

IN SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES.

MAY 4, 1826.

Mr. BENTON, from the Select Committee, to which was referred the proposition to inquire into the expediency of reducing the Patronage of the Executive Government of the United States, made the following

REPORT :

That, after mature deliberation, the Committee are of opinion that it is expedient to diminish, or to regulate, by law, the Executive Patronage of the Federal Government, whenever the same can be done consistently with the provisions of the Constitution, and without impairing the proper efficiency of the Government. Acting under this conviction, they have reviewed, as carefully, as time and other engagements would permit them to do, the degree and amount of patronage now exercised by the President, and have arrived at the conclusion that the same may, and ought to, be diminished by law. For this purpose they herewith present to the Senate six bills, entitled :

1. A bill to regulate the publication of the Laws of the United States, and of public advertisements.
2. A bill to secure in office the faithful Collectors and Disbursers of the Revenue, and to displace defaulters.
3. A bill to regulate the appointment of Postmasters.
4. A bill to regulate the appointment of Cadets.
5. A bill to regulate the appointment of Midshipmen.
6. A bill to prevent Military and Naval Officers from being dismissed the service at the pleasure of the President.

The Committee do not doubt but that there are many other branches of Executive Patronage, in addition to those which are comprehended in the provisions of these bills, which might be advantageously regulated by law. Far from thinking that they have exhausted the subject, they believe that they have only opened it, and that nothing more can be done, at this time, than to lay the foundation of a system to be followed up and completed hereafter.

In coming to the conclusion that Executive Patronage ought to be diminished and regulated, on the plan proposed, the Committee rest their opinion on the ground that the exercise of great patronage in the hands of one man, has a constant tendency to sully the purity

of our institutions, and to endanger the liberties of the country. This doctrine is not new. A jealousy of power, and of the influence of patronage, which must always accompany its exercise, has ever been a distinguished feature in the American character. It displayed itself strongly at the period of the formation, and of the adoption, of the Federal Constitution. At that time the feebleness of the old Confederation had excited a much greater dread of anarchy than of power—"of anarchy among the members than of power in the head"—\* and although the impression was nearly universal that a government of more energetic character had become indispensably necessary, yet, even under the influence of this conviction—such was the dread of power and patronage—that the States, with extreme reluctance, yielded their assent to the establishment of the Federal Government. Nor was this the effect of idle and visionary fears on the part of an ignorant multitude, without knowledge of the nature and tendency of power. On the contrary, it resulted from the most extensive and profound political knowledge,—from the heads of statesmen, unsurpassed, in any age, in sagacity and patriotism. Nothing could reconcile the great men of that day to a constitution of so much power, but the guards which were put upon it against the abuse of power. Dread and jealousy of this abuse displayed itself throughout the instrument. To this spirit we are indebted for the freedom of the press, trial by jury, liberty of conscience, freedom of debate, responsibility to constituents, power of impeachment, the control of the Senate over appointments to office; and many other provisions of a like character. But the Committee cannot imagine that the jealous foresight of the time, great as it was, or that any human sagacity, could have foreseen, and placed a competent guard upon, every possible avenue to the abuse of power. The nature of a constitutional act excludes the possibility of combining minute perfection with general excellence. After the exertion of all possible vigilance, something of what ought to have been done, has been omitted, and much of what has been attempted, has been found insufficient and unavailing in practice. Much remains for us to do, and much will still remain for posterity to do—for those unborn generations to do, on whom will devolve the sacred task of guarding the Temple of the Constitution, and of keeping alive the vestal flame of liberty.

The committee believe that they will be acting in the spirit of the constitution in laboring to multiply the guards, and to strengthen the barriers, against the possible abuse of power. If a community could be imagined in which the laws should execute themselves—in which the power of government should consist in the enactment of laws—in such a state the machine of government would carry on its operations without jar or friction. Parties would be unknown, and the movements of the political machine would but little more disturb the passions of men than they are disturbed by the operations of the great laws of the material world. But this is not the case. The scene shifts from this imaginary region, where laws execute themselves,

to the theatre of real life, wherein they are executed by civil and military officers, by armies and navies, by courts of justice, by the collection and disbursement of revenue, with all its train of salaries, jobs, and contracts; and in this aspect of the reality, we behold the working of PATRONAGE, and discover the reason why so many stand ready, in any country, and in all ages, to flock to the standard of POWER wheresoever, and by whomsoever, it may be raised.

