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LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

To the PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF
REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SEVENTY-FOURTH CONGRESS:

Pursuant to the provisions of section 6 (c) of the act of July 3, 1930 (Public, No. 536, 71st Cong.), I have the honor to submit the following report of activities of the Veterans' Administration for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1935.

This, the Fifth Annual Report of the Veterans' Administration, discloses the nature and extent of benefits furnished veterans and their dependents under laws and Presidential regulations in effect during the fiscal year 1935. The text deals largely with changes and developments within the year covered by the report, while many of the statistical tables show the number of beneficiaries at the close of each fiscal period since the benefit was first authorized. The report also contains a summarization of the important provisions of the Presidential regulations issued and the new legislation enacted during and shortly after the close of this year which directly affect the activities of this Administration.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1935

INTRODUCTION

In the field of monetary benefits the application of the liberalizing compensation and pension provisions of Public, No. 141, enacted March 28, 1934, continued to occupy the major attention of the Veterans' Administration during the year. While adjustments in rates and entitlement immediately possible after this new law went into effect were made by the beginning of this year, there remained the problem of reviewing some 342,000 claims as well as the adjudication of new claims under the changed provisions of law. By the end of this year final action had been taken in approximately 80 percent of all cases affected thereby. The net effect of this action is shown by a comparison of the disbursements for these purposes, which increased from \$321,394,530.63 for the fiscal year 1934 to \$374,425,539.57 for the fiscal year 1935. With the President's approval of Public, No. 269, legislation of great importance to veterans of the Spanish American War, Philippine Insurrection, and Boxer Rebellion and their dependents was placed on the statute books. This act reenacted all laws in effect on March 19, 1933, granting pensions to these groups of veterans. In effect, it was estimated that some 251,000 veterans and their dependents would benefit to the extent of approximately \$46,000,000 per annum.

Concurrently with granting increased monetary benefits to veterans of the Spanish American and World Wars, there arose the need for additional hospital facilities in the light of increased demands especially from among those suffering from mental diseases, and from Negro veterans in the South. Initial studies early in the year culminated in February in a request for an allotment of funds from the Public Works Administration. While funds from this source were not made available, except for certain maintenance projects, due to restrictions later imposed by the National Emergency Council governing the ratio of cost of labor to cost of materials, this initial program served as a basis for a more extensive one later submitted to the Congress, which on August 12, 1935, appropriated \$21,250,000 for the acquisition of a gross total of some 12,116 beds, thus assuring, when the program is completed within the next 3 years, a total of 55,858 beds in Government facilities for the hospitalization of veterans, not including 21,216 beds for domiciliary care.

In addition, the President on August 30, 1935, approved resolutions of the Federal Board of Hospitalization dated July 29, 1935, in which it was recommended that the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs be authorized to submit to the Bureau of the Budget estimates of appropriations within the unappropriated balance remaining under the General Construction Authorization Act of March 4, 1931, Public,

No. 868, Seventy-first Congress, for the following new construction: 500-bed neuropsychiatric hospital in middle Tennessee or northern Alabama; 350-bed general hospital in or near Detroit, Mich.; 100-bed general hospital in the vicinity of White River Junction, Vt.; and a treatment station of 25 beds with space for a regional office in Reno, Nev.

Guardianship.—In the administration of veterans' affairs of paramount importance has become the problem of assuring the full measure of benefit from payments made to fiduciaries in behalf of incompetent veterans and minor children of deceased veterans. These payments and other receipts during the fiscal year aggregate \$36,257,511.57 in the cases of approximately 83,000 wards whose estates now aggregate \$129,232,778.51. While much progress was made in prior years in this direction, extensive studies of this problem both by the Congress and the Veterans' Administration during this year resulted in the enactment of Public, No. 262, dated August 12, 1935, which authorized the Veterans' Administration to exercise closer and more direct supervision over expenditures made on account of these wards of the Government.

Improved service in the medical care of beneficiaries.—Recognizing that the medical phase of veterans' relief is the most extensive organized project of its kind in the world, it has continued to be the policy of the Administration to take every means to see that its quality is of the highest order. On the physical side modern, well-equipped hospitals and clinics have been developed. On the professional side, every effort has been made to maintain high standards for the admission of medical personnel into the service and to extend opportunity to such personnel for their training and advancement in the specialized branches of medicine.

During the past several years postgraduate courses in medicine and surgery have been conducted at Veterans' Administration Facility, Washington, D. C., and until recently at Palo Alto, Calif. These are "refresher" courses and are intended for physicians who have been with the Administration for some time, and who have not had the advantage of familiarizing themselves with the modern concepts in medicine, surgery, and in the specialties. Altogether 165 physicians have undergone postgraduate instruction at the two facilities since 1928.

In addition to the "refresher" courses, the Administration has established a policy of giving intensive instruction to associate physicians upon their entrance into the service. These courses are conducted in a number of facilities for the purpose of instructing the associate physicians in regulations and procedure of the Administration, and to ascertain the qualifications and aptitude of each, so that an estimate may be made of his qualifications and ability prior to permanent assignment with the Administration. Since this policy has been in effect 226 associate physicians have been given courses, and have subsequently been assigned to permanent duty.

Because of the needs of the service for specialists of various kinds, courses have been given at certain of our facilities in pathology, roentgenology, operative surgery, urology, electrocardiography, etc. In addition, postgraduate instruction has been authorized for a number of our physicians in civilian clinics and medical schools in the various specialties. Since the establishment of the policy of

giving physicians postgraduate instruction in the different branches of medicine, 455 physicians have had the benefit of various courses in medicine, surgery, and in the specialties.

During this year there were established at Aspinwall, Pa., a clinic, a postgraduate school, and a laboratory for intensive work in connection with the diagnosis and treatment of allergic diseases. This unit serves as a postgraduate school for the instruction of physicians in the diagnosis and treatment of allergic diseases, such as asthma, hay fever, and similar conditions. In addition, the laboratory of the unit prepares all of the allergens, both stock and autogenous, for use in the diagnosis and treatment of allergic diseases in the facilities and dispensaries of the Administration.

As an example of its cooperation with civilian medical societies, the Administration cooperated with the National Tuberculosis Association and contributed a scientific exhibit in connection with the meeting of the association at Saranac Lake, N. Y., June 24-27, 1935. A representative of the Administration also presented a report of a study on the end results of the surgical treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis before one of the clinical sessions. This form of treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis has made such rapid strides in recent years, and the various operative procedures have been standardized to such an extent, that it is planned to apply the treatment on a larger scale in the tuberculosis facilities of the Administration.

At the facility, Hines, Ill., the Administration has one of the largest cancer services in the world, with a capacity of 255 beds. There are available at this facility two high voltage X-ray machines and a radium emanation plant containing 1 gram of radium in solution, from which is obtained radium emanation both for local use and for distribution to other facilities of the service. In addition, there are available 2 grams of radium for use in the radium "bomb." Accordingly, the Government has available at this facility 3 grams of radium. The cancer research unit which is in operation at this facility to conduct research in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer is doing worth-while work at the present time in connection with the diagnosis of teratoma and embryonal carcinoma. These are malignant types of tumors which are characterized by the presence in the urine of prolan or the so-called sex hormones. The quantitative estimation of this hormone is obtained by injection of the urine of the patient into mice and noting the effect of the hormone on the uterus of the animal. In addition, a clinical, pathologic, and radiotherapeutic study of lymphosarcoma was made by the cancer research unit during the past fiscal year, and published in the *Archives of Surgery*. Other studies showing the incidence of various types of malignant diseases in the ex-service population and the best methods of diagnosing and of treating the tumors are being conducted, and it is believed that as a result of these studies a considerable advance will be made in the management of the various types of cancer. The question of the diagnosis and treatment of cancer is a very important one at this time inasmuch as the number of veterans with cancer is increasing rapidly—so much so, that five auxiliary cancer clinics have been established at strategic points throughout the country to take care of the increased cancer load. All of these clinics have the necessary radium, deep X-ray therapy equipment, and personnel needed for the proper diagnosis and treatment of cancer.

