REPORT :

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the petition of Samuel Crapin, for arrears of pension, have had the same under consideration, and report :

That the petitioner asks that he may be allowed a pension from the time of his discharge from the army, in 1815, to the time of his being placed on the pension roll in 1838. The petitioner does not state the reason for not applying for a pension at an earlier period, and if he did not apply for a pension when he was entitled to receive it, his not getting it was his own fault; and the committee do not feel willing to provide for such case of neglect, even if his claim for a pension for the period claimed was well established, which it is not; and, therefore, report—that the prayer of the petitioner ought not to be granted.