The patronage of the Federal Government at the beginning, was founded upon a revenue of two millions of dollars.\* It is now operating upon twenty-two millions, and, within the life time of many now living, must operate upon fifty. The whole revenue must, in a few years, be wholly applicable to subjects of patronage. At present, about one half, say ten millions of it, are appropriated to the principal and interest of the public debt, which, from the nature of the object, involves but little patronage. In the course of a few years, this debt, without great mismanagement, must be paid off. A short period of peace, and a faithful application of the sinking fund, must speedily accomplish that most desirable object. Unless the revenue be then reduced, a work as difficult in republics as in monarchies, the patronage of the Federal Government, great as it already is, must, in the lapse of a few years, receive a vast accession of strength. The revenue itself will be doubled, and instead of one half being applicable to objects of patronage, the whole will take that direction. Thus, the reduction of the public debt, and the increase of revenue, will multiply in a four fold degree the number of persons in the service of the Federal Government, the quantity of public money in their hands, and the number of objects to which it is applicable; but as each person employed will have a circle of greater or less diameter, of which he is the centre and the soul—a circle composed of friends and relations, and of individuals employed by himself on public or on private account—the actual increase of federal power and patronage by the duplication of the revenue, will be, not in the arithmetical ratio, but in geometrical progression, an increase almost beyond the power of the mind to calculate or to comprehend.

The committee think it right to attempt to give an idea of the greatness of this power of patronage by referring to an example in a single city. They will take the city of New York, and a single branch of the federal patronage in that city; and to avoid mistake or error, will limit their reference to a work of unquestionable authority upon this subject—the “*Blue Book*” of the Republic, which corresponds with the “*Red Book*” of monarchies, and will read from pages 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, of that growing little volume.

A formidable list indeed ! formidable in numbers, and still more so from the vast amount of money in their hands. The action of such a body of men, supposing them to be animated by one spirit, must be tremendous in an election ; and that they will be so animated, is a proposition too plain to need demonstration. *Power* over a man's *support*, has always been held and admitted to be *power* over his *will*.\* The President has "power" over the "support" of all these officers ; and they again have "power" over the "support" of debtor merchants to the amount of ten millions of dollars *per annum*, and over the daily support of an immense number of individuals, professional, mechanical, and day-laboring, to whom they *can* and *will* extend, or deny, a valuable private as well as public patronage, according to the part which they shall act in *State*, as well as in *Federal*, elections. Still this is only a branch, a mere prong, of Federal patronage, in the city of New York. The same Government has, in the same city, a branch of the United States' Bank, wielding a capital of many mil-

lions ; a large military, naval, and post-office establishment ; a judiciary, with its appropriate officers ; presses, which print the laws and public advertisements ; and a long list of contractors and jobbers.

But it may be said that this is an extreme case ; that New York is the first city in the Union, and Federal patronage necessarily the greatest there. Granted. Then go to the other extreme ; take a borough town of comparatively small population, and an insignificant amount of revenue to collect : take Norfolk, with her white population of five thousand souls, and her nett revenue of sixty-four thousand seven hundred and twelve dollars and twenty-seven cents, and see the power of patronage there.

Forty-one officers supported and employed by a single branch of Federal patronage in Norfolk ! to collect an annual decreasing revenue of \$64,712 27 ; a single branch, for this borough, also, has her navy yard, and military establishment ; her judiciary, post office, presses, and the unknown and unknowable list of jobbers and contractors ; and the still more inscrutable list of expectants, who are waiting for " dead men's shoes," and willing, in the mean while, to do any thing that the living men wish. The influence of such a body of men, animated by one spirit in an election, must be still more efficient in a borough town of five thousand souls, than the influence of a far greater number of Federal officers and retainers, in the far greater population of New York. And so throughout the Union. Every where, to the extreme frontier of the remotest State or Territory, Federal patronage will be found, in degree and force, proportionate to the population of the place, and forever augmenting with the increasing power of the Government. Diminution of patronage is not thought of : the state of the Custom House in Norfolk, is already pregnant proof of this. The power of patronage, unless checked by the vigorous interposition of Congress, must go on increasing, until Federal influence, in many parts of this Confederation, will predominate in elections, as completely as British influence predominates in the elections of Scotland and Ireland, in rotten borough towns, and in the great naval stations of Portsmouth and Plymouth. In no part of the practical operation of the Federal Government, has the predictions of its ablest advocates been more completely falsified, than in this subject of patronage. The numbers 45 and 46 of the *Federalist*, were devoted to an inquiry into the comparative means of influence possessed by the Federal and the State Governments ; and the superiority, at every point of the inquiry, was assigned to the latter. It will be useful to read a few passages from these numbers. Compared with the actual state of things, they will exhibit the difference which a few short years have developed, between the theoretical and the practical Government of this Union ; and the thinking mind will be carried forward, by a natural impulsion, to contemplate the further differences which a few years more must uncover.

