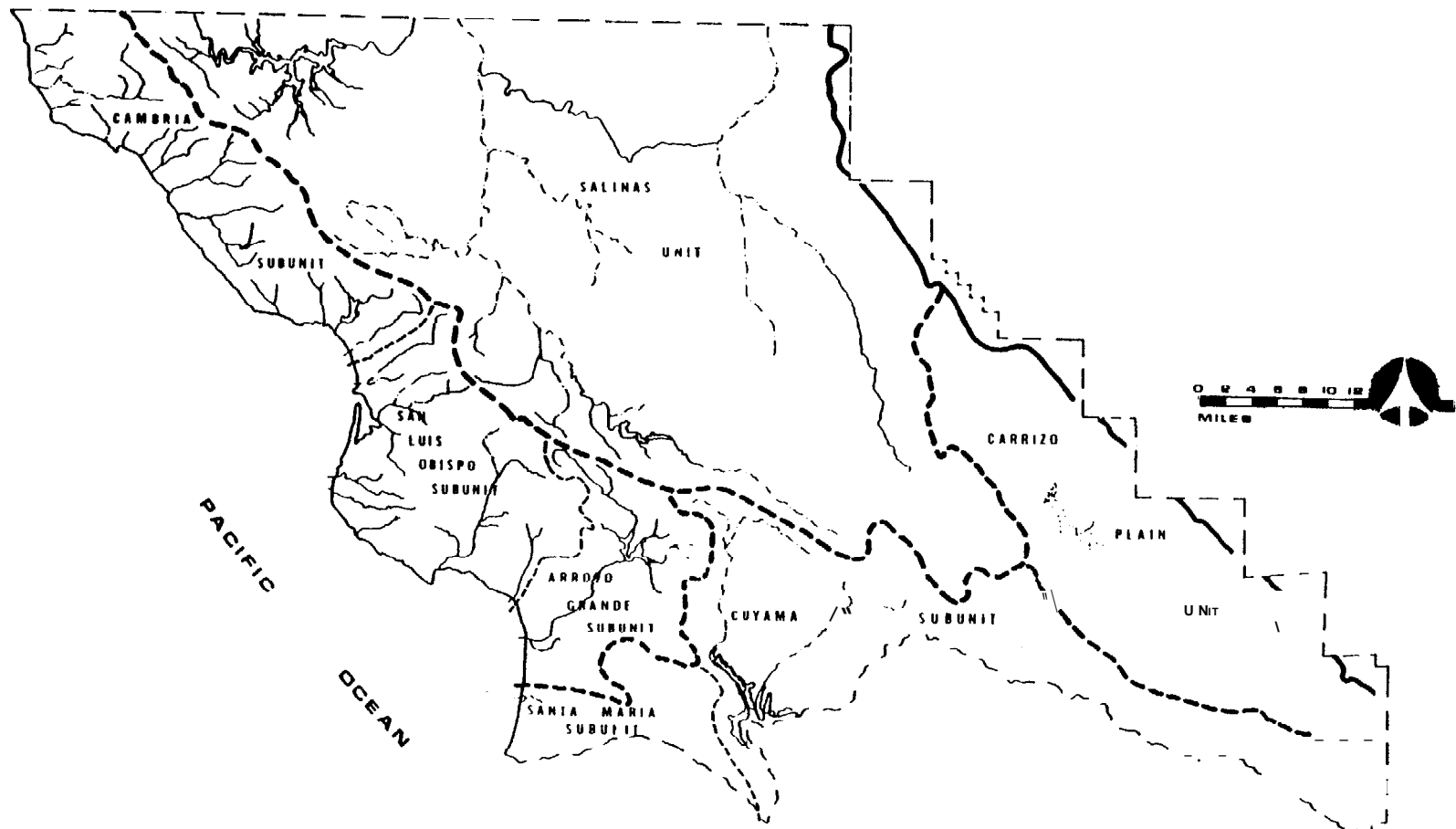
## San Luis Obispo County Rainfall Distribution

The ground water basin of the north central and northeastern portions of the County is large. However, present agricultural and urban uses appropriate the safe annual yield of the basin.

The **Carrizo** Plains in the central and eastern parts of the basin have a limited groundwater basin that contains **highly mineralific** waters. This limitation, plus the probable high cost for water from the State Water Project, does not suggest a significant expansion of irrigated agriculture or urban use in the near future.

The **Cuyama** Valley groundwater basin is quite large and capable of handling all projected land uses well into the future. Based on the current rate of expansion, agricultural use is projected to increase by some 25 to 30 percent by the year 2000.

### 3.1.2 Land Ownership

San Luis **Obispo** County is the fifteenth largest county in **California**, with a total area of 8,615 square kilometers, **approximately** (3,326 square miles), or 861,505 hectares (2.1 million acres). This includes a total interior water surface area of 26.4 square kilometers (10.2 square miles), 2,655 hectares (or about 6,560 acres). The County has approximately 96 miles of coastline. The total water surface area is less than one percent of the total county land area. Water, land area, and land ownership details are presented in Table 1. San Luis **Obispo** County represents approximately 2 percent of the total state area.

Land ownership in the County includes a number of federal, state, county, and local agencies in addition to private ownership. A generalized land ownership map is presented in Figure 9. The amount of public land ownership in the County is approximately 18 percent of the total area, as compared to the state average of approximately 49 percent. County land area by type of public ownership is summarized in Table 2.

### 3.1.3 Total Oil, Gas and Water Production

The County is within the State's **Oil** and Gas Operations District Number Three. Oil production from a total of 473 onshore wells was reported at over 1.6 million barrels in 1983. This represents less than one percent of the state's total production in 1983 of more than 374.5 million barrels (California Division of **Oil** and Gas).

In comparison, net natural gas production onshore with associated oil zone production was **reported** at more than 772,732 million cubic feet (**mcf**) in 1983. This represents **less** than one percent of the state's total production in 1983 of 400,872,085 million cubic feet. No net natural gas production from **nonassociated** gas zones was reported in 1983.

In 1983, reservoir stimulation (i.e., enhanced recovery) accounted for 62 percent of total oil production in the district. Non-

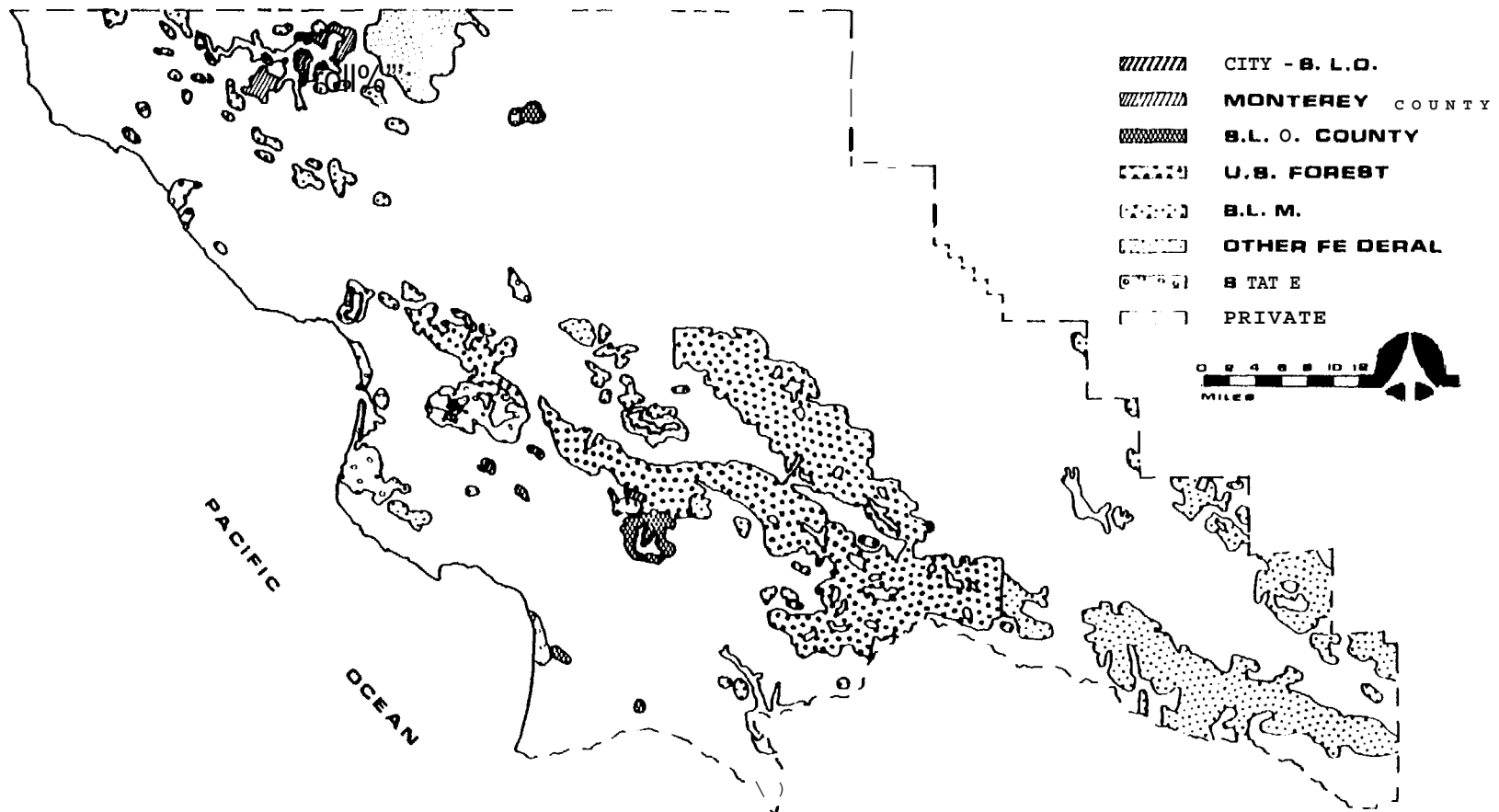

potable water produced in conjunction with producing oil and gas wells was reported at over 9.3 million barrels in 1983. This represents less than one percent of the state's total potable water production in 1983 (more than 2,576.1 million barrels).

There is currently no offshore oil or gas development or production in state or federal waters along the coast of **San Luis Obispo** County. Oil, gas and water related production activities, including the number of wells by **type**, are summarized from 1960 to 1983 in Appendix 1. Locations for these production activities may also be found in the land use maps prepared by the California Department of Water Resources (1978). Major crude oil pipelines within San Luis **Obispo** and the State are identified by producer in Figure 10. General location of natural gas pipelines within the County and the State are identified in Figure 11.

Marine Terminals. Marine terminals are required whenever water-borne shipments of crude oil or products are transported. Such terminals generally include a berthing system for vessels, loading and unloading equipment, storage tanks, terminal control and safety equipment. Six marine terminals are located in San Luis **Obispo** County with five in **Estero** Bay and one in Port San **Luis**. The current capacity or adequacy for handling future offshore oil and gas is uncertain. Presently, there are no offshore production pipelines in San Luis Obispo County. The County has permit jurisdiction over portions of marine terminal facilities on land (i.e., pipelines, storage tanks and other associated facilities). The portions of a marine terminal seaward of the mean high tide are regulated by the Coast Guard and State Lands Commission and require a permit from the Coastal Commission. Under the County's Land Use Element, marine terminals and piers are special uses in the recreation, commercial service, industrial, and public facilities classifications requiring development plan review.

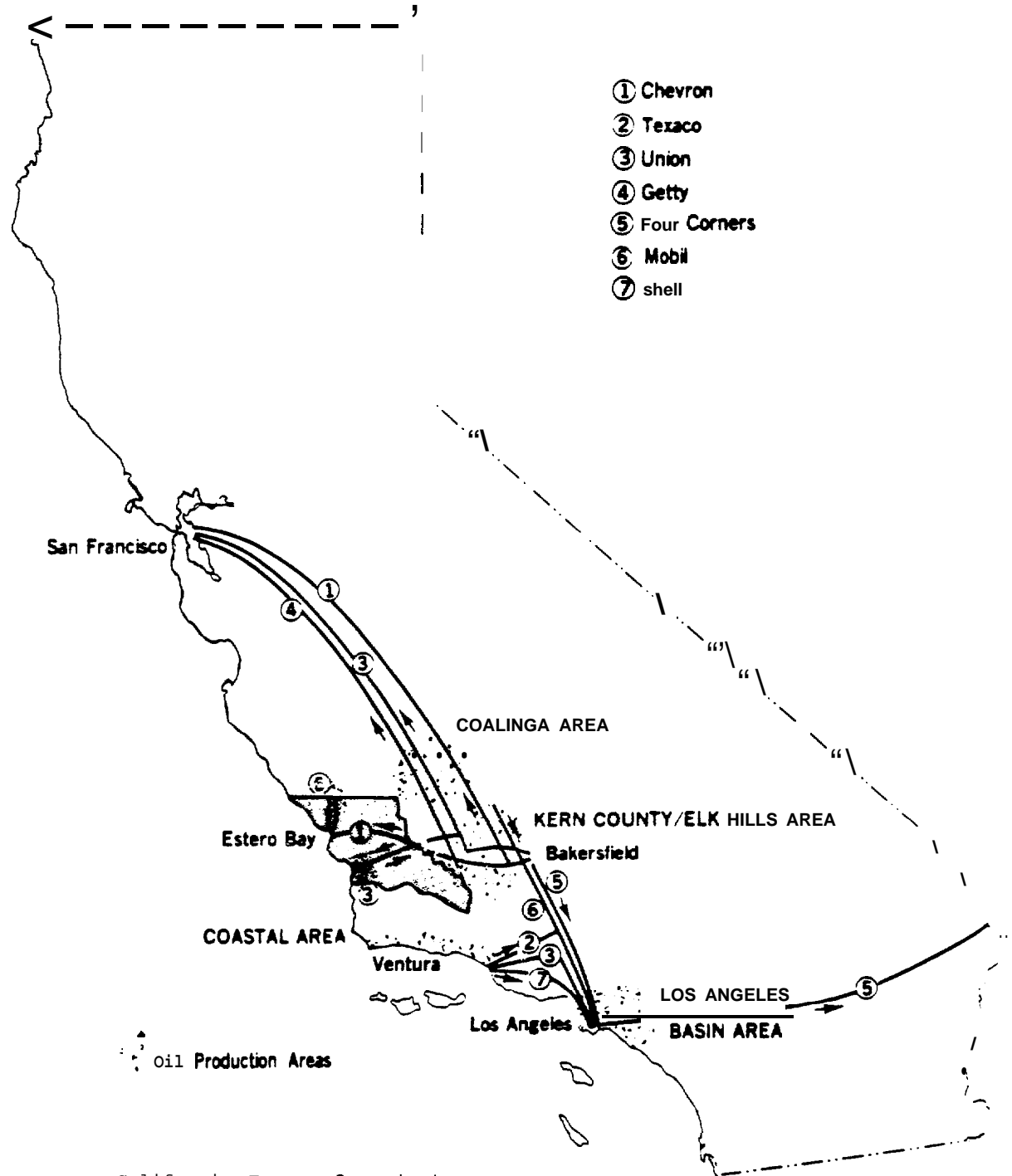
### 3.2 Demographic Profile

#### 3.2.1 Population Characteristics

San Luis Obispo County population for 1983 was estimated to be 169,800 as reported by the California Department of Finance Demographic Research section. This represents an addition of 88,756 persons over the 1960 census, an average annual increase of approximately 5.85 percent. Historically, as shown in Table 3, San Luis **Obispo** County's population growth, although fluctuating in the past, was relatively slow until 1940 when the population exceeded 33,000. The population grew to **51,417** in **1950** and by 1960 increased by 57.6 percent to a total of 81,044. The decade of the 1960-s displayed a declining growth rate, followed by a 1970 population of 105,690, an increase of 30.4 percent over 1960. The population of the County is concentrated in four regions, with relatively distinct physical and market trade areas.

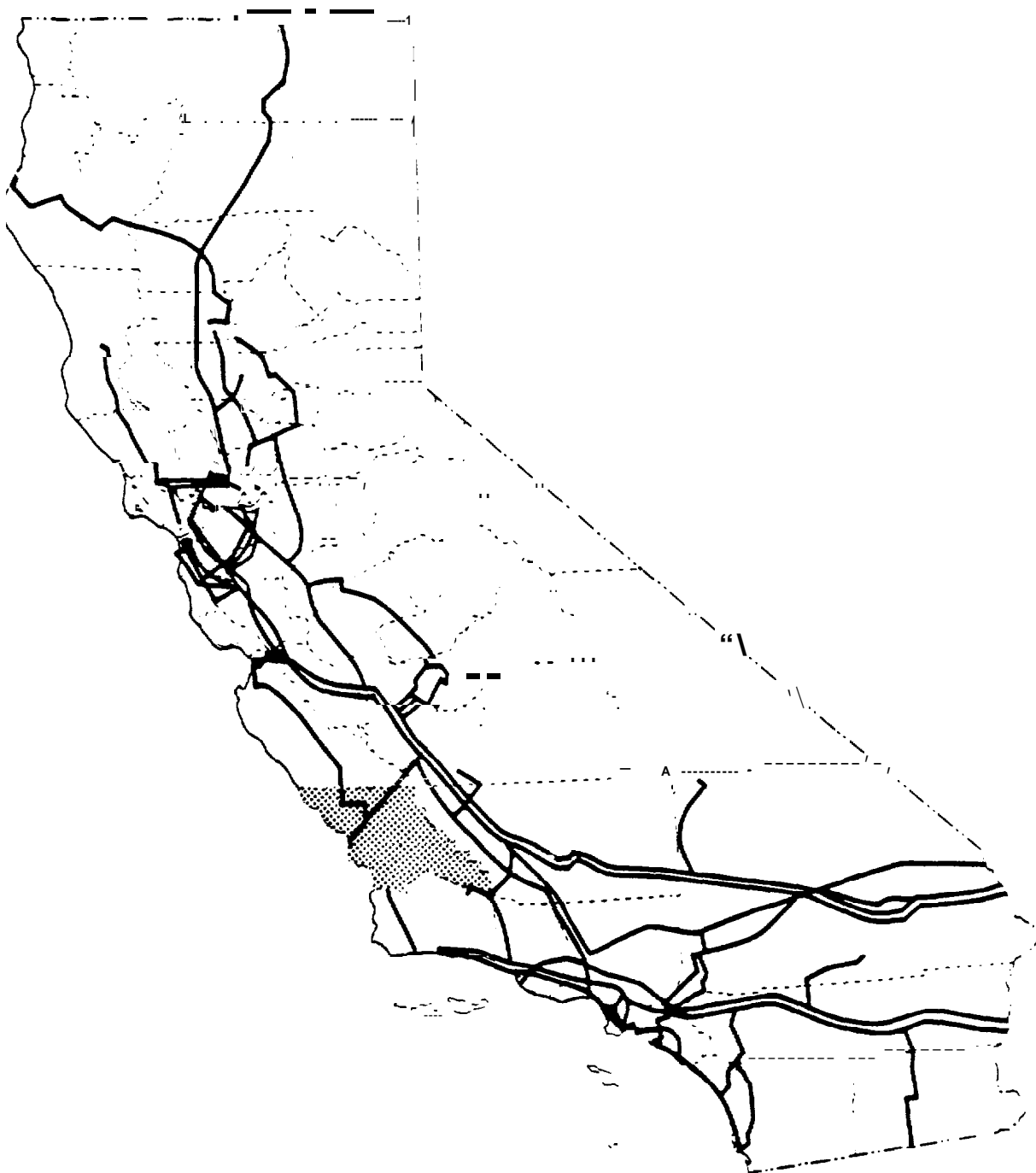
## Major Crude Oil Pipelines in San Luis Obispo County

North County. This area north of **Cuesta Grande**, generally centered on the **Salinas** River, contains the communities of San Miguel, Paso **Robles**, Templeton, Atascadero and Santa Margarita. It is considered in the Land Use Element as the **Salinas** River Planning Area.

North Coast. The region is the coastal terrace and adjacent upland areas south of the Monterey County line, including the communities of San **Simeon**, **Cambria**, **Cayucos**, Morro Bay and South Bay (the North Coast and Estero Planning Areas).

San Luis Obispo. This urban area surrounding the County seat is the major employment and trade center of the County, but also includes the resort community of **Avila** Beach.

South County. The coastal terrace, upland and near coast valleys concentrated along Highway 101, extending from Ontario **Grande** south to the Santa Barbara County line, includes the communities of Pismo Beach, Arroyo **Grande**, Grover City, Oceano, Halcyon and **Nipomo** (the San Luis Bay and South County Planning Areas).

From 1970 to 1983, the annual population growth rate of the County has been 3.71 percent. From 1960 to 1970 the annual growth rate was 2.69 percent. From 1960 to 1983 the overall annual growth rate was 5.85 percent. Table 3 also shows the most current County growth projections supplied by the California Department of Finance for the years 1985 to 2020. City incorporated population estimates as shown on Table 3 are age-cohort **forecasts** based on the County of San Luis Obispo Planning Department and historical figures from the California Department of Finance.

