WAR DEPARTMENT, *December 17, 1838.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit, for the consideration of the Committee of Ways and Means, a communication from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, showing the necessity for an appropriation of \$10,000 to enable the Department to effect the survey of the lands assigned to the Choctaw and Creek Indians west of the Mississippi. I respectfully request the co-operation of the committee in obtaining such an appropriation.

SIR: By the 2d article of the treaty with the Choctaws of September 27, 1830, the United States agree to convey to the nation "a tract of country west of the Mississippi river, in fee simple, to them and their descendants;" and by the treaty with the Creeks of February 14, 1833, the United States stipulated to "grant a patent, in fee simple," for the land assigned them in the 2d article." In both instances it was provided that these grants should be executed immediately after the ratification of the treaties. This has not been done, as the surveys necessary to an accurate description of the lands have not been completed. These surveys are, for the Creeks, as follows: beginning at the southwest corner of the Cherokee lands, and running south about sixty miles, to Canadian river; thence

down that river, with its meanders, to its junction with the north fork. The whole distance is estimated at 406 miles. For the Choctaws, the surveys will begin at the termination of the western Creek boundary on Canadian river, and run south, about 120 miles, to Red river; thence down that river, with its meanders, to the western line of the State of Arkansas. The whole distance will be about 466 miles. Making the aggregate surveys for the two tribes about 872 miles. I am not prepared to submit an estimate, in detail, of the cost of executing this work. In the opinion of Mr. Isaac McCoy, from whom the above computation of distances has been derived, the sum of \$10,000 will be required. A patent has been recently prepared for the Cherokees, which will soon be ready for transmission to them. Many obvious considerations of policy combine with the obligation to meet fully all the treaty engagements with these tribes, to indicate the propriety of making the surveys as preliminary to the issuance of the patents.

As a contract will be made for the completion of these surveys, I think it will be prudent to appropriate the above amount, leaving to this department the arrangement of the terms and other necessary particulars; and recommend it accordingly.