#### THE PASSAGES.

"The powers delegated by the proposed constitution to the *Federal* Government, are *few* and *defined* : those which remain to the *State* Governments, are *numerous* and *indefinite*. \* \* \* \* \*

The number of individuals employed under the constitution of the *United States*, will be much *smaller* than the number employed under

the particular *States* : there will, consequently, be *less* of personal influence on the side of the *former* than of the *latter*. \* \* \* \* \*  
 If the *Federal* Government is to have collectors of revenue, the *State* Governments will have *theirs* also ; and as those of the former (the United States) will be principally on the sea coast, and *not* very numerous, whilst those of the latter, (*the States*) will be spread over the face of the country, and will be *very* numerous ; the advantage in this view also lies on the same side, (*the side of the States.*) \* \* \* \* \*  
 Within every district to which a *Federal* collector would be allotted, there would not be less than thirty or forty, or even more officers, of different descriptions (in the employment of the States,) and many of them persons of character and weight, whose influence would lie on the *side of the STATE.*”

To be able to show to the Senate a full and perfect view of the power and workings of Federal patronage, the Committee addressed a note, immediately after they were charged with this inquiry, to each of the Departments, and to the Post Master General, requesting to be informed of the whole number of persons employed, and the whole amount of money paid out, under the direction of their respective departments. The answers received are herewith submitted, and made part of this report. With the BLUE BOOK, they will discover enough to show that the predictions of those who were not blind to the defects of the Constitution, are ready to be realized ; that the power and influence of *Federal* patronage, contrary to the argument in the “*Federalist.*” is an overmatch for the power and influence of *State* patronage ; that its workings will contaminate the purity of all elections, and enable the Federal Government, eventually, to govern throughout the States, as effectually as if they were so many provinces of one vast empire.

The whole of this great power will centre in the President. The King of England is the “fountain of honor :” the President of the United States is the source of patronage. He presides over the entire system of Federal appointments, jobs, and contracts. He has “power” over the “support” of the individuals who administer the system. He makes and unmakes them. He chuses from the circle of his friends and supporters, and *may* dismiss them, and, upon all the principles of human action, *will* dismiss them, as often as they disappoint his expectations. His spirit will animate their actions in all the elections to *State* and *Federal* offices. There may be exceptions, but the truth of a general rule is proved by the exception. The intended check and control of the Senate, without new constitutional or statutory provisions, will cease to operate. Patronage will penetrate this body, subdue its capacity of resistance, chain it to the car of power, and enable the President to rule as easily, and much more securely with, than without, the nominal check of the Senate. If the President was himself the officer of the People, elected by them, and responsible to them, there would be *less* danger from this concentration of all power in his hands ; but it is the business of statesmen to act upon things as they are, and not as they would wish them to be. We must then look for-

ward to the time when the public revenue will be doubled ; when the civil and military officers of the Federal Government will be quadrupled ; when its influence over individuals will be multiplied to an indefinite extent ; when the nomination by the President can carry *any man* through the Senate, and his recommendation can carry *any measure* through the two Houses of Congress ; when the principle of public action will be open and avowed, *the President wants MY vote, and I want HIS patronage ; I will VOTE as he wishes, and he will GIVE me the office I wish for.* What will this be but the Government of *one man* ? and what is the Government of *one man* but a *monarchy* ? Names are nothing. The nature of a thing is in its substance, and the name soon accommodates itself to the substance. The first Roman Emperor was styled Emperor of the *Republic*, and the last French Emperor took the same title ; and their respective countries were just as essentially *monarchical* before as after the assumption of these titles. It cannot be denied, or dissembled, but that this Federal Government gravitates to the same point, and that the election of the Executive by the Legislature quickens the impulsion.

Those who make the President must support him. Their political fate becomes identified, and they must stand or fall together. Right or wrong, they must support him ; and if he is made contrary to the will of the People, he must be supported not only by votes and speeches, but by arms. A violent and forced state of things will ensue. Individual combats will take place ; and the combats of individuals will be the forerunner to general engagements. The array of man against man will be the prelude to the array of army against army, and of State against State. Such is the law of nature ; and it is equally in vain for one set of men to claim an exemption from its operation, as it would be for any other set to suppose that, under the same circumstances, they would not act in the same manner. The natural remedy for all this evil would be to place the election of President in the hands of the people of the United States. He would then have a power to support him, which would be as able as willing to aid him when he was himself supporting the interests of the country, as they would be to put him down when he should neglect or oppose those interests. Your committee, looking at the present mode of electing the President as the principal source of all this evil, have commenced their labors at the beginning of this session by recommending an amendment to the constitution in that essential and vital particular ; but in this, as in many other things, they find the greatest difficulty to lie in the first step. The committee recommend the amendment, but the People cannot act upon it until Congress shall "propose" it, and, peradventure, Congress will not "propose" it to them at all.

The Committee have also reported another proposition of amendment, intended to exclude Senators and Representatives from appointment to civil offices, under the authority of the Federal Government ; and this proposition they will not despair of seeing referred to the consideration and decision of the People. They believe that every proposition to amend the Constitution, not frivolous, or flagrantly bad

on its face, should be referred to the People. The people *made* the Constitution, and they can *amend* it. They are the only constitutional triers of the amendment. They alone have power to adopt it; and for Congress to refuse to propose the amendment, is to prevent decision, and to act upon the principle that the People are incompetent to decide.

