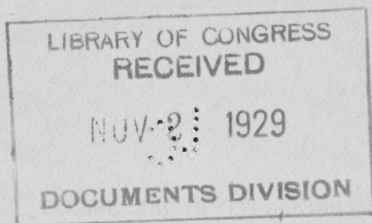

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REPORT OF THE PUBLIC BUILDINGS COMMISSION FOR THE YEAR 1928

DUTIES AND POWERS

The Public Buildings Commission was created by an act of Congress approved March 1, 1919, "with a view to the control and allotment of space in owned or leased Government buildings in the District of Columbia." Under the act, the commission was also given "absolute control of and the allotment of all space in the several public buildings owned or leased by the United States, in the District of Columbia, with the exception of the Executive Mansion and office of the President, the Capitol Building, the Senate and House Office Buildings, the Capitol power plant, and the Congressional Library Building," and the power to "from time to time assign and allot for the use of the several activities of the Government, all such space."

With its duties and prerogatives so defined, the commission immediately applied itself to the solution of problems relating to current ailments and provision for future needs. To this latter end the commission recommended the passage of legislation to establish a logical and systematic public buildings program that would provide adequate and suitable quarters for the Federal Government in the Capital City.

This objective was realized when the public buildings act (Public No. 281), passed by the Sixty-ninth Congress was approved May 25, 1926. This act provided:

That to enable the Secretary of the Treasury to provide suitable accommodations in the District of Columbia for the executive departments and independent establishments in the Government not in any executive department; * * * such amount as is necessary, not to exceed \$50,000,000 of the total amount authorized to be expended under the provision of this act, shall be available for projects in the District of Columbia; * * *. That the Secretary of the Treasury is also authorized to acquire a site for the Supreme Court of the United States. * * *. To provide such suitable office accommodations in the District of Columbia as are hereinbefore mentioned, for constructing suitable buildings for the furnishing of such office accommodations on said sites, or addition to sites, or on sites already owned by the Government; * * *. Providing suitable appropriations to said buildings for beautifying and embellishing their surroundings as nearly in harmony with the plan of Pierre Charles L'Enfant, as may be practicable, said buildings shall be so constructed as to combine high standards of architectural beauty and practical utility.

The Public Buildings Commission was given supervision over the public-buildings program in the National Capital by section 6 of the above-mentioned act, which provided:

The provisions of section 10 of the legislative, executive, and judicial appropriation act for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1920, approved March 1, 1919, relating to the assignment of space in public buildings in the District of Columbia, shall apply to all buildings constructed, extended, or enlarged under the provision of this act in the District of Columbia, and no land for sites or enlargement of sites therefor shall be acquired or land belonging to the United States be taken for sites or enlargement of sites therefor without prior approval of the commission created by said act of March 1, 1919; no contract shall be let for any building or the enlargement or extension of any building in the District of Columbia, under the provisions of this act without approval of said commission as to the assignment and general arrangement of space therein; and said commission shall determine the order in which buildings or enlargement of buildings in the District of Columbia under the provision of this act shall be constructed.

The preliminary plans for compliance with the legislation quoted above soon showed that acquisition of practically the entire triangle included by B Street north, Fifteenth Street and Pennsylvania Avenue would be necessary and that the interests of the Government could be best served by acquiring this area immediately and as nearly simultaneously as possible to avoid the raising of the cost to the Government's disadvantage by its own project. Therefore legislation to this end was sought, including some other features which were found to be in the interest of ultimate economy in execution of the project. The desired result was obtained in the act approved January 13, 1928 (Public No. 5, 70th Cong.), which is as follows:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That to enable the Secretary of the Treasury to acquire economically and at an early date adequate sites for suitable accommodations in the District of Columbia for the executive departments and independent establishments of the Government not under any executive department, and suitable grounds, parking, and approaches thereto, the act entitled "An act to provide for the construction of certain public buildings, and for other purposes," approved May 25, 1926, is hereby amended so as to authorize and direct him to acquire, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, all the lands obtainable with the funds that may be appropriated, including buildings and other structures, included within the triangle bounded by Pennsylvania Avenue and B Street, extending from Fifteenth Street to Sixth Street NW., and reservations A, B, C, and D, except property owned by the United States or the District of Columbia as such lands appear in the records of the office of the surveyor of the District of Columbia.

SEC. 2. There is hereby authorized to be appropriated, in addition to the amounts authorized in said act of May 25, 1926, and without regard to the limitations contained in the first paragraph of section 5 of such act, the sum of \$25,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.

SEC. 3. The buildings constructed under said act approved May 25, 1926, when completed and ready for occupancy, shall be turned over to the Office of Public Buildings and Public Parks for care, maintenance, and protection, including the furnishing of heat, gas, and electricity therein, together with all machinery tools, equipments, and supplies to be used in connection therewith.

