COMMERCIAL RELATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES, 1910.

INTRODUCTION.

There was a general improvement in trade conditions between the United States and foreign countries during the calendar year 1910 compared with the previous year. According to data prepared by the United States Bureau of Statistics, the total imports of merchandise into the United States for the calendar year 1910 were valued at \$1,562,904,151, as compared with \$1,475,520,724 for 1909 and \$1,116,374,087 for 1908. Exports of domestic and foreign merchandise were valued at \$1,866,258,904, against \$1,728,198,645 for 1909 and \$1,752,835,447 for 1908. These figures show that the American purchases increased in value \$87,383,427 over 1909 and \$446,530,064 over 1908, and the American exports gained \$138,060,259 over 1909 and \$113,423,457 over 1908.

The trade of the United States with its neighboring countries showed a marked improvement. The imports from Canada were valued at \$103,256,955, a gain of \$15,946,074 over 1909 and \$31,893,352 over 1908, and the exports to that country amounted to \$242,209,233, an increase of \$54,479,850 over 1909 and \$89,584,475 over 1908. These figures show that the United States sold \$138,952,278 worth more goods to Canada during 1910 than was purchased by the United States from that country. The share of the United States in the total trade of Canada during 1910 was 52 per cent, as compared with 49 per cent the previous year.

There was a gain of \$10,345,592 over 1909 and \$17,396,895 over 1908 in the value of the American shipments to Mexico. The total imports from that country to the United States during 1910 was \$61,092,502, and the sales to Mexico amounted to \$63,858,939.

COMMERCE OF EUROPEAN COUNTRIES.

The United Kingdom leads all countries in the trade with the United States. That country purchased American merchandise valued at \$550,913,288 during 1910, a large gain over the preceding year, while the United States imported from the United Kingdom articles valued at \$270,890,309, an increase of \$23,425,197. It is therefore seen that the value of the American sales to the United Kingdom is more than double the American purchases from that country. Cotton is the principal item shipped to the United Kingdom, followed by meats, wheat, lard, leather, corn, tobacco, and live animals. The principal purchases from the United Kingdom were textile goods, tin, rubber, chemicals and drugs, hides and skins, and iron and steel and their manufactures.

Germany comes second in the value of the total trade with the United States, that country taking \$258,372,326 worth of American goods during 1910 and the American purchases from that country amounting to \$166,536,719. Cotton, phosphates, lumber, oils, corn, wheat, and feedstuffs are the principal articles shipped to Germany.

France sold \$5,969,554 worth more goods to the United States during 1910 than was shipped from the United States to that country, the amounts being \$121,797,225 and \$115,827,671, respectively. There was a large decrease in the shipments of raw cotton, which is the principal import into that country from the United States, compared with 1909. Other important exports are copper, oils, tobacco, wood, machinery, and cereals and flour. The total trade decreased as compared with 1909.

Belgium, Italy, Greece, Netherlands, Portugal, Sweden, Turkey in Europe, and Denmark decreased their purchases from the United States compared with 1909, while Austria-Hungary, Switzerland, Norway, Russia in Europe, and Spain increased their imports.

SOUTH AND CENTRAL AMERICA AND THE WEST INDIES.

Most of the South American countries increased their trade with the United States over 1909. In the imports to the United States Argentina comes first with merchandise valued at \$42,776,982, a gain of \$6,488,990. The imports from that country amounted to \$32,050,322, an increase of nearly \$5,000,000. Brazil, however, exports more merchandise to the United States than the shipments from the other South American countries combined. Although there was a decline of \$13,346,494 in the exports compared with 1909, the total American purchases from that country for 1910 amounted to \$103,716,231, coffee and rubber being the principal items.

The exports from the United States to the Central American States during 1910 were valued at \$32,152,137, a gain of nearly \$4,000,000 over 1909. Panama led with imports amounting to \$21,530,112, followed by Costa Rica, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Honduras, and Salvador, in the order given. The American purchases from those countries amounted to a little over \$13,000,000.

In the American trade with the West Indies there was a gain of \$9,565,928 in the sales of American goods to Cuba compared with 1909. The imports from that island increased over \$20,000,000. Of the total shipments to the United States sugar amounted to over \$100,000,000 and tobacco over \$12,000,000. Both the import and export trade with British West Indies declined somewhat. Haiti and the Dominican Republic increased their sales to and their purchases from the United States.

CHINA, JAPAN, INDIA, AUSTRALASIA, AND AFRICA.

China decreased its purchases from but increased its sales to the United States, due principally to the larger shipments of silks, which is the principal item in the purchases from China. The

American trade with Japan in both imports from and exports to that country increased \$5,649,546 and \$3,094,341, respectively, over 1909. There was an increase in both the import and export trade with the British East Indies. The imports to the United States were valued at \$70,308,967, a gain of \$870,590 over 1909, and the sales to that country amounted to \$10,002,167, an increase of \$292,935. The principal imports into the United States from British India are jute and manufactures, and hides and skins, and the principal shipments to that country are oils, machinery, and cotton goods. The sales to the Dutch East Indies increased, but the American purchases from that country decreased.

There was a large gain in exports from the United States to Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand, and other British Oceania, shipments to those countries in 1910 amounting to \$38,345,781, a gain of \$7,498,531 over 1909. Purchases from the same sources, however, decreased \$377,354. Both the American import and export trade with the Philippine Islands showed a large gain, the total shipments to the islands amounting to \$19,941,539 compared with \$13,791,595 for 1909, and the imports into the United States being valued at \$18,040,745 and \$13,556,916 for the two years, respectively.

American trade with British, German, and Portuguese Africa increased, while that with French Africa decreased. British South Africa is the principal market for American goods, the shipments to that country amounting to \$11,411,609 for 1910 as compared with \$8,453,439 for the previous year.

EUROPE.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

The foreign trade of Austria-Hungary for the calendar year 1910 increased in value more than \$34,000,000 over 1909. This gain was in both imports and exports, with a heavy excess of imports. The returns for 1910 showed record figures of imports and exports, but were accompanied by the greatest adverse balance of trade in the history of the country, viz., over \$90,000,000. The following table shows the imports into and the exports from Austria-Hungary, by groups, for 1909 and 1910:

BELGIUM.

The general improvement in the foreign trade of Belgium continued during 1910. The imports for home consumption, according to Belgian statistics, amounted to \$823,137,414, and the exports of domestic products, \$657,633,666, compared with \$714,933,039 and \$542,276,592, respectively, the previous year. The customs duties collected amounted in 1910 to \$12,999,689, against \$11,771,169 in 1909.

According to Belgian statistics the imports from the United States during 1910 amounted to \$44,618,898, against \$53,498,056 in 1909, and the exports from Belgium to the United States were \$22,608,985 and \$20,667,984, respectively. The exports to the Philippine Islands in 1910 were valued at \$451,257 and to Porto Rico at \$90,341, both islands showing increased purchases over 1909.

DENMARK.

The value of the goods imported into Denmark for consumption in 1910 was \$152,760,000, while the exports of Danish goods for the same period were valued at \$128,640,000, the imports exceeding exports by \$24,120,000. These figures do not include transactions in gold, of which the imports in 1910 amounted to \$1,474,000 and the exports to \$1,072,000. The excess of imports over exports in 1910 was \$8,844,000 less than in 1909 and was less than half the excess of imports over exports in 1907. This improvement in the Danish trade balance is due exclusively to Danish agriculture. The exports of agricultural products in 1910 amounted to \$117,116,000, while the imports of agricultural supplies amounted to only \$52,528,000.