The Committee must then take things as they are. Not being able to lay the axe to the root of the tree, they must go to pruning among the limbs and branches. Not being able to reform the Constitution in the election of President, they must go to work upon his powers, and trim down these by statutory enactments, wherever it can be done by law, and with a just regard to the proper efficiency of the Government. For this purpose they have reported the six bills which have been enumerated. They do not pretend to have exhausted the subject, but only to have seized a few of its prominent points. They have only touched, in four places, the vast and pervading system of Federal Executive Patronage: *the Press—the Post Office—the Armed Force—and the Appointing Power*. They are few, compared to the whole number of points which the system presents, but they are points vital to the liberties of the country. The Press is put foremost, because it is the moving power of human action: the Post Office is the handmaid of the Press: the Armed Force its executor; and the Appointing Power the directress of the whole. If the Appointing Power was itself an emanation of the popular will—if the President was himself the officer and the organ of the People—there would be *less* danger in leaving to his will the sole direction of all these arbiters of human fate. But things must be taken as they are; statesmen must act for the country they live in, and not for the Island of Utopia; they must act upon the state of facts in that country, and not upon the visions of fancy. In the country for which the Committee act, the Press, with some exceptions, the Post Office, the Armed Force, and the Appointing Power, are in the hands of the President, and the President himself is not in the hands of the People. The President may, and in the current of human affairs, will be against the People; and, in his hands, the arbiters of human fate must be against them also. This will not do. The possibility of it must be avoided. The safety of the People is the “supreme law;” and to ensure that safety, these arbiters of human fate must change position, and take post on the side of the People.

*A bill to regulate the publication of the Laws of the United States, and of Public Advertisements.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That, from and after the first day of December next, the selection of newspapers for the publication of the laws of the United States, and of public advertisements, shall be made as follows: in each State the number selected shall not be less than three, and may be equal to half the number of Representatives to which such State may be entitled in Congress; in each Territory, one; in the District of Columbia, three.

Sec. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That the selection of newspapers for the above objects, within the respective States, shall be made by the Senators and Representatives in Congress, from such State, and the names of the selected papers communicated to the Department of State, in writing, signed jointly or severally, and a majority to govern, on or before the first day of January next, and on or before the same day in every two years thereafter; in default of which, the selection shall be made by the Secretary of State.

Sec. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That the Delegates from Territories, respectively, shall, in like manner, each select the paper in which the publication of the laws of the United States and public advertisements, shall be made in the Territory from which he comes; and in default of such selection being made, and communicated to the Department of State, the Secretary of State shall select the same.

Sec. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That the selection of newspapers in the District of Columbia, for the publication of the like laws and advertisements, shall be made, at the same time, by the Secretary of State; and a preference shall be given, in the selection, to the papers which may have the greatest number of actual subscribers, to be ascertained by the affidavit of the editors, respectively.

Sec. 5. *And be it further enacted,* That the public advertisements of the United States shall be published in such papers only, as may have been selected according to the terms of this act, and may be published in any number of them, according to the nature of the advertisement, and the propriety of giving to it a general, a partial, or merely a local circulation.

Sec. 6. *And be it further enacted,* That, as soon as may be, after the first day of January next, and every two years thereafter, a copy of the list of newspapers selected, according to the terms of this act, for the publication of the United States' laws and advertisements, shall be communicated by the Secretary of State, to the Senate and House of Representatives, to the Heads of Department, respectively, and to the Postmaster General.

*A bill to secure in office the faithful Collectors and Disbursers of the Revenue, and to displace defaulters.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That in the first week of the month of January next, and at the same time in fourth year thereafter, the President shall cause a statement to be laid before Congress of the accounts of all District Attorneys; Collectors of the Customs; Naval Officers and Surveyors of the Custom; Navy Agents; Receivers of Public Moneys for Lands; Paymasters in the Army; Surveyors General of the Public Lands; the Apothecary General; The Assistant Apothecaries General; The Commissary General of Purchases; and of all others under the authority of the Executive Government of the United States, who hold any office charged with the collection or disbursement of public moneys, and who shall have failed to account for all such moneys, on or before the thirtieth day of September preceding; and the offices held by all such defaulting officers, shall be vacated, from and after the date of said message.

Sec. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That, in all nominations made by the President to the Senate, to fill vacancies occasioned by an exercise of the President's power to remove from office, the fact of the removal shall be stated to the Senate, at the same time that the nomination is made with a statement of the reasons for which such officer may have been removed.

Sec. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That the first and second sections of an act, entitled "An act to limit the term of office of certain officers therein named, and for other purposes," approved the thirteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, shall be, and the same hereby are, repealed.

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*A bill to regulate the appointment of Postmasters.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That, from and after the — day of — next, no person shall be appointed Postmaster to any Post Office, the emoluments of which exceed the sum of — hundred dollars per annum, except by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, upon a nomination from the President.

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*A bill to regulate the appointment of Cadets.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That, from and after the — day — next, the appointment of Cadets to the Military Academy, shall be apportioned among the several States and Territories, and the District of Columbia, as follows: to each State, a number equal

to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which it may be entitled in Congress; to each Territory, one; to the District of Columbia, —; and the appointments shall be so made in each State, as to take one Cadet from each electoral district when the State shall have been divided into such districts, or one from each Congressional district, when it shall not have been so divided, and two from the State at large.