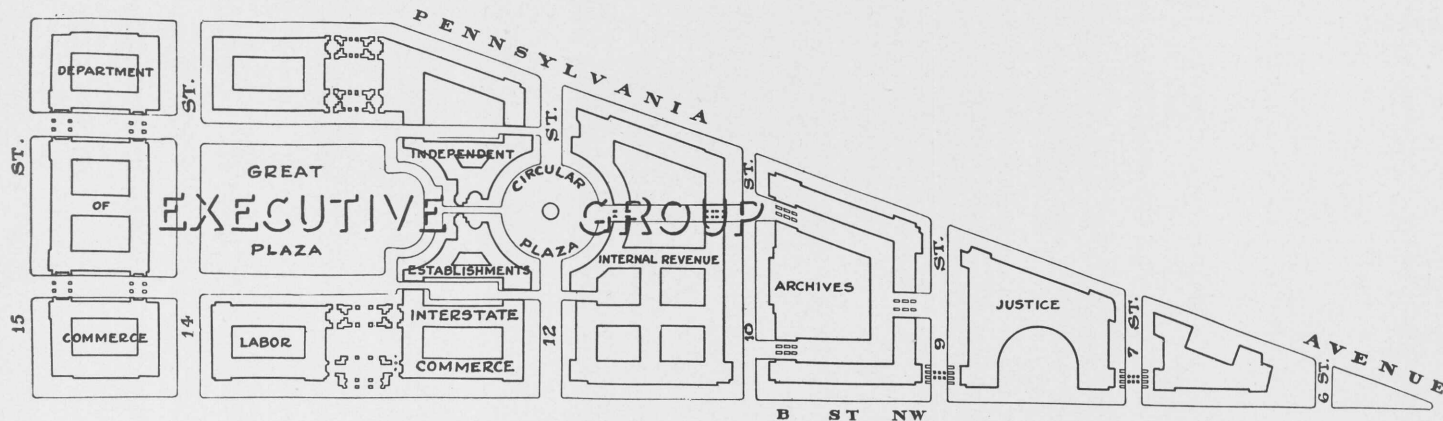
SEC. 4. That after title has been vested in the United States to any of the properties herein or heretofore authorized to be acquired or taken within the area embraced in this act, the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, further authorized to enter into contracts for demolishing the buildings thereon and for clearing and grading the land at such time and to such extent as he may deem proper, and to enter into contracts for plans and specifications for the architectural landscape treatment of the portion of the lands acquired which he may deem proper, with the approval of the Public Buildings Commission, created by the act of March 1, 1919, to reserve for planting and for open spaces for the proper grouping of the Federal buildings which have heretofore been authorized or may hereafter be authorized to be constructed within the area embraced in this act, the expenditures on account thereof to be charged to the appropriations authorized under the provisions of this act.

Acting under this authority the commission has approved generally the acquisition of land incident to the triangle-area development and has specifically approved the erection of the buildings mentioned in the following section entitled the "public buildings program."

As is apparent from the legislation referred to above, the duties of the commission may be classified under the headings: (1) The public-buildings program by which the requisite new Government buildings are to be provided. (2) Space allocation and moving. (3) Government leases.

PUBLIC-BUILDINGS PROGRAM

The task of presenting in brief outline a satisfactory statement of a building program which has for years been a subject of consideration and study by specialists is not an easy one. The history of the

general project and its relation to other projects for the development of the National Capital will be found in pages 3 to 10 of this commission's report for 1927. The present project, promising to evolve a series of monumental structures designed to combine both the utility and beauty requisite to efficient and economical administration of the governmental activities as well as to the dignity and character of the National Capital, is well deserving of more detailed description than is appropriate to this report. However, the Public Buildings Commission, as a supervisory body functioning in connection with the building program, may properly state the fundamental precepts that have guided its action in connection with the program.

Briefly characterized, the program involves a basic step forward in the Government's administrative economy. A commanding and dire need for additional working space for the Government personnel and records had to be met. Around this imperative fact expert thought and study have evolved a design which combines the most up-to-date facilities and devices, to provide for the utilitarian needs of efficient administration and reasonable possibilities for future expansion, with general artistic treatment of such merit as to give assurance that the new group of buildings now under way will be one of the greatest and most impressive compositions of the kind ever undertaken. The advantage of such a unified design is not alone to be found in the architectural effects obtainable but its utilitarian value is indicated by the fact that, in spite of two great plazas, ample through streets, and adequate interior courts, more floor space is said to be obtainable than would have been possible in individual buildings separately designed to fit the original street system and the old private-property lines.

The extent of the building program has been defined by the legislation already quoted, as to authorization and appropriations. As to location, the present program centers principally in what has been termed the triangle area, comprising about 70 acres of land as shown on accompanying diagram, in the northwest sector of the city, bounded by Fifteenth Street on the west, B Street on the south, and having Pennsylvania Avenue as the hypotenuse for the right angle thus formed.

Though general plans for the completed treatment of the area have been drawn up and approved, the triangle project, in its details, is still an open matter. Necessarily, the program will develop with some slowness, which will allow opportunity for continued study of the problems involved. The several thousand Government employees who will eventually be installed within the buildings give rise to problems to be decided other than their mere housing. Problems of ingress and egress and transportation call for determination of the most desirable routes for streets, car lines, bus lines, automobile parking, and walks. Such matters can not be decided offhand, but must be carefully studied as problems in city planning. To point out another aspect, the sudden and wholesale leveling of existing structures in the area involved, simply to make an impressive gesture of activity, would be unjustifiable and extravagant in so far as there are certain buildings in the area which may be put to use for several years, pending the advent of the time for their destruction to make way for their more modern and more worthy successors.

To visualize the design as now developed, a large model of the triangle group is being prepared under the direction of the board of

architectural consultants¹ appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury. The model will depict all phases of the situation and illustrate the comprehensive elements of city planning involved. It should develop and help to avoid errors, which precipitate action so frequently brings, and which leave permanent scars on a city.

