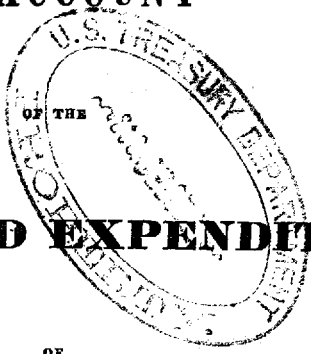

SIR: I have the honor to transmit the printed account of the Receipts and Expenditures of the United States, for the year 1840, stated in pursuance of the standing order of the House of Representatives of the 30th of December, 1791.

This account contains—

- I. A general account current of the receipts and expenditures for 1840; the credit side referring to the pages of the book, exhibiting, in detail, under each head of expenditure, the name of, and the amount paid or advanced to, each individual connected with the Civil, Diplomatic, Military, and Naval Departments.
- II. Statements of the appropriations made by law for the year 1840, including the balances of former appropriations, and exhibits the payments made under, and the balances of each, at the end of the year; also the sums carried to the surplus fund.
- III. A statement of the receipts, expenditures and appropriations, from 1789 to 31st December, 1840; showing also the sums carried to the balances of appropriations.
- IV. An appendix, including,
 - 1st. A statement of the duties on imports and tonnage; payments for drawback on foreign merchandise; domestic refined sugar and domestic distilled spirits exported; payments for allowances to vessels employed in the fisheries; payments for bounties on salted fish exported; the expenses of collection of said duties during the year 1840; and the balances in bonds and cash in the hands of each collector at the close of that year.
 - 2d. Statements of the official emoluments of the collectors, naval officers, and surveyors, for 1840.
 - 3d. Statements of balances due by supervisors and collectors of the late direct taxes and internal revenue.
 - 4th. Statements of the operation at the several land offices in 1839; exhibiting the balances due by receivers in and out of office, at the commencement and close of that year.

COPY OF COMPTROLLER'S CIRCULAR.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
First Comptrollers Office, Sept. 2, 1839.

SIR: In consequence of the difficulties in ascertaining the liabilities of the sureties on bonds given to the United States, I have to request that, in future, your accounts with the United States be kept on your books separate and distinct, *under every bond which may be given*; and in rendering your quarterly accounts you will state *the date of the bond* under which they are rendered in the caption of your quarterly account current.

The balance due to the United States under the first series of accounts, will not be carried into the second series, rendered under a new bond, but will be closed on the payment of the balance found to be due; and you will, in making your deposits, designate by date of the bond, the accounts to which you wish the sum applied.

It has been decided by the Supreme Court in the case of the United States vs. Kirkpatrick, (Wheaton's Reports, 9 vol. page 720,) that "the liabilities of sureties to a bond given under an appointment during the recess of the Senate, expires with the commission on the day the session ends, and can reach no further. The bond is given with reference to the commission, while that commission has a legal continuance, and cannot go beyond it. The new appointment, (made by and with the advice and consent of the Senate for the term of four years,) so soon as it is accepted, (viz. by taking the oath of office,) is a virtual superseding and surrender of the former commission." In accordance with this decision, your *first series* of accounts, if under a temporary appointment, will end the day preceding the date of your oath of office, under the confirmed appointment. The *second series*, in such a case, will commence with the date of the oath of office, and ends with the day on which your commission expires; or, if a bond from any cause be required or given, during the term of service, with the day preceding the date of such bond.

Your accounts are to be made up and rendered in all cases where one series ends and another begins during a quarter, to the end of such quarter. For example: A. B. is re-appointed, and his commission is dated on the 10th of May, the accounts are to be rendered up to the 9th of May, in one series, and a second series commences from the 10th of May, and ends on the 30th of June, inclusive; and so on, quarter-yearly, until such time as you may cease to be in office.

Postscript for Collectors of the Customs.

The balances of bonds not due, and bonds in suit, will be transferred from one series of accounts to another, as is now the usage, when a new collector is appointed.
