HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,

February 27, 1852.

*Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Delaware in General Assembly met,* That while the people of the State of Delaware sympathize with all nations, who are striving to establish free governments; yet they recognize the great law of nations, which assures to each of them the right to manage its own internal affairs in its own way, and to establish, alter or abolish its government at pleasure, without the interference of any other power, and they have not seen, and are firmly convinced that the United States government ought not again to see without deep concern the violation of this principle of national independence.

*Resolved,* That our senators in Congress and our representatives be, and they are hereby requested to urge upon Congress the adoption of a resolution expressive of this principle of national independence, as laid down in the foregoing resolution.

*Resolved,* That copies of these resolutions be signed by the Speakers of both houses respectively, and transmitted by them to each of the senators and representatives of the State, in Congress of the United States, to be laid before their respective houses.