GREECE.

According to the official Government statistics the foreign trade of Greece for 1910 amounted to \$57,137,536, as compared with \$45,802,636 in 1909. The value of imports was \$30,591,423, against \$26,229,994 in 1909, and exports \$26,546,113, against \$19,572,642 in 1909. The duty collected on goods imported into the Kingdom amounted to \$8,500,086, showing an increase of \$840,855 over 1909.

ITALY.

Italy's foreign trade, exclusive of precious metals, aggregated \$1,006,104,118 in 1910, as against \$960,869,783 in 1909. The imports were valued at \$618,507,078, an increase of \$17,946,971, and the exports at \$387,597,040, a gain of \$27,287,364. The excess of imports over exports in 1910 was \$230,910,038, as compared with \$240,250,431 in 1909.

NETHERLANDS.

The imports of coffee into the Netherlands during 1910 amounted to 1,442,100 bags, against 1,743,700 bags in 1909. Of the quantity received in 1910, 1,178,500 bags were from Santos, Brazil; 116,800 bags from Java, 65,300 bags from Central America, 34,700 bags from Venezuela, 28,700 bags from Africa, 17,100 bags from Padang, Menado, and Macassar, and 1,000 bags from other East India places.

During 1910 the Netherlands Trading Co. sold 31,207 bags of coffee, as compared with 54,207 bags in the previous year.

Notwithstanding the high prices paid by American buyers for Sumatra tobacco, the auction prices were generally lower than the cost of production. The total Sumatra crop was sold for \$13,800,000, or \$4,800,000 less than in 1909. There were 249,692 packages offered at the inscriptions at Amsterdam and 24,033 packages at Rotterdam.

The imports of raw sugar into the Netherlands during 1910 amounted to 124,632,200 pounds, as compared with 137,088,400 pounds in the previous year. Of the imports in 1910 Belgium supplied 60,209,600 pounds; Germany, 29,033,400 pounds; Netherlands Indies, 19,144,400 pounds; and other countries, 16,244,800 pounds. The exports of raw sugar from the Netherlands during 1910 amounted to 106,374,400 pounds, and of refined sugar 213,015,000 pounds, against 98,098,000 pounds and 237,272,200 pounds, respectively, in 1909. The United Kingdom took 304,389,800 pounds of raw and refined sugar in 1910. The quantity of nutmegs imported in 1910 was 2,222,000 pounds, against 2,664,000 pounds in 1909. The stock on hand at the close of 1910 was 112,000 pounds.

Banda mace was imported to the amount of 627,000 pounds in 1910, as compared with 807,400 pounds in 1909. The visible supply at the end of 1910 was 66,000 pounds.

The total amount of pepper imported into the Netherlands during 1910 was 2,070 tons, against 2,818 tons in 1909.

The receipts of rice in the Netherlands during 1910 were 3,279,000 bags, as compared with 3,071,000 bags in 1909.

The value of the exports to the United States invoiced through the American consulate general at Rotterdam and the consular agencies during 1910 was \$9,571,027, against \$8,110,928 for 1909. The principal shipments and their value were as follows: Hides and skins, \$1,290,359; fish, \$1,242,752; linseed oil, \$797,424; plants, \$815,816; and bulbs, \$609,097. The exports from the Amsterdam district amounted to \$21,578,367, compared with \$23,058,491 for 1909. Diamonds represented \$10,655,753 and tobacco \$5,826,605.

NORWAY.

The foreign trade of Norway for 1910 was valued at \$183,498,800, made up of \$107,761,000 imports and \$75,737,800 exports. Swedish goods in transit are not included in the above figures. Such goods amounted to \$7,272,400, of which \$5,470,000 consisted of iron ore from Swedish mines exported through Narvik, northern Norway, and the balance of wood pulp, paper, and matches exported through Trondhjem and Christiania.

The value of the exports to the United States invoiced through the American consulates in 1910 was \$7,205,884, Christiania and agencies leading with \$4,151,743, Stavanger \$1,712,662, and Bergen \$1,341,479. The principal exports from Christiania and agencies were: Wood pulp, \$2,410,501; hides and skins, \$302,952; fish, \$521,750, and paper, \$337,372. The exports from Stavanger and Bergen were mostly fish.

PORUGAL.

The foreign commerce of continental Portugal, which, for administrative and statistical purposes, includes also the Azores and Madeira, for 1910 amounted to \$155,585,000. The imports, including goods in transit and coin and bullion, were valued at \$94,684,000, and the exports \$60,901,000. Exclusive of goods in transit and coin and bullion the imports were valued at \$69,506,843 and the exports \$35,724,072.

The leading imports in 1910 were: Cotton, \$5,658,472; coal, \$4,151,672; metals, \$5,163,368; wheat, \$4,033,206; sugar, \$2,535,937; automobiles, 298, valued at \$615,085. The imports from the United States consist principally of cotton, lumber, mineral oils, tobacco, and wheat.

The leading exports were: Wine, \$12,416,928, of which \$582,506 was Madeira and \$6,705,936 was Port wine; cork and corkwood, \$3,530,711; sardines in oil, \$1,697,295; copper ore, \$942,614. The reexported colonial goods were: Cacao, \$8,693,804; coffee, \$673,243; and rubber, \$5,626,522.

SERVIA.

The total foreign trade of Servia for 1910 was valued at \$35,135,147, against \$32,137,751 for 1909. The imports were \$16,146,258, an increase of \$1,953,986, and the exports \$18,988,889, an increase of \$1,043,410. The imports from the United States were valued at \$202,250, a gain of \$34,348 over 1909, and exports to the United States amounted to \$907,624, a decrease of \$15,080.

Germany leads in the value of imports into Servia, followed by Austria-Hungary, Great Britain, Turkey, Italy, France, Switzerland, Russia, Roumania, and the United States, in the order named. CANARY ISLANDS.

The value of the import and export trade of the Canary Islands during 1910 was estimated at \$18,000,000. The direct imports from the United States into Teneriffe during 1910 were: Petroleum, 90,000 gallons; tobacco leaf, 139 tons; manufactured tobacco, 1 ton; and wood, 1,481 tons. Great Britain participates to a greater extent in the import and export trade of these islands than all other countries combined, including Spain.

The exports to the United States, according to invoices certified at the American consulate at Teneriffe, were valued at \$50,831 in 1910, against \$85,525 the previous year. Of the total, onion seed amounted to \$35,994. The exports from Grand Canary to the United States consisted of cochineal valued at \$18,855, against \$11,712 for 1909.

SWEDEN.

The total foreign trade of Sweden for 1910 amounted approximately to \$341,968,000, of which the imports were estimated at \$182,240,000, and the exports at \$159,728,000, showing a balance against the country of \$22,512,000. In 1909 the imports were \$165,302,000 and exports \$126,737,000.