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
*A bill to regulate the appointment of Midshipmen.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, from and after the — day of — next, the number of Midshipmen to be appointed in the Navy shall be apportioned among the several States and Territories, and the District of Columbia, as follows: to each State, a number equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which such State may be entitled in Congress; to each Territory, one; to the District of Columbia, —: and the appointments shall be so made in each State, as to take one Midshipman from each electoral district, when the State shall have been divided into such districts, or one from each Congressional district, when it shall have not been so divided, and two from the State at large; and no person shall be appointed Midshipman unless he be, at the time of his appointment, above fourteen, and under twenty-one years of age.*

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*A bill to prevent Military and Naval Officers from being dismissed the service at the pleasure of the President.*

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That commissions issued to the Officers in the Army and Navy of the United States, shall no longer be made out with a clause, importing that they are “to continue in force during the pleasure of the President of the United States, for the time being;” but shall be made out with a clause, declaring that they are “to continue in force during your good behaviour;” and no officer shall ever, hereafter, be dismissed the service, except in pursuance to the sentence of a Court Martial, or upon an address to the President from the two Houses of Congress.*

DOCUMENTS FROM THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

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The Committee of the Senate of the United States upon the reduction of Executive Patronage, having, by their resolution, of the 27th of February last, called upon the several Departments of Government in the following form:

*Resolved*, That the Chairman of this Committee be instructed to address notes to the Secretaries of State, Treasury, War and Navy, and to the Postmaster General, requesting of them information on the following points:

1st. The *number* of persons who hold places, and the *tenure* thereof, in their several Departments, or under their control, including the Officers of the Army and Navy, the Custom House, Contractors of every description, and the number and description of appointments *annually* made.

2d. The amount annually distributed in each Department to the Officers and Contractors, as abovementioned, distinguishing the amount of salary, or other compensation prescribed by law, and that which is fluctuating, and dependent upon the will of the President, or the officer at the head of either of the Departments.

3d. A detailed statement of the amount annually paid for printing, in each of the Departments, for the three last years, and the amount required for the same object during the present year; with a list of the public newspapers in which the laws and advertisements have been inserted by authority, and those selected for that purpose for the present year.

The Secretary of the Treasury, having referred the same to the Register, with directions to cause statements to be formed, having for their object a reply to the call of said Committee, affecting the Treasury Department, begs leave to Report :

The number of persons, the tenure of whose office is at the pleasure of the President of the United States, (having received their appointment by the consent of the Senate of the United States,) are exhibited in statement No. 1.

No. 2, exhibits the number of Clerks employed in each office attached to the Treasury Department, and the amount of their annual compensation.

No. 3, exhibits the number of Collectors of the Customs, Naval Officers and Surveyors, &c. of Clerks and other subordinate Officers connected with the collection of the Revenue.

No. 4, contains the names of Contractors in relation to the Treasury Department, and the amount of compensation under the control of, with the appointments annually made by, the Secretary of that Department.

No. 5, is a detailed statement of the amount annually paid for printing in the Treasury Department, and an estimate of the amount that will be required for the same object during the present year; with a list of the public papers in which the advertisements have been inserted during the last three years. The advertisements from the Treasury Department are usually inserted in the same papers in which the laws are published.

Under the authority of the Act of the 26th of March, 1824, four persons are annually appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury to examine the books and accounts of the Receivers at the several Land Offices, for which service they are allowed six dollars per day, and six dollars for every twenty miles travelling.

#### EXTRA CLERKS.

There have been employed extra Clerks occasionally during the last three years, in the office of the Secretary of the Treasury, of the Register, and in that of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, in preparing transcripts of land reports, bank correspondence, and copies of surveys and statements, required by sundry resolutions of Congress. Their compensation has been made from the Contingent Fund of the Treasury Department, and in the aggregate has averaged to those several persons per annum, - - \$2,083 33

## DOCUMENTS FROM THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

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POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT, 8th March, 1826.

SIR : In answer to the resolution of the Committee of the Senate, on the reduction of Executive Patronage, I have the honor to state, that there are about six thousand Post Masters, and between seven and eight thousand Assistant Post Masters and Clerks; they all hold their appointments at the pleasure of the Post Master General.

There are nine hundred and fifteen Contractors, and about three thousand Sub-contractors and carriers of the mail. The contracts are made for four years, and are so divided, as to require the annual renewal of about one-third of them, three years in four.

The amount of compensation to Post Masters for the last year, ending the last day of September, was four hundred and four thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and thirty-two cents.

In the same time, there was paid to contractors, \$784,080 11 cents. The amount paid for transporting the mail, is fixed by contract, and is only increased when additional services are required. No discretion is given to the Post Master General to increase the compensation of Post Masters, beyond what they now receive—he may reduce it at pleasure. No agents are permanently employed by this department, to visit Post Offices and correct abuses; they are occasionally engaged in this business, and are paid generally, three dollars per day, in addition to their expenses.