The general phases of the building program have not been altered to any appreciable extent during the past year, and reference may be made to pages 4 to 8 of the 1927 report of the Public Buildings Commission for a more detailed account, giving costs, space to be supplied, space to be released, rental savings, and other items bearing on the matter of the building program in relation to existing conditions in the various departments which will be affected by the program.

Within the triangle group active progress is being made on two structures, namely, the Department of Commerce Building and the Internal Revenue Building. Outside the triangle the Treasury Department reports substantial progress on the administration unit of the Department of Agricultural Building on the south side of the Mall and on the Government Printing Office addition. Detailed reports on the projects under way follow:

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE BUILDING

The year 1928 witnessed the real beginnings of construction on this building, the largest of the projected triangle group. The first step was the leveling of the temporary war building known as Treasury Annex No. 2 and of other buildings on the site required for the new Commerce structure. These demolitions were followed by letting contracts for the excavation work. Preliminary excavations and test borings have been reported as completed and construction on the foundations is at present in progress. Drawings for the superstructure are approaching completion, and reports from the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury are to the effect that work on the superstructure will be under way some time in the spring of 1929.

Approximately \$1,234,000 has been expended and obligated to date for excavations and foundations. Specifications for construction and mechanical equipment are in course of preparation, bids will be advertised for late in January and opened on March 27, 1929, the time specified for completion being 1,100 calendar days.

This building is to measure 1,030 feet long by 318 feet wide, and to embrace a total of 26,000,000 cubic feet. It is planned to accommodate over 5,000 Government workers, the floor area being 1,092,000 square feet. This building is to be five stories in height below the main entablature, with a sixth story appearing above and beyond the balustrade. On the interior courts a seventh story appears, which does not show from the front.

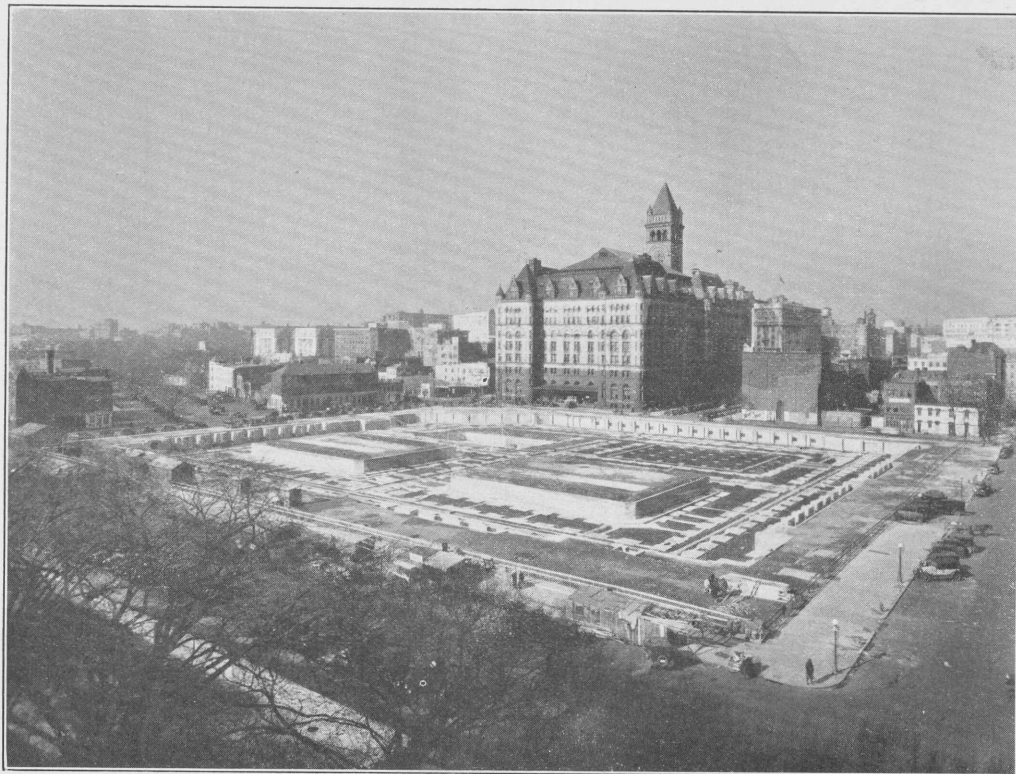
The drawings for the building were prepared by York & Sawyer, of New York. The type of architecture is an adaptation of eighteenth century classic, and the exterior walls are to be faced with limestone.

One of the most significant features of the completion of this building will be elimination of the annual rent bill of the Department of Commerce, which, by the 1928 report of that department, totals

\$68,000 annually. A total of approximately 400,000 square feet of net space, now occupied by that department in permanent Government-owned buildings, will be released for other activities, and about 175,000 square feet of floor space now occupied by that department in temporary Government buildings will be vacated, thereby contributing toward the ultimate demolition of the latter buildings.

INTERNAL REVENUE BUILDING

Work on this building is progressing concurrently with work on the Department of Commerce Building. Clearing of the land, and preliminary excavation work has been completed and work on the foundations is in progress. Moneys expended and obligated to date for land, excavations, foundations, etc., total approximately \$1,463,395. Bids have been received for construction and mechanical equipment, the low bid received being \$6,104,000.