Exports to the United States from the consular agency at Sundsvall amounted to \$129,045, against \$150,826 in 1909, and consisted of chemical wood pulp \$128,409, and sulphite paper \$636. Exports to the Philippines, consisting of petroleum stoves and iron, amounted to \$5,505, against \$2,870 in 1909. The exports from Malmo to the United States were valued at \$405,313, as compared with \$645,186 for 1909. Enameled ware made up \$131,350, wrapping paper \$98,332, wood pulp \$59,305, and cocoa butter \$36,323.

SWITZERLAND.

The foreign commerce of Switzerland reached a record figure in 1910, the aggregate being \$561,578,047, as compared with \$515,916,181 during the previous year, an increase of \$45,661,866. TURKEY.

According to Turkish returns, the value of the imports into the country for the fiscal year ended March 13, 1910 (the latest statistics available), was \$147,276,997, and the exports \$80,073,168. UNITED KINGDOM.

The aggregate foreign trade of the United Kingdom was greater in 1910 than in any previous year. This increase is partially accounted for by the higher prices of commodities. The total imports into the country amounted to \$3,300,737,807, exports of British products and manufactures \$2,094,467,492, and reexports \$505,026,410. NEWFOUNDLAND.

The total value of the foreign trade of Newfoundland for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1910, amounted to \$24,624,693, against \$22,251,250 for the preceding year. The imports into the colony increased from \$11,402,337 in 1909 to \$12,799,696 in 1910, and the exports increased from \$10,848,913 to \$11,824,997. The total value of imports on the free list amounted to \$5,062,958, and those on the dutiable list to \$7,736,738. Imports from the United States amounted to \$4,571,192; Canada, \$4,559,759; the United Kingdom, \$2,940,401; British West Indies, \$315,650; and other countries, \$412,694.

Of the exports for the fiscal year 1910, Brazil took more than any other country, its share being \$2,100,691. Other leading customers of the colony were: United Kingdom, \$1,824,235; Portugal, \$1,693,798; Canada, \$1,454,314; Italy, \$1,198,019; and the United States, \$1,163,313.

MEXICO.

The foreign trade of Mexico during the calendar year 1910 amounted to \$245,885,803, United States currency. The imports were valued at \$107,061,955 and the exports \$138,823,848. The share of the United States in the import and export trade was \$61,029,681 and \$105,357,236, respectively.

The purchases from the United Kingdom were valued at \$600,889. HONDURAS.

According to the report of the Minister of Finance, the total imports into Honduras for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1910, were valued at \$2,695,907, an increase of \$114,355 over the previous year, and the exports \$2,472,996, a gain of \$482,395. The United States furnished 68 per cent of the imports, Great Britain 11 per cent, Germany 9 per cent, and France 3 per cent. Of the exports, 87 per cent went to the United States.

The exports invoiced at the American consulates for shipment to the United States during the calendar year 1910 were valued at \$3,517,459. The principal shipments from the following districts were: Tegucigalpa and agencies, precipitates \$627,504, cyanid products \$199,788, sarsaparilla \$33,489; Puerto Cortes, bananas \$935,221, rubber \$72,336; Ceiba and agencies, bananas \$1,122,943, mahogany logs \$152,904, coconuts \$120,727.

NICARAGUA.

According to British consular reports the foreign trade of Nicaragua in 1910 amounted to \$7,417,957, imports being \$2,861,502 and exports \$4,556,455. Of the imports the United States furnished merchandise valued at \$1,585,394. The principal items and their value were as follows: Textiles and textile goods, \$226,146; flour, \$214,957; leather and shoes, \$92,727; mining materials, \$58,573; machinery, \$53,303. The exports to the United States, according to invoices certified at the American consulates, were valued at \$2,565,223, of which the consulate at Bluefields certified invoices covering goods valued at \$1,504,433, consisting principally of bananas, gold bullion, and rubber. The shipments from Cape Gracias a Dios amounted to \$276,879, consisting principally of gold and rubber, and from Corinto and the agency at San Juan del Sur \$783,911, made up mainly of rubber, hides, and coffee.

PAÑAMA.

The imports into Panama for 1910 were valued at \$9,872,691, against \$8,756,307 in 1909. Exports to the United States in 1910 amounted to \$2,011,436, or more than the entire exports from the country for 1909, which were valued at \$1,509,000. This increase is represented mainly by the increased exportation of bananas from Bocas del Toro.

In addition to the \$5,422,656 worth of merchandise imported in 1910 from the United States into Panama through the customs, the Isthmian Canal Commission brought in about \$16,000,000 worth of American goods free of duty.

The articles invoiced at the American consulate at Colon and the agency at Bocas del Toro for the United States were valued at \$1,591,400, of which bananas accounted for \$1,374,930 and coconuts \$97,368. The shipments to the United States invoiced through the Panama City consulate general were valued at \$420,034, rubber representing \$201,686, hides \$97,274, and ivory nuts \$60,265.

SALVADOR.

The foreign commerce of Salvador in 1910 amounted to \$11,039,851, an increase over the preceding year of \$1,209,167. This is significant when it is considered that the imports fell off nearly half a million dollars, the increase, therefore, being due to the exports. The imports amounted to \$3,745,249, against \$4,176,931 in 1909, and the exports were valued at \$7,294,602 and \$5,653,753 for 1910 and 1909, respectively. The cocoa exports were the largest on record, amounting to 57,858,640 pounds, an increase of 6,283,536 pounds over 1909. The value of the exports of sugar, molasses, rum, etc., was \$3,615,689, an increase over 1909 of \$759,822. It is estimated that 5,000,000 coconuts were used during the year in the manufacture of 85,000 gallons of oil, which was principally used in the colony.

The exports declared at the Brighton agency for the United States in 1910 amounted to \$406,641, against \$95,148 in 1909. The exports for the two years consisted entirely of asphalt, except \$306 worth of canned pineapples shipped in 1910. The agency was established the end of July, 1909.

The exports from Grenada to the United States, as invoiced through the American consular agency, amounted to \$219,608 in 1910, against \$140,668 in 1909. The articles for 1910 consisted principally of cocoa, \$208,524; nutmegs, \$6,198; and mace, \$4,730.

TURKS ISLAND.

The official statistics show a decline in the salt exports from \$76,560 in 1909 to \$72,457 in 1910, while the export of sisal rose from \$2,959 to \$35,774, and that of sponges from \$4,638 to \$6,404 in the same period. The total exports amounted to \$119,039, a gain of \$26,887 over the preceding year. The exports to the United States invoiced at the Turks Island consulate and its agencies during 1910 amounted to \$92,679, the principal items being as follows: Salt, \$51,928; sisal, \$33,794; sponges, \$6,962; canned lobsters, \$224; and old metal, \$129.

CUBA.

DANISH WEST INDIES.

ST. THOMAS.

The value of the total imports at the port of St. Thomas in 1910 was \$942,884, of which articles valued at \$554,679 were from the United States. Coal was the largest single item in the imports, amounting to 78,973 tons, of which 75,523 tons, valued at \$332,301, were from the United States and 3,450 tons, valued at \$15,655, came from Great Britain.

The exports invoiced through the American consulate at St. Thomas to the United States during 1910 were valued at \$4,915. The items making up this trade and their value were as follows: Goat-skins, \$4,348; rum, \$442; and bay rum, \$125.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC.