The printing of the department, not including the publication of proposals for mail contracts, in the year 1823, amounted to \$2,567 52; in the following year to \$2,973 45; and in the year 1825, to \$6,466 45. In this year, the amount was greatly increased by the printing of about ten thousand pamphlets, containing a statement of the Post Offices, &c. and about the same number of the Post Office laws, instructions, &c.

The amount paid for the publication of proposals, as also the papers in which such publications were made, will appear from the papers enclosed, to which the Committee are respectfully referred.

No selection of papers has been made for the advertisements of the current year. The expense of publishing proposals, will be much greater this year than it was last year, as there will be many more contracts to make—the amount will probably not exceed five thousand dollars.

1. The tenure of the office of Aid-de-Camp is the pleasure of the General.

2. The amount of annual compensation to an Aid-de-Camp, exclusive of his pay, &c. in the line, which he receives in common with other officers of the army, is about \$552, and is prescribed by law.

3. No expense is incurred for printing in the Office of the General-in-Chief, nor for any other object embraced in third paragraph of the communication from the Military Committee.

NOTE.—The above statement is made to meet what is believed to be the object of the second clause of the resolution of the Committee on Executive Patronage, namely, to exhibit a view of all allowances made to Officers of the Army, whether supplied *in kind*, or commuted for *in money*—though the language of the resolution would seem to comprehend such only of the latter description as would properly come under the denomination of “salary or compensation.” It is to be observed in respect to most of these allowances, that they are nothing more than *necessary means* afforded by the Public to enable the officer to discharge his appropriate duties with effect, and cannot be regarded as “salary or compensation.” The Forage allowance cannot be availed of, unless the officer actually keep in service the number of horses for which he demands it; and he must do so, whether he draw it in kind or receive the commutation of eight dollars per month for each horse, as established by law. He cannot, therefore, derive any *gain or emolument* whatever, from that allowance, and it consequently forms no part of his “compensation,” since he is obliged to incur an expense fully equal to what he receives. So it is with Transportation. He must travel *under orders on public duty*, to entitle him to the allowance, which is designed solely to *reimburse* the expense to which he is put for *stage fare*. In other words, he must first incur the expense, before he has any claim to the allowance, for it is purely a reimbursement. The only allowance comprehended in this statement which can be said to constitute a part of an officer's “compensation,” is, that of Quarters and Fuel, and this results from the fact, that, unlike the other allowances which result from the nature of the duties which the public exact of him, they are necessities of life, which cannot be dispensed with in any situation. Habitually, all allowances derived through the Quartermaster's Department, are supplied *in kind*. The only one for which a commutation of money is authorized by *law*, is that of Forage, and when

this is availed of, it is drawn through the Pay Department. Quarters generally belong to the Public, and are assigned to the officers by the Quartermaster's Department, according to the scale exhibited in this statement. If, however, there be no *public* quarters at a post where an officer is stationed on duty by competent authority, they are rented on the best terms by an officer of the Department, who pays the rent direct to the landlord. Fuel is procured by contract, or by the labor of the troops, and issued to the officers according to rank, in the quantities exhibited above. As a general rule, these allowances are never commuted for money, but are always supplied in kind. The only exception to this rule, is in regard to officers engaged in staff duties at this City, where they receive a commutation in lieu of those allowances, viz. for Quarters to the Major General, \$36 per month—to officers of the second class, \$27 per month—to officers of the third class, \$24 per month—to officers of the fourth class, \$15 per month—and to all, \$4 50 per cord for the Fuel to which they are respectively entitled. A commutation also exists for Transportation, when the officer moves on duty without troops, and for the sake of practical convenience, a fixed rate of allowance has been established.

It will be seen, from the preceding remarks, that but few of the allowances are of a permanent and fixed character—that is, due at all times and under all circumstances. Forage depends upon the contingency of “keeping the horse in actual service.” Transportation on that of being “compelled to travel on public duty,” the per diem allowance, on being “obliged to incur extra expense in travelling, and sitting on Courts Martial,” Quarters and Fuel, on that of being “regularly assigned to duty at a post,” by the competent authority.

SIR: In obedience to your order requiring answers to several inquiries made by the Committee of the Senate on Executive Patronage, I have the honor to submit Statements A and B, containing all the information which this department can furnish, in detail, on the subjects referred to by the Committee.

The amount paid to contractors is very inconsiderable: for it has been generally found more advantageous to the public to obtain the necessary supplies in the vicinity of the posts at which they are required, by open purchase, rather than by contract.

Payments for supplies or services are, in all cases, made by the subordinate officers of the department, whose official transactions are subjected to the most rigid scrutiny at this office.

The amount of money distributed, annually, to the officers of the department, depends on the wants of the service, and generally equals the whole appropriation.

