MY DEAR MR. BEERS: I shall greatly appreciate it if you can find it possible to take prompt and favorable action on H. Res. 257, which provides for the printing of additional copies of the hearings held before the joint committees on H. R. 5000; S. 291, and S. 2841.

Although a limit was placed on the number of copies to each Member, the supply of 2,000 copies was exhausted about 10 days ago, and, since that time, I have been receiving a large number of requests each day from Members of the House. The fact that the printed hearings were only made available on April 15 and lasted less than three weeks is some evidence of the demand for them.

My Dear Mr. Barks: I will greatly appreciate it if you will be so kind to take prompt and favorable action on H. Res. 257, which provides for the printing of additional copies of the hearings held before the Joint Committee on Education (H. Res. 257, and S. Res. 257).
