Baker, who together with said Guthrie, were lost while attempting to render assistance on the occasion of the said wreck, shall be entitled to, and shall receive out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, as follows, to wit: the relatives in the order named of the persons connected with the Huron, hereinbefore referred to, a sum equal to twelve months' sea-pay of each person lost; the relatives of Captain J. J. Guthrie as hereinbefore indicated, one year's full pay of said deceased; and the relatives in the order named, of the persons lost of the steamer B. and J. ## II.—NEW OFFICES CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Prepared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]

*By the act (No. 16) to authorize the coinage of the standard silver dollar and to restore its legal-tender character.*

The President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, is authorized to appoint three commissioners on behalf of the United States to attend a proposed conference between certain European nations and the United States for the purpose of adopting a common ratio between gold and silver, establishing internationally the use of bi-metallic money, and securing fixity of value between those metals.

Said commissioners each to receive \$2,500 and their reasonable expenses, to be approved by the Secretary of State.

*By the act (No. 41) to prevent the introduction of contagious or infectious diseases into the United States.*

The Surgeon-General of the Marine Hospital Service is charged with the execution of the act, and medical officers of the Marine Hospital Service and customs officers are required to aid in the enforcement of the national quarantine rules and regulations established by said act, but without additional compensation except actual and necessary traveling expenses.

Officers and agents of any State or municipal quarantine system, at any port of the United States, shall, upon application of the respective State or municipal authorities, be authorized and empowered to act as officers or agents of the national quarantine system and shall be clothed with all the powers of United States officers for quarantine purposes, but shall receive no pay or emoluments from the United States.

*By the act (No. 49) authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to employ temporary clerks, and making an appropriation for the same; also making appropriations for detecting trespass on public lands, and for bringing into market public lands in certain States, and for other purposes.*

The Secretary of War is authorized to employ in the record and pension division of the Surgeon-General's office during the balance of the present fiscal year, clerks and laborers in addition to the clerical force already provided by law:

One clerk of class four, one clerk of class three, two clerks of class two, twenty-eight clerks of class one, and two laborers at \$720 each.

*By the act (No. 55) making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

At the Naval Asylum, Philadelphia, Pa.: One assistant cook and one laundress, at \$168 each.

Marine Corps: The sum of \$10,000 is appropriated for ten clerks and two messengers, but no specific salaries are established.

Naval Academy: One attendant at recitation rooms, at \$20 per month.

Pay of employés in the department of steam enginery: For master machinist, boiler-maker, and pattern-maker, at \$3.50 per day each; one machinist, one blacksmith, one moulder, at \$2.50 per diem each; and two laborers, at \$1.50 per diem each.

*By the act (No. 63) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Agents of Indian Affairs: At the Nevada agency and at the Western Shoshone agency, at \$1,800 each per annum; and at the Gros Ventres agency, at \$1,000 per annum.

Interpreters: One additional for Nevada, namely, Western Shoshone agency, at \$300 per annum; one additional for the Gros Ventres in Montana, at \$300 per annum; one additional for the tribes in the Indian Territory, to be assigned as the Secretary of the Interior may direct, at \$300 per annum.

Out of appropriations for contingencies of the Indian service, the Secretary of the Interior is hereby, at his discretion, authorized to employ two special Indian agents at large, at a compensation not exceeding \$2,000 each per annum.

Pay of Indian police: For the services of not exceeding four hundred and thirty privates, at \$5 per month each, and not exceeding fifty officers, at \$8 per month each, of Indian police, to be employed in maintaining order and prohibiting illegal traffic in liquor on the several Indian reservations.

*By the act (No. 73) regulating the appointment of justices of the peace, commissioners of deeds, and constables within and for the District of Columbia, and for other purposes.*

The President of the United States is authorized to appoint as many commissioners of deeds throughout the United States as he may deem necessary, and as many notaries public, residents of the District of Columbia, as in his discretion the business of the said District may require.