The County's incorporated population as shown in Table 4 for 1983 was 100,675 as compared with the unincorporated population of 69,125. This represents a total incorporated population increase of approximately 71 percent and a total unincorporated population increase of 48 percent since 1970. In 1970, the majority of the County's 58,977 population was in incorporated as compared to 46,693 in the unincorporated areas. The annual rates of change of population in incorporated and unincorporated areas from 1960 to 1983 are 7.92 percent and 3.6 percent, respectively. Table 4 shows County incorporated and unincorporated population for selected years and the percent changes between years for the period 1960 to 2000. Detailed population figures for the County of San Luis Obispo are summarized in Appendices 2 and 3 which present annual population increases from 1960 to 1984, with projections and detailed population figures for incorporated areas as available. According to U.S. Census Bureau definitions, the entire county is "rural"; Figure 12 reviews these distinctions and statistical derivations.

Population density in San Luis **Obispo** County was estimated at **51.2** persons per square mile in 1983 or a total increase of 60.5 percent over a 1970 density of 31.9 persons per square mile.

San Luis **Obispo** County migration statistics are limited. However, some census estimates of migration are available. As shown on Table 3, the census of population indicates the number of households at the same and different residences five years prior to each census year. As shown in 1980, 34,440 households (or 38 percent) were in the same county five years prior to the census while 55,640 or 62 percent were in a different county. In 1960, of 47,890 households reporting, 27,724 households or 58 percent had lived in the county and 42 percent lived outside the county five years prior to the Census.

The State Department of Finance provided some information on migration for 1980 to 1983, which includes components of change and net migration for each county in California. According to the Department of Finance, the net migration for the period 1980 to 1984 was an additional 18,700 persons. Table 5 summarizes the aggregate population information for the 1980-1984 period.

In 1983 the military population in San Luis **Obispo** County was only 47 persons. The California Department of Finance reports the military population for counties and the historical figures for 1970 to 1983 in Table 3. In **1970** there were 282 military persons in the County. From 1970 to 1983, the county's military population averaged 111 persons. Since 1970 the total number of military has declined by 83 percent.

### 3.2.2 Distribution by Sex, Age and Race

Table 3 shows the age distribution by sex for major groupings of the population. According to the State Department of Finance, in 1980 the number of persons under the age of 18 was 34,181 or 22 percent of the population, with 17,628 males and 16,553 females. The category 18 to 64 years of age accounted for 101,480 or 64 percent of the population, with 48,874 females and 52,606 males. There were 21,236 persons or 14 percent of the population over 64 years of age, with 11,750 females and 9,486 males. The median age of the population as reported in 1980 was 30.2 years with 29.3 for males and 31.3 for females. In 1970 the median county age was 28.4 years. Overall the County's median age has fluctuated between 27 and 30 as indicated in Table 3. Based on predictions and general trends, the median age of the County's population is predicted to advance to 40.7 years by the year 2020. Appendix 4 shows complete details for age/sex categories in the County including the decennial census years and California Department of Finance age/sex **annual** forecasts to 2020.

In 1980, 51 percent of the population, or 79,720, was male and 49 percent, or 77,177, was female. In 1970 the total number of persons in the County was 106,628, of which 54,073 (51 percent) were males and 52,555 (49 percent) were females, suggesting very little change in the County's sex ratios. In 1970, 30,158 persons or 28 percent of the population was under the age of 18, with 15,581 males and 14,577 females. The 18 to 64 age group accounted for 63,426 persons or 59 percent of the population,

with 32,471 males and 30,955 females. The over 64 age group accounted for 13,044 or 13 percent of the population, with 6,021 **males** and 7,023 female.

Population breakdown by race as reported by the **U.S.** Census is presented for 1960, 1970 and 1980 in Table 3. The population of San Luis **Obispo** County is predominantly white, (85.5 percent of the population in 1980). The minority population in San Luis **Obispo** County represents **14.5** percent of the total population according to the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census 1980 Census of Population data. Hispanics represent the largest minority group with 9.5 percent of the **total** population in San Luis **Obispo** County **followed** by Asian and Pacific Islanders at 2.1 percent of the total population, Blacks at 1.7 percent, Native Americans at 1.1 percent, and other remaining races at less than one percent of the total population. According to racial and ethnic summary data provided by the San Luis **Obispo** County Planning Department, Hispanic populations living in incorporated areas range from a high of 16.5 percent of the total population of Grover City to a low of 4.8 percent in Morro **Bay** as compared with 6.5 percent of the total population in San Luis **Obispo**. In contrast, Hispanic populations living in unincorporated areas range from a high of 31.8 percent of the total population in Nipomo and 31.5 percent in **Oceano** to a low of 3.3 percent in **Cambria** as compared with 3.4 percent in **Cayucos** and 4.9 percent in **Avila Beach**.

Vital events in San Luis **Obispo** County are shown in Table 3 for the various data points. In 1983, the number of live births was 2,203 and the number of deaths was **1,336**, which is a 54 percent and a 29 percent total increase, respectively, over 1970. From 1960 to 1984, the annual number of live births and deaths has averaged 1,669 and 1,064, respectively. See Appendix 3 for further data concerning vital events.

### 3.2.3 Households

Table 3 shows the available census data for 1960, **1970**, and **1980** concerning households and the projected changes as estimated by the State of California Department of Finance for the years 1985, 1990, 1995, and **2000**. In 1980, the number of households in San Luis **Obispo** County was 58,800 with a total household population of 147,200. These figures represent a 73 percent and a 39 percent increase from respective 1970 figures. The median size of year round occupied households was 2.50 in 1980, which is a decrease from 1970 figures of 2.82 and a decrease from 1960 figures of 2.95 persons per house. The decrease in household size follows the current national trend of declining household size for the last two decades. Note that household sizes are projected to increase slightly to 2.53 by 1995.

### 3.2.4 Housing

Housing data for San Luis **Obispo** County comes from the available census years of 1960, 1970 and 1980 and is presented in Appen-

dix 5. Table 6 summarizes the available census data for the various census measures and the percent change between census years. In 1980, the number of **total** housing units was reported at 66,780, which is a 77.6 percent increase over the 1970 census, or an annual increase of approximately 4.2 percent since 1960. Note that the category Rural Occupied is synonymous with the unincorporated area just as Incorporated is synonymous with the urban area of the County.

The largest decennial increase in housing units occurred in the seasonal category between the 1970 and 1980 census over the 1960 census years as shown in Table 6. Seasonal units increase was 944.1 percent between 1970 and 1980 as opposed to a net decrease of 94.8 percent between 1960 and 1970. A reason for this may be census definitions rather than actual changes. As indicated on Table 3 the number of Incorporated Occupied units increased 0.45 percent annually. The least change occurred in the Seasonal units which decreased at an annual rate of 0.25 percent.

For the years 1970 to 1984, an average of 2,090 units was built per year in San Luis **Obispo** County (Table 7). Peak activity occurred in 1977 when 3,493 units were constructed. After declining in the late 1970"s and early 1980"s, in 1983, the number of units constructed increased sharply to 2,874.

Total valuation in the County was reported to be **almost \$179** million in 1983. Average building valuation in San Luis **Obispo** County for the period 1970 to 1983 was \$119,429,000 (expressed in 1983 constant dollars). Building valuation was \$49,833,000 in 1970 and increased 275 percent by **1977**. Peak building valuation occurred in 1977 when 3,493 units were constructed and **total** building valuation amounted to \$187,098,000 (expressed to 1983 constant dollars) as shown in Table 7. Building valuations declined to a low point in 1982 of \$84,437,000 (expressed in 1983 dollars). The 1983 figure of \$178,984,000 for building valuation is a significant increase of 112 percent over 1982 figures.

### 3.2.5 Education

San Luis **Obispo** County is served by 13 active public school Districts (Table 8). In addition **Cuesta** Community College and California Polytechnic University of San Luis **Obispo** are located within the County. In the 1982-83 school year the Department of Finance reported a total enrollment of 24,373 in the public school system of San Luis **Obispo** County. This represents a 9.58 percent increase from the 1973-74 figure of 22,243, the first available comparison year.

The annual **school** enrollment in the County averaged 23,573 students from 1973 to 1984. School enrollment is estimated to increase by more than 47 percent during the next decade. Historically, 'the annual percent change for the years 1973 to 1974 to 1983 to 84 was 1.3 percent. The annual percent change from 1983-84 to 1993-94 is forecast at 3.9 percent (see Appendix 6).

In the 1982 to 1983 school year, the total number of public school graduates decreased 8.4 percent to 1,448 from 1974 (Table 9). The average number of public school graduates from 1974 to 1983 for San Luis **Obispo** County was 1,535 students. In the next ten years the number of public school graduates from 1984 to 1994 is expected to increase by more than 26 percent over current figures with more than 1,800 graduates estimated in the 1994 school year (Table 9). Average number of graduates for the period 1984 to 1994 is expected to be 1,624, a 5.8 Percent increase over the previous" decade. Table 9 also shows the number of other graduates from private schools within the County.

The median number of school years completed in San **Luis** Obispo County according to the U.S. Census was 12.8 for persons 25 years old and over in 1980. This is an increase of 4 percent over the 1970 figure of 12.3 years of school completed and an increase of 12.3 percent over the 1960 figure of 11.4 years.

Higher education in the County is provided through two local institutions, **Cuesta** Community College and California Polytechnic University at San Luis Obispo, both located near the City of San Luis **Obispo**. Enrollment at California Polytechnic University at San Luis **Obispo** was 15,624 in 1983, an increase of 26 percent over 1970 enrollment figures (Table 10). Since 1960 the annual percent change has been 5.58 percent. Average enrollment since 1960 has been 11,400 students. **Cuesta** Community College 1983 enrollment is about one third (5,532) that of California Polytechnic's, an annual increase of 39 percent since 1970. Average enrollment since 1964, the first year of record, was 3,900 or an annual increase of approximately 11.4 percent. Peak enrollment at California Polytechnic University and at **Cuesta**, respectively, occurred in 1981, with 16,392 and 6,075 students reported enrolled.

### 3.3 Economic Profile

The economic profile for San Luis **Obispo** County is divided into sections covering labor force, income, industry, commerce, tourism, fishing and agriculture.

#### 3.3.1 Labor Force. Total Employment and Unemployment

In 1980, approximately 60,000 employed and 4,600 unemployed persons resided in the County, producing an annual average unemployment rate of 7.1 percent as reflected in Table 11. Since 1978, total employment has increased in five out of six years with a very slight, 100 job decrease in 1980. The increase from 1981 to 1982 was 250 jobs or a 0.4 percent growth rate. By comparison, the 1982-83 increase of 7,800 jobs was a growth rate of 12.4 percent, which reflects the results of the economic recovery of 1983. Significant gains in employment in the construction industry, plus large gains in the two tourism industries of retail trade and services, were primary reasons for the huge increase in

jobs in 1983. **Small** increases in government, wholesale trade, and nondurable goods also served to decrease the number of unemployed.

It is projected that total civilian employment **will** increase from 74,150 in 1984 to 77,900 in 1985, for a total of 3,750 additional jobs and a total growth rate of 5.1 percent. Further increases are forecast for 1985 by the California Employment Development Department, Employment Data and Research Section with **total** employment expected to reach 77,900. This represents an increase of 3,750 more jobs, or a **5.1** percent growth rate. Unemployment is expected to drop from 4,750 in 1984 to 4,550 in 1985, with decreasing unemployment rates of 6.0 percent in 1984 to 5.5 percent in 1985.

Total actual civilian labor force, civilian employment rates, and total unemployment rates for San Luis **Obispo** County, 1980 and 1985, are summarized in Table 12. Historic labor force profile including employment participation factors is presented in **Appendices** 7 and 8.

#### The Labor Force Composition

In 1980, the employment composition of San Luis **Obispo** County included 21 percent service workers, 18 percent professional/technical, 14 percent clerical workers, 12 percent crafts and kindred workers, 10 percent managers, 7 percent operations, 7 percent sales workers, and 4 percent each for both laborers and farmers. Forecasts of Occupation Composition category percentages presented in Table 12 and Figure 13 suggest labor force composition growth patterns of similar percentages.

#### The Labor Force Participation Rates

San Luis **Obispo** County labor force participation rates are reported by the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) for 1970 and 1980 Census years. Labor force participation rates are presented in Table 13 for total civilian labor force participation by sex. The civilian labor force participation was reported at 33.7 percent in 1970, with a total male participation rate of 63.2 percent as compared with 36.7 percent for females. By 1980, the total civilian labor force participation in San Luis **Obispo** County was reported as 55.7 percent, with a total male participation rate 65.0 percent as compared with 46.5 percent for females. In sum, the civilian labor force participation rates for all categories increased significantly between 1970 and 1980.

#### Resident Location of San Luis **Obispo** County Employment

Resident location of County employment is reported **by** the Bureau of Census for the years 1960, 1970, and 1980. Comparative employment by residence location was not available from the California Employment Development Department. Residents within the County

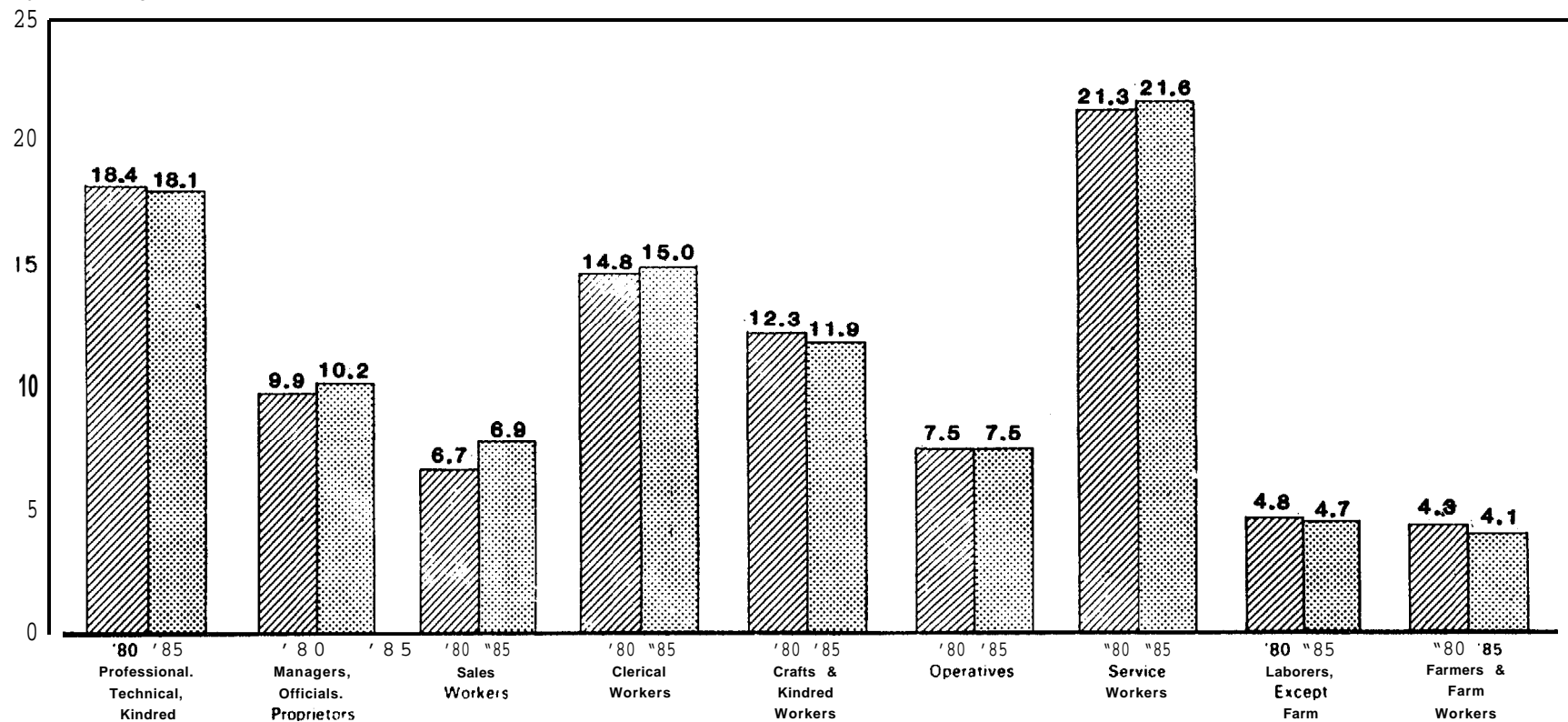

accounted for a relatively constant average of approximately 85 percent of total **County** employment during the 1960 to 1980 period (Table 14). Unemployment of residents within the County has also remained constant at an approximate average of 7 to 9 percent during the period from 1960 to 1980 (Appendix 7). No significant changes in the trends of employment of residents within the County are anticipated.

### 3.3.2 Income

Income characteristics of San Luis **Obispo** County covered here are per capita personal income, median household income, and median family income estimates. County per capita income was reported by the Bureau of Economic Analysis to be \$10,438 in 1977 as compared with \$10,448 in 1980 and \$10,150 in 1982 or an annual percent decrease of approximately 0.56 percent (Table 15).

San Luis **Obispo** County per capita income as reported in the 1980 Census was approximately \$10,448 as compared with a median household income of more than \$20,283 and a median family income of more than \$24,931. Median household income in 1980 ranged from \$16,906 to \$25,383 in the incorporated areas of the County, and from \$15,583 to \$23,528 in the unincorporated areas of the County, as presented in Table 16, expressed in constant 1983 dollars.

Based on U.S. Census data, San Luis **Obispo** County's estimated percent of families below the poverty income **level** in 1980 was approximately 8 percent compared to almost 11 percent in **1970**. The percent of individuals living below the poverty income level reported in 1980 was almost 14 percent compared to more than 15 percent in 1970. Income characteristics for San Luis **Obispo** County from 1960 to 1982 (expressed in constant 1983 dollars) covering per capita income, median household income by place and income class, median family income, total personal income, and income below poverty level are summarized in Appendices 9 and 10.

### Payroll By Industry

Total payroll income by industry in San Luis **Obispo** County from 1977 to 1982 and from 1959 to 1982 is summarized respectively in Table 17 and in Appendix 11. Comparative total annual payroll income by 4 "digit standard industrial classification code as available (expressed in constant 1983 dollars) is presented in Appendices 11 and 12. The industry specific payroll income estimates presented in the appendix support the general summary conclusions identified in Section 3.3.3 below.

### 3.3.3 Industry

Wage and **salary** employment in **San Luis Obispo** County increased by 5,150 workers from 1982 to 1983, bringing the total employment to 54,900, reflecting a **recovery** from the recessionary climate of 1982 (Table 18). The County usually has been considered "safe"

from economic slowdowns because of large government, services, and retail trade employment.

Gains were registered in all of the major industry sectors in the County between 1980 and 1984, except for agriculture and government (Table 18). Construction posted both the largest absolute gain of 3,550 jobs and also the greatest annual percent growth rate of approximately 20.8 percent. The service industry sector showed the second largest absolute gain with an increase of 1,950 jobs, and a 4.6 percent annual growth rate. Employment in wholesale and retail trade rose by 450 and 1,700 employees, respectively, with respective annual growth rates of 7.71 percent and 4.6 percent. Manufacturing has remained stable from 1980 to 1984. However, an increase of 4.5 percent or 150 jobs in 1985 is forecast by the California Department of Employment. Finance, insurance, and real estate increased by 5.1 percent, or 400 jobs between 1980 and 1984. Mining has added 50 jobs since 1980, or a 4.7 percent annual growth rate.

The only two major industry sectors that showed decline between 1980 and 1984 were agriculture and government. Agriculture employment decreased during this time by 50 workers while government lost 850 workers for a 1.7 percent decrease.

#### 3.3.3.1 Employment By Industry

In San Luis Obispo County, the government sector provides approximately 25 percent of total jobs, with a gain of 300 jobs between 1982 and 1983 (Table 18). This 2.5 percent growth rate in government employment is in sharp contrast to the 9.4 percent decrease that occurred from 1981 to 1982. A decline in government was also registered in 1978 while all other years since 1974 have shown growth. Federal employment remains steady with 600 workers for about 5 percent of government employment. State and local education account for over half of government jobs, including a large percentage at California Polytechnic State University. The balance of jobs is in various State penal and mental institutions and local city and county government. Some growth in employment is anticipated at California Men's Colony as prison population grows. Employment projections for 1984 show no overall change, but a slight 1.6 percent growth rate is anticipated in 1985 as total population grows and increased government services will be needed.

Retail Trade accounted for 22 percent or 11,000 jobs in 1980 as compared with 22.5 percent of the total employment or 12,350 jobs in 1983. Restaurants provided slightly over half of the jobs in this industry sector, approximately 50.4 percent, reflecting the importance of tourism in the County. Approximately 22.5 percent of retail employment was in miscellaneous retail stores. Employment in food stores, (9.3 percent) and gas and auto retail outlets, (9.1 percent) together provided approximately one out of five retail jobs. This trend is expected to continue during the projection period with an increase of 350 jobs in 1984 and an additional 150 jobs in 1985. It is also anticipated that tourism

will increase and create additional jobs in retail trade as the economy grows.

The 9,950 jobs **in** the service industry in 1980 account for 20 percent of the total County wage and salary employment as compared with **11,900** jobs in 1983, or **21** percent. Of these jobs, 29.4 percent are in health service and **18.9** percent in hotels and motels. Between 1982 and 1983, the number of jobs in services followed the pattern of the past few years and increased by 450 jobs, or 4.1 percent. This reflects the County's relatively stable growth in the tourism market. An increase of 450 jobs is anticipated during 1984 and 350 jobs in 1985 as tourism accelerates, and jobs in health services increase due to population growth .

