

JOHN H. PEASE.

Mr. CUSHMAN, from the Committee on Commerce, made the following

REPORT:

The Committee on Commerce, to which was referred the petition of John H. Pease, report:

That it appears from the statement of the petitioner, that he was master of a coasting vessel running between Nantucket and New Bedford, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; that in April, 1836, he incurred a fine, under the 9th section of the coasting act of 1793, of fifty dollars, which he paid to the collector of Nantucket, by whom he was then informed that it was within the power of the Secretary of the Treasury to remit said fine, provided the said Secretary was satisfied that there was no wilful neglect or fraud intended on the part of the petitioner. He accordingly prepared a petition to the Secretary of the Treasury, making a fair representation of the whole case; upon which the above-mentioned forfeiture was refunded, in pursuance of an act of Congress passed the 3d March, 1798. In about a year after said sum was refunded, the petitioner was required to restore the same, on the ground that it had been refunded to him without authority; and agreeable to which request, the petitioner again paid the above-mentioned sum to the collector aforesaid, for the benefit of the United States. It is admitted at the Treasury Department that the above statement is substantially true; and the committee, concurring with that Department in the opinion that there was no wilful neglect or fraud intended on the part of the petitioner, therefore report a bill for his relief.

In about a year after said sum was remitted, the petitioner was required to restore the same, on the ground that it had been remitted to him without authority; and agreeable to which request, the petitioner again paid the above-mentioned sum to the collector aforesaid, for the benefit of the United States. It is admitted at the Treasury Department that the above statement is substantially true; and the committee, concurring with that Department in the opinion that there was no willful neglect or fraud intended on the part of the petitioner, therefore report a bill for his relief.