*By the act (No. 79) to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to constitute superintendents of mints or assayers in assay-offices assistant treasurers of the United States.*

Superintendents of mints and assayers of assay-offices may be constituted by the Secretary of the Treasury assistant treasurers of the United States, without additional compensation, to receive gold coin and bullion on deposit for the purposes provided for in section 254 of the Revised Statutes.

*By the act (No. 80) providing a permanent form of government for the District of Columbia.*

In lieu of the board of health, the Commissioners of the District of Columbia shall appoint a physician as health officer, at a salary of \$3,000 per annum; also, on recommendation of health officer, they may appoint not exceeding six sanitary inspectors for said District, at a salary not exceeding \$1,200 per annum each.

*By the act (No. 81) making appropriations for the support of the Military Academy for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Clerk to adjutant in charge of cadet records, at \$1,200 per annum.

*By the act (No. 93) to provide for the appointment of a district judge for the western district of Tennessee, and for other purposes.*

There shall be appointed by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a district judge for the western district of Tennessee, who shall, from and after the time of his appointment, hold the terms of the United States district court in said district at the times and places required by law, and shall be paid the same salary and in the same manner as the judge of the middle and eastern districts of Tennessee, and shall exercise all the circuit and district court power and jurisdiction now conferred on said judge and said court.

*By the act (No. 101) to regulate the practice of pharmacy in the District of Columbia.*

Immediately after the passage of the act, and biennially thereafter, or as often as necessary, the Commissioners of the District of Columbia shall appoint three pharmacists and two physicians, all of whom shall have been residents of the District of Columbia for five years, and of at least five years' practical experience in their respective professions, who shall be known and styled as Commissioners of Pharmacy for the District of Columbia, who shall serve without compensation, and who shall hold office for two years and until their successors are appointed and qualified.

*By the act (No. 109) to organize the Life-Saving Service.*

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint, when in his opinion necessary for the proper administration of the Life-Saving Service and the protection of public property at the stations, a district superintendent of the Life-Saving Service for the coast of the United States bordering on the Gulf of Mexico, whose compensation shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per annum; and also a keeper, at a compensation of \$400 per annum, at each of the stations authorized to be established by the act.

The President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, may appoint a suitable person, familiar with the various means employed in the Life-Saving Service for the saving of life and property from shipwrecked vessels, as general superintendent of the Life-Saving Service, who shall, under the immediate direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, have general charge of the service and of all administrative matters connected therewith, and whose compensation shall be at the rate of \$4,000 per annum, and the Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint an assistant to the general superintendent, whose compensation shall be \$2,500 per annum.

The Secretary of the Treasury may detail such officer or officers of the Revenue Marine Service as may be necessary, to act as inspector and assistant inspectors of stations, who shall perform such duties, in connection with the conduct of the service, as may be required of them by the general superintendent.

*By the act (No. 121) to create an Auditor of Railroad Accounts, and for other purposes.*

A bureau of railroad accounts is established in the Interior Department; the auditor thereof is authorized to be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, at an annual salary of \$5,000; and, to assist the said auditor to

perform the duties of said office, the Secretary of the Interior shall appoint one book-keeper, at an annual salary of \$2,400; one assistant bookkeeper, at an annual salary of \$2,000; one clerk, at an annual salary of \$1,400; one copyist, at an annual salary of \$900.

*By the act (No. 134) making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Two additional clerks of class four, one in the office of the First Comptroller of the Treasury and one in the office of the First Auditor, under the act providing a permanent form of government for the District of Columbia.

S. Dana Horton is named as secretary of the International Monetary Conference, authorized by act of February 28, 1878, at a compensation of \$2,500; and, in addition thereto, a sum sufficient to pay his reasonable expenses, to be approved by the Secretary of State.

The enlisted force of the Signal Corps is fixed at one hundred and fifty sergeants, thirty corporals, and two hundred and seventy privates (an addition of fifty enlisted men), who shall receive the pay of engineer soldiers of similar grades; and two sergeants may, in each year, be appointed to be second lieutenants.

To enable the Secretary of the Interior to restore and reconstruct the Patent Office building, under report and specifications to be submitted by a commission of three practical men skilled in the art of building, the appointment of such commission is authorized, the members of which shall be allowed compensation at the rate of \$10 per day.