Certain other advances are being made by the Administration in the diagnosis and treatment of diseases which are frequently found in the ex-service population. The question of the diagnosis of arthritis and the best type of treatment for this disease is receiving attention. This disease, which is increasing in incidence in the ex-service population, is characterized by a great deal of disablement and economic loss. Studies have been conducted tending to facilitate its diagnosis and improve its treatment. At the Dayton, Ohio, facility, research work is being conducted with an apparatus known as the Kettering hypertherm. This apparatus is a means of introducing artificial fever therapy in the treatment of various diseases. It is proving particularly effective in the management of such diseases as arthritis and general paresis, and other forms of neurosyphilis.

Enrollment of veterans for emergency conservation work, etc.—Pursuant to special authority of the President and upon the approval of the Director of Emergency Conservation Work, the quota for the veterans' contingent of the Civilian Conservation Corps as of July 2, 1934, was 28,225 for the States at large and 5,000 for the 22 States comprising the then drought-stricken area of the country as designated by the Department of Agriculture, or a total basic veterans' quota of 33,225. The enrollment to fill this quota began on July 2, 1934, and replacement enrollments were authorized quarterly thereafter to maintain the veterans' contingent at full strength.

During the year the Veterans' Administration selected and the War Department enrolled in the Civilian Conservation Corps 26,547 veterans from the States at large and 7,520 veterans from the drought area, placing in employment on emergency conservation work a total of 34,067 veterans, a large proportion of whom allotted three-fourths of their pay toward the support of dependent relatives. As of June 30, 1935, there were 31,715 veterans employed on this work in 268 Civilian Conservation Corps companies, as compared with 21,732 veterans in 138 companies on June 30, 1934.

The unemployment of ex-service men in such large numbers throughout the country, as has been experienced during the past several years, has resulted in increased demands for hospitalization, domiciliary care, and monetary benefits. It has greatly stimulated demands for the cash payment of adjusted-service certificates. The Government, through its several agencies, has made every possible effort to find reemployment for veterans. To meet this growing problem the work of the United States Employment Service, established in the Department of Labor on June 6, 1933, with a national officer in charge of the Veterans' Placement Service and an extensive field organization, and the enrollment of veterans in the Emergency Conservation Work (Civilian Conservation Corps) first limited to 25,000 and increased to 55,000 beginning June 15, 1935, have helped materially. These efforts, however, have not solved permanently the future of the unemployed nondisabled veteran now reaching middle age.

During this year continuously and in the early months of the fiscal year 1936, there have congregated in Washington groups of veterans from all parts of the country, for whom relief and assistance were not generally available except in the form of temporary relief through the transient bureaus established throughout the country under the Federal Emergency Relief Administration. Special arrangements

were necessary through the Federal Emergency Relief Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corps to take care of these men, who in the aggregate totaled some 5,500 during the year.

With the Department of Labor reporting 443,372 veterans actively seeking jobs through the United States Employment Service as of June 30, 1935, there is every indication of the necessity for the several agencies of the Federal Government to continue their efforts toward placing these men in permanent employment in order that they may resume their normal place in society.

Organization.—There was continued during this year the policy of consolidating field activities when this was possible without impairment of service to beneficiaries and to the advantage of the Government from the standpoint of savings in operating costs. During the year consolidations were effected in the States of Missouri, California, Virginia, and West Virginia, and to date there have been 28 of these consolidations out of a possible total of 54. Several additional consolidations were authorized during the year which it is expected will be accomplished in the near future. It is roughly estimated that a saving of approximately 10 percent in operating costs is obtained in making these consolidations and, in total, this recurring annual saving has reached an aggregate of more than \$2,000,000. These savings are reflected in such items as salaries, miscellaneous medical-fee services, supplies, telephone service, rentals, and miscellaneous contract services. It is felt that the Administration is able to give equal or better service at combined facilities.

Transfers of functions.—Executive Order No. 6166, promulgated June 10, 1933, pursuant to the provisions of section 2, title III, of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, "An act to maintain the credit of the United States Government", provided, among other things for the transfer to the Treasury Department of the functions of disbursement of moneys of the United States. The disbursement activities of the Veterans' Administration (central office) were transferred to the Division of Disbursement, Treasury Department, on January 16, 1934, and field disbursement activities on various dates throughout this fiscal year, the first transfer of this kind being New York City on October 16, 1934.

Executive Order No. 6670, promulgated April 7, 1934, under the same authority as hereinbefore mentioned, provided for the transfer to the Civil Service Commission of the functions of the Veterans' Administration pertaining to civil-service-retirement activities. Executive Order No. 6731, issued June 5, 1934, extended the time of transfer beyond the effective date of Executive Order No. 6670, and provided that such transfer might be made operative and effective between June 7, 1934, and October 1, 1934. The transfer was effected as of September 1, 1934.

MEDICAL AND DOMICILIARY CARE AND TREATMENT

HOSPITALIZATION

Remaining under treatment.—At the expiration of this fiscal year the total hospital load of the Veterans' Administration was 42,984, an increase of 2,925, or approximately 7 percent in the number as of June 30, 1934. With the exception of the fiscal year 1933, during which the Economy Act which denied hospitalization to a large

group of veterans with non-service-connected disabilities was passed, there has been a steadily increasing percentage of patients with disabilities not of service origin remaining in hospitals at the close of each fiscal year.

The total patient load at the expiration of this year was composed of 42,599 United States veterans, classified by service as follows: World War, 38,033; Spanish American War, 2,369; Civil War, 117; all other wars, expeditions, and occupations, 70; and peace-time service, 2,010. There were 12,046 United States veterans under treatment for diseases or injuries determined to be of service origin, of whom 10,746 had service in the World War; 38 in the Spanish American War; 3 in other expeditions and occupations; 1 in the Civil War; and 1,258 in the regular establishment during peace time.

In addition to United States veterans there were under treatment 57 veterans of countries allied with the United States in the World War; 282 employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps, and Civil Works Administration; and 46 miscellaneous beneficiaries. Included in the 42,599 United States veterans are 237 female and 3,822 colored beneficiaries.

Of the patients in hospitals at the close of this year 12 percent were under treatment for tuberculosis, 55 percent for neuropsychiatric diseases, and 33 percent for general medical or surgical conditions. This represents a marked change in the character of the patient population since June 30, 1923, when 41 percent of the patients were classed as tubercular, 39 percent as neuropsychiatric, and 20 percent as general.

Admissions.—Since March 3, 1919, when the acquisition of Government hospital facilities was first authorized for the treatment of veterans of the World War, there have been 1,448,421 admissions to hospitals of which 106,897 were made during this year. The admissions for this year represent an increase of 67 percent over 1934 but the number is 28 percent less than the peak of 148,662 in 1932. The material increase in admissions during this year is due to the application of Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, approved March 28, 1934, which removed the restrictions placed on hospitalization by Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, approved March 20, 1933, and the veterans' regulations promulgated thereunder by the President and reestablished practically the same basis of eligibility as was authorized by the World War Veterans' Act, October 1924, which was in effect at the time of the enactment of Public, No. 2.

Since June 7, 1924, when hospitalization was first authorized for the veterans of all wars without regard to the origin of their disabilities 677,394 or 66 percent of all admissions have been for the treatment of disabilities not connected with service. Approximately 88 percent of the admissions this year were on account of non-service-connected disabilities.

Of the United States veterans admitted to hospitals during this year approximately 90 percent had service in the World War and 7 percent in the Spanish American War. In addition to United States veterans, there were 7,263 admissions of other patients, including 299 allied veterans and 6,629 employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps, Civil Works Administration, and Public Works Administration.