Construction employment **in San Luis Obispo** County accounted for 3,150 jobs or 6.3 percent of wage and salary employment in 1980 as compared with 6,700 in 1984, or 11.8 percent. These figures reflect an additional 3,550 jobs. Much of this increase is attributed to work at the Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant project. Also, a larger number of building permits were issued during the past year. A major decline **in** employment is expected by 1985 as work at the Diablo Canyon power plant is completed.

Nearly one-half of all jobs **in** the construction industry sector are **with** special trade contractors. These include electrical work, plumbing and heating, plastering, and miscellaneous trade contracting. The balance of construction employment **is divided** at a **ratio** of two to one **in** favor of heavy construction over general **building** contractors.

In San Luis **Obispo** County manufacturing provided 3,700 jobs in 1980, or 8 percent of total wage and salary employment in San Luis **Obispo** County. All of the increase was in the nondurable goods sector of this industry where 350 workers were added to the payrolls between 1980 and 1983. Gains were posted in food processing, apparel, chemical, rubber and miscellaneous plastic products. In nondurable manufacturing, printing and publishing provide nearly one-half of the jobs while food processing provides another 22.7 percent. The durable goods group remained constant from 1982 to 1983 with a total of 1,800 workers, following a decline from 2,350 in 1980.

Employment in the nondurable goods manufacturing group is expected to grow by 100 jobs **in** 1984, and by another 50 jobs in 1985. The durable goods group is expected to show an increase of 100 jobs in 1984 and in 1985.

Transportation and public utilities account for 3,000 jobs, or 6.0 percent of the County's total wage and salary employment in 1980, as compared with 3,150 jobs, or 5.6 percent in 1984. Communications services and utilities comprise <sup>over</sup> 70 percent of the jobs in this industry sector. An increase of 50 workers is expected during each of the projected years, moving total employment to 3,150 in 1984 and 3,200 in 1985. This increase will be the result of the additional work at the Diablo Canyon nuclear



power plant. Little growth **is** expected in the transportation industry in the near future.

The finance, insurance, and **real** estate industry accounted for an average of 1,800 jobs or 3.7 percent **of** employment in the County in 1980 as compared with 2,200 jobs, or 3.9 percent in 1984. This represents an increase of 250 jobs from 1982 and continues the pattern of growth over the past years. Bank jobs provide about 36.8 percent of this sectors" employments real estate provides about 26.8 **percent**, and the balance is in insurance and other credit agencies.

An increase of 50 jobs is expected in 1985. Even though the use of computers and automatic teller machines has increased, banks and banking employment are expected to expand. Increased activity forecast in the real estate sector would also add some jobs during the projection period.

Agriculture accounted for **1,950** jobs or 3.9 percent of the County-s **total** wage and **salary** employment in 1980 as compared with 1,900 jobs or 3.4 percent in 1984. Crop production and related tasks provide about two-thirds of agricultural jobs. Among the major crops produced are lettuce, broccoli, celery, strawberries and grapes.

Wholesale trade is a relatively **small** part of the economy and accounted for 1,300 jobs, or 2.6 percent in 1980 as compared with **1,750** jobs, or 3.2 percent in 1984. This industry gained 450 jobs in 1984 over 1980. About 60 percent of the jobs are in the distribution of nondurable goods including grocery products, wine, and miscellaneous nondurable goods, while the balance of 40 percent is in the distribution of durable goods such as machinery equipment and supplies. During the projection period, an increase of 100 jobs is expected in 1984, and an additional **50** jobs in 1985.

Mining continues as the smallest industry, accounting for 250 jobs in 1980 as compared with 300 in 1984. This employment is expected to gain 50 workers in 1985. The major activities in the mining industry are onshore oil and gas, sand, and gravel.

The percent wage and **salary** employment in 1983 in San Luis **Obispo** County is presented in Figure 14. The Industry Employment Profile of San Luis Obispo County for 1976, 1980 and 1985 is presented in Figure 15.

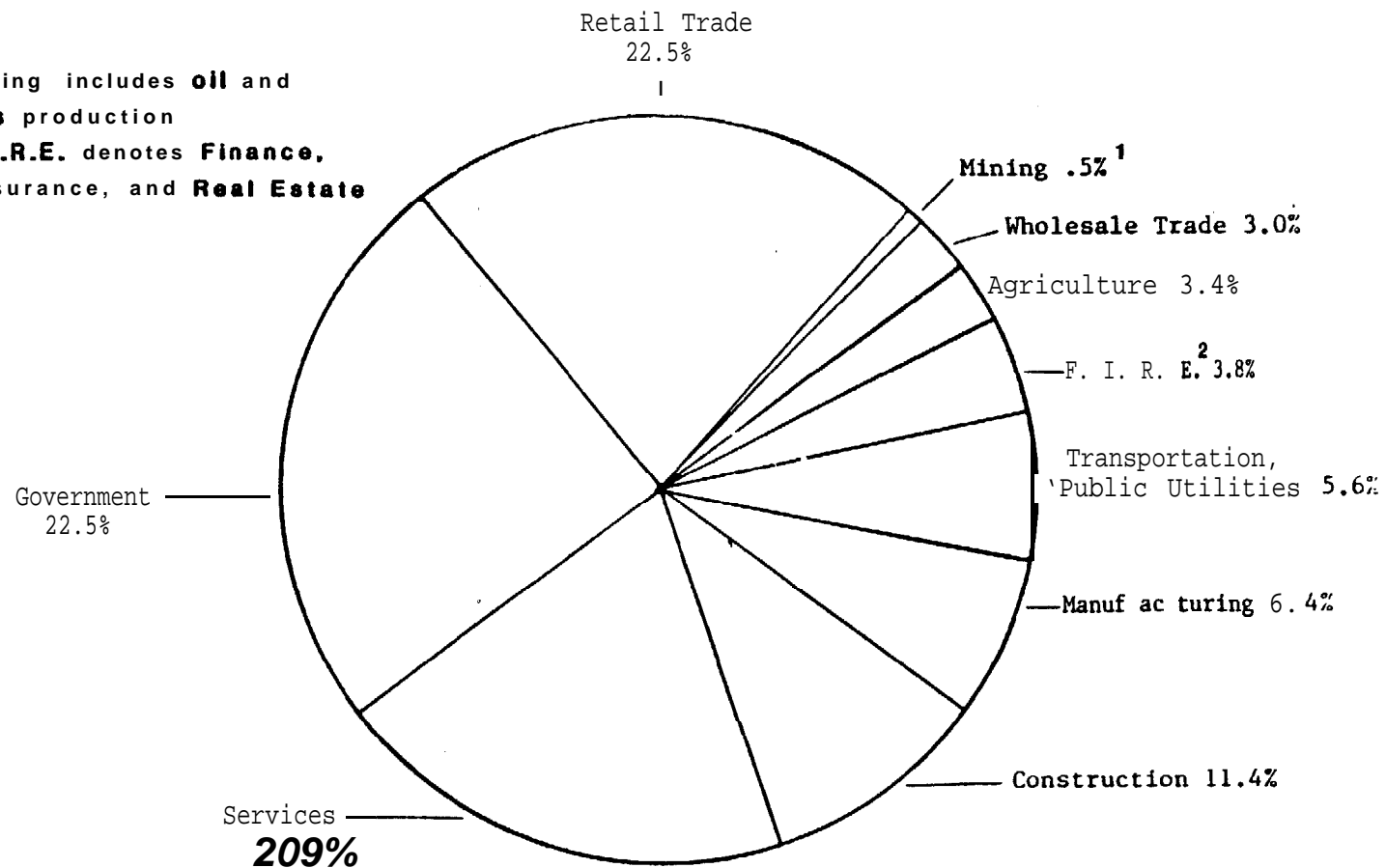
### 3.3.3.2 Industry Activity

**Basic** industrial profile characteristics of San Luis **Obispo** County include the number of establishments, as well as the number of employees and **annual payroll** by industry. Available industry data are summarized in Appendix 12 by 4 digit Standard Industry Classifications (SIC) for 1964 to 1982. SIC specific industry data supports the general summary of industry composition and growth as presented above in Section 3.3.3.1.

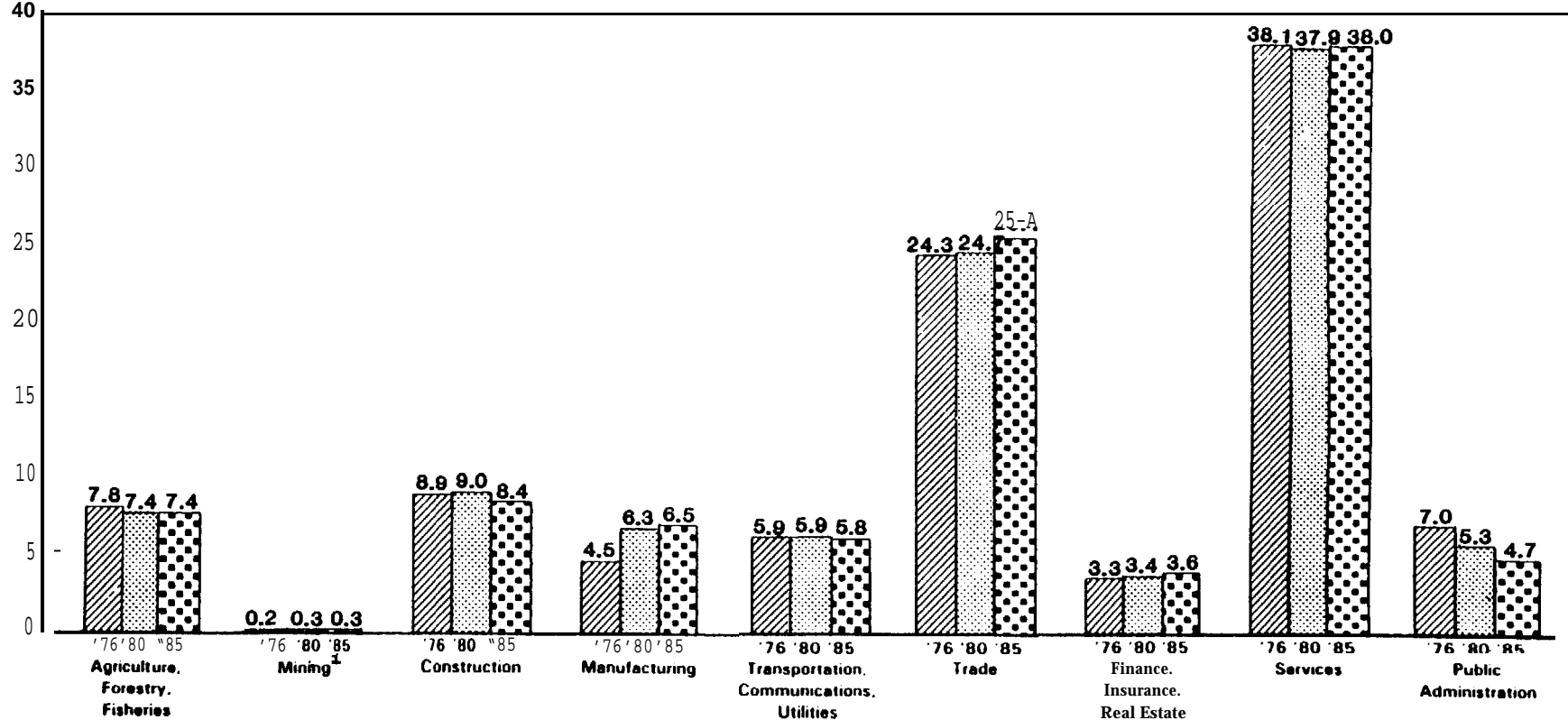

1980 Projections of Employment by industry and Occupation 1980-85 for San Luis Obispo County

Industrial profile characteristics including **estimates** of **total** value added by manufacturing, total value of product sales or shipments, and new capital expenditures are summarized in Table 19. Comprehensive SIC data for these items are of limited availability due to U.S. Department of Commerce disclosure policy for any industry that does not have at least 100 employees or 10 reporting units in the County.

The total value added by **manufacturing** for San **Luis Obispo** County as reported by the 1977 Census of Manufacturing is estimated at more than \$143.6 million as compared to \$63.4 **million** in 1972. The value of total shipments was reported for the County at more than \$385.0 million in 1977. The value of capital expenditures as reported for 1977 was more than \$9.2 million.

Due to reporting disclosure limitations, the only San Luis **Obispo** County industry specific, four digit SIC data available were that for the electric and electronic equipment industry, SIC 36. The total value added by manufacturing for SIC 36 is estimated at more than \$40.4 million, or approximately 28 percent of the total County value added by manufacturing in 1977. The total value of shipment for SIC 36 is estimated at more than \$63.2 million, or approximately 26 percent of the County total value of shipments in **1977**. The value of new capital expenditure for SIC 36 is estimated at \$1.30 million, or approximately 14 percent of the County total value of new capital expenditures. Industry specific SIC data for 1982 in San Luis **Obispo** County were unavailable at the time of this publication.

### Industry Location Quotients

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Construction Engineering Research Laboratory (**CERL**) has developed an economic impact forecast system which can estimate four digit SIC location quotient estimates. Appendix 13 summarizes 1978 location quotient estimates by four-digit SIC for industry in San Luis **Obispo** County. A location quotient greater than 1.00 indicates the region exports those commodities produced to other regions. Location quotients less than 1.00 imply the industry commodities are not produced locally in quantities sufficient to satisfy local needs and must be imported.

#### 3.3.4 Tourism

##### 3.3.4.1 Beach Attendance

Within San Luis **Obispo** County are a number of scenic parks and recreation areas provided by the State of California. Section 3.4.3 Land Use, summarizes the recreational facilities, historic places and overall statistics concerning the State Park System. Appendix **18** presents state park and beach data in some detail.

As related to tourism, the State Park system is a major attraction in San Luis **Obispo** County. Table 20 presents total park and

beach attendance for current fiscal years **1980-81** to 1983-84. In 1983, visitor attendance in San **Luis Obispo County** was reported to be 4,539,047 visitors. This is a 34 percent drop from 1970 when attendance was reported to be 6,882,247 visitors. **Peak** attendance occurring in 1976 was reported to be **8,835,670 visitors**. Annual percent change since 1970 was less than one percent. Average attendance since 1970 has been 5,167,600 visitors. Table 21 summarizes County total attendance for all years since 1967.

#### 3.3.4.2 Pleasure Boat Registration

Available data on Boat Registration comes from the Department of Motor **Vehicles'** annual data on vessel registration. Pleasure Boat registration has increased from 4,485 in 1975 to 6,239 in 1984, an increase of 39 percent, or an annual increase of 3.74 percent (Table 22).

#### 3.3.4.3 Transient Lodging

One measure of tourism in San **Luis Obispo County** is the amount of Room Occupancy Tax generated and collected by transient lodging. These data are available from the State Board of Equalization Annual Reports and are presented in Table 23 which shows the tax in both current and constant 1983 dollars. As shown, total room occupancy tax in 1983 was \$600,720, a 118 percent increase from \$275,750, collected in 1970. In 1967, the earliest data year, the amount collected was \$179,240, expressed in 1983 constant dollars. The annual change from 1967 to 1983 was 7.85 percent.

#### 3.3.5 Fishing

##### 3.3.5.1 Commercial Fish Landings

The State Department of Fish and Game publishes statistics on fish landings by dollar value and by poundage. These statistics are recorded on a port basis. Historically, San Luis **Obispo County** has had two major centers for fishing activity: **Avila** and **Morro Bay**. Records on fish landings are available from 1960 to 1983 by major ports. Records on fish landings and poundage were also compiled from 1978 to 1983 for Grover City and San Luis **Obispo** ports. In 1983, the total landings amounted to 9,345,043 pounds (Table 24). Total value was reported to be \$5,020,719.

The largest catch in terms of dollar value was \$6,783,062 in 1978. The lowest dollar value catch occurred in 1962 and was \$2,145,239 expressed in constant 1983 dollars. Total poundage on the other hand has fluctuated dramatically over the last two decades, but averages 8,793,373 pounds per year. Peak year fish landings, by poundage, occurred in 1964 when total landings **equalled** 12,502,753 pounds.

The California Department of Fish and Game **also** publishes records on fish landing by species based on **dollar** value by port. Albacore, shrimp and **rockfish** are the most commonly mentioned species. Table 25 is a list of the top five species landed **at** each port during **1983**. Before 1980, extensive records were not kept for Grover City or San Luis **Obispo** because of limited fishing activity. Appendix 14 provides a complete profile **of** County fishing activity by port from 1961 to 1983 and Appendix 15 details the leading 5 marine species of each port from 1961 to 1979.

#### 3.3.5.2 Commercial Boat Registration

Available records from the Department of Motor Vehicles list annual total vessel registration by county for several categories. As of September 1984, total commercial vessel registration in San Luis Obispo County was approximately 153 vessels (Table 26). Commercial vessel registration averages approximately **158** vessels per year, with peak registration occurring in 1979 when 179 vessels were registered in the County.

Livery vessel (rental) registration is **also** shown on Table 26. The total number of livery vessels registered in 1983 was 47, or a 60 percent decrease since 1975 when the total number was 119 vessels. Since 1975, the annual change has been a decrease of 10.96 percent.

#### 3.3.5.3 Harbor and Port Facilities

There are two main port and harbor facilities located in San Luis Obispo County: the Port of San Luis, and the Morro Bay harbor. San Luis is under consideration for future development.

Information regarding existing harbor and **port** facilities was provided from the various agencies, including the California Department of Boating and Waterways, which conducts periodic surveys of harbor and boating facilities in the state. The last survey, conducted in **1977**, is summarized in Table 27.

#### Description of Port San Luis

Port San Luis is located in the northwest section of San Luis **Obispo** Bay, about one mile west of the community of **Avila** Beach. The port is protected by an existing breakwater from the northwest off Point San Luis but is exposed to the south and southwest. Because the harbor is exposed to southerly storms which occur in winter, the district has provided no permanent berthing. Principal port features are depicted in Figure 16.

Harbor Management. The harbor is owned and operated by the Port San Luis Harbor District, which serves the entire southern half of the County and the City of San Luis **Obispo**. The District owns the pier and **all** the tidelands of San Luis Bay under the trust of

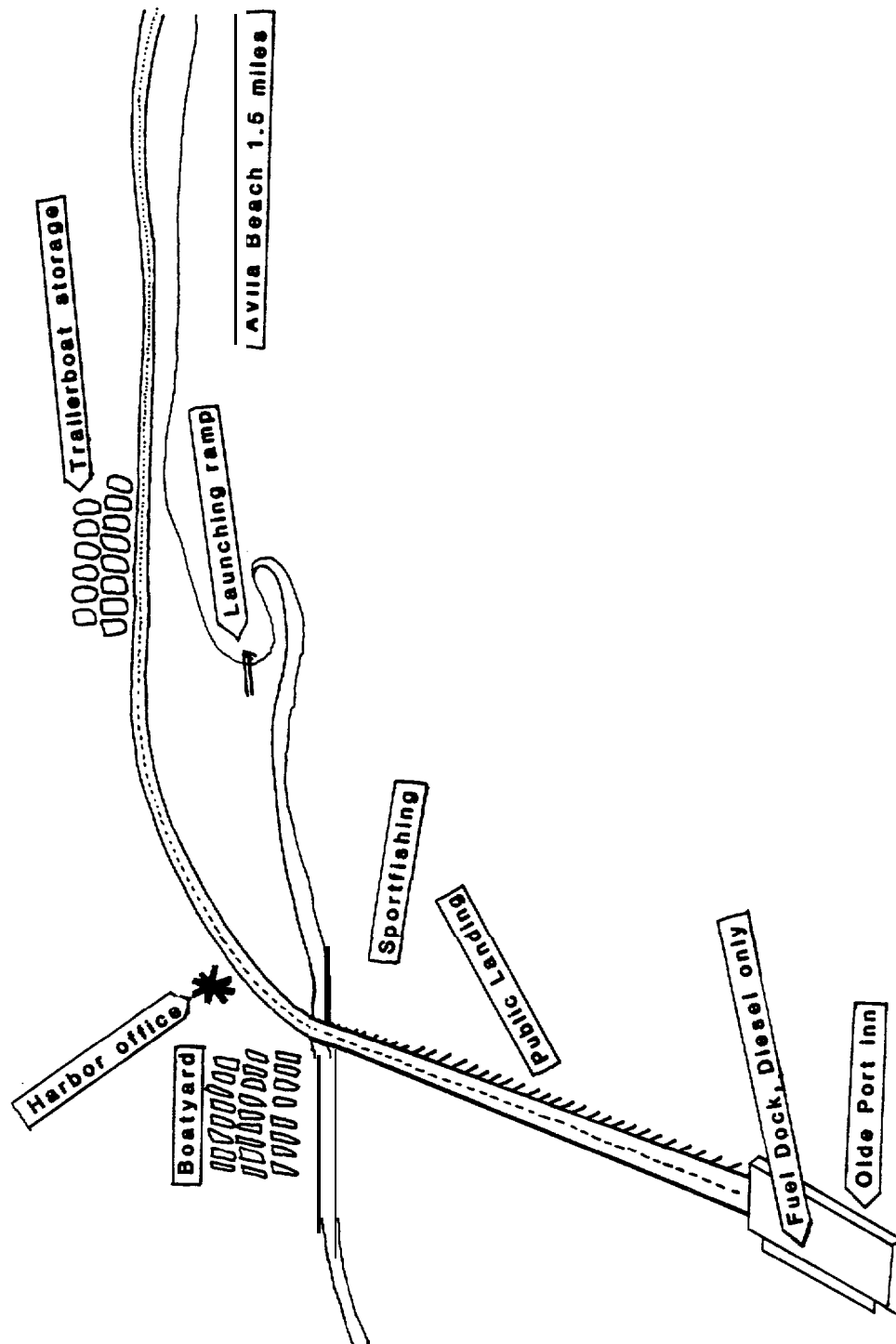

the State. This area includes one and one **half** miles of waterway **and** beach. The district is supported by both tax revenue and user fees. The port district is currently attempting to be **self-supporting** through user-fee revenues.