Preliminary work for this building involved the clearing of old buildings on squares 350 and 324, and removing the westerly half of the Farmers' Market shed.

The drawings for this building were prepared in the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury. As in the case of the Department of Commerce Building, the architecture is to be an adaptation of the eighteenth century classic, and limestone is to predominate as exterior wall material. The building is to lie between Tenth and Twelfth Streets, with a frontage on B Street of 452 feet and depth of 410 feet, extending to C Street. This building is to have a floor area of 750,000 square feet and is designed to accommodate approximately 4,500 Government workers.

The Government rent bill to be saved by completion of this building, based on rented space now occupied by organizations which will, at its completion, be installed therein, totals approximately \$110,000. Additional advantage will result from its completion in releasing over 120,000 net square feet of floor space in permanent Government-owned buildings and over 338,000 square feet in temporary Government buildings.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Progress on construction of this building, which is to connect the already constructed east and west wings of the Department of Agriculture Building, has proceeded apace during 1928. Excavation, foundation, and steel superstructure on the unit have been completed. Expenditure and obligation to date for construction and mechanical equipment on the building totals approximately \$1,699,000 and time for completion is specified as 720 calendar days from April 2, 1928. The firm of Rankin & Kellogg are architects for this building, the type of architecture selected being Renaissance, with marble as the exterior wall materials.

An interior court is provided for light and ventilation, to be roofed with glass at the third floor level, the portion above this being an open court. This covered court, two stories high, is to be 88 by 56 feet and will have an architectural treatment to form a particular feature in the administration building. This provides a large area which can be used for general meetings in connection with the administration of the department. On one wall of this court there is to be placed a war memorial provided by the employees of the department. The interior finish, other than the first floor lobbies,

corridors, suites of the Secretary and his immediate assistants, and the covered court, all of which are to be given particular architectural treatment, is to be of the high-class office type.

The building is to contain 322,000 square feet of floor space, the approximate dimensions being: Length, 483 feet; width, 241 feet; and height, 77 feet. At the completion of this building, the administrative departments of the Department of Agriculture are to be installed. The present administration building of the department will be razed.

The completion of the project will effect a remarkable transformation of Mall topography. Satiric comment has been made from time to time on the appearance of the Department of Agriculture building ensemble, featuring the ancient administration building, and the obviously incompleated appearance of the two wings, isolated as they have been and visibly suffering from their abandonment in course of construction. Completion of the administrative unit remedies this situation fully, and will give a finished appearance to the construction.

Future development is planned for the Department of Agriculture in what has been termed the "extensible building". This building, as planned, is to constitute an extension of the main building to the south across B Street south, as shown in the illustration in this report. Plans for this development are so arranged that the construction can proceed in separate units, as funds are made available and needs require. To date the land for the construction has not been acquired.

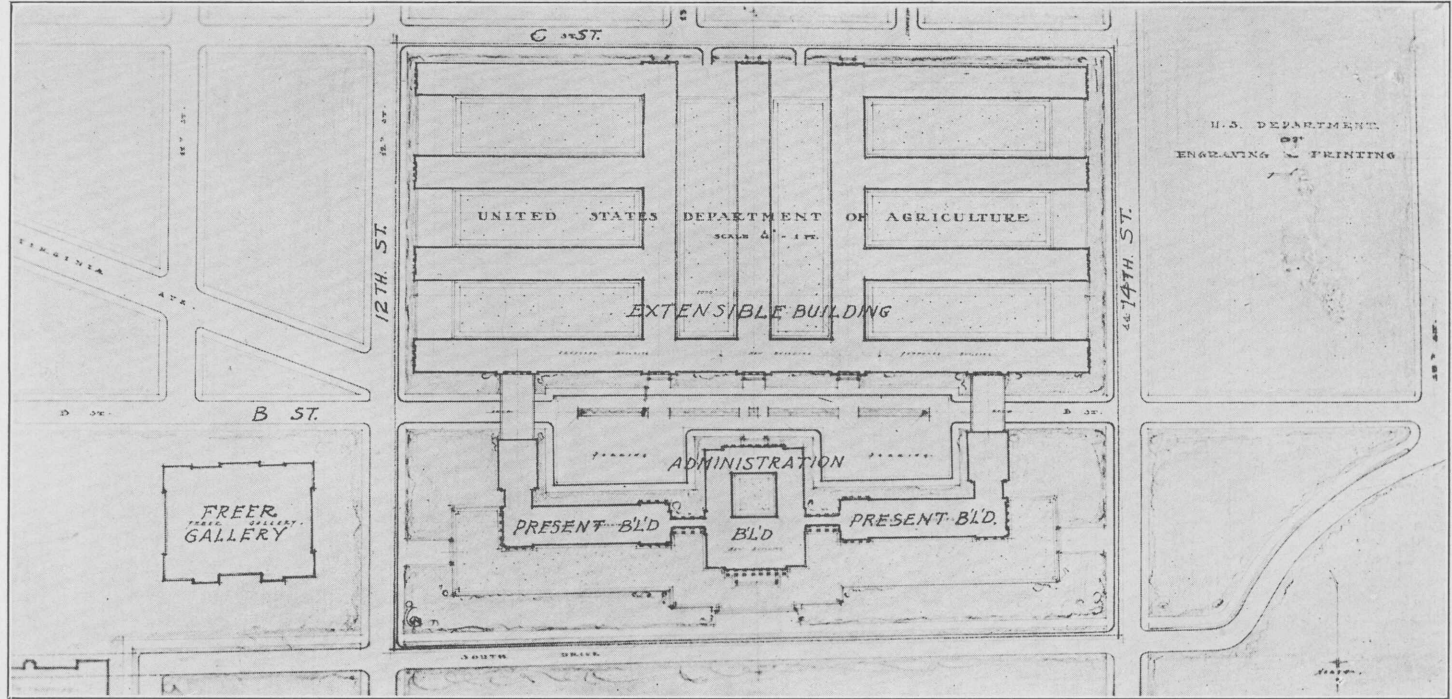
The ultimate realization of this project will constitute an item of great benefit to the Department of Agriculture, since the present housing of that department is most unsatisfactory, its various units being widely scattered and in some cases inadequately housed, and the department annually facing a rent bill of approximately \$200,000.