An analysis of the type of hospital admissions during this year shows that 48,834 or 46 percent of the total were first admissions;

56,108 or 52 percent readmissions; and 1,955 or 2 percent admissions by transfer from other facilities.

During this year 10,387 admissions were authorized for the observation or treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis; 7,539 for psychotic or mental diseases; 9,680 for other neurological disorders, and 79,291 for general medical and surgical conditions.

There were 581 female and 9,937 colored veterans admitted to hospitals during this year.

Included in the 106,897 admissions during this year are 2,360 cases in which the veteran was originally admitted for hospital treatment and later transferred to domiciliary status within the same facility.

Turn-over.—During the fiscal year 1935 the patient turn-over in all types of Veterans' Administration hospitals was approximately once every 5½ months. Based upon the experience of this year, hospitals devoted principally to the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases have a complete patient turn-over once every 2½ years. The relatively low turn-over rate experienced for this type of case is due to the long and continuous hospital treatment usually required and a low mortality rate. During this fiscal year the turn-over rate for hospitals utilized primarily for the treatment of tuberculosis was about once every 5 months. The attainment of a low rate of turn-over is highly desirable among the tuberculous veterans, inasmuch as arrest of this disease is seldom obtained in less than 1 year of extensive care, treatment, and exercise. The turn-over rate for this year in hospitals treating a majority of general medical and surgical patients was approximately once every 2 months.

Discharges.—During this fiscal year 153,018 patients were under hospitalization, of whom 145,072 were United States veterans. The total number of patients treated represents an increase of approximately 41 percent since 1934. Of those treated 102,473 were discharged after an average of 96.2 in-patient days. Patients who remained until the completion of treatment numbered 83,626 or 81.6 percent of the total discharges. The incomplete cases totaled 18,847, and include 5,224 cases in which further treatment or care was required in another facility or out-patient clinic; 13,300 cases in which the patient was discharged for personal reasons, i. e., against medical advice, leaving without permission, etc.; and 323 cases not entitled to hospitalization under the laws now in effect. Approximately 75 percent of the patients discharged during this year had been under treatment for general diseases or conditions; 16,846 or 16 percent for neuropsychiatric diseases; and 9 percent for pulmonary tuberculosis. In 72 percent of the completed and 49 percent of the incomplete cases recovery or some improvement was effected.

Deaths in hospitals during this year totaled 7,253 or 7 percent of the discharges as compared with 5,334 or 9 percent in 1934. Of the total deaths 4,340 or 59.84 percent occurred among patients under treatment for general conditions; 1,885 or 25.57 percent for pulmonary tuberculosis; and 1,058 or 14.59 percent for neuropsychiatric diseases. Considering the total discharged after treatment for each type of disability during this year 20 percent of the pulmonary tuberculosis cases resulted in death, 6 percent of the general and 6 percent of the neuropsychiatric. Of the 4,340 deaths among general patients more than 34 percent were caused by diseases of the circulatory system,

including organic heart disease, and approximately 29 percent by malignant tumors and diseases of the digestive system.

During the year 75,649 World War veterans were discharged after treatment for diseases or conditions not connected with service and 10,845 for disabilities of service origin. There were 5,763 cases in which the veteran was examined or observed for compensation, pension, or insurance purposes. The remaining 10,216 discharges of United States veterans were classified by service as follows: Spanish American War, 79 service connected and 6,583 nonservice connected; peace time, 1,682 service connected and 1,347 nonservice connected; Civil War, 13 service connected and 335 nonservice connected; and miscellaneous occupations, rebellions, etc., 6 service connected and 171 nonservice connected. In addition to United States veterans there were 7,561 discharges of other patients, 302 of whom were veterans of countries allied with the United States in the World War, 6,910 employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps, Public Works, Civil Works, etc., and 349 miscellaneous beneficiaries.

Included in the total of 102,473 discharges during this year are 3,201 cases classified as interfacility transfers, i. e., cases in which the veteran was discharged from hospital treatment after having at some time between the date of original admission and final discharge also received domiciliary care within the same facility.

There were 65,883 surgical operations performed during this year, the largest number at any one facility being 14,670 at Hines, Ill.

DOMICILIARY CARE

Remaining.—On June 30, 1935, the veteran population reported as present in domiciliary status in facilities under the jurisdiction and control of the Veterans' Administration totaled 9,323 as compared with 9,404 on June 30, 1934, a decrease of 81 during this fiscal period.

The number present in domiciliary status on June 30, 1935, was divided as to color and sex as follows: White males, 8,250; white females, 37; and colored males, 1,036.

The approximate average age of the veterans of each of the major wars who were present in domiciliary status at the close of this fiscal year was as follows: Civil, 92; Spanish-American, 61; and World, 43.

The percentage distribution of the membership by wars as of June 30, 1935, was as follows: Civil, 0.39; Spanish-American, 13.79; World, 80.08; other wars, 0.44; and peace time, 5.30.

Approximately two-thirds of the domiciled veterans are under care in facilities located in the States of California, Ohio, Wisconsin, and Tennessee.

In conformity with the act of August 27, 1888 (U. S. C., title 24, sec. 134), the Federal Government is required to reimburse State or Territorial homes for disabled volunteer soldiers at the rate of \$120 per year for each person domiciled therein who is eligible for similar care in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration. During this year an average of 4,160 such persons were cared for, thereby creating an obligation of approximately \$499,200 on the part of the Federal Government.

Admissions.—During this year there were 8,656 admissions for domiciliary care, including 1,152 cases in which the veteran was originally admitted for this purpose and later transferred to hospital status within the same facility.

An analysis of the type of admission shows that 2,169, or 25 percent, were first admissions; 5,994, or 69 percent, readmissions; and 493, or 6 percent, admissions by transfer from other facilities.

Of the veterans admitted during this year 85 percent had service in the World War and 11 percent in the Spanish-American War.

There were 5 female and 646 colored veterans admitted for domiciliary care during the year. Approximately 85 percent of the admissions this year were for non-service-connected disabilities.

Discharges.—During this year 10,612 veterans were discharged after an average period of 6½ months' domiciliary care. These discharges were classified as follows: 8,275 routine or transfers within the same or to other facilities; 57 deaths; 379 ineligible for further care; 1,305 voluntary without formal discharge; and 596 disciplinary. Approximately 76 percent of the discharges were for veterans with general medical conditions. The principal causes of death among domiciled veterans were diseases of the arteries and organic disease of the heart.

Of the total veterans discharged 8,554 were World War veterans and of these 7,326 were disabled by non-service-connected disabilities. The other discharges were classified as to service as follows: Spanish-American War, 1,438; peace time, 552; Civil War, 23; and various occupations and rebellions, 45. Included in the total 10,612 discharges during this year are 2,555 cases classified as interfacility transfers, i. e., cases in which the veteran was discharged from domiciliary care after having at some time between the date of original admission and final discharge also received hospital treatment within the same facility.

HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY FACILITIES

On June 30, 1935, the Veterans' Administration was operating hospital facilities at 80 locations in 43 States and the District of Columbia. These facilities provided a total of 44,793 beds, an increase of 1,501 in the number available on June 30, 1934.

Two newly constructed facilities were opened during the fiscal year, one at Roanoke, Va., with a capacity of 472 beds, and the other at San Francisco, Calif., with a capacity of 336 beds. In addition, the 225 bed facility at Dwight, Ill., which was closed shortly after the passage of the Economy Act of 1933 was reopened.

Additional hospital beds were acquired during the year through new construction, alterations, or readjustment of space at Palo Alto, Calif.; San Fernando, Calif.; Washington, D. C.; Augusta, Ga.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Marion, Ind.; Gulfport, Miss.; Dayton, Ohio; Muskogee, Okla.; Hot Springs, S. Dak.; and Sheridan, Wyo.