**Avila** Beach County Wharf, 1.4 miles North East of Point San **Luis**, is used by commercial fishing and pleasure craft; it has a dock 25 feet long at the outer end and is lighted all night. The wharf is operated by the County of San Luis **Obispo**, Department of parks and Beaches.

Port San Luis has a 2,400-foot **pebblemound** breakwater which was constructed by the Army Corp of Engineers in 1913; a wharf **1,456**-feet long with terminal facilities for unloading fish from commercial fishing boats; mooring spaces for 248 boats; a service and repair area for commercial sport-fishing, and small recreational boats; two fish buyer installations; a seafood restaurant; and, parking spaces for 150 vehicles and 100 vehicles with boat trailers. Support facilities include the harbormaster's office, public restrooms, a boat-storage area, a boat repair and maintenance area, stationary and mobile launching and landing hoists. Gasoline, diesel fuel, water, marine supplies, a trailer boat launching hoist, and a 50-ton mobile hoist are available.

Other facilities located in the bay include a 3,082-foot pier used by Union Oil for transporting petroleum products, and a 1,463-foot recreational pier at **Avila** State Beach. A Pacific Gas and Electric Company barge landing dock is about one-fourth mile from the Port San Luis pier and extends about 100 feet seaward.

Proposed Development. There is a proposed development plan to provide additional boat **haulout** and repair capacity, as well as storage during the winter storm period. Presently, the boat storage area is located within the harbor parking lot, reducing parking for day use and causing substantial congestion. During the summer months, when most boats are returned to the water, a portion of the port is available for additional parking for visitor use, including auto/trailer spaces.

Other development proposals involve Standard Oil Co. of California (SOCAL) which is studying the construction of an oil tanker superport for California, midway between San Francisco and Los Angeles, according to **J.F.** Mayer (SOCAL) at a recent hearing before the U.S. Corps of Engineers in Oakland. The single-point, offshore mooring system would be located 3 miles offshore in Estero Bay near the site of present local terminal facilities, northwest of San Luis **Obispo**. The site could serve both northern and southern California from a single location capable of handling tankers up to 200,000 dwt or more. The offshore point would be connected by a submarine pipeline to shore, and a land line would be laid to **SOCAL's** Richmond refinery in the San Francisco area.

Morro Bay. Some 25 miles farther north around Point **Buchon** is the harbor of **Morro** Bay, one of the most beautiful and best

protected harbors along the California coast. Roughly midway between Los Angeles and San Francisco, and midway between **Santa** Barbara and Monterey, **Morro** Bay is ultimately the main port of call for all yachts heading up or down the coast.

Harbor Regulations. **Morro** Bay Harbor is owned by the City of Morro Bay and is under the control of a harbormaster. Yachts and small craft may anchor in the bay, at the small-boat basin at White Point administered by Morro Bay State Park, or at the Morro Bay Yacht Club.

The City T-piers are on the north side of the harbor about 0.8 mile above the harbor entrance with depths alongside of about 22 feet. Commercial fishing vessels have priority use. Gasoline, diesel fuel, water, ice, a launching ramp, and marine supplies are available in the port. A boat works has an elevator lift that can handle craft up to 50 tons and 65 feet long; hull and engine repairs can be made. A sketch of **Morro** Bay is presented in Figure 17.

North of **Morro** Bay, approximately 3 miles, are submerged pipe lines which extend to oil loading terminals located approximately 0.8 mile offshore in Estero Bay; the outer limits are marked by buoys. A mooring master supervises the mooring of vessels.

Pismo Beach. **Pismo** Beach is a resort 6 miles east of Point San Luis with a 1,200 foot long pleasure pier facility. There are no facilities for landing at the wharf.

San Simeon. There is a harbor and pier at San Simeon which provide for sport fishing activities. The harbor is the only designated harbor of refuge between Morro Bay and Monterey. A needed improvement at this harbor is an anchorage to serve primarily as an emergency refuge for passing coastal vessels, but also to accommodate regional recreational boating.

### 3.3.6 Agriculture

Agriculture is a major contributor to the overall San Luis Obispo County economy and traditionally has been the leading form of land use in the County. The number of farms in the County in 1982 had increased by 26 percent over 1964 (Table 28). Total producing acreage, in contrast, has not increased over time. In 1982, total production was 619,334 hectares (1,530,392 acres), or less than 1 percent over the 1964 figure of 617,328 hectares (1,525,435 acres). The average size of the farms has decreased since 1964 from 444 hectares (1,097 acres), to 353 hectares (873 acres) in 1982, or a decrease of 20 percent (Table 28).

Total crop production in acreage was 586,646 hectares, or 1,449,619 acres, in 1983. This figure is misleading because it includes a new category, "range dry land" that was previously not

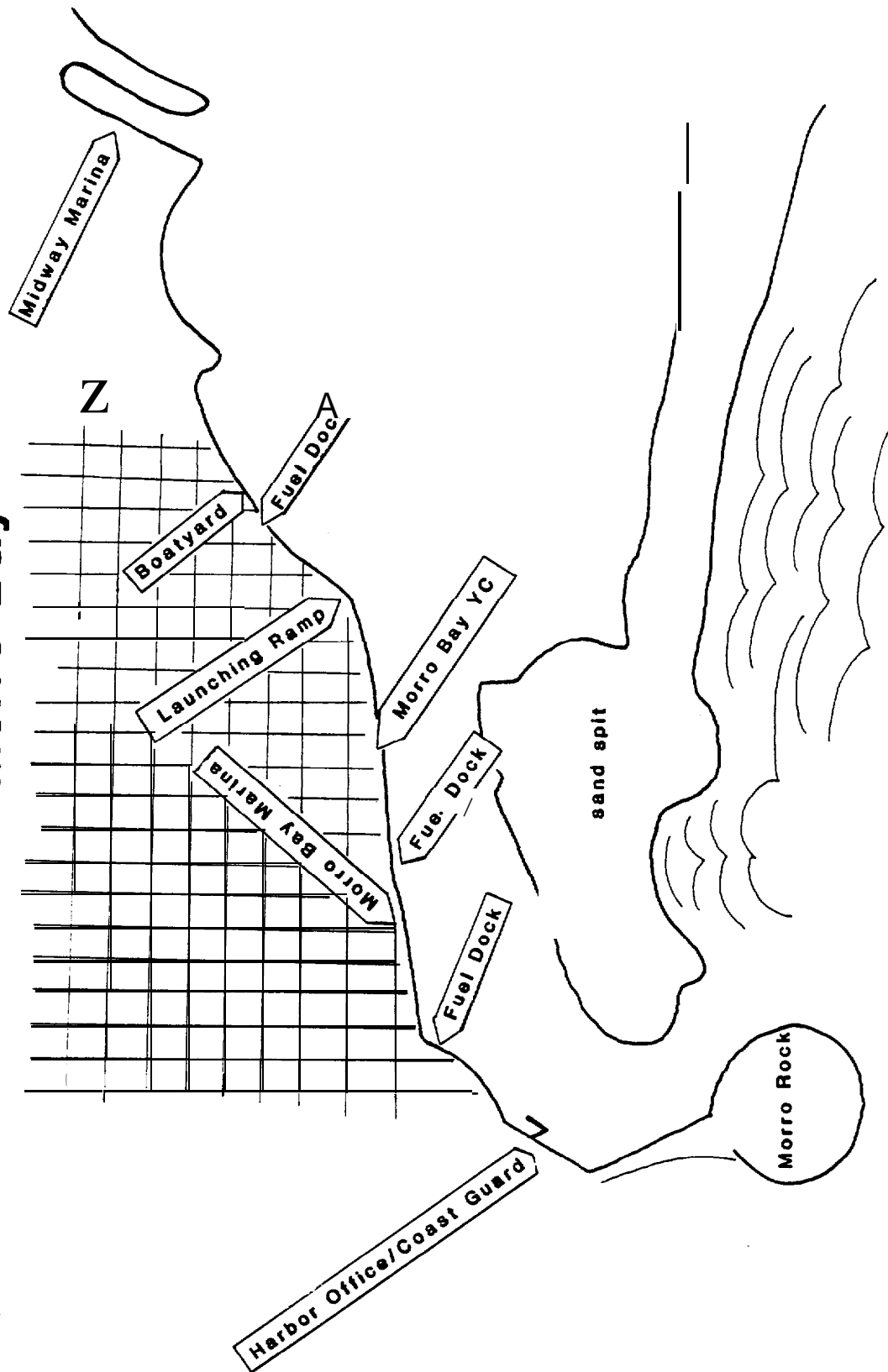

recorded as agricultural land. **Actual** Production acres in 1983 excluding range land amounted to 130,505 **hectares**, (322,482 acres) or approximately a 25 percent increase from 98,193 hectares (242,637 acres) reported in 1970. Since 1970 acreage in production has averaged 92,043 hectares, or **227,439** acres (Table 29).

Historically, agricultural production in San **Luis Obispo** County has been diverse and, like much of **California**, has not centered on any one crop. Total vegetable production in 1980 was the leading sector in terms of total **value**, reported to be \$49,461,600 as compared with \$97,139,000 in 1983 (Table 30). Animal production in 1980 accounted for \$47,520,195 as compared with \$60,348,000 in 1983. Production of field crops was \$49,461,600 in 1980 as compared to \$46,716,000 in 1983.

Total production was \$231,431,000 in 1983, an increase of 55 percent over \$148,768,077 reported in 1970, and an increase of 22 percent over the \$189,502,000 in 1980 (Table 29).

Annual production acreage data from 1980 to 1983 is included in Appendix 16. Table 30 shows complete data, acreage in production, crop valuation and types of crops for the latest year, 1983, as reported by the County of San Luis **Obispo**, Department of Agriculture.

### 3.3.7 Commerce

Currently there are 8 banks located in San Luis **Obispo** County with 37 banking offices. These banks are: Mid-State Bank, Security Pacific National Bank, First Interstate Bank of California, Heritage Oaks Bank, Bank of America, Crocker National Bank, Wells Fargo National Bank, and First Bank of San Luis **Obispo**. The larger city banks emphasize commercial and consumer credit and frequently draw on secondary money markets, especially for real estate loans. The smaller town banks do more agricultural lending. Growth in total deposits has increased at an average annual percent of less than 4.5 percent, from more than \$361 million (expressed in constant 1983 dollars) in 1966 to more than \$757 million in 1983. The growth in total bank deposits by type (including demand deposits, savings, time, and public fund demand summaries, as reported by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation for San Luis Obispo County for years available from 1966 to 1983) is presented in Table 31.

## 3.4 Land Use

### 3.4.1 County Land Use By Type

San Luis **Obispo** County includes 861,505 hectares, or 2,128,800 acres, 8,61.5 square kilometers, or 3,326 square miles, of land within its boundaries. The total area accounts for 2.1 percent of the total area in the State of California and ranks 15th in terms of **total** area among the **58** counties in California.

The most complete and available land use information for San Luis Obispo County is the County's 1980 land use element (LUE). The LUE consists of a comprehensive framework of area plans which divides the County into thirteen planning areas, as shown in Figure 18. Table 32 shows the comparisons of land use type, actual acreage and percent changes for 1959, 1968 and 1977 (more recent data is unavailable). Detailed land use data were compiled by planning area and are summarized in Appendix 17. This data profile indicates current land use **in detail** for each planning area along with estimated absorption capacity of population for each planning area. The inclusion of San Luis Obispo County absorption capacity reflects local concern about population growth.

The California Department of Water Resources (1978) also collects land use data as it relates to Water Management. Their report consists mainly of 161 information maps with land use and locations about the coastal zones. Agriculture, wild vegetation, commercial, urban, industrial, recreational and military uses are signified on U.S. Geological Survey quadrangle maps.

Table 32 shows the total area for San Luis Obispo County at 860,529 hectares, or 2,126,390 acres in 1977, the latest available information. Note that for all survey years, the largest portion of the total area of the County was comprised of open space. The second largest land use category in the County is agriculture, which has expanded in the County over the last two decades.

Table 32 shows the overall changes in percentages of area for the County. Despite the conversion of prime agricultural land to urban use, agricultural acreage has increased as a percentage of the County total. This has been accomplished through the increased conversion of open space land to agricultural **production**.

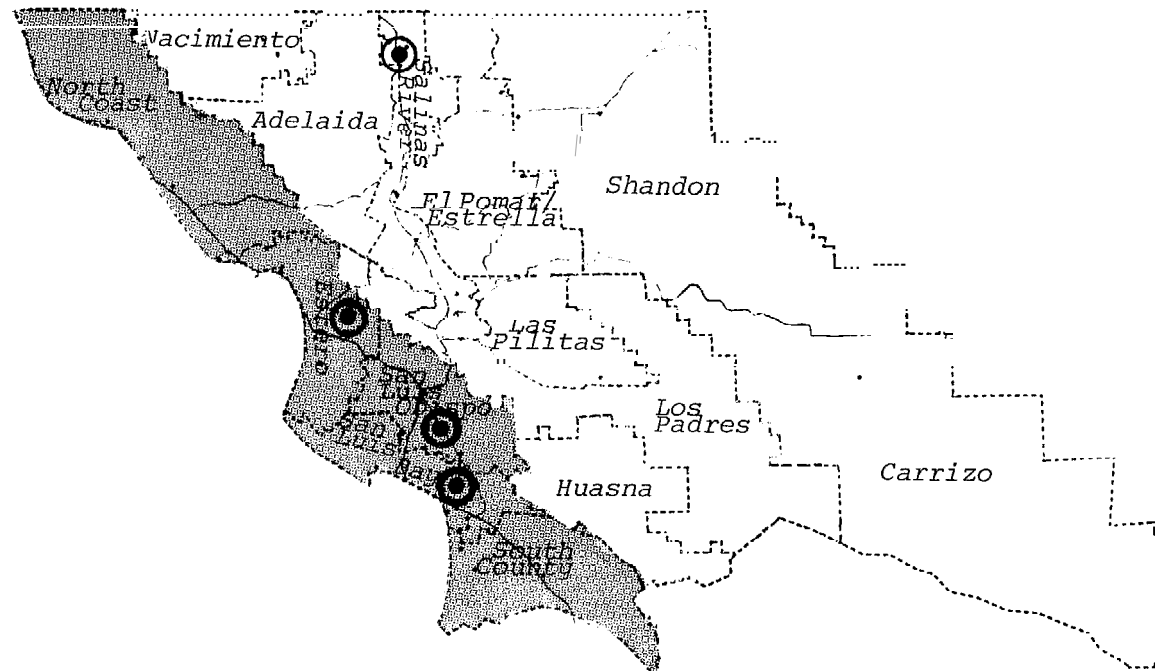
Review of land use changes during the past decade indicates definite trends in growth and development. Table 32 summarizes those changes and suggests the increasing rate of growth of urban and suburban land uses. Table 32 shows that the urban land use category more than doubled from 1959 to 1977. Increasing urban development and the increasing division of agriculturally productive land into rural homesites is a significant trend. In addition to a physical loss of arable soil, a loss of land productivity has resulted from the division of properties into parcels too small for economically viable agricultural production. The Open Space Plan refers to such areas as Fractured Rural Lands.

Unlike many other California counties, military land ownership in San Luis Obispo County is minor. **Only** a handful of military installations exist in the County. These are Camp Roberts Military Reservation, Camp San Luis Obispo and a few minor technical stations.

Of primary importance to **local** planning and statewide legislation efforts is the County's Coastal Zone land use plan (1980). The

County carries out its planning efforts through the usage of local planning areas. They are North Coast Planning Area, **Estero** Planning Area, San Luis Bay Planning Area and South County Planning Area, as indicated by the shaded portions on Figure 18. There is no offshore oil and gas related land use in any of the planning areas along the coast of San Luis **Obispo** County.

North Coast. The majority of acreage in the North Coast Planning Area is designated for Agricultural or Rural Open Space (Table 33). The majority of the area is used for cattle grazing. The open slopes and higher rainfall of the north coast make it one of the best grassland range areas of the County. The most typical uses are for oat, hay and irrigated pasture. Although the coastal lowlands contain good soils, **cropland** uses are limited by water availability and are affected by the extensive wind and fog.

A major agricultural land holding and recreation attraction is the Hearst San Simeon State Historical Monument, better known as the Hearst Ranch, in the North Coast Planning Area. This ranch encompasses over 47,753 hectares, or 118,000 acres, 31,161 hectares, or 77,000 acres, located within San Luis **Obispo** County. The ranch encompasses a wide range of topography and habitats, and thus is a primary consideration in the overall planning effort in the North Coast Planning Area. Because of its size, the development of the Hearst Ranch over the next 15 years involves all aspects of land use development. While plans are in order for small resort developments along the coast, the overall strategy is to keep over 98 percent of the Ranch in agricultural use.

Table 33 indicates that the residential, **commercial/office**, industrial and public facilities land use in the North Coast Planning Area are relatively small compared to open space and agricultural uses. The developed areas are primarily concentrated in the unincorporated community of **Cambria** located on the coast north of Morro Bay.

Estero Planning Area. The Estero Planning Area includes a variety of rural, recreational, and scenic vistas as well as the urban areas of South Bay, **Morro** Bay and **Cayucos**. The predominant land usages in the Estero Planning Area are agricultural and recreational, as indicated in Table 34. Agriculture is approximately 81 percent of the Estero Planning Area. Mixed irrigated and dry farm **croplands** occupy most of the valley lowlands, while grazing use predominates in the extensive hilly and mountainous areas. Substantial acreages of row crops, orchards, and garbanzo beans also occur in the area.

Recreation includes major state park holdings in the non-urban areas including: 1) Montana de Oro State Park; 2) **Morro** Bay State Park; 3) **Atascadero** State Beach; and 4) **Morro** Strand State Beach. These areas encompass most of the immediate coastal frontage from **Cayucos** to Point **Buchon** and the lands surrounding **Morro** Bay. Activities available within these parks are primarily passive

uses including beach walking and sunning, shoreline viewing and exploring, hiking, camping, and golfing. As shown in Table 34, the South Bay area which includes the City of Morro Bay is the primary urban settlement in the planning area.

San Luis Bay Planning Area. Land usage for the San Luis Bay Planning Area consists of a large portion of urban area including Arroyo Grande, Grover City, Pismo Beach and Oceano and Avila Beach. The majority of the land use in the planning area is agricultural, rural, and open space related as presented in Table 35. A substantial portion of lands in the Agriculture category are under Agricultural Preserve Contract and include uses which are predominantly rangeland. Truck farming is also prevalent in the planning area.

Recreation, open space, and rural areas are primarily those of steeper terrain and dense vegetation. Many of the rural areas are unsuitable for urban development. Other land use categories such as residential, commercial and industrial are located in the urban areas of Arroyo Grande, Avila Beach and Pismo Beach.

South County Planning Area. Table 36 shows the South County Planning Area consists of a 40,024 hectares, or 98,910 acres. Within this area, diverse land uses occur. They include the rural/suburban developments of older towns, extensive agricultural usage, and activities related to the many scenic and natural characteristics of the coastal ridges and the Pismo Dunes as well as major industrial land usage. As is common throughout the County, the primary land usage in the South County Planning Area is agricultural, rural open space and recreation related.

Agricultural land use occurs in varying degrees of intensity over approximately 57 percent of the planning area. The South County area includes various agricultural preserves and large dairy operations that utilize the extensive grazing acreage. Open space and recreation areas consist primarily of State Parks and Beaches along with several State Vehicular Recreation Areas.

The other important land usage in the South County Planning Area is an industrial area, which includes the Santa Maria oil refinery owned and operated by the Union Oil Company of California, and the Santa Maria chemical plant operated by the Union Chemical Division Carbon Group. Although industrial land usage is relatively small, it is located in the sensitive coastal zone area. There is currently no offshore oil and gas production in state or federal waters along the coast of San Luis Obispo County.

#### 3.4.2 Sub Area Land Use By Type/Absorption Capacity

Section 3.4.1 reported overallCountylandusebytypeand described in some detail the land use of the four planning areas within the larger coastal zone plan. These four planning areas, South County, North Coast, Estero, and San Luis Bay will not be

detailed arty further in this section except for the mention of the County's "absorption" capacity population numbers. Further details on land use for the remainder of the County is necessary for only two planning areas, San Luis **Obispo** and **Salinas** River, which together comprise the majority of the County's urban population and diverse land usage. The remaining seven rural planning areas, **Adelaida**, **El Pomar/Estrellas**, **Huasna-Lopez**, **Las Pilitas**, **Los Padres**, **Nacimiento** and **Shandon-Carrizo** are not discussed in detail. For a summary of existing land use acreage and absorption capacity in these planning areas, refer to Appendix 17.

