SIR: I have the honor to transmit the printed account of the Receipts and Expenditures of the United States for the year 1841, stated in pursuance of the standing order of the House of Representatives of the 30th of December, 1791.

This account contains—

1st. A general account current of the receipts and expenditures for 1841; the debit side showing the balance in the Treasury on the 1st January, agreeably to the Treasurer's account; the various sources from which the money has been received; the individual paying the money into the Treasury; the place where collected; the amount so paid by each individual; and the aggregate amount received during the year. The credit side showing the expenditure during the year under the specific heads of appropriation; the aggregate under each general head; the total during the year, and the balance in the Treasury on the 31st December. From the aggregate amounts, under the heads of Military and Naval establishments, are deducted the repayments during the year; these repayments being balances of specific appropriations in the hands of the individuals paying them into the Treasury; under which appropriations there have either been no expenditures, or the repayments have exceeded the expenditures during the year; but in most of these cases the objects for which the appropriation was made have been accomplished.

2d. The payments made during the year, arranged under general and specific heads—the latter being the precise heading of the appropriation. Under the head of each specific appropriation the total amount paid to each individual during the year is shown; the aggregate of the appropriation during the year from which the repayments, if any, are deducted. The payments are either made on settled accounts or advances to disbursing agents. In those cases where the payments are made on settled accounts, and when the object can be stated in a few lines, it is so done. This, however, does not apply to the accounts of the War and Navy Departments which are not kept in this office. In every case of money advanced, and of which, either by act or resolution, special reports of the expenditures are required in detail, reports have accordingly been uniformly made to Congress; for instance, such as the contingent expenses of the various departments. To make similar detailed reports of all the expenditures, under the various heads of appropriation, would require a transcript of every account settled with the Government; which would be exceedingly voluminous and expensive, and beyond the accomplishment of the office with its present clerical force.

3d. Statements exhibiting the balances of appropriations unexpended on the 31st day of December, 1840; the appropriations for the service of the year 1841; the repayments during the year; the total available; the payments during the year; the amounts carried to the surplus fund; and the balances of appropriations on the 1st January, 1842.

4th. A statement of the duties on imports and tonnage; payments for drawback on foreign merchandise, domestic refined sugar, and domestic distilled spirits exported; payments for allowances to vessels employed in the fisheries; payments for bounties on salted fish exported; the expenses of collection of said duties during the year 1841; and the balances in bonds, and cash in the hands of each collector at the close of that year.

5th. Statements of balances due by supervisors, collectors, and others, of the late direct taxes and internal revenue.

6th. Statements of the operations at the several land offices in 1840, exhibiting the balances due by receivers in and out of office at the commencement and close of that year.

In consequence of all the accounts relating to the surplus official emoluments of officers of the customs not having yet been finally acted on by the accounting officers, I have deemed it expedient to omit the statements relating thereto in the accounts for this year, in order that the printed account of the receipts and expenditures of the United States may be placed in the hands of Congress before its adjournment.