At the expiration of this year the Veterans' Administration was utilizing 1,575 beds in other Government hospitals, distributed by branch of service as follows: Army, 758; Navy, 377; Public Health Service, 335; and Interior Department, 105.

On June 30, 1935, there were 20,073 beds available for domiciliary care in facilities under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration, a decrease of 3,474 in the number on June 30, 1934.

Practically all of the decrease in domiciliary beds during this year occurred at two facilities, Danville, Ill., which is being converted into a hospital for the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases, and Togus, Maine, where a number of nonfireproof barracks were torn down to

provide a suitable site for new barrack buildings now under construction.

The total number of beds available in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration on June 30, 1935, was 64,866, as compared with 66,839 on June 30, 1934, a decrease of 1,973 during this fiscal period.

During the period beginning with the act of March 3, 1919 (Public, No. 326, 65th Cong.), and ending with the act of August 12, 1935 (Public, No. 260, 74th Cong.), the Congress has specifically authorized the sum of \$149,222,000 for new hospital, domiciliary, and outpatient dispensary facilities, of which \$145,222,000 has been appropriated. In addition, there has been expended since 1923 approximately \$21,290,000 from regular fiscal funds for permanent improvements and extensions to Veterans' Administration facilities. This latter figure, however, does not include expenditures for the purposes mentioned at the former national homes for disabled volunteer soldiers prior to their consolidation with the Pension and Veterans' Bureaus in July 1930. Further, the Veterans' Administration has been allotted the sum of \$3,006,650 under the provisions of the National Recovery Act of 1933 for improvements and new construction at a number of its facilities.

FUTURE HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY CONSTRUCTION

At the expiration of this fiscal year work was in progress on the construction of 2 barrack buildings of 350 beds each to replace non-fireproof structures at Togus, Maine; the conversion of the former soldiers' home at Danville, Ill., to a 1,850-bed hospital of the neuro-psychiatric type; alterations to the hospital buildings at Los Angeles, Calif., as the result of which it is expected to acquire 512 additional beds; and alterations to the hospital buildings at North Little Rock, Ark., to provide 52 additional beds.

The new construction program of the Veterans' Administration for which funds were available on June 30, 1935, but which had not been placed under contract on that date provides for a new 400-bed general hospital to replace unsatisfactory facilities at Bath, N. Y., 466 additional neuropsychiatric beds at Waco, Tex., 303 additional neuropsychiatric beds at North Little Rock, Ark., 164 additional neuropsychiatric beds at Perry Point, Md., and for the partial replacement of nonfireproof barracks at Los Angeles, Calif. The 933 additional beds to be acquired under this program are for the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases, and of this number 631, or over two-thirds, are for colored beneficiaries.

As a result of studies constantly being made the conclusion was reached in this fiscal year that the above-outlined program would be inadequate to meet the expected normal increase in the neuropsychiatric hospital load for the next several years, and when it was thought that there existed a possibility of obtaining sufficient funds from the Public Works Administration to meet this expected shortage in beds, a program of new construction was prepared and submitted to that agency on February 23, 1935. Before any action had been taken on this program, the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act for 1935 was passed, and upon the establishment of the National Emergency Council said program was revised and submitted to that

agency. In June of this year when it was realized that, because the proposed type of construction did not furnish the desired proportionate amount of labor as against material costs, there was little chance of obtaining funds in this manner, the matter was presented to the President, and he approved the submission to the Congress of a revised program with the request that the sum of \$20,000,000 for such purpose be included in the then pending second deficiency bill. This amount was increased by congressional action to \$21,250,000 to provide for additional new construction at Johnson City, Tenn., North Little Rock, Ark., Fort Lyon, Colo., and Newington, Conn. The appropriation is made by Public, No. 260, Seventy-fourth Congress, approved August 12, 1935.

The program prepared by the Veterans' Administration in support of its request for an appropriation of \$20,000,000 provides for new construction at 38 locations in 29 States, and is designed largely to furnish additional beds at existing facilities for the treatment of beneficiaries with neuropsychiatric diseases. It makes no provision for new institutions, and the new general medical and surgical beds included are for the purpose of rounding out existing facilities or meeting special needs. It provides for the acquisition of a gross total of 11,816 beds, of which 6,835 are for neuropsychiatric patients, 455 for tuberculous patients, 2,276 for general medical and surgical patients, and 2,250 for domiciliary members. The actual net increase in beds, however, is but 8,832, in that 2,634 are to replace existing unsatisfactory facilities and 350 are merely a change in the type of present utilization. The number of beds to be replaced for each type is as follows: Neuropsychiatric, 134; tuberculosis, 300; general medical and surgical, 800; and domiciliary, 1,400. The program as submitted contemplates the erection of separate barrack accommodations for 50 female beneficiaries at each of the following locations: Los Angeles, Calif.; Dayton, Ohio; and Bay Pines, Fla.; and for 844 additional hospital beds for colored, including 350 at Tuskegee, Ala.; 164 at Roanoke, Va.; 100 at Alexandria, La.; and 230 at Columbia, S. C. It is expected that the first project under this program will be advertised in August 1935, and that construction work on all projects will have been completed by July 1938.

As shown in another section of this report there were available on June 30, 1935, in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration 44,793 hospital and 20,073 domiciliary beds, or a total of 64,866 beds of both types. Upon completion of presently authorized construction and in the event that the projects listed in the program used to form the basis of the amount appropriated by Public, No. 260, approved August 12, 1935, are accomplished there will be available 55,858 hospital, 21,216 domiciliary, and a combined total of 77,074 beds or 12,208 in excess of the number on June 30, 1935.

With the passage of Public, No. 2, Seventy-fourth Congress, approved February 2, 1935, which appropriated and made generally available the remaining balances not heretofore appropriated under several authorization acts for new construction at specified locations, there remains but one authorization act for new hospital and domiciliary construction under which there is an unappropriated balance. This act, Public, No. 868, Seventy-first Congress, approved March 4, 1931, authorized to be appropriated the sum of \$20,877,000, of which \$16,877,000 has been appropriated, leaving an unappropriated balance

of \$4,000,000. At the close of this fiscal year, the Federal Board of Hospitalization, of which the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs is chairman, was considering the need for recommending the appropriation of all or part of this balance to permit new construction at those locations for which bills were introduced during the Seventy-fourth Congress or in the interest of which briefs had been filed, but which were not included in the program prepared and submitted by the Veterans' Administration in support of the appropriation contained in Public, No. 260, Seventy-fourth Congress, approved August 12, 1935.

OPERATING AND PER DIEM COSTS FOR HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY FACILITIES

During this year the net operating expense for all hospital and domiciliary facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration totaled \$43,880,302.30, of which \$39,855,873.83 was for hospital and \$4,024,428.47 for domiciliary facilities. This amount does not include expenditures for new construction, major alterations, nonexpendable equipment, or those for the diagnostic centers at San Francisco, Calif., and Hines, Ill. Throughout the year there was a daily average of 39,030 patients of all types under treatment, and a daily average of 10,406 beneficiaries receiving domiciliary care.

The per diem cost of operation for hospital facilities used principally for the treatment of tuberculosis was \$4.01 for this year, an increase of 3 cents over last year. For hospital facilities devoted exclusively to the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases the per diem rate for this year was \$1.97 as compared with \$1.76 for 1934, an increase of 21 cents. The per diem rate for hospital facilities used largely for the treatment of general medical and surgical conditions was \$3.41 for this year, an increase of 42 cents over last year. For all hospital facilities the per diem rate this year was \$2.78 as compared with \$2.51 in 1934. The per diem cost of operation for domiciliary facilities this year was \$1.06. The per diem rates shown are for facilities which functioned the entire year and include authorized legislative reductions in salaries, which incidentally were at higher rates during 1934 than in 1935. This factor together with the increased cost of supplies and materials, principally subsistence stores which increased approximately 15 percent over last year, was responsible for the higher per diem rates in 1935.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS AND OUT-PATIENT TREATMENT

During this fiscal year the field facilities of the Veterans' Administration made a total of 885,349 physical examinations for out-patient purposes, an increase of 325,795 in the number accomplished during the preceding fiscal period. Of the number made during this year 867,624 or approximately 98 percent were medical and 17,725 or 2 percent dental. Approximately 96 percent of the medical and 87 percent of the dental examinations were made by physicians on a salary basis, as compared with 92 percent and 85 percent, respectively, during the fiscal year 1934.

