*Of the letting of the printing for the 30th Congress, under the joint resolution of the 3d August, 1846, and the contracts relating to the same.*

MARCH 2, 1847.

Read, and ordered to be printed.

The undersigned have the honor to report to the House, that, in pursuance of the joint resolution of the 3d August, 1846, advertisements were published for four weeks successively in all the newspapers printed in the city of Washington for proposals for executing the printing of the 30th Congress; that sealed proposals were received from various persons, (fifteen in number,) which were duly opened as required by the said resolution; that after a full examination and comparison of all the proposals, it was ascertained that Messrs. Cornelius Wendell and Packard Van Benthuysen, of the State of New York, were the lowest bidders for the printing of the first, second, third, and fourth classes, and Messrs. Andrew Tippin and Jacob Streeper, of the State of Pennsylvania, for that of the fifth class; and that contracts and bonds, with security deemed sufficient, have been executed by those persons, for the execution of the printing for which their proposals were accepted.

Copies of the advertisement, (marked B,) of the proposals, (numbered 1 to 15,) a comparative statement of the proposals, (marked E,) and of the contracts and bonds, are herewith submitted.

To the honorables GEORGE M. DALLAS, *Vice President of the United States*; J. W. DAVIS, *Speaker of the House of Representatives*; ASBURY DICKINS, *Secretary of the Senate*; B. B. FRENCH, *Clerk of the House of Representatives*:

GENTLEMEN: In obedience to your order of the 9th of January, the duties therein assigned have received an unremitted attention, and the undersigned now begs leave to submit the following report:

The order is contained in the following words, viz:

"Ordered, That the secretary of the meeting collect the necessary materials, showing the quantities of each kind of printing executed for the Senate and House of Representatives for the twenty-eighth, being the last Congress of which the printing has been completed, excluding only such portions of those quantities as are excluded by the existing laws, and which cannot, therefore, be required for the thirtieth Congress; and that upon this data he proceed to make calculations showing the cost of each description and the aggregate cost of the whole printing of Congress for each class, as designated by the joint resolution of the 3d of August, 1846, at the respective rates contained in the proposals made in pursuance of the advertisement of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives, dated the 7th December, 1846, and which have been this day opened according to law."

It is proper to state, that in the execution of this order the quantities of the descriptions of printing coming under the several classes have been carefully taken from the accounts of the printers that have been paid and closed, and therefore contain all the matter executed for the entire Congress, excluding only the printing of the agricultural part of the report from the Commissioner of Patents, which has been discontinued, and the double composition of documents that may be ordered to be printed by both houses of Congress, which has been expressly prohibited by the joint resolution of the 3d of August, 1846, and which directs that the expense of composition "shall be paid by the House which shall have first ordered the printing of the paper or document."

It is also necessary to state, as it appears not to have been generally understood, that the practice of charging for composition and press-work, &c., of blank pages, where they can possibly be avoided, has long since been discontinued in the accounts for the printing of Congress, as may be seen by an inspection of those accounts on record, so that a proposition to charge for them could not now be entertained without a violation of the established practice, and of the joint resolution of Congress "in relation to the manner of executing the printing ordered by either house of Congress," approved the 24th May, 1828, upon which that practice is founded, and which declares "that the whole matter shall follow in close order, from the first page."

Regard has therefore been paid, in the calculations, to these existing provisions of law, and the practice founded upon them.

Where the forms of the proposals have deviated from the common standard prescribed in the advertisement of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives, it has been necessary to assimilate them, where practicable, to the common form, in order to insure to each a just position on the common platform of comparison, according to the actual terms of each bid.



To present an intelligible view of the entire ground upon which these calculations are based, it is necessary to append hereto—

1st. The "joint resolution directing the manner of procuring the printing for the two houses of Congress," approved the 3d August, 1846, marked A.

2d. The advertisement of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives, dated the 7th December, 1846, marked B.

3d. The joint "resolution in relation to the manner of executing the printing ordered by either house of Congress," approved the 24th May, 1828, marked C.

4th. The proposals of the several individuals and firms, marked D, and numbered from 1 to 15 inclusive.

In the execution of this trust it has been deemed proper to make a full statement of the bid of each individual and firm for each of the first four classes, and of each of the parts of the fifth class, so that the manner of calculation and the means by which the result has been ascertained in each case may be seen and understood.

The result of these calculations, together with a detailed tabular statement of the terms of each bid for each class, showing particularly the amount or effect of each separate part of such bid upon the quantity of each description of composition and press-work, are embodied in a general statement, concluding with a table of the aggregate amount of the proposals of each individual and firm for the printing of all the classes for the entire Congress, with the average amount of the whole. This statement is herewith submitted, marked E.

