STATED IN PURSUANCE OF THE FOLLOWING STANDING ORDER OF THE HOUSE OF
REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES, PASSED ON THE 30th DAY
OF DECEMBER, 1791, VIZ:

"Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to lay before the
"House of Representatives, on the fourth Monday of October, in each year, if Congress shall
"then be in session, or if not then in session, within the first week of the session next fol-
"lowing the said fourth Monday of October, an accurate statement and account of the receipts
"and expenditures of all public moneys, down to the last day, inclusively, of the month of De-
"cember immediately preceding the said fourth Monday of October, distinguishing the amount
"of the receipts in each State or District, and from each officer therein, in which statement
"shall also be distinguished, the expenditures which shall fall under each head of appro-
"priation, and shall be shewn the sums, if any, which remain unexpended, and to be accounted
"for in the next statement of each and every of such appropriation."

And of "an Act to define and establish the fiscal year of the Treasury of the United States,"
passed August 26th, 1842.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit the printed account of the Receipts and Expenditures of the United States, for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1844, stated in pursuance of the following standing order of the House of Representatives of the 30th December, 1791:

"Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury "to lay before the House of Representatives on the fourth Monday of "October, in each year, if Congress shall then be in session, or if not "then in session, within the first week of the session next following the "said fourth Monday of October, an accurate statement and account of "the receipts and expenditures of all public moneys, down to the last "day, inclusively, of the month of December immediately preceding "the said fourth Monday of October, distinguishing the amount of the "receipts in each State or District, and from each officer therein, in which "statement shall also be distinguished, the expenditures which fall un- "der each head of appropriation, and shall be shewn the sums, if any, "which remain unexpended and to be accounted for, in the next state- "ment of each and every of such appropriation."

And of "an Act to define and establish the fiscal year of the Treasury of the United States," passed August 26th, 1842.

This account contains—

- I. A general account current of the receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1844. The pages in the margin of the credit side, refer to the detailed expenditures under the specific heads of appropriation.
- II. Statements of the appropriations made for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1844, including the balances on 1st July, 1843; the payments during the year; the several sums carried to the surplus fund, and the balances unexpended at the end of the year.
- III. Statements of the receipts, expenditures and appropriations, from 1789 to 30th June, 1844.
- IV. Statements exhibiting the operations relative to the customs for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1844.
- V. Statements of balances due by, and in favor of, supervisors, collectors and others, of the late direct taxes and internal revenue.
- VI. Statements of the operations at the several land offices during the half year ending 30th June, 1843, and the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1844.

The statements relative to the official emoluments of officers of the customs, are omitted in consequence of this office not being in possession of materials from which to make correct and full statements.