Treatments furnished during this year totaled 804,406 as compared with 575,816 last year, an increase of 228,590. Of the number furnished during this year 744,035 or approximately 92 percent were

medical and 60,371 or 8 percent dental. Approximately 75 percent of the medical and 89 percent of the dental treatments were furnished by physicians on a salary basis, as compared with 64 and 83 percent, respectively, during the fiscal year 1934.

The increase reported for this year in the percentage of out-patient work rendered by physicians on a salary basis is due to the current policy of having this service as far as possible provided at field stations under the control of the Veterans' Administration. The frequently incomplete character of physical examination reports for disability rating purposes prepared by designated and private physicians on a fee basis residing in the home communities of claimants and beneficiaries was largely responsible for the adoption of this policy. Claimants and beneficiaries are now being physically examined for purposes of disability compensation, pension, and Government insurance at that field station which is nearest to their place of residence, regardless of territorial lines. The medical staffs at all field facilities of the Veterans' Administration have been adjusted so that any special examination—neuropsychiatric, tuberculosis, eye, ear, nose, or throat or orthopedic—can be made in addition to the usual general physical examination.

DENTAL RELIEF

The value of dental services rendered in clinics of the Veterans' Administration during this fiscal year computed on a fee basis was \$1,674,920 as compared with \$1,509,228 for the fiscal year 1934, an increase of \$165,692. The actual cost of furnishing this relief was \$852,085, thereby resulting in a net saving of \$822,835, or approximately 49 percent through the operation of Government clinics. Of the total value of dental service rendered in clinics, \$505,279 was in connection with the treatment of service-connected disabilities and \$1,169,641 or approximately 70 percent as auxiliary to the treatment of non-service-connected disabilities for which beneficiaries were receiving domiciliary care or hospitalization.

The number of beneficiaries that received dental service in clinics during this year totaled 58,629 as compared with 55,318 in 1934, an increase of 3,311. Of the beneficiaries furnished dental relief during this year, 55,830 were in receipt of hospitalization or domiciliary care at the time the service was rendered. The cost per case of rendering this relief during the fiscal year 1935 was \$14.53 as compared with \$14.67 in 1934; \$15.25 in 1933; and \$25.93 in 1930. It is believed that the cost per patient of rendering dental treatment has about reached its minimum.

Authorizations for dental treatment by private practitioners in those service-connected cases in which it was more economical to furnish relief in this manner increased from 1,825 cases to the value of \$66,038 in the fiscal year 1934 to 2,260 cases to the value of \$89,997 in 1935. The increase reported for this year is due in part to the restoration of the deduction in authorized fees required by the Economy Act of March 1933, and to the application of the provisions of sections 27 and 28 of Public, No. 141, approved March 28, 1934, which increased the number of service-connected dental cases handled on a fee basis by 34 percent.

The current requirement of securing prior approval of central office for out-patient adjunct dental treatment has resulted in a better

administrative control of this phase of the work. During the fiscal year 1935 this treatment was authorized for 2,684 veterans as compared with 3,387 in 1934, a decrease of 703 cases.

On June 30, 1935, there were 161 full-time dental officers on duty with the Veterans' Administration with two vacancies in the process of being filled, as compared with 161 full time and one part time on June 30, 1934.

PENSIONS AND COMPENSATION

VETERANS

Civil War.—Out of a total of 2,213,365 that served in this war, which terminated 70 years ago, pensions were being paid to 13,273 veterans on June 30, 1935. This represents a reduction of 5,182 in the number of veterans on June 30, 1934. Of those on the pension roll at the close of this year 5,912 were in receipt of \$75 per month and eleven \$85 per month, as authorized by the act of June 9, 1930, while 7,196 were being paid \$100 per month and seven \$110 per month under the same authority by reason of being helpless or blind or so nearly helpless or blind as to require the regular aid and attendance of another person. The balance of the pension roll consisted of 26 veterans who were in receipt of pension under the general laws for service-connected disabilities and 121 veterans who were beneficiaries of special acts of Congress. The disbursements for pensions to veterans during this fiscal period totaled \$16,144,255.36, as compared with \$20,051,397.35 for the previous year, a reduction of \$3,907,141.99. There were 43 new claims filed during this year.

Indian wars.—On account of Indian war service 3,899 veterans were in receipt of pensions on June 30, 1935, and to this class \$2,138,494.97 was paid during this year. This represents a decrease of 471 in the number of veterans on the roll June 30, 1934, and a decrease of \$39,696.10 in disbursements over last year. There were 96 new claims filed during this year.

Spanish American War.—The work of the year in behalf of this group has been to accomplish the review required under section 30, Public, No. 141, approved March 28, 1934, whereby there was a restoration of three-fourths of the former rates of pension in cases in which a greater amount was not provided by the veterans' regulations issued pursuant to Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress. This affected principally the veterans whose disabilities had not previously been considered to result from war-time service, since with respect to war-time service connection disability generally Public, No. 2 was the more liberal enactment. The review required a close scrutiny of many claims involving nonpensionable disabilities, and as in the World War group, the correction of clear and unmistakable errors which in years past had been overlooked in the adjudications. Since all the veterans had rights under at least two separate laws, and many under four, and since in addition many claims for increases were received, the group was very active, and presented rating and adjudication activities of considerable complexity. During the year, purusant to the consolidation of veterans' activities heretofore reported, there was an effort to complete the record of statements of fact and law in line with Veterans' Administration practice and as required by the Comptroller General. As a further incident of the

consolidation, and as a result of numerous claims for increased pension or restoration, when the rate of pension had been reduced, the reexaminations conducted by medical officers of the Administration in Government facilities, in contrast to the examinations formerly conducted by individual medical practitioners often without laboratory facilities and in unstandardized fashion, conveyed a wholly different evaluation of the disability present, or disclosed unanticipated increases or decreases in degree of disability in cases which had remained dormant for many years. During the year the veterans' regulations in regard to the Spanish-American War group were liberalized in behalf of those who served between August 13, 1898, and July 4, 1902, who left the continental limits of the United States under military or naval orders for service in Guam, Cuba, or Puerto Rico. The restrictions against receipt of full pension by residents of foreign countries were also removed.

A tabulation from individual statistical records shows that the number of veterans on the roll at the close of this fiscal year was 167,892 as compared with 172,723 on June 30, 1934, a decrease of 4,831. The disbursements for this purpose during 1935 totaled \$66,252,826.14 as compared with \$47,933,272.10 in 1934, an increase of \$18,319,554.04.

Of the 167,892 veterans on the roll, 164,415 were receiving pension payments for disabilities of nonservice origin or for age, and 3,477 for conditions determined to be the result of service.

On June 30, 1935, the average monthly value of all pension awards for non-service-connected disabilities or age was \$31.91 and for service-connected disabilities \$50.92.