The extensible building, when completed, will cover the entire area between B and C, Twelfth and Fourteenth Streets, SW. The building will be constructed in the form of wings, to be approximately 57 feet wide, of from 320 to 430 feet in length and to be five stories high. There are to be courts between the wings about 90 feet across. The exterior treatment is to be on classical lines to harmonize with the administration group on the opposite side of B Street. A particular feature provided for in this proposed construction is a library to accommodate 500,000 volumes. The building as designed is to be utilitarian in character, accommodations being provided generally for offices and laboratories. Entrances are provided at five places on B Street, three places on C Street and at each end of the wings on Twelfth and Fourteenth Streets. Drawings for this project have been prepared in the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury.

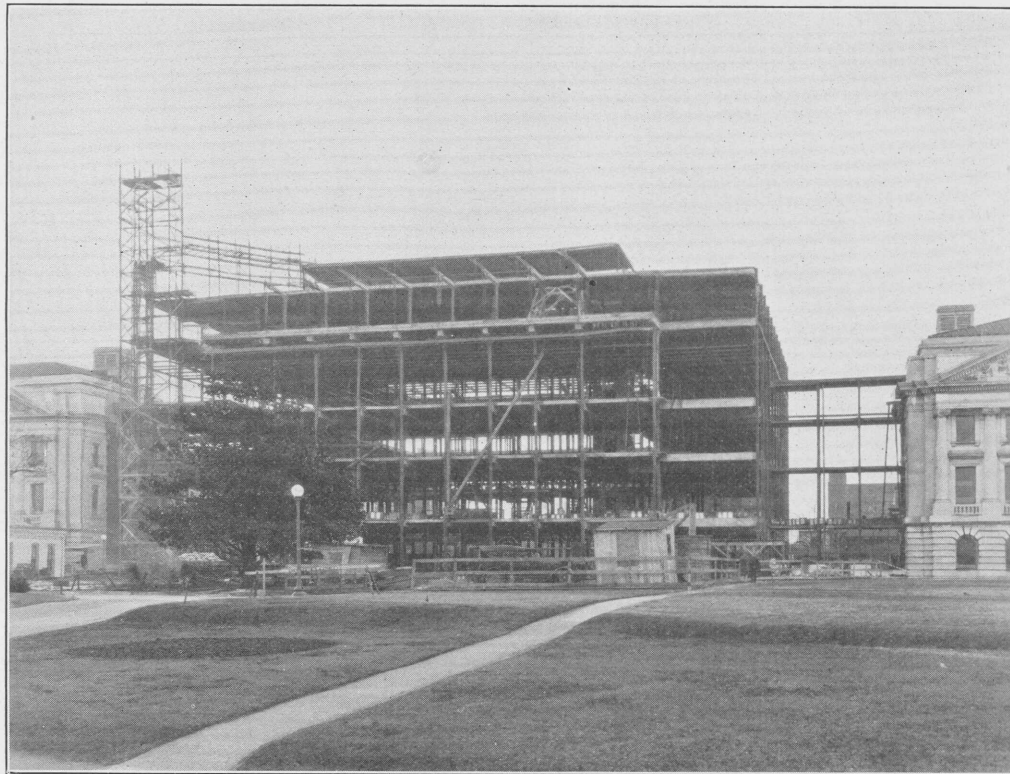
GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE ADDITION

Construction work is in progress on the Government Printing Office extension, the sum of approximately \$748,000 having been expended and obligated to date for the land and construction and mechanical equipment.

Drawings for this structure were prepared in the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury. The construction is to conform to the style of the present building, located at North Capitol and G Streets. Brick and terra cotta are to be the exterior wall material, the structure to contain 168,000 square feet of floor space and to have the following

approximate dimensions: Length, 175 feet; width, 112 feet; height, 128 feet.

The width of about 112 feet represents the frontage of the building on G Street, and the depth to the back of the alley is 175 feet.

An open court 130 feet deep and approximately 75 feet wide will be provided between the extension and the rear portion of the existing building. For convenient connection between the extension and the old building a double-deck bridge at the fourth and fifth floor levels will be constructed across this open court. The construction of the extension involves removal of the present boiler house, the old laundry building and all buildings on the land which was purchased in connection with the extension.

