NEWPORT, Sick seamen are accommodated in the marine hospital, at Newport, for 3 dollars per week, medicine and attendance separately charged; from the 1st of July, the board was reduced to 2 dollars 50 cents, and an agreement was made with a physician at a salary of 400 dollars per annum; 32 were received; physician's charges 800 dollars 50 cents; total,	1,168 21
MIDDLETOWN, Provided for in private houses, at from 2 to 3 dollars per week, medical attendance separately charged; 7 were received; physician's charge 4 dollars 25 cents; expenditure - - -	155 06
NEW LONDON. Seamen are accommodated in private houses, at from 2 to 2 dollars 50 cents per week; a physician receives for his services, a compensation of 200 dollars per annum; 53 were provided for; total	662 86
SAG HARBOR, One seaman was provided for in this port, at 3 dollars per week, for all necessaries from 27th August, to 31st December - - -	54 54
NEW YORK, Seamen are boarded in the New York Hospital for 3 dollars per week, including all expenses, except the salary of a superintendent of seamen, at 250 dollars per annum, clothing, and funeral expenses; 805 were provided for - - -	9,641 35
PHILADELPHIA, Sick seamen are admitted into the Pennsylvania Hospital, at 50 cents per day, exclusive of clothing and funeral expenses; during the third quarter of the year, the board was reduced to 40 cents per day; 348 were received; 675 dollars and 65 cents paid for clothing, 70 dollars for funeral expenses, and 42 dollars and 62 cents paid for conveyance of three seamen to their friends; total -	7,264 29
BALTIMORE, Sick seamen are boarded in the marine hospital for 50 cents, and disabled seamen at 40 cents per day, including all expenses, except clothing; 175 dollars was paid to enable seamen to return to their friends; 512 dollars was paid for clothing; there was a deduction of 3,821 dollars and 93 cents from the collector's accounts for the last half year, he having transcended the authority of the Secretary of the Treasury, directing that the expenditure should not exceed the amount of tax collected; 607 seamen were provided for - - -	13,194 13
ANNAPOLIS, Boarded in private houses at 50 cents per day; six were received; physician's charges 30 dollars and 50 cents, clothing and funeral expenses 28 dollars and 50 cents; total - - -	138 36

Seamen are accommodated in private houses at from 2 dollars and 50 cents, to 4 dollars per week; medical attendance, funeral expenses, separately charged; six were provided for; physician's charges 35 dollars and 28 cents; funeral expenses 16 dollars and 67 cents; total - - -	\$ 125 13
ALEXANDRIA, Accommodated in the alms house, for 5 dollars per week, including all charges, funeral expenses excepted; 27 were received; expenditure - - -	597 48
TAPPAHANNOCK, Seamen are boarded in private houses at from 2 dollars and 50 cents, to 3 dollars per week; six were provided for; physician's charges 69 dollars and 34 cents; total - - -	91 24
RICHMOND, Sick seamen are supported in private houses, or their passage paid to the United States' marine hospital at Norfolk; six were sent to the hospital, passage 4 dollars each - - -	24 24
PETERSBURG, There was paid by the collector, to three distressed seamen, to enable them to get to the United States' marine hospital at Norfolk, the sum of - - -	6 06
NORFOLK, Seamen are accommodated in the United States' marine hospital; a physician receives a salary of 840 dollars, with an assistant at 600 dollars per annum; attendants at various rates; the number of seamen received cannot be ascertained from the accounts; the total expenditure for the year was - - -	3,541 33
CAMDEN, Seamen are boarded in private houses at from 2 dollars to 2 dollars and 50 cents per week; medical attendance separately charged; 26 were provided for; physician's charges 201 dollars and 50 cents; total - - -	518 64
EDENTON, Seamen are accommodated in private houses at 3 dollars per week; medical attendance separately charged; 19 were received; medicine and attendance, 97 dollars and 55 cents; total - - -	247 35
PLYMOUTH, Boarded in private houses at from 2 dollars to 3 dollars per week; 14 were received; physician's charges 65 dollars and 5 cents - - -	213 32
WASHINGTON, Seamen are received in private houses at 50 cents per day; 18 were provided for; physician's charges 47 dollars and 67 cents; total - - -	170 11
WILMINGTON, Sick seamen are boarded in private houses at 50 cents per day, exclusive of medical attendance; there were 17 received in the fourth quarter of 1820, not included in the statement for that year; 108 dollars was paid to the physician, making the ex-

CHARLESTON, The amount collected in this port for hospital money is paid over to the City Treasurer, the corporation engaging to relieve those seamen who are objects of charity from this fund; the amount paid the Treasurer was - - - -	1,172 37
SAVANNAH, Seamen are accommodated in the Savannah poor house and hospital, at 5 dollars per week, for all necessities; 73 were received; funeral expenses 105 dollars; the expenditure, including 13 dollars for advertising proposals for attendance on seamen, and 10 dollars for the passage of a seaman to New York was - - - -	971 67
DARIEN, Received in private houses, at 2 dollars per day, including medical attendance; eleven were provided for; funeral expenses 22 dollars and 50 cents; total - - - -	225 72
NEW ORLEANS, Seamen are admitted into the New Orleans charity hospital; a physician receives from the United States a salary of 1000 dollars, a director 144 dollars, and a steward 120 dollars per annum; all other expenses are borne for 75 cents per day; 188 seamen were provided for; expenditure - - - -	3,480 97
MOBILE, Boarded in private houses, at 5 dollars per week, medical attendance, &c. separately charged; eleven were received; physician's charges, (including attendance on board the revenue cutter Alabama, also, 33 dollars and 71 cents paid by him in 1820,) 60 dollars; total - - - -	458 73
ST. AUGUSTINE, One seaman was boarded in a private house at 3 dollars per week, and 2 dollars paid to enable two distressed seamen to support themselves until they could obtain employment - - - -	5 05
PENSACOLA, Seamen received in private houses at 2 dollars and 50 cents to 3 dollars and 50 cents per week, fuel, &c. separately charged; nine were provided for; expenditure - - - -	282 41