The foreign trade of the Dominican Republic during 1910 attained unprecedented value in both imports and exports. The imports amounted to \$6,257,691, a gain of \$1,831,778 over 1909, and the exports \$10,849,623, an increase of \$2,735,943. Within the last five years the trade of the Republic has almost doubled.

The share of the United States in the total foreign trade of the Republic during 1910 was \$11,400,328, which was a decided gain over the previous year. A large part of the sugar exported to the United States, however, is reshipped to other markets, principally the United Kingdom. The same is true of cocoa shipments. The United States supplied more goods to the Republic than all other countries combined, Germany, France, and the United Kingdom following in the order named. The total exports during 1910 were valued at \$15,475,331. The shipments of coffee amounted to 75,406,895 pounds, or 34,059,325 pounds more than in 1909. The exports to the United States, according to consular invoices, amounted to \$187,670 in 1910, and consisted principally of goatskins, valued at \$70,626, logwood \$63,925, and lignum-vitæ \$18,807.

SOUTH AMERICA.

ARGENTINA.

According to official figures the foreign commerce of Argentina for 1910 was as follows: Imports, \$339,458,683; exports, \$359,584,143; leaving a balance of trade in favor of the Republic of \$20,125,460. Merchandise imported and subject to duty was valued at \$246,372,728, an increase of \$32,607,258 over that of 1909; imports free of duty were valued at \$93,085,954, an increase of \$14,691,793. The total increase in imports for 1910, exclusive of gold, was \$47,299,051. Bullion imports amounted to \$35,731,958, and exports \$1,611,445.

The imports into Argentina from the United States consisted principally of timber, sheet iron, tools and implements of husbandry, vehicles and railway material, sisal twine, kerosene, mineral and vegetable oils, chemicals and pharmaceutical products, manufactures of iron and steel wire, agricultural tools and machinery, paper for newspapers, electrical supplies, motors, foodstuffs, sheep dips, and many other articles.

The country's exports for 1910 consisted of pastoral products valued at \$155,371,361, agricultural products \$189,701,262, forest products \$10,194,767, fish and game \$1,378,874, mineral products \$521,005, and all other products \$2,416,874.

The value of the articles shipped from Argentina to the United States during 1910, according to invoices certified at the consulate general at Buenos Aires and the consulate at Rosario, was \$32,895,378. Hides and skins accounted for \$12,211,423, linseed \$8,657,159, wool \$4,630,172, quebracho extract \$3,849,762, and quebracho wood \$735,627.

BOLIVIA.

Bolivia's foreign commerce during 1910 amounted to 171,957,082 kilos (kilo = 2.2046 pounds), an increase of 32,865,728 kilos over the total trade of 1909. The imports aggregated 113,323,552 kilos, compared with 95,417,742 kilos in 1909, the revenue accruing to the national treasury from duties thereon being \$2,136,238 and \$1,834,107 for these years, respectively. The foregoing figures do not include importations through the Abuna customhouse. The exports of the principal articles of consumption to foreign markets reached 58,633,530 kilos in 1910, in contrast to a total of 43,673,612 kilos in 1909.

Tin was the chief article of export in both years under review, the shipments being valued at \$12,313,449 in 1909 and at \$14,395,530 in 1910. Other important minerals exported during these two years were: Copper—1909, \$638,427; 1910, \$695,124; bismuth—1909, \$564,468; 1910, \$748,209; and silver—1909, \$2,225,825; 1910, \$2,047,868. India-rubber shipments aggregated \$8,537,437 and \$10,435,015 for the same years, respectively.

[In the official statistics of the United States, Bolivia is credited with only \$345 worth of the imports and with \$703,644 worth of the exports for the calendar year 1910. This apparently wide discrepancy is due to the fact that, Bolivia being an inland country, all of its over-sea commerce passes through the ports of other South American Republics, and, upon reaching the United States, imports that may have originated in Bolivia are credited to the country whence shipped.—B. of M.]

BRAZIL.

The value of Brazilian exports and imports to and from foreign countries in 1910 amounted to \$545,581,275, as compared with \$488,021,954 in 1909 and \$386,286,447 in 1908. Imports in 1910 amounted to the record-breaking total of \$235,574,837, as compared with \$179,690,125 in 1909. The excess of exports over imports in 1910 was \$74,431,601, as compared with \$128,641,704 in 1909. The fact that this apparent excess was almost altogether counterbalanced by exports of foreign specie had an important bearing upon the country's financial and economic condition. The table following shows the distribution of the trade, by countries, during 1910.

BRITISH GUIANA.

British Guiana's foreign trade during the fiscal year 1910-11 amounted to \$17,135,830, a decrease of \$912,186 as compared with 1909-10. The imports were valued at \$8,398,879 and the exports, including transit trade, at \$8,736,951, decreases of \$118,517 and \$792,669, respectively, compared with the preceding year. The United States lost \$259,595 and the United Kingdom gained \$13,154 in the imports, compared with 1909-10. The loss on imports from the United States was caused principally by decreases in the following items: Flour, \$111,759; pork, \$50,856; linen, cotton, and woolen goods, \$21,563; medicinal preparations, \$10,283; machinery, \$12,904; kerosene, \$24,141; white-oak staves, \$37,658. CHILE.

The foreign commerce of Chile increased from \$165,638,961 in 1905 to \$224,410,099 in 1910, of which imports made the greatest gain, \$39,744,671, or more than 58 per cent. The record imports for 1910 were not the result of any boom or abnormal condition, but a revival of the natural industrial advancement of the country.

DUTCH GUIANA.

The foreign trade of Dutch Guiana during the calendar year 1910 was \$6,308,059, an increase of \$797,898 as compared with 1909. The imports amounted to \$2,969,878 and the exports to \$3,338,181, gains of \$83,505 and \$714,393, respectively, over the previous year. The exports invoiced through the consulate general at Guayaquil to the United States were valued at \$3,701,031 in 1910, of which cocoa represented \$2,004,755 and rubber \$587,087.

FRENCH GUIANA.

The foreign trade of French Guiana for the calendar year 1910 amounted to \$4,593,509. The imports were valued at \$2,361,050 and the exports, including \$11,783 of reexports, at \$2,232,459.

France furnished \$1,609,524 of the imports; British colonies, principally Barbados and British Guiana, \$346,230; United States, \$157,522; and all other countries, \$247,774.

The imports from British colonies were principally American breadstuffs and provisions transshipped at Barbados and British Guiana, therefore it can safely be stated that the United States furnished \$500,000 of the total imports.

The total exports were valued at \$2,232,459. The principal articles of export were: Gold, \$2,005,839; essence of rosewood, \$106,468; phosphate rock, \$52,619; and balata, \$20,628. France took \$1,153,887 of the total exports; the United States, \$24,688; Switzerland, \$996,517; and all other countries, \$57,367.

PARAGUAY.

According to figures compiled from customhouse statistics, the value of the imports into Paraguay for 1910 was \$6,734,637. The table following shows the principal imports and the amounts furnished by the countries supplying the greater part of the trade.

The foregoing imports of lumber cover the fiscal year ended June 30, 1910. The imports of lumber from Brazil for the same period were less than 1,000,000 feet, and from Australia were some irregular cargoes of railway sleepers. The imports of lumber from the United States for the years given were, in superficial feet: 1907, 34,437,000; 1908, 40,555,000; 1909, 27,783,000; and 1910, 60,725,000.