No particular newspapers are selected by the authority of this office, for the publication of advertisements, but each officer is allowed to select for that purpose the paper most convenient to himself. Printing forms a very small item in our expenditures, and I have no data on which an accurate report of the amount paid can be made, as the accounts of the department are not retained in this office, but, after being examined, are sent to the Treasury.

The papers taken for the use of the office are, the Philadelphia Price Current, the United States' Telegraph, and the Missouri Intelligencer.

Sir: In obedience to your order requiring answers to several inquiries made by the Committee of the Senate on Executive Patronage, I have the honor to submit Statements A and B, containing all the information which this department can furnish in detail on the subjects referred to by the Committee.

The amount paid to contractors is very inconsiderable; for it has been generally found more advantageous to the public to obtain the necessary supplies in the vicinity of the posts at which they are required by open purchase, rather than by contract.

Payments for supplies or services are, in all cases, made by the subordinate officers of the department, whose official transactions are subject to the most rigid scrutiny at this office.

The amount of money disbursed, annually, by the officers of the department depends on the wants of the service, and generally equals the whole appropriation.

No particular newspapers are selected by the authority of this office for the publication of advertisements, but each officer is allowed to select for that purpose the paper most convenient to himself. Printing forms a very small item in our expenditures, and I have no data on which an accurate report of the amount paid can be made, as the accounts of the department are not retained in this office, but after being examined, are sent to the Treasury.

The papers taken for the use of the officers are the Philadelphia Price Current, the United States Telegraph, and the Missouri Intelligencer. I have the honor to be, Sir, your obedient servant.

ENGINEER DEPARTMENT, *May 8, 1826.*

SIR: In pursuance of your instructions, I have the honor to make the following report, to be appended to my report of the 24th ult. relative to information called for by the Committee of the Senate on Executive Patronage.

In my report of the 24th ult. the statement accompanying it is referred to as containing complete, the information under the first head, relating to places held and appointments made, and the fact of there being no accounts kept in this office is assigned as a reason for the blanks in the statement relating to the second and third heads not being filled up.

It is proper, therefore, in explanation of the following statement of places held, and of moneys distributed, which are not included in the statement alluded to, to state, in relation to the former, that the persons now to be reported, were considered to be contingently employed only, and not as holding places under the Engineer Department; and, in relation to the latter, that, although an account is kept in the Engineer Department of the moneys distributed through it, the individuals to whom the moneys are distributed are not held accountable to the Engineer Department for the same, except in relation to its application, but to the Accounting Department, in the books of which they are charged therewith.

The persons contingently employed, as above stated, under the Engineer Department, during the year 1825, comprised 25 officers of artillery and 7 officers of infantry, who were employed on topographical duty.

The moneys distributed through the Engineer Department, in the year 1825, to officers and contractors, amounted to \$867,775 67, of which \$8000 was sent to Mr. Brown, the contractor for improving the navigation of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, and the residue, \$859,775 67, was distributed to 16 officers of the Corps of Engineers, 8 officers of Topographical Engineers, 1 officer of Artillery, 2 officers of Infantry, 2 Civil Engineers, 3 Assistant Civil Engineers, 1 Superintendent of Roads, 2 Superintendents of Construction, and 3 Commissions for surveying and making Roads.

A portion of the amount distributed as above stated, was applied to the payment of salaries and other compensations, but there are no means in this office of stating the amount, or any particulars respecting it, except in relation to salaries paid to clerks employed in the office of the Chief Engineer, amounting to \$2150.

It may be proper, however, to state, that, by the existing regulations of the War Department, officers employed in exploring, reconnoitering, or surveying, if they have not received transportation and quarters for the time, are allowed, while actually engaged, at the rate of \$1 50 per diem, and persons disbursing under the Engineer De-

partment, are allowed  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on the amount disbursed, provided the compensation shall not exceed the rate of \$2 a day.

It is proper, also, to state that, although the officers employed on topographical duty received the per diem, in lieu of transportation and quarters, the amount paid on account of this compensation was inconsiderable, by reason of the period for which it was received having been limited to the time during which those who received it were actually engaged; and that, although the compensation for disbursing amounted in some instances to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. the average was probably less than  $\frac{2}{3}$  per cent. as will be understood by the fact of nearly \$700,000 of the amount distributed having been sent to 6 officers, the aggregate of whose compensation for disbursing the same could not exceed \$4,380. SIR: Conformably to the instructions contained in your letter of the 1st inst. transmitting a copy of a communication from the Chairman of the Committee of the Senate on Executive Patronage, I have the honor to report that, by an act of Congress, dated March 2d, 1821, two Military Storekeepers are allowed for the Purchasing Department, who receive, each, as compensation, the pay and emoluments of a captain of infantry; one of them is allowed a clerk, whose salary is \$900 per annum.

In this office three clerks are employed, for whose united salaries the appropriation for 1825 was \$3500, and for the messenger, \$700 per annum.