San Luis Obispo. The San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area is the most populated planning area in the County (Table 37), containing the City of San Luis **Obispo** and the surrounding agricultural and rural lands. The county seat is located here as are the only two institutions of higher learning, California Polytechnic at San Luis **Obispo** and **Cuesta** Community College. Table 37 suggests the largest categories of land use are agricultural and rural lands.

Agriculture/Rural Lands. Agriculture usage as presented in Table 37 accounts for 19,793 hectares, or 48,910 acres, of the planning area-s total 24,644 hectares, or 60,897 acres. A variety of agricultural activities exists in the planning area. These range from intensive field crops, orchards and vineyards to low intensive grazing areas which are also scenic in nature.

Rural lands make Up the next largest land use category at approximately **2,427** hectares, or 5,998 acres. These areas are steeper terrain with dense vegetation, rocky outcrops and other land that is unavailable for farming.

Residential/Commercial /Industrial. Within the San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area are major County residential developments located in the City of San Luis **Obispo** and surrounding suburban areas. The **total** acreage for residential, commercial, industrial, and public facilities land usage is 3,351.2 hectares, or 8,282.5 acres, as reported in 1977 (Table 38).

Public Facilities. Within the San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area are located a number of public facilities and major county and state facilities. These are:

### Salinas Planning Area

The **Salinas** River Planning Area is a **long**, narrow area occupying the part of the County known as the North County **urban** corridor. This area runs along the **Salinas** River and **Highway** 101. It includes the urban areas of San Miguel, Paso **Robles**, **Templeton**, **Atascadero**, Santa Margarita and the village of Garden **Farms**. Total planning area acreage is approximately 28,164 hectares, or 69,595 acres. The largest land use type is agriculture at **approximately** 19,238 hectares, or 47,539 acres. Other categories under the urban/suburban definition account for 7,035 hectares, or 17,383 acres (Table 38).

Agriculture. Agriculture along the **Salinas** River corridor is intermingled with the increasing urban land use activity. Agriculture is very dependent upon the **Salinas** River for irrigation.

Residential/Commercial /Industrial. The other major category for the **Salinas** River Planning Area is urban land use related. Major transportation corridors like state Highway 101 and the Southern Pacific Rail Line run the length of this planning area. The City of **Atascadero** is the largest of the urban centers located **in** the **Salinas** Planning Area.

County-Absorption Capacity. Of central importance to county-wide planning efforts is the control of urban development and the associated population increase. Table 39 shows the 1980 population of each County planning unit along with the estimated absorption capacity, based on projections which estimate the County's population to be over 446,089 by the year 2000. Land absorption capacity is determined by the potential total population that would result from unconstrained growth and maximum development of all land within the County to the extent permitted within each land use category. The absorption capacity is not anticipated to be reached during the term of the plan. In reality, the absorption capacity is an unattainable population since most existing development will not be removed and replaced at maximum density, new development will not always occur to its maximum potential, and necessary services (e.g., sewer, **water**, etc.) may not be available to support the maximum density. The primary value of absorption capacity estimates is their use as indicators of the long-term effects of land use policies on the economy, particularly in terms of the plan providing opportunities for new development.

#### 3.4.3 Local Transportation And Miles Of Public Roads

San Luis **Obispo** County is a rural county which can be traversed in a number of ways. Total road mileage for the County of San Luis **Obispo** as reported in the 1982 California Statistical Abstract was 2,518 total miles in 1980, decreasing by 13 miles to 2,505 in 1982. Total road mileage by category is shown for San

Luis Obispo County for available years 1960-1982 in Table 40. The primary north-south route is U.S. Highway 101 which enters from Santa Barbara County and winds its way north through the majority of the County's population centers, passing through Grover City, Pismo Beach, City of San Luis Obispo, Atascadero and El Paso de Robles where U.S. Highway 101 enters Monterey County.

A more scenic north-south route along the coastal region of the County is State Highway 1 which enters southern San Luis Obispo County approximately 10 miles west of U.S. Highway 101. The coast highway passes through the more tourist attractive and scenic coastal elements of San Luis Obispo County, and it passes through Oceano, Grover City, Pismo Beach and the City of San Luis Obispo. At a divergence from U.S. Highway 101, it courses northwest to Morro Bay, then north to Cayucos, Cambria Pines and finally to San Simeon State Historical Monument.

One east-west route through the sparsely populated eastern portion of the County is State Highway 46, which passes through the northern section of San Luis Obispo County and is the major route to Kern County and Bakersfield located on the east. State Highways 58 and 41 also provide east-west passage to Kern County.

Other forms of transportation are also available in the County. One major rail line, owned by the Southern Pacific Transportation Company, enters the County from Santa Barbara County in the south and nearly parallels U.S. Highway 101. Air travel within the County is accommodated through the usage of the four regional airports located in Oceano, Paso Robles, and two in the City of San Luis Obispo. The largest is San Luis Obispo Airport which is the base for approximately 220 aircraft.

#### 3.4.4 Recreational/Cultural Resources

This section provides detailed information on coastal resources and a listing of County parks and recreational facilities, historic resources including National Historic Register Sites, California Land Marks, and Historical Points of Interest. Existing State Park System resources and use data in Planning District 7 are summarized in Table 41. The County is located in District 7 of the State Park System as identified in Figure 19. Specific recreational resource units within the County by land area, waterfront area, number of facilities and visitor attendance, and other resource facility data including land and water acreage, type of facility, expenditures and visitor attendance records for Fiscal Years 1971/72 through 1979/80 are summarized in Appendix 18.

San Luis Obispo County Parks are identified in Figure 20. Beaches, lakes, golf courses, campgrounds, regional and community parks are available in recreation-rich San Luis Obispo County. Boating and fishing activities are available at Lopez Lake Recreation Area and Santa Margarita Lake. Saltwater fishing is especially noted at Cayucos Beach Pier and at Shamel Park in Cambria. Three County parks offer convenient camping and hiking

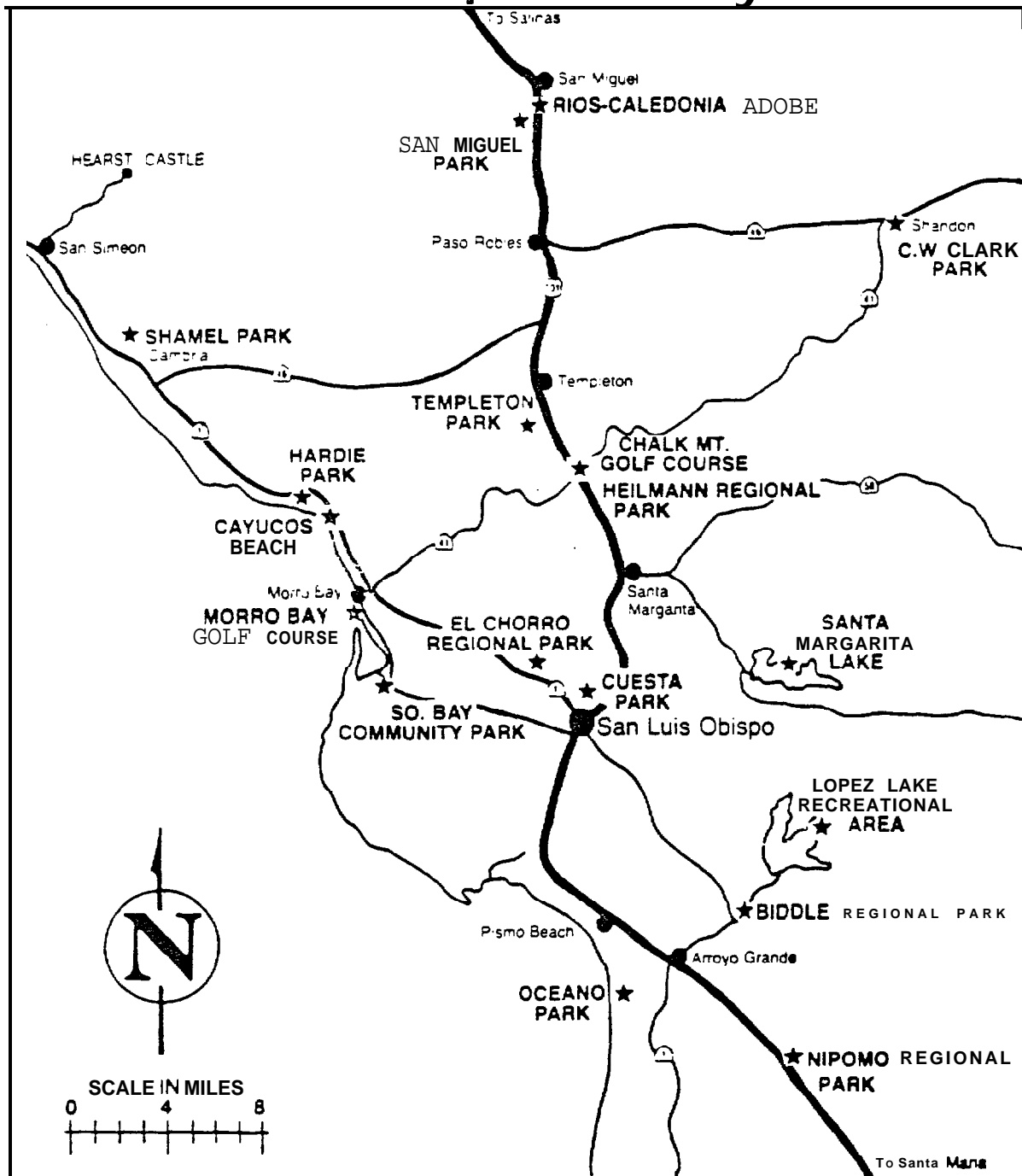

for Central Coast area visitors including **Oceano** Park, Lopez Lake Recreation Area, and El **Charro** Regional Park. Detailed County Park facilities are summarized in Figure 21.

The County's 96 mile long coast has numerous wide, sandy beaches, sheltered bays, and many vista points offering scenic views of the Pacific Ocean ranging from rugged sea cliffs south of Big Sur to the extensive sand dune fields of **Pismo** Beach. The resource data is presented by the following regions in the County:

- o San Simeon
- o **Cayucos/North Morro** Bay
- o **Avila/Shell** Beach
- o San **Simeon/Cambria**
- o South **Morro** Bay
- o **Pismo** Beach

Detailed coastal resource listing by location, facilities and general environmental characteristics also are presented for each area. In addition, detailed regional maps and brief facility summaries are also presented.

### San Simeon Region

In contrast to the **Pismo** dune and beach areas of the South are the grassy coastal terraces and steep cliffs of the North County. The North County Area includes the San **Simeon** Region and the San **Simeon/Cambria** Region. Detailed facility information is summarized in Figure 22. Regional facility location maps are presented in Figure 23. Regional facility descriptions are as follows.

- o Hearst Castle: Formerly William R. Hearst's private estate, now open to the public as a **50** hectare, or **123** acre, State Park Historical Monument located within the 95,102 hectares, or **235,000** acres, of private Hearst Ranch holding. Constructed between 1920 and 1950, Hearst's architecturally-renowned mansion and grounds still contain portions of his famous art collection and unique herds of exotic animals. The estate provides numerous scenic views of San **Simeon** Bay and the San Luis **Obispo** coast.
- o William R. Hearst Memorial State Beach: Excellent swimming area, protected from heavy surf and wind by scenic San **Simeon** point directly north. A 1,000 foot pier, fishing equipment rentals, and boat charter service are located at the west end of the main parking lot\* Picnic tables are located in the eucalyptus grove and park entrance.
- o Overlooks: Three parking lots along Highway 1 between San **Simeon** and San **Simeon** Acres overlook the ocean south of San **Simeon** Bay.
- o San **Simeon** State Beach: Extends from San **Simeon** Creek to Santa Rosa Creek, west of Highway 1 and Moonstone

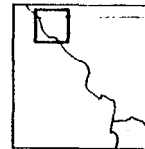

Beach Drive. A 202 hectare area, or 500 acres, campground is located east of Highway 1 off San Simeon Creek Road, which includes **139** campsites, a bicycle and hiker group site, and an overflow trailer camp area.

- o San Simeon Creek Access: A parking area located off Highway 1 provides access to San **Simeon** State Beach, adjacent to the south bank of San **Simeon** Creek.
- o Moonstone Beach Drive Vista Point: The Moonstone Beach area of San **Simeon** State Beach is named after the moonstone agates occasionally found here. Beach access is from San **Simeon** Creek to the north. Highly eroded bluffs provide hiking trails and unique vista overlooks along the edge.
- o **Leffingwell** Landing facilities: Picnic tables are east of the parking lot in a sheltered cypress grove. Hiking trails along blufftops to the north connect to the Moonstone Beach Drive Vista Point, noted as a good spot for watching sea otters seen resting on rocky tidepool areas that are part of the California Sea Otter Game Refuge.
- o Santa Rosa Creek Access: Parking area and benches are adjacent to the ocean. Santa Rosa Creek marshland is south of the parking lot. Hiking trails along **bluff-**tops to the north overlook the rocky shore and tidepool areas below.
- o **Shamel** County Park: Parking and access to the beach is provided along the southern edge of the park. The park contains a playground area, grassy playing field, and a swimming pool open May through September.
- o Cambria Pines Beach: Access to **Cambria** Pines Beach is provided via the low bluffs to the sandy beach and rocky shores.

### Morro Bay Region

Complex folding and uplifting of the earth's crust five million years ago produced the Santa Lucia Mountain Range bordering the shoreline along the north coast, and the San Luis Mountains between **Pismo** Beach and **Morro** Bay. These tectonics formed the tilted strata at the base of the San Luis Mountains, which have since been eroded by the ocean into spectacular tidepool areas accessible from Montana de Oro State Park and the Shell Beach area.

**Morro Rock** and the **six other** volcanic peaks between Morro Bay and the City of San Luis **Obispo** were formed by volcanic activity over 20 million years ago. The Rock marks the narrow and once treacherous entrance to **Morro** Bay, sighted originally by the Spanish explorer Juan **Cabrillo** in 1542. **Cabrillo** never landed here, and not until Juan Gaspar de **Portola's** expedition in 1769 did Euro-

**peans** first explore the land and meet the **Chumash** Indians, the native inhabitants of the region. **Chumash** villages and camps have been found at Los Osos Creek, and Montana de Oro and **Morro Bay State Parks**.

Today, Morro Bay is a heavily used fishing port and one of the largest bay wildlife habitats on California's coast. **At low tide**, 557 hectares, or 1,400 acres, of **mudflats** are exposed, providing a vast feeding area for over 250 species of birds. The adjacent **Morro Bay State Park** is noted as one of the best sites for bay bird-watching.

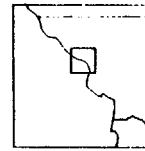
The **Morro Bay** is divided into the **Cayucos/Morro Bay** and South **Morro Bay Region**. Detailed facility information is summarized in **Figure 24**. Regional facility location maps are presented in **Figure 25**.

- o **Cayucos State Beach**: Facilities include a popular fishing pier which is lit at night and offers wheelchair access, as well as group barbecue and picnic facilities in the patio area adjacent to the Veterans Memorial Building. Parking is provided along Oceanfront Road and in a lot adjacent to the patio area.
- o **Cayucos Beach**: There are **nine** stairways along **Pacific Avenue** and **1st** and **22nd Streets** which lead to the sandy beach below.
- o **Morro Strand State Beach**: Extending from **24th Street** to the south end of **Studio Drive**, Morro Strand **State Beach** has a paved parking lot, restrooms, and **picnic** tables are at the end of **24th Street**. Beach access **stairs** and paths to the beach are along **Studio Drive** 200 feet north of **Juanita Avenue**, and at the ends of **Coronado, Mayer, Mannix, and Cody Avenues**.
- o **Atascadero State Beach**: A 1.7 mile long beach north/south between two creeks. Facilities include a campground, dressing rooms and outdoor showers.
- o **Morro Rock Ecological Preserve**: The preserve includes the northernmost of the nine volcanic peaks running from San Luis **Obispo City** to Morro Bay. The Preserve is protected by the State for the nesting of the endangered peregrine falcon. A large parking area and rest-room facilities are provided.
- o **Coleman City Park**: The park contains playground equipment, picnic tables and a protected shady beach area. Access to the dunes area and **Atascadero Beach** is directly north.
- o The City T-Pier is a small pier used primarily for fishing and commercial boat docking. The U.S. Coast Guard Cutter **Cape Hedge** also berths here.

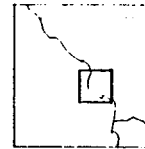

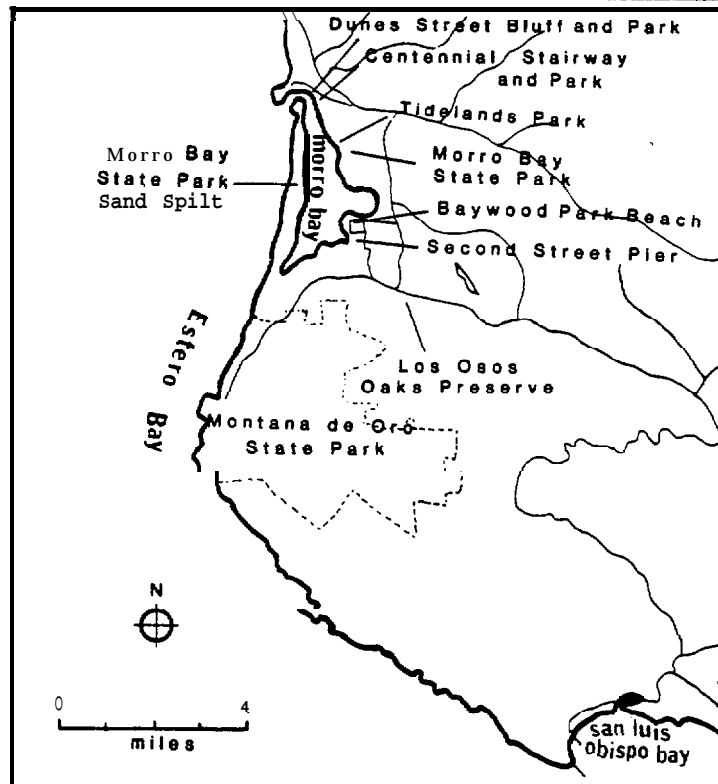
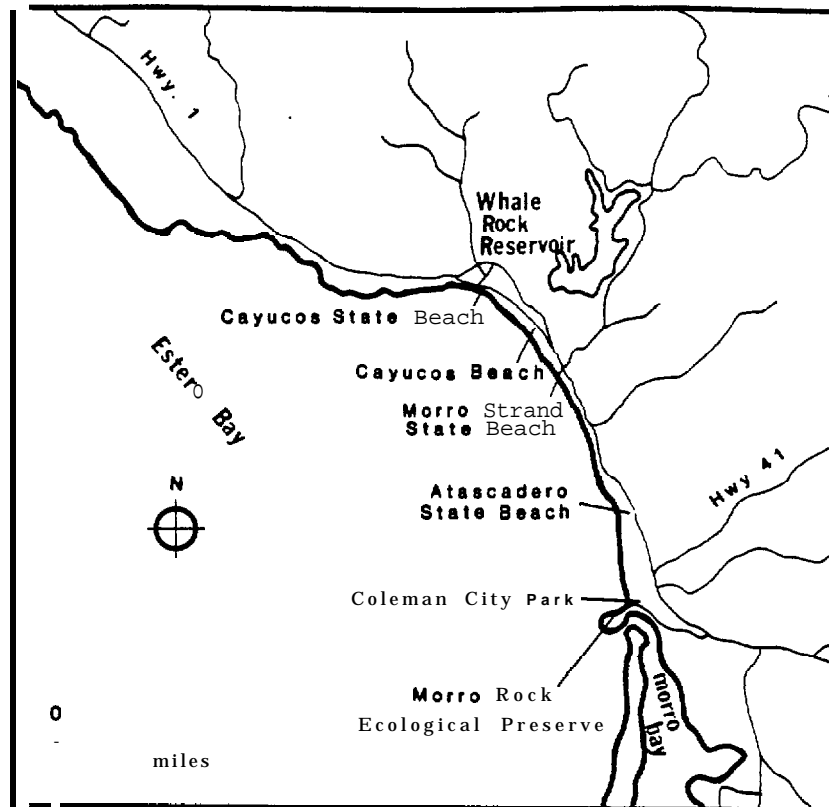

- 0 Dunes Street **Bluff** and Park: The **vista** point at the end of Dunes Street above the Embarcadero **contains** a public bench for viewing.
- 0 The Centennial Stairway leads from the west end of **Morro** Bay Boulevard down to a small park which contains benches, a shuffle board court, and a giant chessboard.
- 0 Tideland Park: A two-lane boat ramp with two docks is adjacent to a small picnic area at the south end of the parking lot. No mooring of boats is allowed at the ramps or buoys. There is a fish cleaning station near the ramps and parking spaces for boat trailers.
- 0 Morro Bay State Park: Most of the park overlooks Morro Bay and the southern **mudflats** at the mouth of Los Osos Creek. The State Park campground contains 135 units with tables and stoves; 20 sites have electric and water hookups. A 50-person group campground is at **Charro** Creek, east of South Bay Boulevard. An 18-hole public golf course is accessible from Black Mountain or Golf Course Roads. Boating facilities include a small launch ramp north of the museum, a courtesy dock, and restrooms to the south. A protected heron rookery is south of the park's west entrance; visitors may observe from the road but may not enter or disturb the herons. Great blue herons nest in the eucalyptus treetops from January to August.
- 0 Baywood Park Beach: Undeveloped private property adjoins either side of Baywood Park Beach. The beach provides access to Morro Bay **mudflats** at low tides.
- 0 Second Street Pier is a 50-foot long T-Pier, primarily used as a vista point. Benches are provided in a cypress grove to the east.
- 0 Morro Bay State Park Sand Spit is an undeveloped park, popular for bird-watching and clamming. Access is by private boat or boat shuttle service.
- 0 Los Osos Oaks Preserve: Two miles of marked trails lead through undisturbed groves of scenic old growth oak. The Preserve contains vista points overlooking the Los Osos Valley and Santa Lucia Mountains.
- 0 Montana de Oro State Park contains 2,815 hectares, or 6,956 acres, and 1.5 miles of coastline south of the Morro Bay Sand Spit. Fifty campsites with tables and stoves are provided. Hazard Canyon Trail is 1.5 miles south of the park entrance; the 1/4 mile long path leads through eucalyptus groves used by Monarch Butterflies for nesting October through March. A special equestrian camp area is located south of the park entrance.