Six watchmen are authorized to be employed day and night on the Capitol grounds, under the direction of the Architect of the Capitol, at \$660 each per annum.

Congressional Library: Three additional assistants, at \$1,200 each per annum.

*By the act (No. 135) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Senate:

Clerk to the Committee on Pensions, at \$2,200; messenger to the Committee on Appropriations, to be appointed by the committee, at \$1,440; telegraph operator, by the year, at \$1,200.

House of Representatives:

One assistant librarian, at \$1,440; one page under Clerk of the House and one page under the Sergeant-at-Arms, at \$60 per month each; one assistant clerk to the Committee of Ways and Means, and one assistant clerk to the Committee on Appropriations, at \$1,200 each; clerk to the Committee on Invalid Pensions, at \$2,000. The superintendent of the folding-room is authorized to appoint one foreman, at \$1,500, and one page, at \$500.

Office of Public Printer:

One clerk of class one.

Library of Congress:

Three assistant librarians, at \$1,000.

Office of President of the United States:

One stenographer, at \$1,800. Also the following additional employés for the Executive office in lieu of those detailed from other departments, namely: One clerk of class four, one clerk of class two, and one clerk of class one; one telegraph operator, at \$1,200, and four messengers, at \$1,200 each.

Department of State:

Two clerks of class two.

Treasury Department:

Secretary's Office: Seven clerks, at \$1,000 each; and six firemen, at \$720 each. Consolidated Division of Loans and Currency: Four clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Office Supervising Architect: One clerk of class one.

Office of First Comptroller: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Office of Second Comptroller: Three clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Office of Commissioner of Customs: Three clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Office of First Auditor: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each; one assistant messenger and one clerk, at \$1,000, in the Division of Loans.

Office of Second Auditor: Eight clerks at \$1,000 each, and one assistant messenger.  
 Office of Third Auditor: Two clerks of class one, seven clerks at \$1,000 each, four clerks at \$900 each, one assistant messenger, and three laborers.  
 Office of Fourth Auditor: Three clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of Fifth Auditor: Three clerks, at \$900 each.  
 Office of the Auditor of the Treasury for the Post-Office Department: Five clerks of class one, five clerks at \$1,000 each, and ten charwomen at \$180 each.  
 Office of Treasurer: Five clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of Register of the Treasury: Two clerks at \$1,000 each, and two clerks at \$1,000 each, for the Division of Loans.  
 Office of Comptroller of the Currency: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Bureau of Statistics: Three clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Bureau of Engraving and Printing: One stenographer, \$1,600; one clerk of class three, one clerk of class two, one clerk at \$1,000, and two assistant messengers.  
 Office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue: Three clerks of class one, and thirteen clerks at \$1,000 each; ten special agents, in addition to the number named in section 3152 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and at the compensation therein named. The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to employ eight additional special agents in the customs service, at a compensation of not exceeding six dollars per day in the discretion of the Secretary, and actual traveling expenses when actually employed in the duties of such agency.  
 Independent treasury: One clerk at \$1,600, and one assistant detective at \$1,400.  
 Office of the assistant treasurer at Boston: Assistant paying-teller, at \$2,000.  
 Office of assistant treasurer at Chicago: One clerk, at \$1,200.  
 Office of assistant treasurer at New Orleans: One clerk, at \$1,000.  
 Mint at New Orleans, Louisiana: Cashier, \$2,000; chief clerk, \$2,000; weigh-clerk, deposit-clerk, and bookkeeper at \$1,600 each, and assayer's clerk at \$1,600.  
 Assay-office at Boise City, Idaho Territory: One clerk, at \$1,000.  
 Assay-office at Charlotte, North Carolina: The assayer is authorized in case of necessity to employ a clerk at not exceeding \$1,000 per annum.

#### Government in the Territories:

One chaplain in each branch of the respective Territorial legislatures, at \$1.50 per day, to be paid only during the sessions of said legislatures.