From these calculations and statements it will be seen that Messrs. Cornelius Wendell and Packard Van Benthuyzen are the lowest bidders for the first, second, third, and fourth classes of the printing, and that Messrs. Andrew Tippin and Jacob Streeper are the lowest bidders for the fifth class of the printing, for the thirtieth Congress.

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### A.

JOINT RESOLUTION directing the manner of procuring the printing for the two houses of Congress.

*Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and they are hereby authorized and required, at the beginning of the final session of every Congress, to advertise for four weeks successively, in all the newspapers published in the city of Washington, for sealed proposals for supplying the Senate and House of Representatives, respectively, of the next ensuing Congress, with the necessary printing for each; which advertisement shall describe the kind of printing and the quality of paper required, as near as may be, in the execution of the work; and said advertisement shall divide and classify the printing of the respective houses as follows: One of bills and

resolutions; one of reports of committees; one of journals; one of executive documents; and one for every other description of printing: each class to be a separate job, and to be provided for by separate contract. The said advertisement shall also contain a designation of the place in the said city of Washington where such sealed proposals shall be received, and the day and time of day at which said Secretary and Clerk will cease to receive any further proposals; and the Secretary and Clerk aforesaid shall provide suitable samples of the printing required, and of the paper on which the same is to be executed, to be kept at the place so designated as aforesaid at least twenty days successively before the time of receiving proposals shall expire, open to the inspection of all persons desiring to make proposals for the printing aforesaid, intelligence whereof shall be contained in said advertisement. Immediately on the expiration of the time for receiving said proposals, they shall be opened by the Secretary and Clerk aforesaid, in the presence of the Vice-President or President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and of such persons making proposals as may wish to be present. And the Secretary of the Senate, under the supervision of the Vice President or President of the Senate, and the Clerk of the House of Representatives, under the supervision of the Speaker, shall thereupon let each class of said printing to the lowest bidder, who shall furnish satisfactory evidence of his practical skill and his ability to do the work, and who shall offer good and sufficient security for the faithful execution of the jobs and contracts undertaken by him. And thereupon the Vice President or President of the Senate and its Secretary, and the Speaker of the House and its Clerk, shall proceed to take bonds, with good and sufficient security, for the due and faithful performance of the work; and the officers aforesaid shall immediately thereafter report to their respective houses all such lettings of printing, and the contracts relating to the same: *Provided*, That the said proposals shall remain sealed until the time appointed for examining the same.

SEC. 2. *And be it further resolved*, That a committee, consisting of three members of the Senate and three members of the House of Representatives, shall be chosen by their respective houses, which shall constitute a Committee on Printing, which shall have power to adopt such measures as may be deemed necessary to remedy any neglect or delay, on the part of the contractor, to execute the work ordered by Congress, and to make a pro-rata reduction in the compensation allowed, or to refuse the work altogether, should it be inferior to the standard; and in all cases the contractor and his securities shall be responsible for any increased expenditure consequent upon the non-performance of the contract. The committee shall audit and pass upon all accounts for printing; but no bill shall be acted upon for work that is not actually executed and delivered, and which they may require to be properly authenticated.

SEC. 3. *And be it further resolved*, That all motions to print extra numbers of any bill, paper, or document, in either house, shall be referred to the members of the committee of that house, who shall report upon the propriety of printing and the probable expense thereof, as early as convenient. And all expenses for printing shall be paid from the contingent fund of the two houses, in proportion to the number of copies ordered by each, except the expense of composition, which shall be paid by the house which shall have first ordered the printing of the paper or document; and if there shall be a second composition, it shall be paid for by the house

which shall authorize and direct the same; and when extra copies of any document or paper shall be ordered by both houses, they shall be delivered to the two houses simultaneously, in proportion to the number of copies by them respectively ordered.

SEC. 4. *And be it further resolved*, That all laws and parts of laws now in force, not in conformity with the provisions of this joint resolution, be and the same are hereby repealed.

*Printing of Congress.*

In compliance with the "joint resolution directing the manner of procuring the printing for the two houses of Congress," approved August 3d, 1846, sealed proposals will be received by the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives for supplying the Senate and House of Representatives, respectively, with the necessary printing for each for the thirtieth Congress. The proposals will be received at the office of the Secretary of the Senate, in the Capitol at Washington, until Saturday, the 9th day of January, 1847, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and no longer; and suitable samples of the printing required, and of the paper on which the same is to be executed, will be kept at the said office until that time, open to the inspection of all persons desiring to make proposals. Each class of printing, including the printing for the Senate and the printing for the House of Representatives, will form one separate job, and is to be provided for by a separate contract.