Of the frontage on G Street, approximately 51 feet is one story in height and the remainder eight stories high. The one-story portion, including the basement thereunder, is for use as a garage. There is provided in the garage an unusually large lift for lowering heavily loaded auto trucks from first floor to basement. One public entrance on G Street is provided, particularly for access to the office for sale of publications. Each floor is designed to meet the particular requirements and specialized work of the Government Printing Office and structurally so as to carry the heavy loads imposed thereon. The major portion of the seventh floor is given over to the library, where will be housed valuable books, samples of printing and data in connection with the work of the office.

ADDITIONAL

By the Act of May 29, 1928, the Secretary of the Treasury was authorized to proceed with the study of the other buildings of the triangle group, which, though some have not been specifically authorized for construction, form part of the general composition. Accordingly the Treasury Department has entered into contracts with authorized private architects for study of the buildings for the Department of Labor, Interstate Commerce Commission, Archives Building, independent establishments, and the Department of Justice, respectively, and is also retaining architectural services in connection with architectural landscape work connecting the various units of the group.

While studies and plans for the new building for the United States Supreme Court are not at this time available, a site for that building has been decided upon. The site chosen is on squares 727 and 728, bounded on the north by Maryland Avenue, on the south by East Capitol Street, on the east by Second Street, and on the west by First Street NE. The site was selected with future development of the section in mind.

For acquisition of the property \$1,500,000 has been appropriated but appeals by property owners have, in the course of condemnation proceedings, been awarded in excess of that amount. A deficiency bill of \$268,741, for the excess in awards rendered up to the present time is now pending, and as there are still some additional appeals to be settled it is likely that the entire purchase will involve an even larger expenditure. In order to avoid further delay an attempt is being made to secure legislation to take care of awards as they are rendered without regard to the total cost.

Without unusual further delays, the acquisition of the site should be completed before the end of the fiscal year 1929.

SPACE ALLOCATIONS AND MOVES MADE

Due to the crowded condition of all Government organizations, any expansion or increase in records requires an additional assignment of space, and, as more organizations are expanding than contracting, the Public Buildings Commission is constantly faced with the problem of obtaining space.

During the past few years the commission has sought the cooperation of each organization in rearrangement of offices and files to utilize available space to the best advantage, thus effecting such a saving that practically all normal expansion has been taken care of in space previously occupied by the Government. The year 1928, however, brought a sudden demand for office space that could only be met by the leasing of additional space. This need was caused by the loss of Treasury Annex No. 2, which was torn down, and material additions to the Patent Office, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Justice, and the creation of the Radio Commission. In spite of the new leases thus made necessary, the net space released or lost by the Government approximately equaled that acquired for the year.

The process of rearranging offices frequently necessitates the moving of an organization from one building to another, and thus during the year 1928, as in the two preceding years, the commission carried out an extensive moving program. The reasons for these moves and the results or gains obtained can best be indicated by considering each move separately. There follows a brief statement concerning each move directed by the commission during the year.

1. BUREAU OF INTERNAL REVENUE MOVED FROM TREASURY ANNEX NO. 2 TO THE PRESS BUILDING

This move was necessitated by the Treasury Department's having to tear down this temporary building to make way for the new Department of Commerce Building. Private concerns were asked to consider this move, but as the moving was to be done at night, in order to prevent the interruption of the work at the bureau, they declined to bid. The commission, therefore, with the cooperation of the Office of Public Buildings and Public Parks of the National Capital, organized a moving force and made the move. It was begun January 31 and completed February 14. The cost of moving from Annex No. 2 to the Press Building was \$2,357.58. The cost of incidental moving from Annex No. 2 to temporary building No. 5, Walker-Johnson Building, 462 Louisiana Avenue, and Treasury Annex No. 1 was \$522. These incidental moves were necessary to take care of surplus in personnel and material that could not be housed in the Press Building. The total for this move was \$2,879.58. From the size of the organization, approximately 1,500 persons, and the amount of material moved, 352 truck loads, it is evident that this was considerably less than it would have cost had private concerns been given the contract, and by making the move at night there was practically no interruption in the work of the people moved and so any costly loss of time was avoided.

2. MOVING THE GENERAL ACCOUNTING OFFICE

(a) *From temporary buildings Nos. 3 and 5 to temporary building No. 6.*—This move was made for two reasons. First, to consolidate small activities of the General Accounting Office in one building, and,

second, to provide space in temporary building No. 5 for the Division of Distribution and Publication of the Department of Commerce and space in temporary building No. 3 for the Bureau of Valuation of the Interstate Commerce Commission. The cost of this move was \$137.70. The work was done by the moving force of the commission. This move made available approximately 3,500 square feet of space in temporary building No. 5 and 900 square feet in temporary building No. 3. This amount of space would otherwise have had to be rented at a cost of not less than \$1 a square foot, so that on this basis a saving of \$4,400 a year was made by the expenditure of \$137.

(b) *From temporary building No. 6 to Emory Building.*—This move was done in order to provide room in temporary building No. 6 for the increase in files of the General Accounting Office housed in that building. The files moved to the Emory Building were part of a series already housed there, and it was thought advisable to move them into the vacant space and justify the claim of the General Accounting Office that they would save in administration more than the cost of the move by having them together.