According to customs statistics, the exports to the United States during 1910 were valued at \$6,305,485, but the invoices certified at the several American consulates show a total of \$7,586,519. The principal items were coffee, amounting to \$4,677,646; hides and skins, \$1,569,765; and cocoa, \$434,106.

ASIA.

ARABIA.

ADEN.

The imports into Aden in 1910 amounted to \$17,168,040 and the exports to \$15,708,530. The feature of most importance to American manufacturers was the heavy decline in the quantity of cotton piece goods imported from the United States. In the 12 months ended March 31, 1909, Aden imported 22,538,885 yards of cotton piece goods from the United States; in the calendar year 1910 the amount was 7,055,300 yards, valued at \$1,227,866. Both Italy and India passed the United States in supplying this market during the year, the former contributing 8,307,000 yards, valued at \$1,337,402 and the latter 8,129,519 yards of gray piece goods alone. During 1910 cotton piece goods were exported to the value of \$2,498,074. The imports of American oil were 592,000 gallons.

Exports from Aden to the United States in 1910, declared through the American consulate, were as follows: Civet, \$23,057; coffee, \$246,670; gazelle skins, \$5,854; goatskins, \$1,615,815; gum myrrh, \$611; ivory, \$44,167; sheepskins, \$265,070; total, \$2,201,244. Coffee amounting to \$931 was sent to the Philippines.

OMAN.

The principal imports into Oman are foodstuffs, textiles, and arms and ammunition. The trade with the United States consists principally in the import of sheetings and kerosene and the export of dates. The imports of cotton goods from the United States in 1910 amounted to \$114,911, kerosene \$26,551, and arms and ammunition \$2,000. The shipments of dates invoiced for the United States during 1910 were valued at \$94,082, against \$55,152 for 1909.

YEMEN.

The total imports into Hodeida for 1910 were valued at \$3,253,590, as compared with \$3,291,410 for 1909. The exports were \$2,210,000 in 1910 and \$2,184,560 in 1909. The most important import was that of gray sheetings and cotton piece goods, of which the United States furnished less than two-fifths. The value of the imports of sheetings and shirtings from Manchester considerably surpassed that from the United States. Italian piece goods, which have attempted competition with American goods, made no great advance in the Hodeida market during 1910, but they easily held their own. Imports from the United States during 1910 were made up of gray sheetings and petroleum, the former amounting to \$245,075 and the latter to \$116,150. Exports to the United States consisted of skins, valued at \$245,156, and coffee, worth \$204,496, the trade balance therefore being against the United States to the extent of \$88,427.

CHINA.

Despite adverse conditions, the net value of the direct foreign trade of the Chinese Empire in 1910 was \$550,578,339, exceeding the total of 1909 (the highest hitherto recorded) by \$75,390,446. This growth was shared by both imports and exports. Net foreign imports amounted to \$302,084,593, which was an increase of \$39,648,590 over the value for 1909, and exports aggregated \$248,493,746, a gain of \$35,741,856.

The extent to which the various countries shared in this direct trade is shown in the following table, which includes reexports valued at \$7,462,502 in 1909 and at \$8,866,501 in 1910:

The imports to the United States from China for the fiscal year were valued at \$34,227,503, of which raw silk in skeins made up \$13,666,732; wool, \$3,070,472; goatskins, \$3,046,848; tea, \$2,951,628; nut oil and oil nuts, \$2,176,309, and cotton, \$1,052,567.]

HONGKONG.

The volume of the trade of Hongkong and south China can not be told accurately, for the port has no trade returns and keeps no trade accounts. It ships to China and the Philippines about \$100,000,000 worth of foreign goods and takes from them goods to the value of about \$63,000,000. Its shipments direct to the Straits Settlements are about \$7,000,000 and receipts from the Straits Settlements about twice that amount. Its sugar imports are about \$23,000,000 and its exports of sugar are worth more; it is imported to be refined and

shipped. Its rice trade will average about \$22,000,000, of both imports and exports. Its coal imports run about \$8,000,000 a year, and nearly all of it is exported as bunker coal or otherwise. Much of Japan's imports of raw cotton is handled through Hongkong, probably close to \$1,000,000 in value.

Then there is the great trade in the goods sent directly from America or Europe to China or other eastern points and from China and the East to Europe and America, which are bought and sold through Hongkong but which do not come directly into the returns of the port. Its direct total import and export trade will probably reach \$275,000,000 gold and may greatly exceed that figure.

The United States had practically the whole of the foreign flour trade in China, as far west as the East Indies, Australia shipping to Hongkong in 1910 less than 50,000 bags, but it has been losing its trade in China, even in the southern ports, to Chinese-made flour. The imports of oil into Hongkong and the several tributary ports and territories—Canton, Amoy, Swatow, Foochow, Haifong, Saigon, Bangkok, and Philippine Islands—in 1910 were 89,104,000 gallons, against 76,351,000 gallons in 1909. The share of the United States in this trade was 51,440,000 gallons in 1910, and 44,200,000 in 1909. The imports of American oil into Hongkong in 1910 were 9,160,000 gallons.

The declared value of the exports from Hongkong to the United States during 1910, according to consular invoices, was \$4,434,639, an increase of \$1,354,059 over the previous year. The principal articles were as follows:

INDO-CHINA.

According to the official returns published by the Government of Indo-China the general commerce in 1910 amounted to \$103,142,008, against \$100,899,141 in 1909. The imports in 1910 amounted to \$46,966,454, compared with \$48,203,460 in 1909, and the total exports in 1910 were \$56,175,554, as compared with \$52,695,681 in 1909. The value of the imports during the five years ended 1910 averaged \$50,078,826 and the exports \$43,001,249. The general figures of the imports for 1910 include those for local consumption valued at \$36,926,780; goods in transit, \$7,193,148; reexports, \$54,371; transshipped, \$213,374; goods admitted temporarily, \$199,496; and goods warehoused, \$2,379,285.

The value of the imports for local consumption during the five years ended 1910 averaged \$41,969,467.

BRITISH NORTH BORNEO.

No statistics are available giving the import trade of British North Borneo by countries for 1910, but after an investigation made of the goods found in the stores at Sandakan and Kudat during 1909 the percentage of the import trade from some of the principal countries was found to be as follows: United Kingdom, 38.37; Germany, 15.32; China, 12.36; Java, 6.38; United States, 6.30; and Japan, 5.28; followed by Siam, France, and Austria.

The following are the percentages of the goods found at Sandakan and Kudat coming from the United States: Cloth, 1.5; watches and clocks, 60; lamps, 5; canned goods, 13.25; stationery, 2.5; ironware, 16.5; silverware, 9.5; kerosene, 100; furniture, 5; brass ware, 7.5; agricultural implements, 10; cigars and cigarettes, 15; medicines, 15; flour, 75. These figures do not include goods arriving here from the United States by mail for private parties. There is hardly a ship arriving in the colony without imports of this character.

BURMA.

