PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES,
COMMUNICATING,

In answer to a resolution of the Senate requesting a list of claims of citizens of the United States against foreign governments, a report of the Secretary of State.

JANUARY 20, 1859.—Read. Motion to print referred to the Committee on Printing.

JANUARY 24.—Report in favor of printing the usual number submitted, considered, and agreed to.

To the Senate of the United States:

In compliance with the resolution of the Senate of the 14th June last, requesting a list of claims of citizens of the United States on foreign governments, I transmit a report from the Secretary of State, with the documents which accompanied it.

The Secretary of State, to whom was referred the resolution of the Senate of the 14th of June last, requesting the President “to cause to be prepared and communicated to the Senate, at the commencement of the next session, a list in tabular form, setting forth—

“1st. The names of such complainants or claimants, citizens of the United States, as have preferred complaints or claims against foreign governments to the executive department of the government, for aggressions or spolations or other demands against such governments.

“2d. The amount claimed.

“3d. A brief abstract of the nature of the claim, and the action of the Executive in relation thereto.

“4th. The result of such action and the amount of satisfaction obtained, if any.

“Said list to commence on the 1st January, 1816”—has the honor

to lay before the President the list of claims called for by the resolution, with the exception of those on the late republic of Colombia, which will be presented in a supplementary report in the course of a few days.

This list has been prepared with as much accuracy as the records and files of this department would permit.

Claims are in many instances represented by agents or attorneys, and where the names of principals are not disclosed by the files of the department it has been deemed proper to refer only to the name of the vessel giving rise to the claim.

From various obvious causes, it has been found difficult to state the *amounts* claimed. In several cases, preferred directly to the department, there is a total absence of such information; and our diplomatic agents, in referring to such as have been originally presented at the legations, frequently omit all mention of the amounts. And in those cases where amounts are stated, whether as claimed or paid, it has not been practicable always to designate the relative proportions of principal and interest embraced therein.

The files of the department do not always afford positive information as to the claims which have been settled. Some have been made the subject of personal correspondence between the claimant and the ministers, and adjusted without the necessity of reporting the facts to the department; some have been partially paid, while others have been allowed and are in course of liquidation, but it has been found impracticable in several cases to ascertain with exactness either the measure or restitution agreed upon or the instalments paid thereon.

This statement of claim was received October, 1841, and, by instructions, was pressed upon the British government by the envoy of the United States, 1842 and 1843. It was not presented by the claimant to the London Commission acting under the convention of February 8, 1853.	The government of Great Britain, in reply to the representations of the envoy of the United States, stated that the colonial government of New Zealand was <i>ordered</i> in March, 1841, to recognize and confirm <i>all bona fide</i> purchases made from the New Zealanders by <i>aliens</i> prior to January, 1840, and, in case of want of proof of the good faith of the transactions, such <i>aliens</i> should be dealt with in like manner as British subjects making like claim: which orders and proceedings were recognized and adhered to by the British government in 1844 in the case of a Belgian claimant. The before mentioned order of 1841 confirmed to aliens bona fide purchases made by them prior to 1840, although made at prices less than <i>five shillings</i> sterling per acre, whilst British subjects were required to show payments at that rate in order to be entitled to confirmation of grants of land obtained by them from the natives prior to the proclamation of British sovereignty.

		vention of the Executive of the United States was applied for September, 1858. The archives of the government record this claim to have been presented in different guise in 1841, and to have then received the prompt action of the United States, and to have been met by the measures of relief on the part of the British government, noted in the statement here above next preceding. But the claimant now maintains that the order of the metropolitan government of 1841 was only partially obeyed by the colonial authority, and that the relief, apparently conceded by such partial obedience, has been made a nullity by the judgment of the colonial court; that no order of the British ministry can be of avail to contravene the fundamental law of Great Britain; that an alien cannot take in fee and convey real estate in land by title good in law.