3. MOVING THE STATE DEPARTMENT WITHIN THE STATE, WAR, AND NAVY BUILDING

For years the State Department has been badly in need of additional space. Investigation showed that the War Department, the only other occupant of this building, could contract no further, so that the only other alternative was to rearrange the State Department some way to make available the needed space. After a complete investigation of the way in which the space assigned to the State Department was being used, the commission recommended several changes in office arrangements, which the survey indicated would make the needed space available and avoid having to rent any additional high-priced office room. The State Department had no funds to make these alterations, so the commission did this work. The cost of the move was \$3,690.49. The actual moving cost was only \$388.18, but the balance of \$3,302.31 was spent to erect partitions, supply cases, etc. This rearrangement provided in the supply division alone 1,700 square feet of space, and in other divisions approximately 2,000 square feet, making a total of at least 3,200 square feet saved. To lease this space would have cost at least one and a half dollars a square foot, so that the money here expended was more than saved the first year.

4. MOVING THE REGISTER'S OFFICE FROM 119 D STREET TO THE AUDITOR'S BUILDING

This was the heaviest and most difficult move made this year by the commission. The first move incident to housing the register's office in the Auditor's Building was to take the files of the General Accounting Office from the Auditor's Building and house them in the Emory Building. Inasmuch as shelving had to be erected in the Emory Building in which to store the files, this part of the move was quite expensive, costing \$12,000.63. The Division of Loans and Currency of the Public Debts Service of the Treasury Department

was then moved from the Auditor's Building to the two new floors just added to the Liberty Loan Building. This cost \$1,492.81. The Auditor's Building was then renovated so that the Register's Office could move into it. The move of the Register's Office to the Auditor's Building cost \$11,506.02. The moving of the fireproof steel shelving, in which the securities of the Register's Office have to be stored, alone cost \$1,344.88. This item may be used as an example of saving effected by the commission. Inasmuch as the commission had no previous experience in the moving of steel cases such as these, bids were invited for this much of the move. There were three bids received, the lowest of which was \$4,500. The result showed a saving of \$3,155.12 below this, which means that the commission did this work for about one-third of what it would have cost to have had the lowest bidder make the move. The saving in the rent of the building vacated amounted to \$40,000 each year. This amount more than pays in the first year for the entire cost of the move.

5. MOVING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FROM THE EMORY BUILDING TO THE ST. JAMES HOTEL

This transfer to the St. James Hotel of the material of the Department of Agriculture previously stored in the Emory Building was necessary to make room for the General Accounting Office's files that, in turn, had to be removed from the old Pension Office Building because of the expansion of the General Accounting Office's files therein. The natural expansion of the files in the Pension Office Building was the cause of the move, and the approximately 1,500 square feet gained there can be said to measure the saving effected by this move and the use of the St. James Hotel as a storehouse.

6. MOVING THE FEDERAL FARM LOAN BUREAU FROM THE LAND OFFICE BUILDING TO THE BARR BUILDING

There were two reasons for this move: (1) The need of the Federal Farm Loan Bureau for additional space, and (2) the need of the Patent Office, Department of Commerce, for additional space. It was found that the former had become crowded to a degree that hampered its efficiency and was close to insanitary, and that there was no way in which additional space in the Land Office Building could be obtained for it. The commission found very desirable quarters in the Barr Building, satisfactory to the Federal Farm Loan Bureau, at an annual rental of \$1.50 per square foot, including maintenance. At about the same time a request had been received from the Department of Commerce for 10,000 square feet of space to house three new divisions which were to be established on July 1 in the Patent Office. Obviously the logical thing to do was to assign to the Patent Office the space being vacated by the Federal Farm Loan Bureau in the Land Office Building, inasmuch as the Patent Office was already occupying a large portion of the latter. This provided most convenient quarters for the Patent Office divisions without having to rent outside space. The cost to the commission of \$690.18 was for alterations and rearrangements in the Barr Building and constituted only a portion of the total cost of the move, the remainder of which was paid by the Federal Farm Loan Bureau.

7. MOVE FOR PERSONNEL CLASSIFICATION BOARD

(a) *Department of Agriculture from temporary building No. 1 to Lemon Building.*—This move served to further consolidation of the Department of Agriculture and to make space in temporary building No. 1 available for other occupancy.

(b) *United States Railroad Administration files from the Pettus Building to temporary building No. 1.*—The files of the Railroad Administration were moved into the space in temporary building No. 1 released by the Department of Agriculture, thus releasing some 3,500 square feet in the Pettus Building to meet the requirements of the enlargement in the Personnel Classification Board.

The cost of these two moves was \$105.10, a negligible amount as compared to the cost of at least \$3,500, if an equivalent 3,500 square feet had been leased even at as low a cost as \$1 per square foot.

8. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FROM TEMPORARY BUILDING F TO LEMON BUILDING

The Lemon Building was leased to care for the expansion of the Bureau of Entomology, and therefore no savings in space resulted from the move. The moving was under the direction of the commission but all expenses incident thereto, with the exception of an item of \$32.75 for equipment paid from the commission's funds, were met by the Department of Agriculture.

ADDITIONAL MOVES FOR WHICH THE COMMISSION WAS REIMBURSED

In addition to the above-mentioned moves, the commission has made two moves for the Department of Agriculture, paid for by that department. The first of these was moving the Bureau of Entomology in temporary building F to the Lemon Building as described above. The second was to move material stored by the Department of Agriculture from 220 Fourteenth Street to the St. James Hotel in order that the space occupied for storage might be used for active files. The commission was requested by the Department of Agriculture to make both of these moves with Government forces.