#### War Department:

One stenographer, at \$1,800; one clerk, at \$1,000.  
 Office of the Adjutant-General: Six clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of the Commissary-General: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of the Surgeon-General: Fourteen clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of the Chief of Ordnance: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of the Paymaster-General: Three clerks, at \$1,000 each.  
 Office of the Chief of Engineers: One clerk, at \$1,000.  
 Public Buildings and Grounds: One watchman in Smithsonian grounds, at \$660, and one watchman for Judiciary Square, and one for Lincoln Square and adjacent reservations, at \$660 each.

#### Navy Department:

Two clerks of class one, and three clerks at \$1,000 each.  
 Bureau of Yards and Docks: One clerk, at \$1,000.  
 Bureau of Equipment and Recruiting: Two clerks of class one.  
 Bureau of Construction and Repair: One clerk of class one.  
 Bureau of Steam-Engineering: One clerk of class one, and one clerk at \$1,000.  
 Bureau of Medicine and Surgery: One clerk, at \$1,000.

#### Department of the Interior:

One law-clerk in the office of the Assistant Attorney-General of the Interior Department, at \$2,250; two clerks of class four, and three copyists.

General Land Office: Six clerks at \$1,000 each, and two assistant messengers.

Indian Office: Six clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Pension Office: Twenty-five clerks of class one, ten clerks at \$1,000 each, and five copyists at \$900 each.

United States Patent Office: One librarian, at \$2,000; seven permanent clerks at \$1,000 each, and twenty copyist-clerks at \$900 each.

#### Post-Office Department:

One clerk of class four; one law clerk, at \$2,250, in the office of the Assistant Attorney-General for the Post-Office Department; one female laborer, at \$480.

Office of First Assistant Postmaster-General: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each.

Office of Second Assistant Postmaster-General: One chief of division of inspection at \$2,000, and four clerks at \$1,000 each.

Office of Third Assistant Postmaster-General: Six clerks at \$1,000 each, and five laborers.

Office of superintendent of money-order system: One clerk at \$1,000, and two clerks at \$900 each.

Office of chief of division of mail depredations: One clerk, at \$1,000.

Department of Agriculture:

Two clerks of class 2, who shall be practical printers.

Office of the Solicitor of the Treasury:

One clerk of class 4, and one clerk of class 3.

The President:

The President is directed to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a commission consisting of three persons, one of whom shall be a Rear-Admiral of the Navy, one of whom shall be a colonel of Engineers, and one shall be chosen from civil life, whose duty it shall be to select a site, within the District of Columbia, for the United States Naval Observatory, such site to possess relatively the advantages of healthfulness, clearness of atmosphere, convenience of access from the city of Washington, and such other advantages as may be found expedient, and to report fully thereon, including estimates of the total expense of said site and the removal of the observatory, to the next session of Congress. No compensation is provided by the act.

*By the joint resolution (No. 1) in relation to the International Industrial Exposition to be held in Paris in 1878.*

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a commissioner-general, to represent the United States at the International Exposition at Paris in 1878, and twenty additional commissioners, no two of whom shall be from any one State, one of whom shall be assistant commissioner-general, and shall perform the duties of commissioner-general in case of his death or disability. The allowance to the said commissioner-general for salary and personal expenses not to exceed \$5,000 for his whole term of office, and the allowance to the twenty additional commissioners for salary and personal expenses not to exceed \$1,200 each, and not including such clerical services as may be allowed by the commissioner-general, which shall not exceed \$15,000.

The President may also appoint, on the nomination of the governors of the several States, two honorary commissioners from each of the several States, and may appoint twenty-four additional honorary commissioners, among whom there shall be at least one resident of each of the Territories of the United States. Said honorary commissioners to report on such special subjects as the commissioner-general may direct, and to serve without pay or other expense to the United States.

III.—THE OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

*By the act (No. 38) requiring the commissioner for preparing and publishing a new edition of the Revised Statutes of the United States to revise and perfect the index to the first volume of the same.*

The commissioner for preparing and publishing a new edition of the Revised Statutes of the United States is authorized to revise and perfect the index to volume one of said new edition.