The number of persons with whom contracts were made, during the year 1825, was 48. The principal part of the supplies for the army was manufactured by them. Their names, the nature of their engagements, &c. are stated in detail, in a communication made to the War Department, dated on the 31st of December, 1825, and the sums distributed amongst them, and persons employed in cutting out



SIR: In obedience to your instructions, I have the honor to state, that two permanent clerks are employed in this office, under the act of the 20th of April, 1820, whose aggregate compensation amounts to \$ 2,150 per annum.

One officer of the army, (a first lieutenant,) is detailed for duty according to established usage\* for more than ten years, (and whose services are indispensable,) who receives \$ 1 25 per diem, in addition to his pay in the line.

One temporary clerk, at \$ 25 per month, is now, as formerly, employed by authority of the War Department; and a soldier of the line is also employed as a clerk, whose pay is equal to a sergeant's. (B.)

*Documents from the Navy Department.*NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 1, 1826.*

SIR: I have had the honor to receive your letter of the 27th February, 1826, enclosing a copy of a resolution of the Committee of the Senate upon the reduction of Executive patronage.

It is difficult to furnish a more full answer to the inquiries of the committee, than may be found in the documents which are annually presented to Congress. I therefore enclose copies of those of the present, adding a few remarks by way of explanation.

The Naval Register of this year, enclosed, furnishes the names and number of officers and salaries of all persons belonging to this Department, or under its control. See particularly the recapitulation in page 27. The Secretary and Commissioners of the Navy, hold their appointments by nomination of the President, and consent of the Senate. The Clerks in both offices by appointment from the head of the office.

The Captains, Master Commandants, Lieutenants, Surgeons, Surgeons' mates, Purasers, Chaplains, officers of the Marine Corps, and Navy Agents, hold their offices by the appointment of the President and consent of the Senate.

Midshipmen, Sailingmasters, Boatswains, Gunners, Carpenters, Sailmakers, are appointed by warrant from the President. See act of Congress, April 21, 1806, and others.

Storekeepers and Naval Constructors by letter from the Department.

The whole are considered as removable, like other officers, by the President.

No regular number of these officers is appointed annually—vacancies are filled as they occur.

As the pay of these officers is prescribed by the acts of Congress on the subject, passed 25th February, 1799, 27th March, 1804, and 18th April, 1814, and is contained in the 27th page of the Naval Register, before referred to, it is not supposed necessary here to repeat it. The pay of those officers mentioned in the Register, and not in the laws referred to, is fixed by regulation.

The allowances which are made to any of these officers, are stated in the estimates accompanying the report to the President, at the commencement of the session, with as much minuteness as it would be possible to exhibit, were an attempt made here to repeat them; and to those estimates reference is, therefore, respectfully made.

Of the sums paid to the several officers, under what are usually termed contingent expenses, no account could be rendered in one year which will answer for any other year. Depending upon the services performed, they vary every week and month. Those of the past year, will be found in the report dated 5th January last. Those of previous years, in the reports of those years. The whole amount of this kind of payment, is found in the appropriation bills, and need not here be

repeated. But the sums so paid, are not *salary* or *compensation* for service, but a payment to the officer for the expenses to which he has been subjected by the orders of the Government. As for example, travelling expenses, while travelling under the orders of the Department. The names of the Contractors who supply the various articles required for the service, as well as the price which is paid to them, will be found minutely stated in the report of Contracts, dated 16th January, 1826, to the Senate and House of Representatives. The amount paid to each of these Contractors cannot be stated; but by an examination of each of their accounts, as settled at the Treasury Department. That amount, however, is always governed by the articles furnished, and the sums agreed to be paid, and cannot be regarded as salary or compensation. In addition to the foregoing, there are, in our vessels and at our navy yards, various persons employed at the will of the Commandant, the Commissioners of the Navy, and the Secretary of the Navy, as the duties to be performed require. They are employed and dismissed at pleasure, being no longer detained than their services are absolutely necessary. Their compensation is sometimes daily, sometimes annual, but always determined by the Department, and paid by fixed regulations. Their numbers cannot be stated, for they vary every month and year, as the necessities of the service require. Nor can the amount received by them be stated, for it varies with their number. They are not, in fact, to be considered as officers, being employed in the same manner as other laborers upon wages.

They are always estimated for by the Department, and, by a reference to the Report and estimates at the beginning of the session, it will be perceived, that those to be employed in the present year, are all specifically enumerated, with the sums which they are to receive. The appropriation bill for the Navy is founded on this estimate.

The annual appropriation bills furnish, under the several items, the amount annually distributed among all the officers and Contractors; and it is impossible to furnish more definite or accurate information on this point than is contained in those laws. The amount varies as Congress directs.

I have the honor to enclose a detailed statement of the sums paid during the past year for printing, &c. This sum also varies every year as the necessities of the service require it, and the sums appropriated by Congress authorize.

I also enclose, from the Navy Commissioners, a list of the public newspapers in which the advertisements are inserted by the authority of the Board.