## Pismo Beach Region

Popular for clam digging and sand dune recreation, Pismo State Beach along the south county coast contains more than 809 hectares, or 2,000 acres, of beach and windswept sand dunes. The beach and dunes are formed here because the **effects** of longshore drift are interrupted by Point San Luis to the north; longshore drift is a coastal process which, along this part of the coast, would ordinarily carry sediments south. Consequently, sands deposited here have resulted in widespread sand dune fields.

The Pismo Beach area is divided into the **Avila/Shell** Beach and Pismo Beach regions. Detailed facility information is summarized in Figure 26. Regional facility location maps are represented in Figure 27.

- o Port San **Luis**: Vehicles are allowed to drive onto the 1,320-foot **long** pier which is lit at night. Boating facilities include a 5,000-pound capacity small boat chain-hoist; a 6,000-pound capacity trailer boat hoist and a 50-ton capacity mobile **hoist**. Diesel fuel docks are at the pier end, along with gasoline and diesel dock for shallow draft boats. Located east of the pier there **is** trailer boat parking; boat storage; limited visitor moorings; and launching and storage facilities.
- o Port San Luis **Beach** is a sandy beach at the foot of the **seawall** along Harford Drive, between Port San Luis and the Union Oil Pier.
- o **Avila** State Beach: Playground equipment and volleyball standards are provided along the beach west of the public fishing pier. Fish cleaning facilities are located at the pier.
- o Spyglass City Park consists of grassy bluffs with a dirt pathway leading to the rocky shore and tidepools below.
- o **Seacliff** City Park is a grassy blufftop overlook with benches for viewing.
- o Vista **Point**: A narrow, gravel pathway leads to a public walkway ending at a blufftop viewing pavilion with benches.
- o Ocean City Park is a grassy park on the bluffs overlooking the ocean. Facilities include benches, bike storage racks, a short walkway, and picnic tables.
- o **Margo** Dodd City Park is a grassy blufftop park.
- o Elmer Ross Beach is a rocky pocket beach. This beach and a metal circular stairway are public.

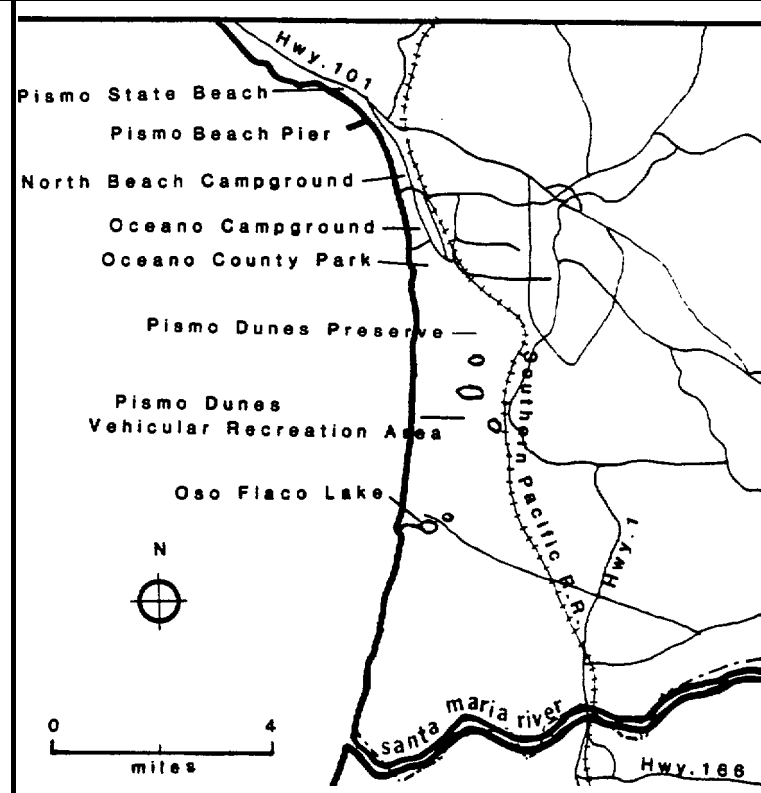
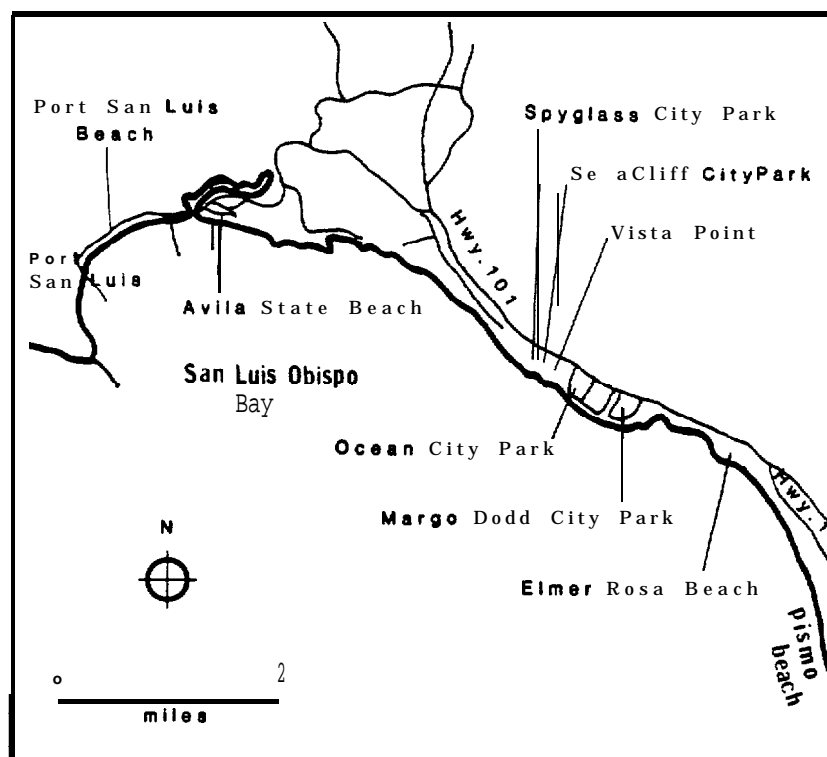

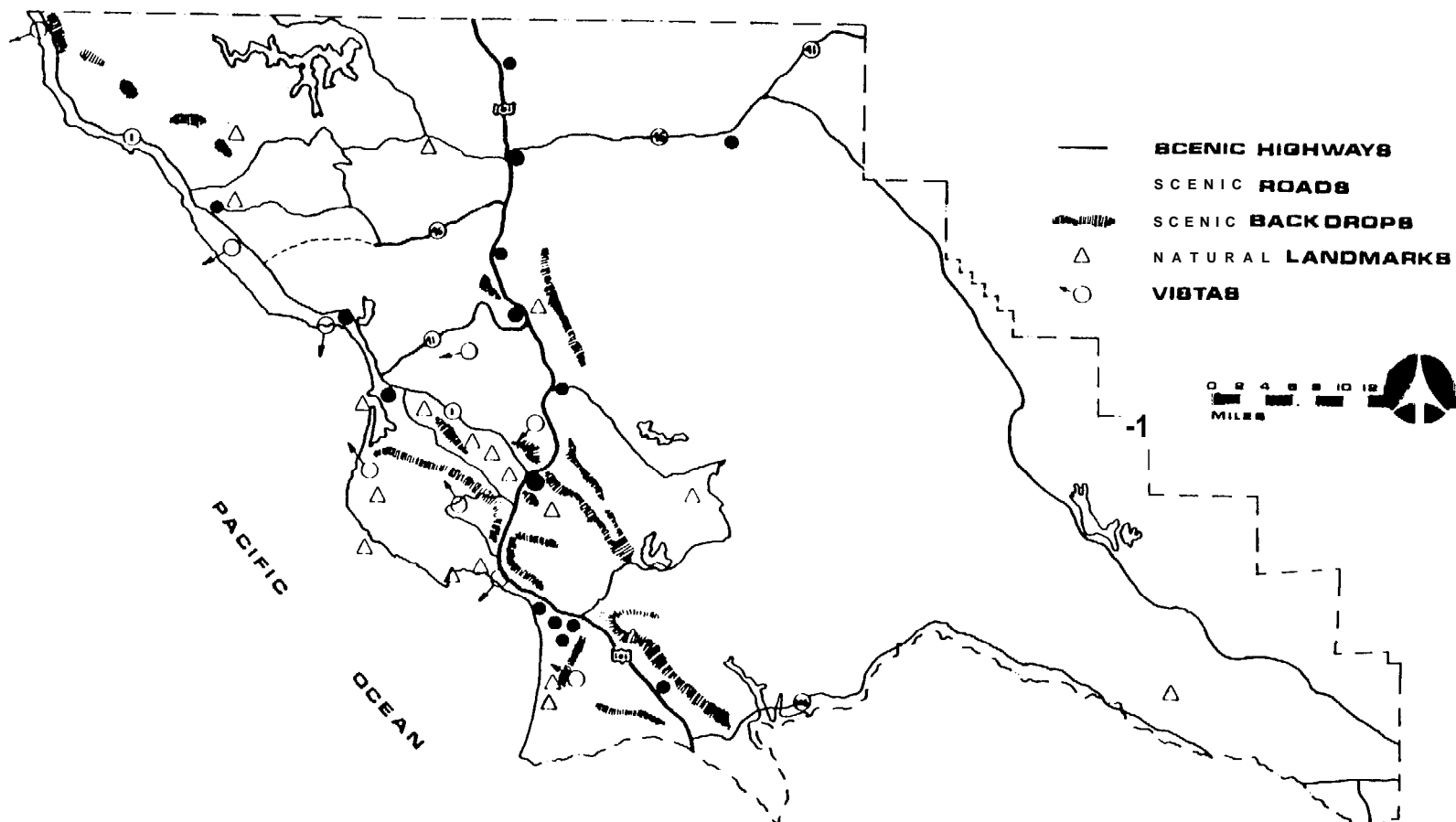
- o **Pismo** Beach Pier, located at pismo State Beach, is 950 feet long, lit at night, and accommodates wheelchair access. There are stairs which lead to a wide, sandy beach. Facilities include concession stand, bait sales, and fishing equipment rentals.
- o **Pismo State Beach North** Beach Campground is located 300 yards from the ocean, separated by sand dunes and eucalyptus groves. The facility contains 103 campsites with stoves and tables. A trail to the beach extends along Meadow Creek and passes through a Monarch Butterfly preserve. No vehicles are allowed on the beach north of Meadow Creek. **Pismo** Beach Public Golf Course is south of the campground.
- o **Pismo** State Beach **Oceano** Campground adjoins the **Oceano** Lagoon to the east and **Pismo** Beach to the west. Facilities include 83 campsites with stoves and tables; 42 have trailer hookups. A hiking trail around the lagoon begins along the eastern side of the campground. An additional 350 primitive campsites primarily for trailers are along the beach beginning 3/4 mile south of **Arroyo** Grande Creek.
- o **Oceano** Memorial County Park is an overnight camping area with 50 campsites, 14 with trailer hookups.
- o **Pismo** Dunes Preserve is an area of sand dunes from **Arroyo** Grande Creek to approximately 1.5 miles south and 1 mile inland, restricted from vehicular use.
- o **Pismo** Dunes Vehicular Recreation Area is 344 hectares, or 850 acres, of dunes and hard, shady beach open to vehicular use. Vehicle access to the dunes at non-high tides is the beach ramp at the west' end of **Oso Flaco** Lake Road.
- o **Oso Flaco** Lake located 3.6 miles west of Highway 1, is a 30-hectare, or 75-acre, lake and marshland area located within the **Pismo** Dunes. Trailer camping is permitted along the roadside near the lake.

#### Scenic Features Of The County

Figure 28 indicates some of the key scenic features of the County including scenic corridors, natural landmarks, and vistas. Scenic corridors include land visible from designated scenic highways and roads, or from the ocean. Scenic highways are designated on proposed routes of the State scenic highway system. Scenic roads are a proposed supplementary system of County roads with similar scenic values and restrictions. Natural landmarks, such as the **Morros** between San Luis Obispo and Morro Bay, include mountains or other natural features with high scenic value. Scenic backdrops include hillsides and ridges which rise above

urban areas or major highways. Scenic vistas are points, accessible to the general public, which provide a sweeping view of the countryside or coastline.

### Federal Recreational Resources

A portion of the Los Padres National Forest **lies** within the County as identified in Figure 29. There are three areas of Wilderness within the Los Padres National Forest including the Santa Lucia Wilderness in San Luis Obispo County. The Santa Lucia Wilderness consists of 8,600 hectares area, or 21,250 acres, with streamside vegetation and chaparral-covered slopes. In addition, there are six improved Forest campsites within the County. These are identified in Figure 30 and located on the map in Figure 31.

### 3.5 Public Finance

Tax revenues and expenditures are administered by the State Board of Equalization. San **Luis Obispo** County **is included in** the Second District of the Board of Equalization administration system. The Board **maintains** accounting summaries of assessed valuation by property type, general County revenues by category, taxable sales and use data, general County expenditures by category, and total federal expenditures. San **Luis Obispo** County general revenues, assessed valuation, and expenditures are discussed below. The **public** finance data **is** summarized for 1960 to 1983 **in Appendix 19**.

A detailed summary of California public finance laws, including information on California taxing authority, major state taxes, property taxation, major local non-property taxes, is available from the California Tax Foundation's California Tax Outline. The tax outline contains a brief description of the tax, who is affected, the tax rate, the tax collection entity and the tax **yield**.

#### 3.5.1 Revenues

County revenues consist primarily of the general property tax, sales and use taxes, other local tax receipts such as fines, and interest on money in reserves, as well as governmental transfers from state, federal and county agencies. Property tax-revenue is determined by the tax rate levied against a total assessed property valuation. County revenues are discussed in detail below.

##### 3.5.1.1 Assessed Valuation of Property

County property subject to local, county, and state assessments **includes** **land**, **improvements**, and personal property. Exemptions include veterans, religious, welfare, homeowners, and business

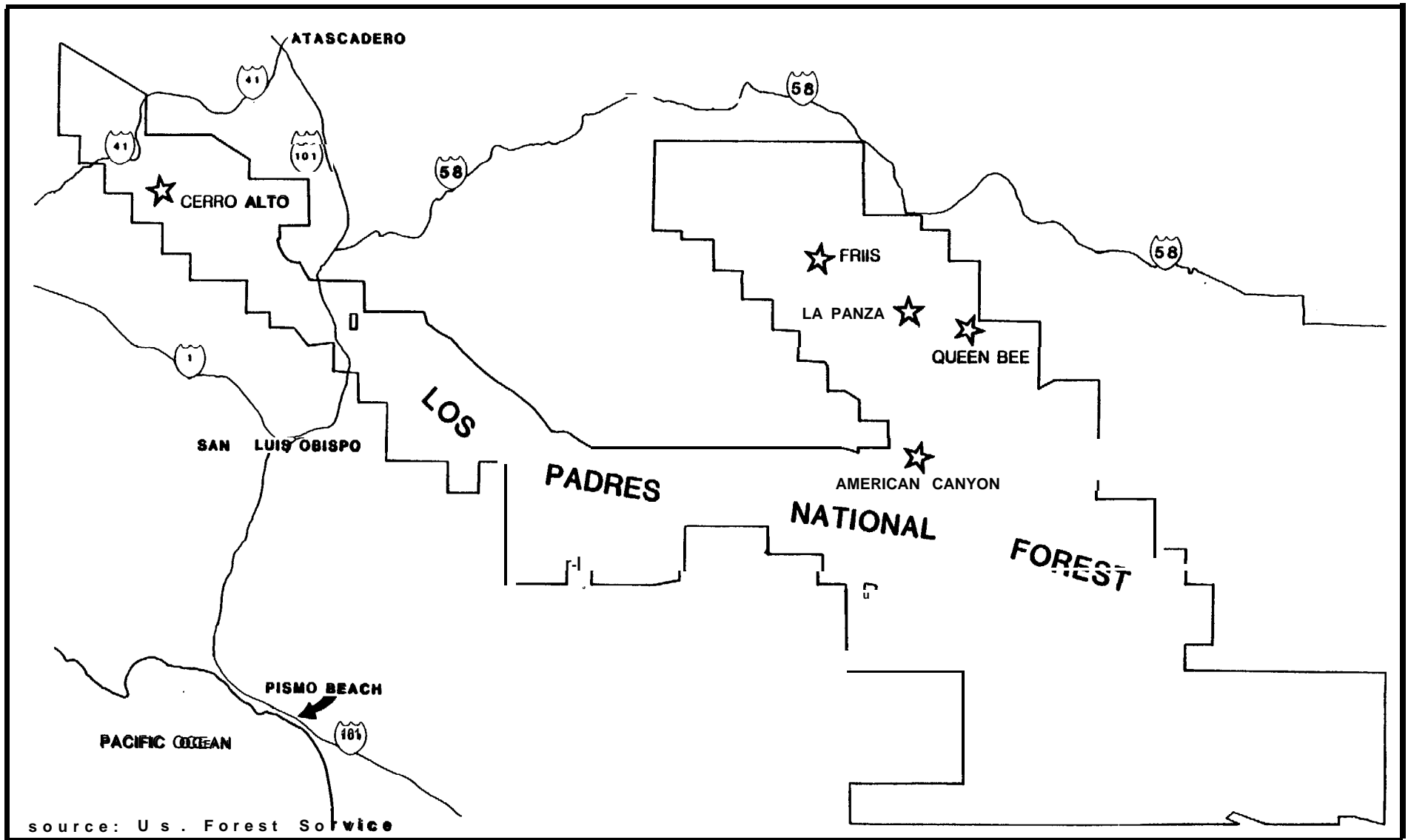

inventory provisions. The total gross assessed value of all San Luis Obispo County property subject to valuation increased from \$1,147.9 million in fiscal year 1980 to \$7,016.0 million in fiscal year 1983-84. Total exemptions increased from \$57.6 million in fiscal year 1980-81 to more than \$243.4 million, in fiscal year 1983-84. Total taxable (net) assessed value base increased from \$1,090.4 million in fiscal year 1980-81 to more than \$6,772.5 million in fiscal year 1983-84.

Historical gross and net assessed property valuation in San Luis Obispo County are summarized from 1960 to 1984 in Appendix 19 (expressed in 1983 constant dollars).

The average property tax rate for San Luis Obispo County decreased from 4.65 in fiscal year 1980-81 to 1.14 percent in fiscal year 1983-84. Of this total amount, 56 percent was allocated to schools, 31 percent to the County, 7 percent to cities within the County and 6 percent to special districts. This allocation has remained relatively constant, historically.