The sea-borne trade of Burma (exclusive of treasure) for 1910, with foreign countries and the British Empire, including India, amounted to \$162,768,228, as against \$165,149,719 in 1909. The total import and export trade is given in the following table:

Of the total exports to India in 1910, rice and grain accounted for \$25,353,526, against \$42,947,568 in 1909. The shipments of rice and grain to other countries amounted to \$52,005,035 and \$39,074,789 for 1910 and 1909, respectively. The total rice and other grain exports, therefore, decreased \$4,663,796, while other exports increased \$4,374,793, compared with 1909.

The exports from Burma to the United States in 1910, according to invoices certified at the Rangoon consulate, were valued at \$252,825, consisting principally of hides, wax, and teak timber. The shipments to the Philippines amounting to \$285,250 consisted of rice, candles, and wax.

CEYLON.

These figures, however, represent only part of the American goods imported into Ceylon, as large quantities enter which are credited to other countries. DUTCH EAST INDIES.

The total import trade of Java for 1910 was \$129,989,086, against \$106,704,330 the previous year, and the exports were valued at \$176,862,600 and \$180,381,860 for 1910 and 1909, respectively. The imports from the United States increased from \$2,030,899 in 1909 to \$2,247,349 in 1910, but the exports from the Colony to the United States decreased, being \$13,940,063 in 1910, against \$15,029,325 the previous year. The decrease in the exports was due to the falling off in the shipments of sugar. The following table shows the principal articles imported from the United States during 1909 and 1910:

FEDERATED MALAY STATES.

Of the \$30,248,925 worth of imports into the Federated Malay States in 1910, \$26,746,082 came from the Straits Settlements; \$2,281,752 from the United Kingdom; \$429,049 from other British possessions; and \$792,042 from other foreign countries. Of the total exports, the Straits Settlements took \$40,828,760, the United Kingdom \$13,641,525, other British possessions \$1,855,855, and other foreign countries \$2,093,791.

Rice was the principal import, followed by opium, tobacco, cigars, cotton piece goods, sugar, oils, iron ware, machinery, and provisions. The exports of cultivated rubber in 1910 were valued \$21,848,767.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.

The total value of imports and exports of the Straits Settlements for 1910—\$391,159,000—showed an increase of \$53,460,000, or 15.8 per cent, over 1909. The imports amounted to \$207,019,000, of which Singapore received 72.9 per cent, Penang 26.6 per cent, Malakka 0.3 per cent, and Labuan 0.2 per cent. Of the \$184,140,000 worth of exports, 69.1 per cent came through Singapore, 30.14 per cent through Penang, 0.53 per cent through Malakka, and 0.23 per cent through Labuan.

JAPAN.

Japan's foreign commerce for the year 1910 showed record figures, with a total of \$461,331,402, made up of imports \$232,116,904 and exports \$229,214,498. Up to 1910, however, Japan had imported from America an average of less than \$30,000,000 worth of goods a year, yet in the matter of exports America continued to be Japan's chief western customer, as is shown by the table following.

Out of a list of 47 articles imported by Japan from the United States in 1910, only two—lumber and flour—had practically a monopoly of the trade, although of a total of \$1,207,272 of condensed milk imported the United States shipped \$734,480.

For 1910 cotton imported from the United States reached \$8,562,178 in value, while the total aggregate value of American kerosene was \$4,957,393 and of machinery over \$1,000,000. The share of the United States in some other items of Japan's 1910 import trade was: Belting and hose, \$22,873; bicycles, tricycles, etc., \$23,126; steam boilers, \$9,209; caoutchouc and gutta-percha, \$122,536; electric cars and parts, \$230,995; railway cars and parts, \$66,384; drilling and boring machines, \$53,205; electrical machinery, \$449,256; gas and oil engines, \$9,378; steam engines, \$96,451; wheat flour, \$803,925; hides and skins, \$17,384; iron bars, rods, plates, sheets, bands, hoops, galvanized sheets, T angles, etc., \$495,574; iron pipes and tubes, \$775,694; leather, \$790,609; lead pigs, ingots, and slabs, \$62,133; lifting machines, \$20,489; iron nails, \$776,426; lubricating and other mineral oil except kerosene and petroleum, \$351,767; paper-making machinery, \$70,179; pencils, \$49,582; phosphorite, \$438,274; pulp for paper, \$24,647; pumping machinery, \$90,676; rails, \$298,128; salted salmon and trout, \$85,390; sewing machines, \$160,126; spinning machinery, \$4,775; soda nitrate, \$14,983; sugar, \$36,358; round, squared, and sided timber, \$335,080; leaf tobacco, \$44,435; toilet waters, cosmetics, and perfumery, \$17,944; toilet soap, \$15,842; steam turbines, \$25,107; turning lathes, \$19,105; watches, \$26,554; paraffin wax, \$377,831; wheat, \$746,277; wines, \$19,126; insulated electric wire, \$170,663; wire and small rods, \$24,956; galvanized wire, \$74,892.

The economic review of Formosa for 1910 reveals a total oversea trade of \$55,337,691, exceeding the record of the previous year by \$12,513,326, an increase of more than 29 per cent. Of the total commerce of the island, \$30,875,862 represents exports and \$24,461,829 imports. The imports from the United States were valued at \$1,353,573, against \$545,542 for 1909, and the exports to the United States were valued at \$3,613,334 and \$3,208,502, respectively. In the imports sugar machinery amounted to \$491,458, kerosene \$265,755, railway cars \$117,861, and flour \$109,888. The principal American purchases were Oolong tea and camphor.

Korea's total foreign commerce for the year 1910 aggregated \$29,728,906, a gain of \$3,385,873 over the total for 1909. Of this increase, imports contributed \$1,560,725 and exports \$1,825,148. The imports from the United States were valued at \$1,595,925 and consisted principally of flour, fish, and timber. The exports to the

United States were valued at \$151,824, of which \$131,105 represented gold and silver ore.

The declared value of the merchandise invoiced through the consulate at Tabriz to the United States in 1910 was \$375,428, as follows: Carpets and rugs \$370,058, almonds \$1,783, gum tragacanth \$1,529, curios \$1,209, household effects \$679, and tobacco \$170. The exports from the Teheran Agency amounted to \$284,665, of which \$279,015 represented carpets and rugs, \$3,304 tobacco, \$955 household effects, \$867 skins, and \$524 curios.

RUSSIA IN ASIA.

The imports into the port of Vladivostok during 1910 amounted to 343,554 tons, against 290,826 tons for 1909. Most of the imports come from China, Germany, Japan, and European Russia, in the order named. In addition to the above, imports from Korea aggregated 19,543 tons in 1910, cattle, coal, and rice being the chief items. The values of the imports into Siberia from China during 1910 were as follows: Over the land frontier, \$3,313,032; to Russian Amur ports, \$6,473,356; to Russian Pacific ports, \$16,257,509. The exports over the land frontier during the same period amounted to

\$5,866,416; from Russian Amur ports, \$153,617; from Russian Pacific ports, \$3,975,792.

The reexports of foreign goods from China to Siberia, exclusive of European Russia, in 1910 were as follows: Over the land frontier, \$264,084; to Russian Amur ports, \$470,365; to Russian Pacific ports, \$785,946. This shows a falling off of \$1,092,830 from 1909, all of which occurred in reexports to the Russian Pacific ports, the other points of entry showing a gain of \$18,864 and \$230,277, respectively.