In addition to 167,892 veterans of this war on the roll at the close of this year there were on the same date 1,183 veterans who were formerly classed as Spanish-American War veterans but who are now receiving payments at peace-time rates due to the shortening of the war period by Presidential regulation issued under authority of Public, No. 2. The average monthly payment received by this group on June 30, 1935, was \$16.64. An analysis of the service-connected group by type of major disability indicates that 4 percent are suffering from tuberculosis; 8 percent from neuropsychiatric conditions; and 88 percent are classified as general medical cases. The average monthly payments for these groups are as follows: Tuberculosis, \$65.45; neuropsychiatric, \$63.58; and general medical, \$49.48. In the non-service-connected group 160,119 cases or 97 percent of the total are receiving pensions because of disabilities. The average monthly pensions in these cases is \$32.28. In addition 4,296 veterans, or 3 percent of the total, are receiving pensions by reason of age, the average monthly payments being \$17.86. A study of the age of all Spanish-American War veterans shows that 77 percent are between 55 and 65 years.

World War veterans war time service connected.—At the close of the fiscal year 1934, a review of all claims of World War veterans on the service-connected roll March 19, 1933, and subsequently, had been initiated pursuant to sections 26, 27, and 28 of Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, enacted March 28, 1934. During this year the review progressed rapidly, so that 270,229 of the entire 341,826 claims were covered. The controlling legislation, while having the broad purpose of restoring compensation payments at least to the

level of those prevailing under the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, or to 75 percent of those rates if the service connection was only presumptive, did not permit permanent automatic restoration in any large groups of cases. Instead, there was necessary the closest scrutiny of each individual case, to ascertain the presence of disabilities due to the veteran's own misconduct, to correct any clear and unmistakable errors which may have crept into the adjudication, to apply regulatory and schedular changes adopted shortly before the enactment of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, and if possible, to fix the date of inception either prior to service or subsequent thereto, in the case of disabilities which owed their original service connection in the main to the broad and in some cases formerly conclusive presumptions of the statute. While the restoration of World War benefits under Public, No. 141 was in its general effect very liberal, an important result was that the close scrutiny as to date of inception of disease eliminated service connection in a small number of cases formerly granted both under the presumptions of the World War Veterans' Act and to the more restrictive, but still widely effective, regulations under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress. The enormous mass of details, for the most part relating to events and circumstances more than 10 years removed, taxed the adjudication facilities to the utmost; nevertheless, an organization of the facilities was necessary so that continuous service to veterans who filed new claims or prosecuted claims already on file would not be impaired.

While not marked by new legislation affecting the World War group, the year was marked by numerous changes in veterans' regulations (to Mar. 20, 1935, when the veterans' regulations in effect became final, subject only to future acts of Congress) and instructions governing rating and appellate procedure, apportionment of compensation to dependents of living veterans, reviews upon the same factual basis, if supported by new and material evidence, restoration of full rate of compensation to veterans resident in foreign countries.

At the present time, the rates of compensation are controlled by two rating schedules, one—that in force March 19, 1933, under the World War Veterans' Act, generally called the 1925 schedule— involving occupational differentials dependent upon the veterans' civil occupation at the time of his enlistment, the other—a revision adopted under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress—with more conservative ratings, though sufficiently supported by statistical data covering actual reductions in earning capacity to be considered fair and liberal, but without occupational distinctions. Each World War veteran is rated under the schedule providing the more advantageous rate. During the year, the principal change affecting the evaluation of disability was the adoption of an amendment permitting a high degree of individualization according to the veterans' capacity for occupational adjustment in the presence of severe disabilities actually producing total disability, though on the strictly average basis heretofore employed rated at a lesser but comparatively high partial percentage. This change affected both the service-connected and the non-service-connected groups of World War veterans.

On June 30, 1935, compensation was being paid to 336,876 veterans suffering from disabilities directly or presumptively connected with service during the World War, an increase of 4,660 in the number on the roll at the beginning of this fiscal period. The disbursements

during this fiscal year totaled \$171,877,328 as compared with \$139,445,823 in 1934, an increase of \$32,431,505. An analysis of the major disabilities for which this compensation is being paid discloses that neuropsychiatric diseases are the disabling cause in 19.01 percent of the awards, tuberculosis in 17.56 percent, and general medical and surgical conditions in 63.43 percent. The average monthly payments by types, based upon the value of awards at the close of this year, was as follows: Neuropsychiatric, \$50.91; tuberculosis, \$54.15; and general medical and surgical, \$33. The average monthly payment for all types was \$40.12, an increase of 45 cents since June 30, 1934. Additional compensation was being paid on account of dependents in 51,091 cases in which the veteran was rated on a temporary basis at an average of \$7.69 per case per month. These dependents included 46,807 wives, 97,378 children, and 3,316 parents. On June 30, 1935, there were 2,498 disabled veterans to whom compensation was being paid who reside outside the continental limits of the United States.

World War nonservice connected.—This group of totally disabled World War veterans, whose disabilities have been determined to be not in any way the result of their military service, is a steadily increasing group as is to be expected with the advancing age of veterans and the hazards of disease and injury in civilian life. During this fiscal year the number on the roll increased from 31,183 to 33,604, all at the present total disability rate of \$30 per month unless reduced to \$6 on account of receiving institutional care at Government expense and having no dependents. Of those on the roll, 227, or 0.74 percent, are over 68 years of age; 549, or 1.80 percent, are over 62 years of age; and 1,197, or 3.91 percent, are over 55 years of age. There is an income limitation in this group, no single person having an income of \$1,000 or more per annum, and no person with dependents having an income of \$2,500 or more per annum being eligible.

Peace time.—During this fiscal year, the number of veterans on the pension roll as a result of disability incurred in service in time of peace was increased from 29,484 to 32,124. There were 5,108 new claims filed from this group. Disbursements increased from \$6,223,411.08 in 1934 to \$7,341,495.86, and the average annual award from \$219.76 in 1934 to \$223.51. The principal source of increase in this group, aside from favorable action in approximately 48 percent of new claims, has been the reclassification of persons formerly included in the Spanish-American War and World War groups as war-time service connected, on account of stricter application of the dates covering hostilities and proof of inception of disease outside of war-time service.

DEPENDENTS

War of 1812.—Although over 120 years have elapsed since the close of the War of 1812 there were at the close of this year 4 persons still receiving pensions on account of service rendered by soldiers in this war—3 widows and 1 daughter. They are as follows:

Arminia I. Anderson, Cedar Grove, Ga.; husband, Robert Anderson, fifer, Nabor's company, South Carolina Militia, pensioned at the rate of \$50 per month.

Lydia Ann Graham, Brushy Run, W. Va.; husband, Isaac Graham, musician, Bodkin's company, Virginia Militia, pensioned at the rate of \$50 per month.

Carolina King, c/o Evangelical Church Home, Cheektowaga, N. Y.; husband, Darius King, private, Steven's company, New York Militia, pensioned at the rate of \$50 per month.

Esther Ann Hill Morgan, Independence, Oreg.; daughter of John Hill, private, Clark's and McCumber's companies, New York Militia, pensioned at the rate of \$20 per month.

Mexican War.—At the close of this year there were 294 widows of Mexican War veterans on the pension roll, and the payments to them in 1935 totaled \$180,316.20. These figures show a decrease of 57 in the number of pensioners on June 30, 1934, and a reduction of \$18,242 in the disbursements for last year.

Civil War.—On June 30, 1935, there were on the pension roll 100,290 widows and minor or helpless children of veterans of this war, as compared with 112,577 at the beginning of the fiscal year, a decrease of 12,287.

Of the widows and other dependents on the pension roll at the close of this year 14,563 were in receipt of \$30 per month; 73,809 were being paid \$40 per month as provided by law for widows of the attained age of 70 years; and 3,026 were receiving \$50 per month as authorized by law for widows who were the wives of soldiers during their services in this war. There were dependents of 8,561 deceased veterans in receipt of pensions under special acts of Congress, and 331 were being paid pensions under the general laws because of the death of the soldier from causes due to military service. The disbursements for pensions to widows and minor or helpless children during this fiscal period totaled \$47,385,327.36, as compared with \$49,763,325.78 for the previous year, a decrease of \$2,377,998.42. The peak in the number of widows and other dependents on the roll was reached in 1912 when 304,373 were receiving pension.