There were other moves that were incident to the occupancy of space assigned by the commission to Government organizations; but only when the commission ordered the activity into the newly assigned space, or the organization to be moved was without funds to pay for it and would otherwise have had to requisition for additional space, did the commission expend any of its funds for the purpose. In a few instances the organization to be moved was advised to accept the bid of a commercial concern, when it was considered lower than what the commission could make the move for. This happened in the cases of the moves of the Employees Compensation Commission from the Interior Department Building to the Investment Building, and of the Federal radio activities from the Department of Commerce Building to the Interior Building.

The following tables show: (1) All space assigned and released by the various organizations through the Public Buildings Commission during the year 1928, and (2) summary of the moves directed by the commission during the year 1928, the organization moved, points from and to, the cost of the preparation, of moving and of overhead for each move.

LEASES

Due to the fact that the Public Buildings Commission has been given control of the space in the Federal buildings in Washington, it has become the usual practice of the Bureau of the Budget, before approving the amounts asked for rent by the various Federal activities, to require them to obtain the approval of the commission to enter into a new lease or renew an old one. This practice has proven very beneficial to the Government, in that it places on one agency the responsibility for the rate of rental that is paid in the District of Columbia. It also prevents an organization from renting quarters elsewhere, when there might be available space in Government-owned buildings or buildings that are already leased by the Government. Not only have these benefits been obtained, but the arrangement has tended to establish uniform moderate rental rates. It has not been an uncommon occurrence in the past to find governmental activities paying different rates of rental in the same office building. This was due to the fact that the representatives of individual establishments could not have any reliable measure of what the proper rate of rental really was, and could not make as good a bargain as an agency controlling all the leases in the city, so that, in one case at least, the Government as tenant was paying three rates of rental in the same building.

The obtaining of uniform rent rates, of uniformity in the terms of leases, and of greater elasticity in the use of space and facility in securing its most economical utilization has been greatly advanced by charging the Director of Public Buildings and Public Parks, who is *ex officio* executive and disbursing officer of this commission, with the disbursement of appropriations for the rent or lease of space for the executive departments in the District of Columbia. The Bureau of the Budget initiated this practice and has cooperated in carrying it out.

The commission made a determined and successful effort to reduce or eliminate on June 30, 1928, all leases that were thought to be unjustifiably high, and was enabled by the terms of item 4 of the second deficiency bill approved May 29, 1928, to take advantage of the most favorable lease offered. This has resulted in a direct saving of \$19,323.14, and is making an additional \$10,146 available for the Department of Justice to apply for rent to provide for authorized expansion.

The annual rent paid by the Government for the past five years is shown in Table No. 3 and a complete list of all leases approved by the Public Buildings Commission is shown in Table No. 4.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

By the act creating the Public Buildings Commission, approved March 1, 1919, it was given "absolute control of all the allotment of space in the several public buildings owned or leased in the District of Columbia." As soon as a comprehensive survey of the existing housing condition of the Government was made, it was found that proper rearrangement of some Federal activities would result in both economy and increased administrative efficiency. Although the commission had control of all space, it was without power to carry out its orders, due to having no money for this purpose itself, and to the fact that the organizations to be rearranged were likewise without means to pay for moves, or when it was found that one organization should be moved to allow another one space urgently needed for expansion of activities authorized by Congress, the commission was again unable to control the space for the reason that there were no funds provided with which it could move an organization into other quarters. For this reason, the commission asked for and received an appropriation of \$250,000, approved April 22, 1926. With this money the problem of making the best use of the various Federal buildings was greatly facilitated.

The reports of individual moves during the past two and a half years sufficiently show that the commission has handled them in an economical manner, and that the saving or value of each move has exceeded its cost. When a move had to be made, special care has been taken to so plan it as to concentrate the activities of scattered departments for better administration, and to place records and supplies in relatively inexpensive warehouse or loft buildings, thus keeping the rental of expensive office space down to a minimum. For instance, the General Accounting Office which in 1924 occupied space in 20 buildings now is concentrated in 4, with some storage in 6 more; the Interior Department, housed in 8 widely separated buildings is now concentrated in 1. One hundred sixty-nine thousand five hundred square feet in the Emory Building, the Kalorama Street garage, the Merchants Transfer Co. garage, and the St. James Hotel provide adequately for little used files, records, and supplies, at an average cost of 28 cents a square foot; and this may be considered as making available in Government buildings a corresponding amount of space suitable for office use and as avoiding the necessity of renting it at \$1 to \$1.50 a square foot. While the persistent expansion of Government activities has necessitated an actual increase in the total expenditure for rents, pending completion of the new public buildings, the foregoing policy has limited the increase to the minimum consistent with good administration and healthful working conditions.

The continuation of a large number of activities and records in the temporary war buildings remains a serious fire menace and decreases the efficiency of the occupants in extremely hot weather.

NOTE.—The storage in the Navy Building consists mainly of semiactive files and office supplies. Approximately 75 per cent of space referred to in column 10 is actually covered by file cases. The building was designed for a uniform live load of 75 pounds per square foot. The file cases have a much greater load per square foot over the space occupied, but the total load, if distributed, would not greatly exceed the allowable load. As a general rule, the amount of the concentrations was governed entirely by the shearing action on the joists. It is considered important that periodic surveys of the building be made as there is a tendency to place loads greatly in excess of the allowable floor loads.