The exports invoiced at the Vladivostok consulate for the United States during 1910 were valued at \$30,792, consisting of wool \$19,155, rubber waste \$11,387, and skins \$250; and to the Philippine Islands \$11,174, made up of potatoes \$9,013, railway materials \$1,234, cabbage \$515, and condensed milk \$412.

SIAM.

According to customs statistics, the foreign trade of Siam as entered at the port of Bangkok for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1911, amounted to \$65,531,865, against \$63,781,393 the previous fiscal year. The imports amounted to \$25,235,971, against \$25,830,333 the preceding fiscal year, and the exports were \$40,295,894 and \$37,951,060 for the two years, respectively.

According to the invoices certified at the Bangkok consulate, the exports to the United States during the fiscal year ended 1911 were valued at \$144,950, consisting principally of rice and pepper.

OCEANIA.

AUSTRALIA.

The year 1910 was a record one in every important branch of industry and commerce throughout the Australian Commonwealth. The country's foreign trade reached an aggregate of \$651,015,784, which is approximately \$50,000,000 greater than that of 1907, which was previously the high-water mark. The exports in 1907 amounted to \$353,924,640, while in 1910 they totaled \$362,058,467. The imports in 1910 were greater by almost \$40,000,000 than those in 1907, the figures being \$288,957,317 and \$251,791,900, respectively. In 1907 the exports of gold exceeded \$48,600,000, against over \$23,000,000 in 1910, a shrinkage out of all proportion to the falling off in production.

The imports from the United States increased from \$28,886,278 in 1909 to \$37,223,469 in 1910, as shown by the following table:

TASMANIA.

The total over-sea trade of Tasmania for 1910 amounted to \$6,534,402, viz: Imports \$4,044,893, exports \$2,489,509; against imports valued at \$3,605,035 and exports \$2,046,961 in 1909. The over-sea imports transferred from other Australian States into Tasmania in 1910 amounted to \$3,719,600, compared with \$4,705,997 in 1909. The total imports from the United States into Tasmania during 1910 were \$403,184, compared with \$302,925 in 1909. These figures do not include American goods imported indirectly through Melbourne and Sydney. The total value of the exports from Tasmania to the United States in 1910, according to consular invoices, was \$88,395, against \$28,688 for 1909. PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Philippine trade returns for the calendar year 1910 show exports to the value of \$40,628,463 and an import total of \$49,719,361. These export figures are the largest in the history of the islands, exceeding those of 1909 by \$5,704,126, and accurately measure the growth of trade for the year.

By chief divisions, the foreign commerce of the Philippines for the calendar years 1909 and 1910 is shown in the table following. Non-dutiable merchandise from the United States imported by supply officers of the Army, Navy, and insular government and railway free entries are excluded in the figures for 1909.

SAMOA.

The total value of imports into Apia during 1910 was \$814,038, as against \$830,989 for the previous year, a decrease of \$16,951, whereas the exports increased \$121,947 over 1909, amounting in 1910 to \$841,035. The falling off of imports in 1910 was on goods from France, Australia, and New Zealand, while the United States, England, and Germany together showed a gain of \$40,258 over the previous year. The United States' gain, while only about \$5,000, showed what a regular line of steamers, sailing on schedule time, between San Francisco, Sydney, and Auckland via Apia, would do to increase American trade in Samoa.

The foreign trade of French Oceania was more active in 1910 than ever before, the exports and imports amounting to \$2,256,298, whereas in 1909 they were \$1,865,223. According to consular invoices the exports to the United States in 1910 were valued at \$697,018, against \$535,963 in 1909, the value of the principal articles in 1910 being as follows: Coconuts, \$16,199; copra, \$399,651; mother-of-pearl shell, \$17,421; vanilla, \$260,392; alligator pears, \$2,667; other articles, \$688.

AFRICA.

BELGIAN KONGO.

The total value of the imports into Belgian Congo during 1910 was \$7,102,716, as compared with \$4,270,510 for the previous year. The imports from Belgium, which country led in this trade, in 1910 amounted to \$5,260,895, followed by Great Britain with \$729,025, France \$240,581, and Germany \$203,160. The imports from the United States amounted to \$20,367, consisting of boats, canned goods, flour, cotton cloth, oil, and clothing.

Products of Belgian Congo were exported to the value of \$12,-851,650, as compared with \$10,840,274 for 1909. Rubber amounted to \$9,845,954, ivory \$1,166,374, palm kernels \$512,833, and palm oil \$346,936. There were no exports to the United States invoiced at the Boma consulate general.

BRITISH EAST AFRICA.

MOMBASA.

The imports into Mombasa in 1910 were \$4,889,667, as compared with \$4,435,098 the previous year, and the exports \$4,167,543, against \$2,295,359. The United Kingdom led all countries in the value of imports into Mombasa, with \$1,403,226. India and Burma came second with \$826,948, and Germany third with \$420,466. The United States was fourth, supplying \$203,124, and Netherlands, Austria-Hungary, and France and French colonies followed in the order named. Imports from the United States consisted principally of cotton goods, petroleum, and grocery sundries.

The advance of 81 per cent in exports for the year is largely accounted for by the greater output of cotton (the production of which is increasing by leaps and bounds), and of rubber and hides and skins.

ZANZIBAR.

The foreign trade of Zanzibar for 1910 amounted to \$9,861,952, as compared with \$9,759,899 for the preceding year. The imports in 1910 were valued at \$4,832,584, a decrease of \$3,489, and the exports \$5,029,368, an increase of \$107,564. The imports from the United States show a gain, as seen from the following table:

The exports of gold in 1910 amounted to \$166,652,052, of which \$154,709,004 was the produce of the Union and \$11,943,048 the produce of Southern Rhodesia. The exports of diamonds produced in the Union were valued at \$41,264,737; wool, \$18,642,681; hides and skins, \$6,259,895; and maize and maize meal, \$3,404,510. The exports to the United States from the Union amounted to \$1,955,458, the chief articles being ostrich feathers and hides and skins. While the United States is the chief market for South African diamonds, few are invoiced direct, practically all of the output being first shipped to England.

RHODESIA.

As an indication of the trade expansion of Rhodesia within the last few years, the imports of merchandise, exclusive of Government stores and specie, increased from \$7,154,671 in 1907 to \$12,782,635 in 1910, the imports for the last year being \$1,483,068 in excess of those of the previous year. The exports increased from \$11,866,916 in 1907 to \$16,270,718 in 1910.

The total value of the imports of merchandise, exclusive of Government stores, into Southern Rhodesia was \$11,805,258 in 1910, an increase of over \$2,000,000 as compared with the previous year. Of these imports \$2,276,436 represent South African produce, the oversea imports amounting to \$9,528,822.

Imports into Southern Rhodesia from the United States during 1910 increased \$117,503 over the previous year. This increase is manifest in nearly every line of goods imported.

The total exports of purely South African products from Southern Rhodesia for 1910 amounted in value to \$13,635,013, being a slight increase over the 1909 exports. Of this amount, gold shipments represented \$12,318,625 and gold concentrates \$323,792; chrome iron, nearly \$500,000; tobacco, \$153,761; corn, grain, and meal, \$89,616; and hides and skins, \$56,962. Of the total exports \$12,850,227 worth (mostly gold) was shipped to the United Kingdom. The exports to the United States consisted of chrome iron, valued at \$270,550.