To receive therefor such additional compensation as shall be allowed by the Secretary of State.

*By the act (No. 63) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Agents of Indian affairs at the following-named agencies: Yakama agency, Crow agency, Fort Peck agency, Navajo agency, La Pointe agency, and San Carlos agency, at \$2,000 each per annum; increase, \$500 each.

Red Cloud agency, Spotted Tail agency, and Cheyenne and Arapahoe agency, at \$2,200 each per annum; increase, \$700 each. Flandreau agency, and Sac and Fox agency, Iowa, at \$1,000 each per annum; increase, \$400 each.

Blackfeet agency, Papago agency, and Pima and Maricopa agency, at \$1,800 each per annum; increase, \$300 each.

Standing Rock agency, at \$1,700 per annum; increase, \$200. Nez Percés agency, Yaneton agency, Los Pinos agency, Osage agency, and White Earth agency, at \$1,600 each per annum; increase, \$100.

In case of the consolidation of two or more agencies, the sums appropriated for the salaries of agents at said agencies, or so much thereof as may be necessary, may be used, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Interior, to increase the salary of the agent who shall remain or be placed in charge of the consolidated agency; provided that in no case shall such salary exceed the sum of \$2,200 per annum.

*By the act (No. 85) making appropriations for the payment of invalid and other pensions of the United States for the year ending June 30, 1879.*

Pension agents shall receive, in lieu of all other percentage, fees, pay, and allowances now provided by law, a salary of \$4,000 per annum; \$15 for each 100 vouchers, and same rate for each fraction of 100 vouchers prepared and paid by said agents in excess of 4,000 vouchers per annum; and actual and necessary expenses for rent, fuel, lights, and postage on official matter directed to departments and bureaus at Washington; subject to approval by Secretary of Interior. Amount of increase not stated.

*By the act (No. 88) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878, and prior years, and for those heretofore treated as permanent, for reappropriations, and for other purposes.*

Salary of Indian agent at the Mission agency in California, \$1,300 per annum; increase, \$700.

*By the act (No. 109) to organize the Life-Saving Service.*

The compensation of the keepers of life-saving stations and lifeboat stations and houses of refuge is fixed hereafter at the rate of \$400 per annum; and they shall have the powers of inspectors of customs, but shall receive no additional compensation for duties performed as such; increase, \$200 each.

*By the act (No. 134) making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Salary of surgeon-in-chief of Freedmen's Hospital and Asylum, Washington, D. C., \$2,000; increase, \$600.

*By the act (No. 135) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, and for other purposes.*

Enrolling clerk of the Senate, at \$2,592 per annum; increase, \$372.

Stationery clerk of the House of Representatives, \$1,800 per annum; increase, \$200.

Four messengers under the Postmaster of the House of Representatives, at \$1,200 per annum each; increase, \$200.

Chief clerk to the Public Printer (formerly clerk of class four), at \$2,000; increase, \$200.

Department of State: Two clerks, at \$1,000 each; increase, \$100 each.

Treasury Department: One chief of Division of Customs, at \$2,750 (formerly chief of division, at \$2,500 (?)); increase, \$250.

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to pay to all employés of the Treasury Department discharged by the provisions of the act one month's pay.

Comptroller of the Currency: Additional to bond clerk, \$200.

Office of assistant treasurer, Saint Louis: Four watchmen, at \$720 each; increase of \$20 per annum each.

Office of Director of the Mint: Examiner, \$2,300; increase, \$300; one computer of bullion, \$2,200; increase, \$200.

Mint at New Orleans, La.: Melter and refiner, at \$2,500; increase, \$500.

Assay-office at Helena, Mont.: Assayer in charge, \$2,500; increase, \$500.

Department of the Interior.—Chief clerk of department, \$2,500, and \$200 additional as superintendent of the Patent-Office building; increase, \$200.

Patent Office: One trade-mark examiner, at \$2,400; increase, \$150.

Post-Office Department: Chief of division of mail depredations, at \$2,250; increase, \$250; one messenger (as clerk of class one), \$1,200; increase, \$300.