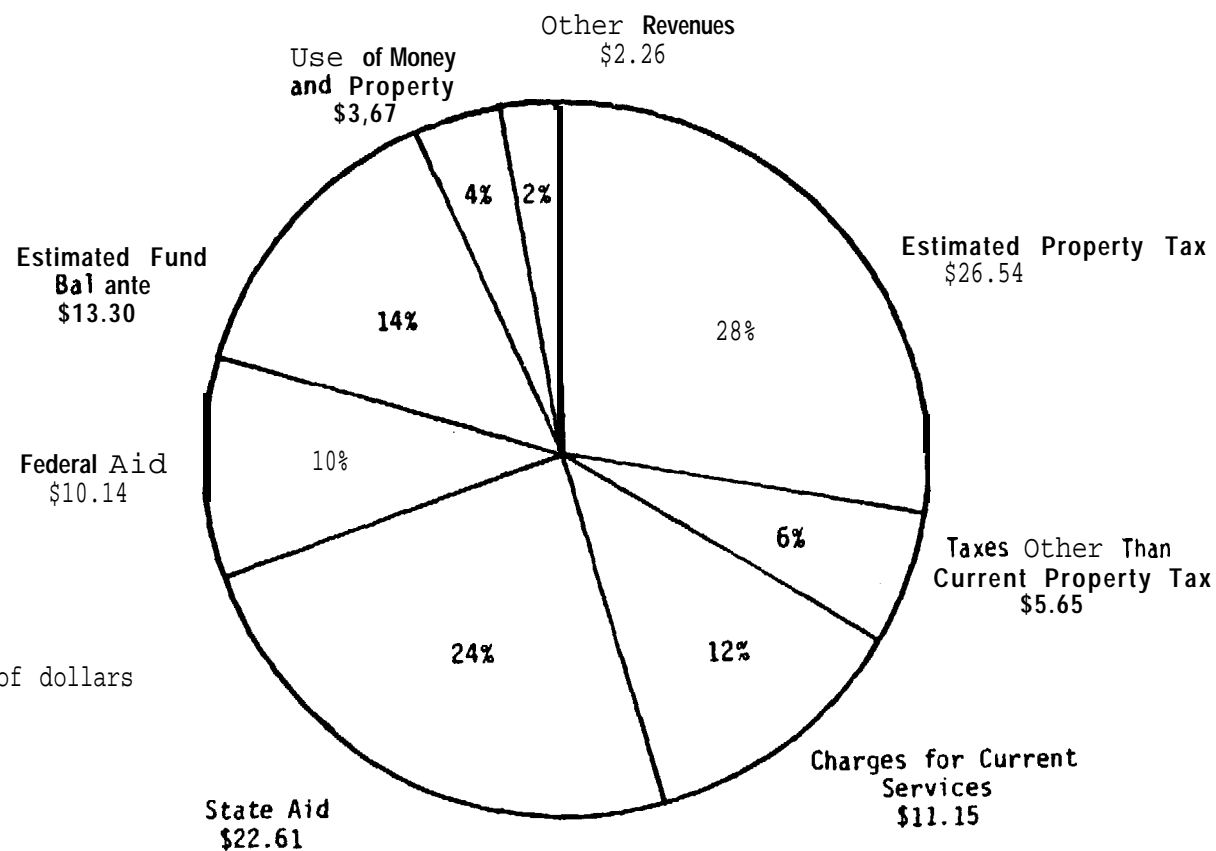
#### 3.5.1.2 Summary of General County Revenues

The San Luis Obispo County 1984-85 Final Budget is \$95,322,300 for all fund categories, a total increase of 24.7 percent from the 1983-84 Final Budget, as compared to \$58,164,146 in fiscal year 1980-81. General County revenue sources include property taxes, taxes other than current property tax, state aid, federal aid, interest and charges for current services, other revenues, and fund balance carryovers.

Property tax revenue in fiscal year 1984-85 is estimated at \$26.54 million or 28 percent of total County revenues; State Aid is estimated at \$22.61 million or 24 percent of total County revenues, with charges for current services estimated at \$11.15 million or 12 percent of total County revenues. In addition, revenue from fund balance carryover at \$13.30 million or 14 percent of total County revenue. The use of money and property at \$3.27 million or 4 percent of total revenue, other revenues of \$2.26 million or 2 percent of total County revenues, and contingencies on new reserve funds of \$18.01 million indicates that the County has a total available financing in fiscal year 1984-85 of \$95,322,300. County revenue source by amount and percent is summarized in Figure 32. San Luis Obispo County revenue summary by category from 1960 to 1983 is presented in Appendix 19.

A major County revenue source is sales and use tax receipts. Total taxable sales from all outlets was more than \$891.5 million in fiscal year 1982-83, or a 12.6 percent increase over \$703.7 million in fiscal year 1981-82. From the total taxable sales, more than \$8,912,000 in sales and use tax revenues were distributed to the county in 1982-83 (Table 42).

### 3.5.2 Summary of General County Expenditures

County budget expenditure categories include the general fund, public safety and protection, public facilities, health and sanitation, public assistance, education recreation/culture, debt service and bond interest. County expenditures are discussed in detail below.

The San Luis **Obispo** County 1984-85 Final Budget includes total fund requirements of \$77,314,818 as compared with \$58,155,371 in fiscal year 1980-81. Contingencies and reserves are \$18,007,482 or 19 percent of the total, for a total budget of \$95,322,300 in fiscal year 1984-85.

The largest budgeted County expenditure in fiscal year **1984-85 is \$20.9 million** for public protection, or 22 percent of the total budget. Public assistance expenditures are estimated at more than \$15.9 million, or 17 percent of the total budget; General Fund expenditures at approximately **\$15.8 million**, or 16 percent; Health and Sanitation expenditures at approximately **\$9.2 million**, or 10 percent of the total; Public Facilities expenditures approximately \$7.9 million, or 8 percent of the total; Education expenditures at more than \$2.1 million, or 2 percent of the total; and Recreation and Cultural expenditures at \$2.6 million or 3 percent of the total.

Since fiscal year 1983-84, the County has had no outstanding bonded indebtedness or Bond Interest expenditures. San Luis Obispo County expenditure by amount and percent is summarized in Figure 33. San Luis **Obispo** County expenditure summary by category from 1960 to 1983 is presented in Appendix 19.

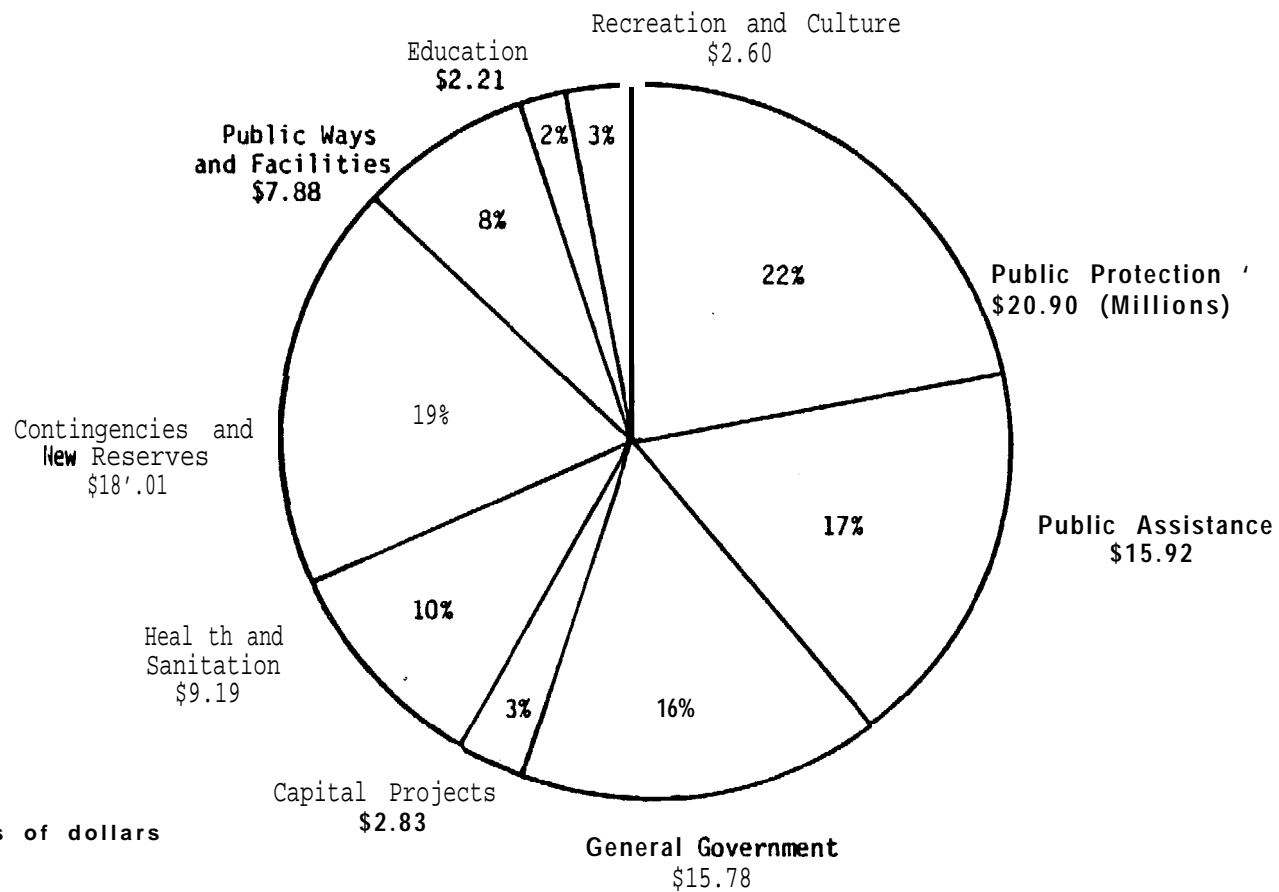
### 3.5.3 Federal Expenditures

Total federal expenditures in fiscal year ending 1980 were reported at more than \$222 million. Total federal expenditures have increased more than 10 percent annually since fiscal year ending 1974. No analysis of federal funding level changes was provided in the Consolidated Federal Funds Report. Total federal expenditure from 1974 to 1983 is summarized in Table 43.

Federal government expenditures, as reported by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census for the Office of Management and Budget's Consolidated Federal Funds Report (1983), include actual direct expenditures and obligated funds for a variety of fiscal year expenditure categories. These summary categories include Direct Expenditures (Outlays) for grants, salaries and wages, procurement, direct payments for individuals, and other direct payments, as well as Other Direct Federal Obligations including direct loans, guaranteed or insured loans. Data on loan or insurance programs generally represent the contingency liability of the federal government. Accordingly, federal expenditures listed in Table 43 do not represent total federal government expenditures. Two general categories of expenditure exclusions include conceptual or those which can not be **geograph-**

ically allocated, and agency/program omissions from the federal budget such as intragovernmental fund transfers made in the case of the U.S. Postal Service. Other specific federal expenditures intentionally excluded by the federal report include such items as interest on federal government debt, travel expenses when not provided under contract, international payments, and foreign aid.

### 3.6 Community Services

#### 3.6.1 Water Resources

Water resources in San Luis **Obispo** County are obtained by surface impoundments at Whale Rock and Lopez Reservoirs or from natural underground aquifers. Refer to section 3.1.1 for the discussion of County ground water basins. Figure 34 indicates the location of the major aquifers in San Luis **Obispo** County. Notice that the majority of the aquifers are in the coastal region. The largest aquifer, however, is inland, number 17, the Paso **Robles** aquifer as shown by the dotted area on Figure 34.

Table 44 indicates the latest available (1977) data on ground-water supply in San Luis **Obispo** County. The study areas listed in column one match the aquifers displayed on Figure 34. Column one in Figure 34 lists the estimated storage capacity for each aquifer in acre feet which, as noted, is volume for storage rather than actual water volume in supply. Column two lists the estimated annual safe yield from each aquifer in acre feet. Safe yield is the portion of a total groundwater reservoir equal to the amount of water that annually recharges the aquifer by rainfall and other surface water percolating through to the aquifer. In cases where the safe yield is being exceeded, a condition exists where the ground water is being "mined" as annual recharge cannot match annual demand.

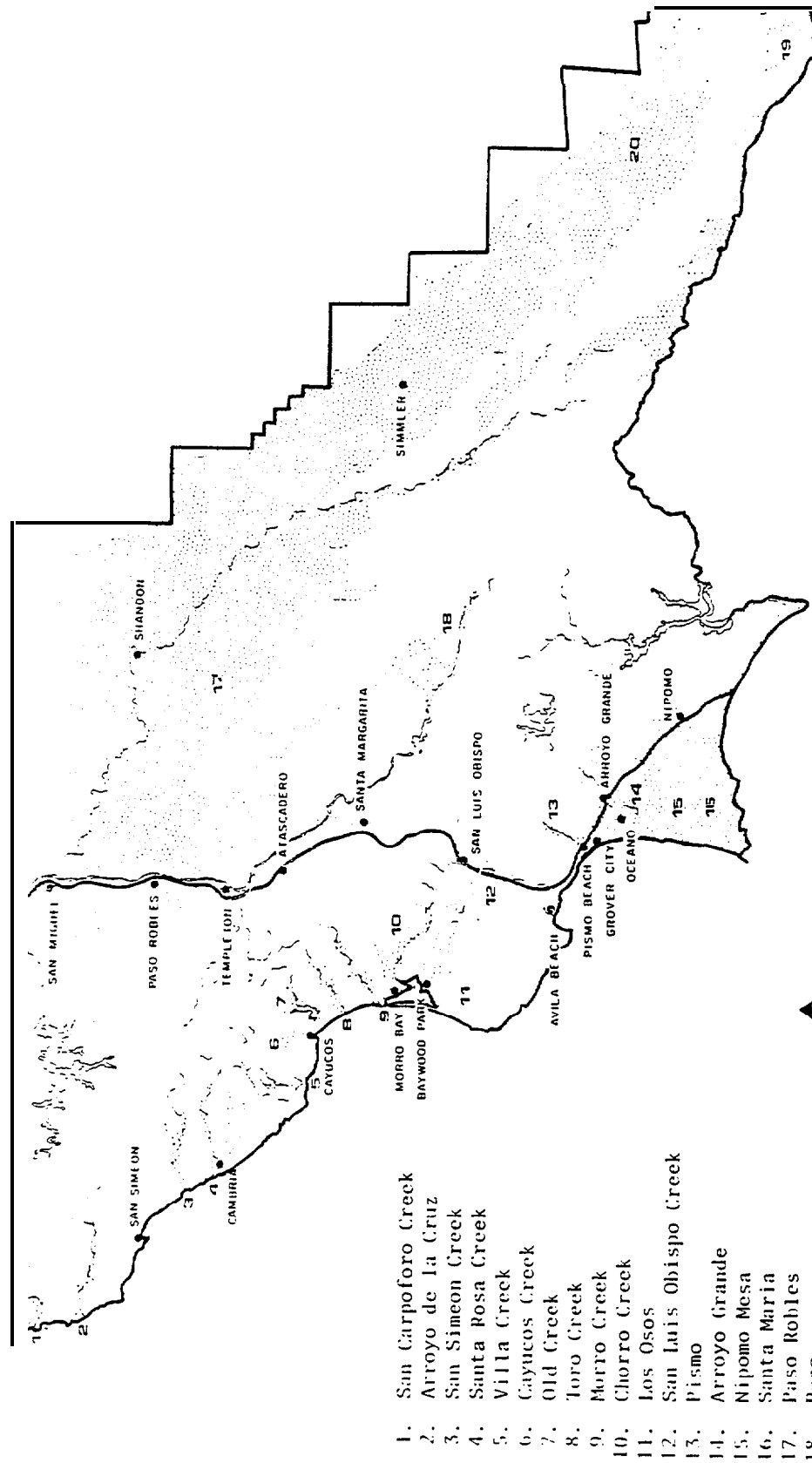
At present it is estimated that agriculture uses about 85 percent of the total Countywide water consumption. Currently, these demands are being met from wells that tap underground aquifers. Section 3.3.6 Agriculture Usage describes the growth in total acreage of irrigated farms which continues to increase. Population in-migration has continued to place additional demands on current coastal aquifers so that both the primary water consumption sectors are in competition for available water. County Planning efforts reflect a concern over the increased demand and the future of the County's water supply.

Local water consumption in San Luis **Obispo** County is shown in **Table 45** for the four major municipal water suppliers. Annual consumption is summarized for the years 1971 to 1980 in millions of gallons. Per capita water consumption is also presented. Figure 35 identifies the location of the major water suppliers in San Luis **Obispo** County. Urban water consumption has increased from 3,789 million gallons in 1971 to 4,890 million gallons in 1980 which is a 29 percent increase or an annual increase of 2.87 percent. These figures are based on Department of Water Resources statistics.

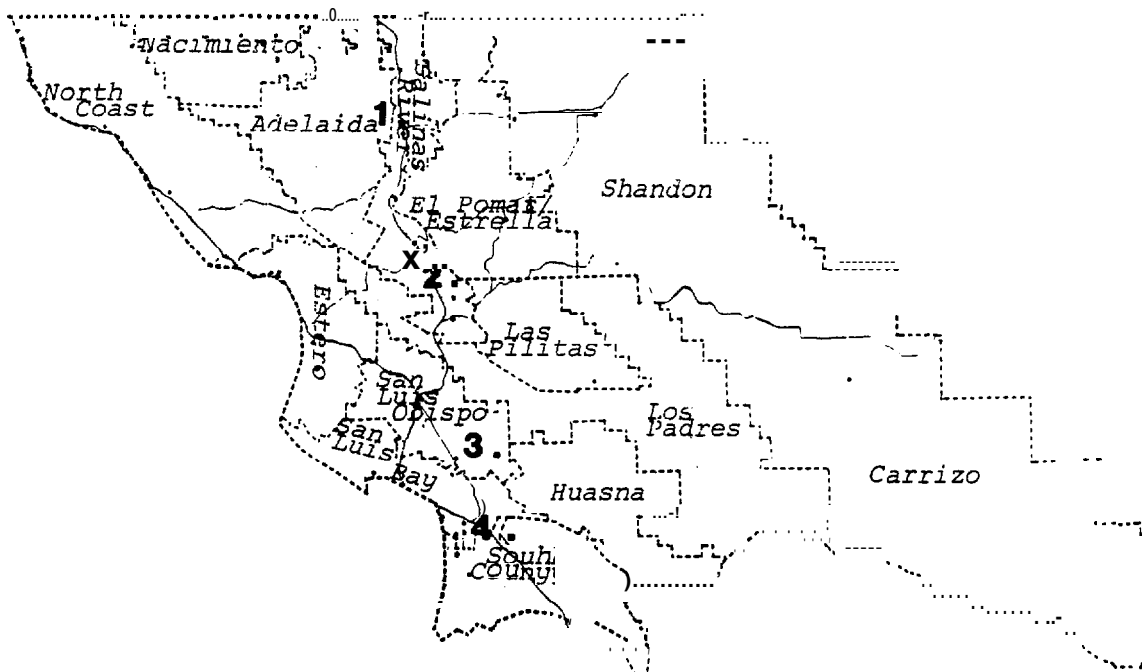

Future water consumption according to the **County** Water Resources will be met by a combination of redistributed surface reservoir water, water from the State **Water** project and underground water supplies. These sources may also be supplemented by desalinated water if the current proposals to construct the Diablo **Canyon** Desalination Plant prove beneficial and feasible.

#### Sub Area Entitlement and Consumption

Consistent with the Population and Demographics Section 3.2, the subareas that are the most populated will be discussed in detail. These planning subareas as listed in the County LUE include the following:

**Salinas River Planning Area** The **Salinas** River Planning Area is the most populated corridor in San Luis Obispo County containing the majority of the County's population. There are six urban areas in the general plan area. They are San Miguel, Paso **Robles**, Templeton, Atascadero, Santa Margarita and Garden Farms Village.

The Paso **Robles** groundwater basin supplies the **Salinas** River Planning Area as well as the El **Pomar/Estrella** and **Shandon-Carrizo** Planning Areas. The annual safe yield was estimated at about 45,000 acre-feet per year according to the Master Water and Sewerage Plan (1972). A recent groundwater study in the Paso **Robles** Basin by the California Department of Water Resources indicates that the safe basin yield may be less than was estimated in that plan.

The Department of Water Resources has found that water **levels** in some portions of the basin are dropping and in other portions the levels are rising; however, the net result is a lowering of the basin's water level. This would indicate that the basin is experiencing an overdraft.

Presently, agricultural water usage accounts for 80 to 90 percent of the water consumed while residential consumption is between 10 and 20 percent. The greater part of the residential usage probably occurs in the **Salinas** River Planning Area since it is by far the most urbanized.

It may be many years before the Paso **Robles** groundwater basin as a whole incurs negative effects from overdrafting of its safe yield. Where water withdrawals are increased, however, local drawdown effects may become noticeable in the short term.

Each of the urban areas and the village areas have water systems. Rural areas rely primarily on private wells. The urban systems have been relatively inexpensive to maintain since water is obtained near the point of consumption. Two effects on these systems' capacities may be experienced. The first is the possible competition with the agricultural use of the groundwater as irrigation increases. The second is an overtaking of local groundwater supply through concentrated downdrafting near urbanized areas. At present, the latter situation is overcome by locating well fields over a broad area of the **Salinas** River.

#### North Coast **Water** Resources

Local water resources in the North Coast Planning Area are considered by the County to be adequate for growth needs through the year 2000. The conflict between domestic and agricultural uses of water is lessened because of limitations of climate and topography for expanding irrigated uses. Groundwater basins and safe yields are indicated in Table 46.

In addition to groundwater resources, the planning area contains long range possibilities for additional water supply reservoirs on the principal creeks (Table 47). Alternatively, smaller water conservation projects could be established on these creeks or smaller creeks or tributaries for local needs.

The most likely source of future water supplies is additional extraction from San Simeon Creek or other local water sources. **Cambria** has not requested an allocation from the Nacimiento water project. **Cambria** is the principal potential user in the North Coast Planning Area.

Proposed Hearst Corporation tourist facilities will be adequately served by local groundwater sources, based upon the water demands which have been ascertained in connection with the proposed development plans of the Hearst Corporation.

#### Estero Planning Area Water Resources

The Estero Planning Area as of 1980 was predominantly dependent on local groundwater resources for local water supplies. The areas of South Bay and Morro Bay are the most populated areas in the planning area and the most dependent on such resources. The primary reservoir in the area is the Whale Rock reservoir which serves the unincorporated Cayucos area. As of 1980, Cayucos was the only area being served by the Whale Rock Reservoir.

