BASIC INFORMATION

When to use this form: Use Form GATT/GRP on or after January 1, 1996, to register copyright claims in a group of related works in which U.S. copyright was restored under the 1994 Uruguay Round Agreements Act (URAA).

Restoration of copyright: Works from any source country eligible under the URAA may be subject to automatic copyright restoration. However, to be so restored, a work must meet the following requirements:

- 1. The work is not in the public domain in its source country through expiration of the term of protection.
- The work is in the public domain in the United States due to:

 a. noncompliance with U.S. copyright formalities;
 b. lack of subject matter protection in the case of sound recordings fixed before February 15, 1972; or
 c. lack of national eligibility.
- 3. The work has at least one author (or rightholder in the case of sound recordings) who was, at the time the work was created, a national or domiciliary of an eligible country.
- 4. If published, the work was first published in an eligible country and was not published in the United States during the 30-day period following publication in the eligible country.

Note about *architectural works*: Restoration of U.S. copyright for architectural works is available only to architectural works published or constructed on or after December 1, 1990.

Definitions:

Eligible country: A nation, other than the United States, that is a member of the Berne Convention, or a member of the World Trade Organization, or is subject to a presidential proclamation restoring the U.S. copyright to works of that nation on the basis of reciprocal treatment.

Source country of a restored work: A nation other than the United States.

For an unpublished work, the source country is the eligible country of which the author is a national or domiciliary. If a restored work has more than one author, the source country is the country of which the majority of foreign authors are nationals or domiciliaries. If the majority of authors are not foreign, the source country is the nation other than the United States that has the most significant contacts with the work.

For a published work, the source country is the eligible country in which the work was first published. If the restored work was published simultaneously in two or more eligible countries, the source country is the eligible country that has the most significant contacts with the work.

Owner of U.S. copyright: A claim in a restored work may be registered only in the name of the owner(s) of the U.S. copyright, that is, in the name of the owner(s) of **all** U.S. rights in that work. A licensee or other owner of only certain exclusive rights in a work is not permitted to register a claim in a restored work in his name.

Requirements for Group Registration:

Group of Related Works: A group registration is available for registering up to **10 individual works** restored under the URAA if all the following conditions are met:

1. The author of all U.S. restored rights must be the same for all works in the group. The owner must also be the same for all the works. But the author and the owner of all U.S. restored rights need not be the same party.

- 2. All works must have been published (or created if unpublished) within the same calendar year. Do **not** combine published and unpublished works on the same form.
- 3. There must be at least two and not more than ten individual works in the group.
- All works must fit within the same classification. For example, all works are literary works or all works are works of the visual arts.

If all the above requirements are met, **send** a completed Form GATT/GRP, a copy of each work to be registered, and the appropriate filing fee together in one package addressed to:

Application Form: Complete Form GATT/GRP legibly in black ink or type. Photocopies of the form are permitted if reproduced on good quality 8 1/2 by 11-inch white paper and printed head to head so that the top of page two is directly behind the top of page one.

Deposit:

Unpublished Sound Recordings: Send one phonorecord of each work in the group that best represents the copyrightable content of the work in which U.S. rights are restored and for which registration is being made, for example, audio tape, vinyl disc, or compact disc.

Published works: Send one copy of each work in the group that best represents the copyrightable content of each work in which U.S. rights are restored and for which registration is being made, in the following order of preference:

- 1. The work as first published;
- 2. A reprint or re-release of the work as first published;
- 3. A photocopy or identical reproduction of the work as first published;
- 4. A revised version containing a substantial amount of the copyrightable content of the restored work as first published, **together with** a written statement of the percentage of the restored work appearing in the revised version.

Exceptions: Please note the following exceptions to the deposit policy.

Previously registered works: No deposit needed for works previously registered in the U.S. Copyright Office.

Three-dimensional works of the visual arts: One or more photographs, preferably in color.

Machine-readable works: For works embodied only in machine-readable format,

- a. One machine-readable copy plus a descriptive statement* or
- b. Representative excerpts of the work, such as printouts or, if the work is an audiovisual work, a videotape.
 - * A descriptive statement for a machine-readable work is a separate written statement giving the title of the work, nature of the work (for example, computer program, database, videogame, etc.), plus a brief description of the purpose or subject matter of the work.

Fees for Group Registration: The fee for a group registration is \$15 per individual title with a minimum fee of \$45. The filing fee may be paid in any of the following ways:

Checks, money orders, or bank drafts made payable to the Register

of Copyrights and redeemable without service or exchange fees through a U.S. institution, must be payable in U.S. dollars, and must be imprinted with American Banking Association routing numbers. Currency, international money orders, and postal money orders that are negotiable only at a post office are **not** acceptable.

Copyright Office deposit account: This is an account into which an applicant deposits money in advance for use in paying copyright fees. For information on deposit accounts, request Circular 5, "How to Open and Maintain a Deposit Account in the Copyright Office."

Credit cards: The Copyright Office will accept VISA, MasterCard, and American Express credit cards. Debit cards are **not** acceptable. To charge the filing fee on a credit card, include **in a separate letter** the type of card, name of individual or firm as it appears on the card, the account number, expiration date, the total amount, and the signature of the cardholder authorizing the Office to charge the fee to the account. DO NOT GIVE CREDIT CARD INFORMATION ANYWHERE ON THE APPLICATION FORM ITSELF.

SPACE 1: Titlea. For a group of related works, give the full title of each work as it appears on the copy or phonorecord followed by an English translation if appropriate.

b. Description of Works: Check the box (or boxes) that best describes these works.

SPACE 2: Author(s)

The author(s) must be identical for all works within the group.

Name at least one eligible author as determined by the applicable law of the source country. To list more than two authors, use a continuation sheet Form GATT/CON.

For each author listed, give the nationality and domicile of that author at the time the work was created.

If any author is deceased, give the year of death.

SPACE 3: Year and Nation of Publication

Give the year and nation(s) in which each work was first published. If all the works were not published in the same nation, specify the nation after each title in space 1(a). Each work must have been published within the same calendar year. (Leave this space blank if the works have not been published.)

SPACE 4: Owner(s) of U.S. Copyright

a. Give the name and address of the current owner(s). The owner(s) must be the same for all works in the group.

b. Transfer of Copyright: If the author(s) named at space 2 is not the current owner(s) of U.S. copyright, describe how the copyright was transferred. **Examples:** "assignment of all U.S. rights," "by contract," or "by will."

SPACE 5: Limitation of Copyright,

SPACE 6: Registration Number and Year for Previous U.S. Registration