The first class consists of bills and joint resolutions, to be printed with English type, double-leaded, folio size, on cap paper of good quality, suitable for writing on. The proposals must state the price per page for composition, and the price per page for press-work, paper, folding, and stitching for 1,000 copies, and in proportion for a less number. Of the first class there are now printed for the Senate 770 copies of Senate bills and resolutions of a public nature, 554 of a private nature, and 75 copies of such bills and resolutions of the House of Representatives as may be reprinted for the Senate. Of the first class there are now printed for the House of Representatives 535 copies of bills and resolutions.

The second class will consist of reports of committees, with such documents and papers as may accompany them, with an index to the whole, to be printed on royal paper of good quality, with small pica type, in octavo pages of the same size as required by the joint resolution of the 3d of March, 1819. Where the matter suitable for a page cannot be brought into the octavo form with small pica type, brevier will be used. The proposals must state the price per page for composition for small pica plain and small pica rule; brevier plain and brevier rule; and the price per page for press-work, paper, folding, and stitching for 1,000 copies, and also for any greater num-

ber not exceeding 1,500 copies. Where the construction of tables belonging to this class requires them to be printed in a form larger than octavo, but to be folded in octavo, the proposals will state the price per 1,000 ems for composition in brevier rule work, and the price per 1,000 copies for the press-work, paper, folding, and stitching of each table, and also for any greater number not exceeding 1,500.

Of the second class there are printed for the Senate 1,214 copies, and for the House of Representatives 1,335 copies.

The third class will consist of the journals of each house, with the appendix, tables, and index thereto; to be printed in the same manner as the printing of the second class, and the proposals to state the same as is required for the second class.

Of the third class there are now printed for the Senate 1,150 copies, and for the House of Representatives 1,335 copies.

The fourth class will consist of the executive documents, embracing messages from the President, reports from the several executive departments, offices, and bureaus, and the documents and statements communicated therewith, with an index to the whole, to be printed in the same manner as the second class.

Proposals to state the same as is required for the second class. The number of copies of this class now required to be printed for the Senate is 1,214, and for the House of Representatives 1,335 copies.

The fifth class will consist of every other description of printing, and will be divided as follows:

*Part A.*—Resolutions of State legislatures, memorials and petitions, and all other papers or documents not included in parts B and C, and to be printed in octavo. This part of the fifth class to be printed in the same manner as the printing of the second class, and the proposals are to state the same as is required in the second class. Of part A, of the fifth class, 1,214 copies are now printed for the Senate, and 1,335 copies for the House of Representatives.

*Part B.*—Treaties and other documents ordered to be printed in confidence for the use of the Senate, to be printed in the same manner as the second class.

Proposals to state as required for the second class, except that the price per page for the press-work, paper, folding, and stitching will be stated for 100 copies, and in proportion for a less number. Part B is for the Senate alone.

*Part C.*—Tabular statements of the orders of the day, lists of yeas and nays, circular letters, and all other printing of a miscellaneous character, in cap folio, post quarto, or royal octavo, not herein specified.

Proposals will state the price per 1,000 ems for composition, in whatever type may be required, and the price per page per hundred copies of each of the above sizes; or where the matter to be printed cannot be so computed, the price per hundred copies, including composition, press-work, and paper, will be stated.

The proposals will state the per centage deduction on the price for press-work, paper, folding, and stitching, for furnishing additional copies of documents in royal octavo form, and of tables in larger form belonging to either of the foregoing classes; that is to say: the per centage deduction for any number exceeding 1,500 and not exceeding 5,000; for any number exceeding 5,000, and not exceeding 10,000; for any number exceed-



ing 10,000, and not exceeding 20,000; and for any number exceeding 20,000 copies.

Each person is required to furnish, with the proposals, satisfactory evidence of his practical skill and his ability to do the work, and to offer at the same time good and sufficient security for the faithful execution of the jobs and contracts proposed to be undertaken by him.

The proposals will be opened in the manner required by law, on Saturday, the 9th day of January, 1847, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Vice President's chamber, in the Capitol.

For a full understanding of the resolution of Congress upon the subject of this printing, a copy of the same is appended to and made a part of this advertisement.

### C.

RESOLUTION in relation to the manner of executing the printing ordered by either house of Congress.

*Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That, after the termination of the present session of Congress, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives so to regulate and direct the printing of the respective houses as to abolish the practice of making "title pages" to executive documents, reports of committees, memorials, or any other documents, unless the same shall be so directed by them, and that the whole matter shall follow in close order, from the first page. And they shall further direct that the printing of the yeas and nays of the journal shall be in consecutive order, as ordinary matter. They shall also so regulate the printing of the executive documents as to have the respective communications from the President and heads of departments bound in distinct volumes; and they may also so change the form of the volume, by increasing its size, as to combine the greatest quantity of matter with the greatest economy in the execution of the work.