During this year 3,167 widow and 260 other dependent claims were under consideration, of which 2,635 were disposed of, leaving 655 widow, and 137 other dependent claims pending on June 30, 1935. The number of widows dropped from the pension roll during this year by reason of death was 13,748, or 12.21 percent, of the number on the rolls at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Indian wars.—On account of Indian war service 4,745 widows and dependents were in receipt of pension on June 30, 1935, and to this class \$1,714,071.03 was paid during this year. This represents an increase of 139 in the number of widow and dependent pensioners on the roll June 30, 1934, and an increase of \$176,214.93 in disbursements over last year. During this year 815 claims were considered of which 728 were disposed of.

Effect of new legislation—wars prior to Spanish American.—Section 18 of the act of March 20, 1933, provided that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934, any pension, and/or other monetary gratuity, payable to former members of the military or naval service in wars prior to the Spanish American War, and their dependents, for service, age, disease or injury, except retired pay of officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard, should be reduced by 10 percent of the amount payable. Section 21 (c), of title II of Public, No. 141, of the act of March 28, 1934, continued this reduction at the rate of 5 percent of the amount payable for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, but by the joint resolution of February 13, 1935, full benefits were restored effective April 1, 1935.

Spanish American War.—On June 30, 1935, there were on the pension roll 39,045 widows, minor children, and dependents of veterans of this war as compared with 35,022 on June 30, 1934, an increase of 4,023. To these beneficiaries \$11,500,469.06 was paid during this year as compared with \$7,680,839.78 in the previous year, an increase of \$3,819,629.28. The increase in the number of beneficiaries and in the disbursements to them was due largely to the renewal of payments at 75 percent of the rates formerly paid in conformity with provisions of section 30, title III of the act of March 28, 1934, and Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (f), and in disbursements to the increase in rate to widows.

The claims of widows, minor children, and dependents of veterans under consideration during this year numbered 7,265, of which 6,400 were disposed of, leaving 865 pending at the close of this year, awaiting receipt of necessary proofs to establish title to pension.

World War—service-connected death.—On June 30, 1935, compensation was being paid to the widows, children, and dependent parents of 99,394 veterans of the World War who died in service or as a result of diseases or injuries incurred either directly or presumptively in service during said war, as compared with 99,229 at the close of the fiscal year 1934, an increase of 165 cases. This compensation is being paid to 26,456 widows, 39,157 children, and 85,975 parents. Death claims have been paid to date to the widows and dependents of 134,159 deceased veterans.

The disbursements for this purpose during the fiscal year 1935 totaled \$33,068,638.75 as compared with \$32,785,871.92 in 1934, an increase of \$282,766.83.

An analysis of the principal causes of death of veterans who died as a result of service, and whose dependents are now receiving benefits, discloses that 31 percent died from tuberculosis, 28 percent from injuries, principally wounds in action, and 25 percent from diseases of the respiratory system, other than tuberculosis.

A study of the awards for this benefit indicates that 42 percent of the deaths on account of which payments were being made on June 30, 1935, occurred prior to July 2, 1921, the official ending date of the World War.

At the close of this year service-connected death compensation payments were being made in 6,820 cases where the dependents reside in the United States possessions and foreign countries, the monthly value of these awards being \$180,011.

In addition to compensation, monthly payments of insurance were being made on June 30, 1935, to the beneficiaries of 62,453 deceased veterans, or in approximately 63 percent of the total active cases.

Death not due to service.—On June 28, 1934, Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, became a law. During the year and 2 days covered by this report in which it has been in effect, 9,954 claims were filed. Of these, 1,976 were allowed, 7,706 disallowed, and 272 are still pending. At the close of this fiscal year 1,970 were on the rolls. This compensation is being paid to 1,741 widows and 3,248 children. The disbursements for this group to June 30, 1935, amounted to \$652,664.06.

Peace time.—On June 30, 1935, there were 7,240 persons receiving pension on account of death determined to be the result of disease or injuries originating in line of duty in the military or naval service in time of peace. This represents an increase of 1,402 for the fiscal year

1935. These pensioners received during this period \$1,896,103.96, an increase of \$286,914.57 over last year. Claims considered during this year totaled 3,283, of which number final action was taken in 1,796 cases.

Effect of new legislation, war- or peace-time service, subsequent to April 20, 1898.—The act of March 20, 1933, established the basis of a new pension system effective July 1, 1933, for all persons except retired officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard who served in the military or naval service on or after April 21, 1898, the beginning date of the Spanish-American War. Under this new legislation, pension is awarded for disability or death resulting from disease or injury incurred or aggravated in line of duty in war-time service; for disability or death resulting from disease or injury incurred or aggravated in line of duty in peace-time service; and, under certain limitations, for disability or death not incurred in military or naval service. The rate of pension prescribed by regulations for widows of veterans who die or have died as the result of war-time service-connected disabilities was \$30 per month. For peace-time service-connected disabilities the rate allowed a widow was \$22 per month. Where death of a veteran of the Spanish-American War, Boxer Rebellion, or Philippine Insurrection was not the result of service, the rate to the widow was \$15 per month. Additional allowances were provided for each child under 18 years of age, each child under 21 attending school or college, and each child incapable of self-support because of a physical or mental defect. Pension was also payable to dependent parents of war-time and peace-time veterans who die of service-connected disabilities. However, the act of March 28, 1934, restored 75 percent of the rates formerly paid to these widows and dependents, from date of the act, in cases where enlistment was entered into prior to August 13, 1898, or there was service in the Boxer Rebellion or Philippine Insurrection, except in cases where payments had theretofore been made through fraud, clear or unmistakable error as to conclusions of fact or law, or misrepresentation of a material fact. Restoration was also barred to any person who paid income tax for the preceding year, to remarried widows, and in cases in which the death of the veteran was due to misconduct.

Section 17 of the act of March 20, 1933 (Public, No. 2), repealed all laws granting compensation to the dependents of the World War veterans who died as the result of disease or injuries directly or presumptively incurred in service and in lieu thereof provided for the payment of pension to such dependents only in the event the veteran's death was directly connected with service. The effect of this repeal was largely nullified by provisions of section 20 of the act of June 16, 1933 (Public, No. 78), which provided that in no event should death compensation, being paid to the dependents of deceased World War veterans on March 20, 1933, be reduced or discontinued whether the death of the veteran on whose account compensation was being paid was directly or presumptively connected with service. The protection of this act was continued in section 28 of the act of March 28, 1934 (Public, No. 141, 73d Cong.). This section also provided that where death is established as service connected under section 200 of the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, in claims where entry into the service was accomplished prior to November 12, 1918, the compensation provided for in Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (a),

part I, paragraph IV, shall be payable to widows and dependents. Under Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (g), approved March 19, 1935, the rates to widows and children were increased where death of the veteran was due to service, in both war- and peace-time cases. The first increase to widows is payable when the age 50 is attained, and a second when the widow becomes 65. Higher rates are established for children from the date each attains the age of 10 years. Increases are also provided for orphan children, regardless of age.

Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, became a law on June 28, 1934. Under this act benefits are authorized and payable to the surviving widow, child, or children of any deceased person who served with the United States military or naval forces in the World War before November 12, 1918, or if service was in Russia, before April 2, 1920. The cause of death is immaterial if not due to misconduct, but benefits may be paid only where the veteran was receiving or entitled to receive at the time of his death, compensation, pension, or retirement pay for a disability of 30 per centum or more, directly incurred in or aggravated by service rendered prior to July 2, 1921. The existence of the directly service-connected disease or injury must have been established to the satisfaction of the Veterans' Administration prior to the date of the veteran's death, but the determination of a 30 per centum disability resulting from such disease or injury may be based upon evidence filed subsequent to death, and the proof of 30 per centum or more disability must be filed within 3 years of the date of death or from June 28, 1934, whichever is the later date.

