The committee amendment is as follows:

The necessity for this legislation is indicated in the following quotation from the statement of Hon. Harry M. Wurzbach before Subcommittee No. II of the Judiciary Committee on Friday, April 16, 1926:

I feel that legislation along this line ought to be enacted, in view of the well-known condition that exists in some sections of this country, and I am going to very frankly state that the evil that it is hoped will be reached by the enactment of this bill prevails most largely in some of the Southern States. This matter has been brought to the attention of Congress by Members of Congress, who have stated that within their personal knowledge and based upon reliable information that they have received, it has gotten to be almost the custom in some of the Southern States to levy tribute upon men seeking Federal appointments. This bill does not require any more than is required at the present time of Members of Congress under the corrupt practices act of 1925.