Table 48 shows the available water resources in the Estero planning Area as of 1980, and the associated use and safe yield of each water source.

Water usage in South Bay and Morro Bay must also include rural and agricultural users drawing water from the same groundwater basins. Another major concern, particularly in the South Bay

area, is the protection of water quality from the combined gradual degradation of excessive withdrawals approaching or slightly exceeding safe yields, seawater intrusion in wells too close to Morro Bay or the ocean, septic tank wastewater recharge from extensive residential development, and leaching of agricultural related chemical hazards.

All three urban areas, South Bay, Morro Bay, and **Cayucos** are relatively close and could mutually benefit by pooling efforts to obtain imported water supplies necessary for continued growth while stabilizing **groundwater** supplies needed for irrigated agriculture and other rural uses. One problem is that citizens are divided in opinion on how much their communities should grow. Importing water and developing or expanding community sewer systems would assure steady growth, while depending on existing resources would curtail development. The objective of this section, however, is to indicate the population levels at which an imported water supply system needs to be planned and constructed. Since each community is supplied by different groundwater basins, each is discussed separately.

#### San Luis Obispo Water Resources

The San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area contains several existing and potential sources of water including groundwater, streams, waste water reclamation, and imported water from the Whale Rock and Santa Margarita Reservoirs. The basic urban demands are currently being met by groundwater from San Luis Obispo Creek. Table 49 summarizes the water resources in the Planning Area.

The basin has a total storage capacity of 67,000 acre-feet, a usable storage above sea level of 22,000 acre-feet and an estimated maximum safe yield of 2,250 acre-feet per year. Based upon approximated land uses, current groundwater demand could range from 4,000 to 5,500 acre-feet per year depending on crop patterns, annual rainfall and available surface water storage. Current water demand appears to be in excess of estimated **safe-yield**.

Strong support for maintaining agricultural use in the planning area is reflected in the plan. Yet, agricultural water demands, coupled with the increasing water needs of rural, industrial and residential land uses may increase overdrafting of the basin, and could cause periodic shortages in some areas. Groundwater cannot be considered as the sole water source for the San Luis **Obispo** urban area if agriculture is to remain viable in the planning area. Limitations of the groundwater basin will also necessitate increasingly efficient irrigation practices.

As of 1980, **the** San Luis Obispo urban area was on the verge of experiencing some water shortages, and water resource specialists predicted that based on current safe yield capacities, the San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area would only be able to support an estimated 47,000 persons.

### San Luis Bay Water Resources

The San Luis Bay Planning Area is commonly called the Five Cities Planning Area and is a heavily populated area in the County. At present, the area is supplied by the Lopez water reservoir and supplements peak demands by pumping of the **local** groundwater basins. The total allotment from Lopez Reservoir is 4,530 **acre-feet** per year for urban use. The Arroyo **Grande** groundwater basin is the supplemental supplier of groundwater.

A 1979 State Department of Water Resources (DWR) study of the Arroyo Grande basin notes that the water quality in some portions of the basin is not adequate to meet requirements for domestic consumption. The DWR estimates there are ample water stores above sea level in the basin to meet the demands until about 1990. However, in order to ensure an adequate long-range water supply, DWR recommended the development of a comprehensive plan to manage the groundwater resources and to provide for the future delivery of a supplemental water supply.

The 1979 DWR study also indicates that a potential water supply lies offshore, where approximately three million acre-feet are stored. While the study substantiates the existence of this resource, it also notes that it is a one-time resource; once mined it is gone. If the policy decision is to use the off-shore aquifer, plans must be developed to prevent or alleviate sea water intrusion that might occur as a result of drawdown of this aquifer.

### South County Water Resources

The South County Planning Area is also supplied by the Arroyo Grande groundwater basin. This basin generally lies west of Highway 101 and extends from **Pismo** Beach southward into the Santa Maria Valley. The basin is divided into three sub-units: the Arroyo Grande-Tri Cities Mesa; the Nipomo Mesa; and the **Santa** Maria Valley. The Nipomo Mesa and Santa Maria Valley sub-units underlie the South County Planning **Area**, with the **Santa** Maria Valley sub-unit lying beneath the agricultural lands in the Santa Maria Valley.

The above mentioned 1977 Department of Water Resources report noted that agriculture is the primary consumer of water in the planning area, requiring 42,300 acre-feet in 1977. Demand is projected to increase to 47,100 acre feet by the year 2000 if agricultural activity increases the demand for water. Urban water consumption is projected to increase from **3,570 acre-feet**, a 1970 figure, to 6,420 in the year 2000, an increase of 74 percent.

According to the DWR report, the **Nipomo** Mesa sub-unit is presently in an overdraft condition. The estimated annual inflow to the basin is 4,800 acre-feet, while the out-flow is 6,250 **acre-feet**. Approximately 3,300 **acre-feet** of the total outflow per year is lost to the adjacent sub-units of the groundwater basin.

Other sources of water for the South **County** Planning Area are the same offshore aquifers mentioned in the Arroyo Grande water resources section. According to the 1979 DWR report, the offshore aquifer is estimated to extend as far as 12 miles from the coastline and may hold up to 3,000,000 acre-feet of water. As onshore water levels decline the offshore water can migrate inland toward production wells. The available amount of groundwater would then include whatever water moves inland from the offshore storage.

### **3.6.2 Sewage Treatment**

Sewage disposal in San Luis **Obispo** County varies from rural septic tank methods to urbanized systems with primary and secondary sewage treatment plants. As with all counties, issues relating to sewage disposal relate both to growth issues and environmental issues. San Luis **Obispo** County's water supply is primarily based on groundwater basin pumping. Septic tank proliferation could potentially damage groundwater quality. On the other hand, septic tanks can contribute to groundwater recharge. As related to growth, the decision to expand **sewer** systems/hookups promotes urban growth. As with water usage, sewage disposal in San Luis **Obispo** County should be considered in light of both future growth potential and current environmental technology.

The majority of the population and the sewage facilities are located in the six major planning areas as discussed in the Land Use and Water Resources sections (see respective sections 3.4.2 and 3.6.2). Each planning area will be discussed in general terms with community level detail included when appropriate.

**Salinas River Sewage Disposal Capacity** There are four sewage treatment plants within the planning area. These plants are San Miguel, Paso **Robles**, Templeton and a portion of **Atascadero**. The communities of Garden Farms and Santa Margarita are served by individual septic systems. Septic systems in the rural areas are widely dispersed and should serve the residents adequately.

One treatment plant located in the rural portion of the planning area serves only the **Atascadero** State Hospital, with a capacity of 500,000 gallons per day (gpd). Present flow averages 200,000 to 250,000 gpd and is not expected to change since the hospital is near its patient capacity.

The capacities and average daily flow of the urban areas in the **Salinas** River are shown in Table 50.

**North Coast Sewage Disposal Capacity** There are two sewage treatment plants within the planning area that serve the communities of **Cambria** and San **Simeon** Acres. The North Coast Planning Area must also serve the seasonal swell of tourists. As a result, the sewage treatment plant in **Cambria** has recently been expanded, taking into account summer peak usage that is about 30 percent

greater than off-season population. The **existing San Simeon** Acres plant capacity is **estimated** to be adequate **into** the year 2000. Table 50 shows the complete data for North **Coast** sewage treatment facilities.

**Estero Sewage Disposal Capacity** Sewage treatment in the Estero Planning Area includes septic tanks in the South Bay area and rural points of the County and a sewage treatment plant serving the communities of **Cayucos** and **Morro Bay**. At present the existing facility is predicted to be adequate at least into the year 1990. The City of **Morro Bay** is presently **allotted** 60 percent of the plant's capacity and **Cayucos** is allotted 40 percent. Sewage capacity and daily flows are presented in Table 50.

**San Luis Obispo Sewage Disposal Capacity** Sewage disposal needs of the rural and agricultural portions of the San Luis **Obispo** Planning Area are served by septic tank disposal systems. San Luis **Obispo** city sewage treatment facilities serve the incorporated area. The extent of the city sewer service area has been a continuing point of discussion and disagreement between the Regional Water Quality Control Board (**RWQCB**) and the City. The **RWQCB** has suggested that the city's sewer service should be made available to the Rolling Hills area including Los Ranchos/Edna Village, because the city plant is considered a regional facility.

The Regional Water Quality Control Board required the City to discontinue effluent discharge into the surface fresh waters of San Luis **Obispo** Creek before 1980. The requirement was made on the basis of state water quality standards, which require that effluent quality be equal to that of any fresh water stream receiving effluent. Recent proposals for achieving that objective include improvement of treatment methods utilizing holding ponds, diverting a portion of the effluent to fill **Laguna** Lake after secondary treatment, and expanding reuse of treated water for agricultural irrigation.

The existing treatment plant has a capacity of 5.23 million gallons per day (**mgd**). The level of treatment has been increased to advanced secondary, and holding pond capacity will be increased. Effluent will then be used for recharge of **Laguna** Lake and irrigation of the city-owned golf course on Los Osos Valley Road. The treatment plant has a capacity for an equivalent population of approximately 50,800 plus that of the California Polytechnic University. Table 50 summarizes current data for San Luis **Obispo**.

**San Luis Bay Sewage Disposal Capacity** Sewage service in the San Luis Bay Planning Area is provided by three sewage treatment plants located in the planning area. The townsites of **Avila** Beach is served by the **Avila** Beach County Water District. Estimated plant capacity and average daily flows pose no current problems and the facility is predicted to be more than adequate into the year 2000. The City of **Pismo** Beach operates a sewage treatment

plant that experiences periodic problems with peak flows during tourist season. The City is considering expansion of these facilities from current 1.2 million gallons capacity to 2.5 million gallons capacity by 1987. At present, peak tourist usage, reported as high as 1.8 million gallons per day, exceeds current plant capacity.

The South San Luis Obispo County Sanitation District treatment plant in Oceano provides secondary treatment for waste water from Grover City, Arroyo Grande and Oceano for disposal via an ocean outfall line. The City of Pismo Beach began utilizing the outfall for disposal of their treated effluent in approximately 1981. Grover City and Arroyo Grande have their own sewage collection systems, while Oceano Community Services District collects sewage for the unincorporated Oceano area. The sewer collection system lines are all of recent construction and no significant system problems are expected, making the system adequate into the year 2000; however, attention should be paid to the effects of adding Pismo Beach effluent to the ocean outfall line. Modifications to the treatment plant are also being made to improve the quality of the treated effluent. The treatment plant has a capacity of 2.5 million gallons per day (mgd), with current use of about 1.9 mgd or 76 percent of capacity.

South County Sewage Disposal Capacity At present the entire South County Planning Area utilizes sewage subsurface leach disposal systems. These systems generally work well in the areas where the soil is sandy and satisfactory percolation rates can be obtained. As long as population densities do not become too great, these systems should continue to be adequate to meet the needs of the rural portions of the planning area.

### 3.6.3 Public Schools

The County of San Luis Obispo Land Use Element (LUE) mentions the need for school facility planning to be conducted with future growth in mind. As of 1980, the LUE reported that some school districts were experiencing some overcrowding and that the County and the school districts needed to better coordinate future planning efforts. As with other portions of Section 3.6, the discussion of County public schools will focus on the six most populated planning areas in the County.

Salinas River Planning Area The Salinas River Planning Area is serviced by three high school districts: the Paso Robles Joint Union High School District, the Templeton Unified School District, and the Atascadero Unified School District. That portion of the planning area within the Paso Robles Joint Union School District is served by two elementary districts: Paso Robles, and San Miguel Elementary School District. All the schools are located within urban areas. Where walking distances are excessive, bus service is provided. San Miguel Elementary School District has one school which is located in the community of San Miguel. According to the County's Land Use Element (1980) no



over-crowding existed as of 1980; however, the remaining capacity was only 90 students, suggesting that enrollments in the school district should be monitored closely as the community grows.

Paso Robles Elementary School District has three schools within the city limits. These schools also serve rural portions of the Salinas and adjoining planning areas. Although enrollment has declined in recent years, the number of available classrooms has also decreased because many classrooms are devoted to state mandated supplemental education services. As of 1980, the capacities have been exceeded in all three schools due to the decreases in available classrooms. The same is true for Paso Robles secondary schools. Both the junior high and high schools are at capacity; however, plans for a new high school with a capacity of 1,200 were developed in 1980.

Students in the central portion of the planning area attend schools in the Templeton Unified School District. Construction of a new high school has doubled the capacity of facilities, thus no overcrowding is anticipated in this century. Crowding, however, will still occur in the elementary grades.

The remainder of the planning area is served by the Atascadero Unified School District. Enrollment in the elementary schools is expected to reach capacity at an enrollment of 2,200. As of 1980 some elementary schools were experiencing overcrowding.

Secondary schools, however, can accommodate a projected enrollment of 2,050. As of 1980, the secondary schools were not experiencing overcrowding.

North Coast Planning Area The North Coast Planning Area is served by the Cambria Union Elementary School District providing for grades K-8. As of 1980, enrollment was 280 students and the district capacity was 300 students. Students from San Simeon Acres also attend school in Cambria. The area population is small and made up of retired persons, presenting no potentially significant impacts on school district enrollments.

The Coast Joint Union High School located in Cambria serves all the North Coast Planning Area as well as Cayucos and portions of Monterey County. The school capacity is 400 students. As of 1980 the enrollment was 275 students. No future capacity problems are anticipated because the area has several physical restrictions that will limit growth.

Estero Planning Area The Estero Planning Area is served by several school districts. San Luis Coastal Unified School District includes two elementary schools and a junior high school in South Bay, and two elementary schools and a high school located in Morro Bay. Cayucos is served by Cayucos Elementary School District consisting of a single elementary school in Cayucos and the Coast Joint Union High School district with the high school located in Cambria.

As of 1980 it was apparent that growth of South Bay in enrollments of all schools within the **local** elementary and high school districts is resulting in some overcrowding.

Schools in the City of **Morro** Bay are of significance in that future residential development of the fringe area on the east side **of** the City will require an additional **local** elementary school, and projected enrollments in the junior high school and high school must consider population growth in both incorporated and unincorporated areas served.

**As of 1980**, no overcrowding was apparent **in** the **Cayucos** Elementary School District. The school can accommodate growth during the 20-year span of this plan. Alternatives to reduce overcrowding in classrooms include short-term adjustments to balance the number of students where two or more elementary schools serve one community, building additional classrooms on existing school sites, or building schools on new sites, an alternative which would require five years lead time to start and finish.

**San Luis Obispo Planning Area** The planning area is entirely within the San **Luis** Coastal Unified School District. Projected growth outside city limits in the urban fringe and rural areas 'will use existing city schools. Los Ranchos Elementary School, which serves the Los Ranchos/Edna Village, is the only school outside San Luis **Obispo**. Planning Department enrollment projections suggest Los Ranchos Elementary has sufficient capacity for growth in the urban fringe to beyond the year 2000.

Schools in the San Luis **Obispo** urban area are presently experiencing a decline in enrollment that is projected to "continue into 1985. Review of district facilities indicates there will be ample capacity in elementary and high schools beyond the year **2000**. High school capacity is presently exceeded, though enrollment is declining and projected to continue downward until about 1985. Declining near-future enrollment will provide capacity for the upward enrollment trend that is expected to follow. While high school facilities are now experiencing some overcrowding, improvement can be expected in the near future without construction of new facilities.

**San Luis Bay Planning Area** The San Luis Bay Planning Area is served by two school districts, the San Luis Coastal Unified School District and the Lucia Mar Unified School District. Students from **Avila** Beach attend school in the San Luis Coastal District while the remaining students attend Lucia Mar schools. Both school districts are discussed in detail below.

**San Luis Coastal Unified School District.** The **Bellevue-Santa Fe** School, located in **Avila** Valley provides elementary school facilities, while the junior high and high school students attend San **Luis Obispo** junior and senior high schools. A review of district facilities indicates there will be ample capacity in the element-

ary school beyond the year 2000. A similar situation exists for the junior high school facilities.

The capacity of the high school is presently being exceeded; however, the enrollment is declining and projected to continue downward through 1985. The declining enrollment in the near future **will** then provide some capacity for the **upward** enrollment trend that is expected to follow. Based on these factors the high school facilities are now experiencing some overcrowding but the situation can be expected to improve in the near future.

Lucia Mar Unified School District. The Lucia Mar District provides school services to all portions of the planning area except for the northerly portion within the San Luis Coastal District. Lucia Mar **also** covers the rest of the South County and extends many miles east of the San Luis Bay Planning area.

The Lucia Mar District has been experiencing capacity deficiencies for a number of years. The expanding student population has led to overcrowding in some schools, while other facilities are deficient in meeting program ends. The district recently prepared a detailed evaluation of its facilities that indicates the overcrowding problem is a serious one. The proposed major developments in the Five-Cities area, especially **in** the City of Arroyo Grande, could further impact the situation.

A review of enrollment figures, enrollment projections and facility capacities indicates many of the schools serving the San Luis Bay Planning Area are already experiencing a serious overcrowding. Table 51 summarizes the enrollment and capacity figures for the various schools. It should be noted that both North **Oceano** School and **Oceano** School have in recent years shown enrollment levels that exceed the district's projections for 1990 enrollment at these two schools. Both schools experienced substantial enrollment increases in recent years that have greatly reduced their capacity.

South County Planning Area The entire South County Planning Area lies within the Lucia Mar Unified School District. Grammar school students attend either Nipomo or Dana Elementary Schools, located in Nipomo, while junior high and high school students travel to Arroyo Grande to attend **Paulding** Intermediate and Arroyo Grande High School.

Table 52 summarizes the projected enrollments and capacities of the schools attended by the students residing in the planning area. It appears that the elementary schools have adequate capacity for new students for several years. However, both the intermediate and high school facilities are presently at or very near capacity. These schools also accept students residing in the San Luis Bay Planning Area, and with the anticipated growth in that area, the remaining capacity is expected to diminish in the immediate future.

At present, some facility deficiency is indicated in Paulding Intermediate and **Arroyo Grande High School**. Moreover, overcrowding for these schools is probable as capacity levels are approached. Enrollment projections indicate that capacities should be adequate into the 1990's.

#### 3.6.4 Public Safety

##### 3.6.4.1 Police Law Enforcement

Police protection in the San Luis **Obispo** County is provided through local, county, and state agencies. Table 53 summarizes the total number of law enforcement personnel and the agencies which provide the service. The current total number of sworn law enforcement officers on all levels in San Luis **Obispo** County is 329. The majority of these, or 145, are on the local level. The California Department of Finance estimated the 1984 population of San Luis **Obispo** to be approximately 169,800 persons. Current population to law enforcement ratio is approximately 1 peace officer for every 516 persons, or about 2 for every 1,000 in population.

##### 3.6.4.2 Fire Protection Stations Vehicles

Fire protection in San Luis **Obispo** County is provided through the various local, county, state and federal agencies. Table 54 summarizes the total number of firefighters, number of fire stations and number of firefighting vehicles for the County. The current number of paid firefighting personnel in the County is 117. An additional 50 fire suppression positions open seasonally, under the California Department of Forestry (CDF).

On the local level the majority of the fire protection is done through volunteer programs with the local fire chief the only paid firefighter. On the County level the firefighting responsibility lies with the CDF, which is under County contract to provide services. U.S. Forest Service firefighters are also located in San Luis **Obispo** County. The federal officials work and patrol the large wilderness expanse of the Los Padres National Forest. Current population to firefighter ratio is approximately one firefighter for every 511 persons or approximately two firefighters per 1,000 population. These figures are based on total firefighting personnel which include all paid, seasonal, and volunteer firefighters.

#### 3.7 Energy Consumption

##### 3.7.1 Natural Gas

The Southern California Gas Company provides natural gas service to San Luis **Obispo** County. In 1983 a total of 4,387,344 million cubic feet (MCFs) were consumed on a county-wide basis. Annual

consumption has averaged **4,571,000** MCFS from 1971 to 1983. Table 55 shows total gas consumption by broad category, residential, commercial, and industrial. Total natural gas consumption has fluctuated only slightly over the last decade with peak consumption occurring in 1975. Appendix 20 shows additional information for local areas for the same broad categories for 1971 to 1983.

### **3.7.2 Electricity**

Electric power in San Luis **Obispo** County is provided by Pacific Gas and Electric, the owners and operators of the newly opened Diablo **Canyon** nuclear power plant. In 1983, electric use recorded in kilowatt hours (kwh) amounted to 898,798,933, a 71 percent increase over 1970. Annually the consumption of electric power has increased in the County at 4.2 percent per year. Peak electric consumption as summarized in Table 56 occurred in 1977 when construction activities at Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant consumed approximately 150,000,000 kwh combined with other uses that totaled 912,260,471 kwh.

Alternative energy sources in San Luis **Obispo** County may take the form of a 30 megawatt central receiver solar power plant which is proposed to be located at **Carrisa** Plains in San Luis **Obispo** County. The plant would use a vertical flat-panel solar receiver located at the top of a tower to collect solar energy redirected by approximately 1,900 heliostats located to the north of the tower. The solar energy would be used to heat liquid sodium. The power conversion system is a non-reheat system designed for high-efficiency performance in an application requiring daily start-up. Successful completion of this project will lead to power generation starting in 1986.