The value of the imports of merchandise into Northwestern Rhodesia for 1910 was \$977,392, a decline of over \$600,000 as compared with 1909. The imports from the United Kingdom, valued at \$994,683 in 1909, were only \$477,803 in 1910, while the imports from Belgium, which in 1909 amounted to \$338,517, were reduced to \$216,072. Imports from the United States show a slight loss in comparison with the previous year, the 1910 trade amounting to \$22,756 as compared with \$27,817 in 1909.

BRITISH WEST AFRICA.

GAMBIA.

In 1910 for the first year in its history the total value of the trade of Gambia exceeded \$5,000,000, amounting to \$5,513,476, an increase over 1909 of \$1,175,634. The total value of the imports of merchandise for 1910 was \$1,759,796, the principal articles being as follows:

NIGERIA.

The total value of the purely commercial imports and exports of Nigeria in 1910 was \$47,798,100, as compared with \$37,062,360 in 1909, \$32,056,560 in 1908, \$35,978,580 in 1907, and \$26,666,820 in 1906, showing an increase of about 80 per cent in five years. These figures do not include Government imports, specie, or transit goods.

The gross value of imports and exports in 1910, including Government imports, but not specie or transit goods, was \$50,096,880. The Porto Novo transit trade in 1910 was made up of imports valued at \$652,329 and exports valued at \$2,089,688.

SIERRA LEONE.

Trade in Sierra Leone was much hampered in 1910 by the periodic appearance of yellow fever from May to October, making quarantine restrictions necessary from time to time. EGYPT.

The foreign trade of Egypt in 1910, according to the latest figures available, amounted to \$262,486,435, of which \$117,764,130 represented imports and \$144,722,305 exports. In both lines the totals exceeded those of 1909, and exports of Egyptian produce during 1910 were the heaviest in the country's history.

FRENCH AFRICA.

ALGERIA.

Algeria enjoyed the best year of its history commercially in 1910. Its general commerce amounted to \$206,896,000, which exceeded by \$44,390,000 the highest previous record. Its special commerce, which includes imports for consumption and exports of domestic products, was also large, the imports amounting to \$97,966,000 and

exports to \$95,200,000. The 1910 special imports increased \$10,243,000 over 1909 and the exports increased \$31,661,000.

Trade between the United States and Algeria fell off greatly from previous years. The following table shows the imports of American goods into Algeria during 1909 and 1910:

REUNION.

Reunion's total commerce for 1910 amounted to \$6,903,186, of which the imports were \$3,638,606, against \$2,554,062 in 1909, and the exports \$3,264,580, against \$3,155,908 in the previous year. Of the \$449,365 worth of imports from countries other than France and French colonies, the United States sent \$61,703 worth, made up of manufactured metals, \$116; petroleum, marble, cement, etc., \$43,843; and timber, \$17,744. Of the exports, France and French colonies took \$3,178,089. The share of the United States can not be determined.

TUNIS.

The import trade of the Regency of Tunis amounted to \$20,287,946 in 1910, a decrease of \$1,721,054 from that of 1909, while the export trade showed a gain of \$2,161,055, amounting in 1910 to \$23,154,055. France leads in both the export and import trade of Tunis, followed by England, Algeria, and Italy. The United States ranks seventh in the import trade and eighteenth in the export trade. The imports from the United States in 1910 amounted to \$361,292 and the exports thereto were \$42,821. The importation of American machinery amounted to \$98,000 in 1910, an increase of \$4,000 over the previous year. The other leading imports from the United States were: Tobacco, \$48,000 in 1910 and \$74,000 in 1909; petroleum and products, \$146,000 in 1910 and \$61,000 in 1909; timber, \$21,000 in 1910 and \$51,000 in 1909; metal goods, \$13,000 each year; rubber goods, \$10,000 in 1910 and none in 1909; cottonseed oil, \$5,000 in 1910 and \$58,000 in 1909.

The declared exports from Tunis to the United States reached \$31,147 in 1910, against \$15,972 during the preceding year. The larger total is due to increased shipments of goatskins, which amounted to \$20,308, as compared with \$4,664 in 1909. Next in importance in the list of exports were: Industrial olive oil, \$6,658; curios, \$1,357; woolen carpets, \$976; and edible olive oil, \$974.

WEST AFRICA.

French West Africa consists of more than half of that part of the Dark Continent known as West Africa. It is divided into five colonies, Senegal, French Guinea, Ivory Coast, Dahomey, and Upper Senegal Niger, and the protectorate of Mauritania. Its trade during 1910 increased to \$52,761,957, of which the imports amounted to \$29,080,533 and the exports to \$23,681,424. The total trade in 1909 amounted to \$43,399,017, and in 1908 to \$36,687,379, the increase in two years being about 44 per cent. The following table shows the import and export trade of the French West African colonies in 1909 and 1910:

The imports of textile fabrics amounted to \$10,010,190, of which cottons and guinées (long cloth) represented \$7,529,755; rice imports increased 12,832 tons, valued at \$606,008, over 1909. Coal imports amounted to 187,057 tons, valued at \$1,203,074, compared with 107,450 tons of a value of \$679,889 in 1909. The imports of iron and steel for bridge, harbor, railway, and other constructive work showed only a slight increase, the amount in 1910 being \$693,440, against \$681,660 in 1909.

Groundnuts, the principal export, amounted to 235,947 tons, valued at \$9,669,829, an increase in weight of 7,887 tons and in value of \$1,251,720 over 1909. Rubber takes second place among the exports, with 4,637 tons, valued at \$7,106,532. The exports of palm kernels increased 2,857 tons, or \$104,700, in 1910, the total exports being 46,226 tons, valued at \$2,354,976. The exports of palm oil decreased \$52,440.

LIBERIA.

About two-thirds of the foreign trade of Liberia is controlled by the Germans, and the balance by the English, but the latter are making heavy inroads into the German trade. The following table shows the quantity and value of products shipped from Monrovia to Hamburg and Liverpool in 1910:

Morocco's imports from and exports to the United States during 1910 amounted to \$271,266, \$86,800 being imports and \$184,466 exports, as against \$214,330 for 1909, made up of \$60,692 imports and \$153,638 exports. The actual exports for 1910, according to the official invoices of this consulate general and agencies, were valued at \$483,394, as compared with \$204,030 for 1909. TRIPOLI IN BARBARY.

The foreign trade of Tripoli in Barbary during the fiscal year ended March 13, 1911, amounted to \$2,613,690, of which \$772,848 was exports and \$1,840,842 imports, as compared with a total of \$3,242,686 in the preceding year, of which the exports were \$845,989 and the imports \$2,396,697. These figures do not include the export and the import trade with the rest of Turkey, which average about \$200,000 and \$300,000, respectively.

Statistics showing the value and character of imports from the United States are not available. American rubber shoes, hardware, and household utensils are found in some of the retail stores. The value of the exports to the United States, as shown by consular invoices, was \$89,221 in 1910, as compared with \$87,339 in 1909. The value of the articles shipped in 1910 was as follows: Ostrich feathers, \$4,081; lemons, \$320; dry-salted goatskins, \$5,450; Sudan-tanned goatskins, \$79,370.