SUMMARY

The following table shows by wars and peace-time service the number of living veterans receiving monetary benefits, exclusive of insurance and adjusted compensation, on June 30, 1935, and June 30, 1934, and the total payments to them during the fiscal years 1935 and 1934, together with number of deceased veterans on whose account dependents were receiving compensation or pension benefits on June 30, 1935, and June 30, 1934, and the disbursements to dependents for these purposes during the fiscal years 1935 and 1934.

RETIREMENT OF EMERGENCY OFFICERS OF THE WORLD WAR

In the preceding annual report it was pointed out that Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, approved March 20, 1933, limited entitlement of this benefit to officers whose disabilities directly resulted from the performance of military or naval duty and that the application of this so-called "causative factor" resulted in reducing the number of officers entitled to retirement pay from 6,304 to 1,595, a decrease of approximately 75 percent. It was also pointed out that as of June 30, 1934, the number entitled to retirement pay had been reduced to 1,583 by reason of deaths. On June 30, 1935, there were 1,691 officers on the retirement roll, an increase of 108 during this fiscal period. This increase means that, upon further review, slightly over 2 percent of those previously dropped from the roll by the application of the so-called "causative factor" were able to prove their disabilities directly resulted from the performance of military or naval duty. Of the 1,691 officers on the active roll at the close of this year 1,671 were receiving full payment. In 19 of the remaining 20 cases there was a partial forfeiture of retirement pay in 6 and a complete forfeiture in 13 due to the application of section 212 of Public, No. 212, Seventy-second Congress, approved June 30, 1932, which provided that in case the salary of any retired officer (except those with disability incurred in combat with an enemy of the United States) in the employ of the Federal Government together with the retirement pay exceeds \$3,000 per annum, the retirement pay should be reduced or discontinued to the extent to which the sum of the two should equal \$3,000. In the other case there was a complete surrender of retirement pay because of active duty in the National Guard due to the application of Public, No. 176, Seventy-third Congress, approved April 26, 1934, which provided that no part of the appropriations made for the military and nonmilitary activities of the War Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, shall be available for pay, allowances, or traveling or other expense of any officer or enlisted man of the National Guard or any officer of the Organized Reserves who may be drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation, or retired pay, unless such officer or enlisted man of the National Guard surrenders payment for said benefits for the period of his service in the National Guard.

The average monthly payment for retirement was \$135.98, based on the annual value of the roll at the close of this year, as compared with \$135.20 on June 30, 1934, an increase of 78 cents.

The disbursements for this purpose during this fiscal year totaled \$2,709,127 as compared with \$2,181,250 in 1934, an increase of \$527,877. This increase was due in part to the fact that as previously explained certain additional officers were added to the retirement roll and also because the requirement in the Economy Act of March 1933 providing for the same reduction in retirement pay as in compensation for Government employees was lifted.

ADJUSTED COMPENSATION

As of June 30, 1935, a total of 132,842 beneficiaries had been awarded adjusted compensation in cases in which veterans died before applying for the benefits of the act, in an amount aggregating \$45,974,146, and 158,295 veterans had been awarded \$5,321,021.71 because of their adjusted service credits being \$50 or less. A total

of 3,732,485 certificates with a maturity value of \$3,680,943,293 had been issued to June 30, 1935, and of this number 203,784 had matured on account of death and \$202,755,857 had been awarded to the designated beneficiaries, leaving 3,528,701 certificates in force with a maturity value of \$3,478,187,436 and a present loan value of approximately \$1,750,000,000. A total of 2,904,525 certificates have been pledged and are held by the Veterans' Administration for loans and interest aggregating \$1,679,669,883.97. In addition, it is estimated that loans made by banks to the value of \$60,000,000 are outstanding.

Public, No. 312, August 23, 1935, extends the time within which applications for benefits under the World War Adjusted Compensation Act may be filed to January 2, 1940. Applications formerly had to be made before January 2, 1935, and were invalid if filed after that date.

INSURANCE

At the close of this fiscal year, there were 590,744 Government life-(converted) insurance policies in force, aggregating \$2,605,011,255 of insurance as compared with 598,226 policies in force, aggregating \$2,666,733,150 of insurance at the close of the preceding fiscal year.

This decrease of 7,482 policies is considerably less than that recorded for the fiscal years 1933 and 1934 during which the reduction in the number of policies in force was 25,149 and 17,483, respectively. There were 16,952 new policies issued during this year, an increase of 3,208 in the number for 1934, while the 2,736 reinstatements during 1935 exceeded by 825 those for the preceding year. The policies surrendered for cash during this year totaled 8,696, as compared with 12,059 for 1934, a decrease of 3,363. During this year the amount of insurance surrendered for paid up insurance totaled \$2,720,000 as compared with \$4,477,837 in 1934, a reduction of \$1,757,837. Paid-up insurance on 525 policies amounting to \$798,880 was added during this year as compared with 853 policies amounting to \$997,155 in 1934.

The dividend schedule adopted January 1, 1934, has been continued in effect for the current year and there has been reserved for the payment of dividends the sum of \$6,889,000 to be distributed to policyholders entitled in accordance with this schedule on the anniversary dates of their policies during the calendar year of 1935.

A decision by the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of *Lynch vs. United States* (78 L. Ed. 1434), held as unconstitutional that clause of section 17 of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress repealing all laws granting or pertaining to yearly renewable term (war time) insurance. In view of the decision, it is permissible for the insured to continue his yearly renewable term (war time) insurance in accordance with the laws authorizing the continuance of yearly renewable term insurance in rerated and disappearance cases, existing prior to March 20, 1933, the date of the above-mentioned law. At the end of this fiscal year there were 121 contracts of yearly renewable term (war time) insurance amounting to \$389,145 on which premiums were being paid.

On April 15, 1935, Public, No. 37, Seventy-fourth Congress authorized the granting of \$10,000 United States Government life insurance to aviation cadets in the Naval Reserve and Marine Corps Reserve forces.

Applications.—Applications for United States Government life (converted) insurance, approved during this fiscal year totaled

16,952, aggregating \$50,890,383, as compared with 13,774 applications amounting to \$41,295,750 approved during the fiscal year 1934. The total applications approved to June 30, 1935, is 930,508 amounting to \$4,087,633,870 insurance.

Policies issued.—The following table shows the number and amount of United States Government life- (converted) insurance policies issued by months for the fiscal year 1935.

Policies in force.—At the close of this fiscal year there were in force 590,744 United States Government life- (converted) insurance policies amounting to \$2,605,011,255 insurance. During this fiscal year 2,736 policies amounting to \$12,459,360 insurance were reinstated. Policies surrendered for cash and paid-up insurance.—United States Government life insurance policies provide that after having been in force 1 year they may be surrendered for cash or paid-up insurance. During this fiscal year, there were 8,696 policies, representing \$27,632,-682.47 insurance, surrendered for cash. The total number of policies surrendered for cash through June 30, 1935, is 99,711, representing \$319,707,924.51 insurance.

During this fiscal year policies having a total face amount of \$2,720,000 were surrendered for paid-up insurance, while 525 policies having a total face amount of \$798,880 paid-up insurance were issued. Through June 30, 1935, policies having a total face amount of \$20,539,386 have been surrendered for paid-up insurance, and 3,763 policies having a total face amount of \$4,094,934.04 paid-up insurance have been issued.

Premium income.—United States Government life insurance premiums are deposited to the credit of the United States Government life insurance fund from which are paid claims on account of total permanent disability and death, dividends and refunds. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, premiums amounting to \$64,949,746.89 were received on United States Government life insurance policies. The amount of United States Government life insurance premiums received to date totals \$810,745,112.99.

Dividends.—The fund from which dividends on United States Government life insurance are apportioned is accumulated from two sources—savings due to deferred mortality and excess interest on the amount earned on invested funds over the assumed rate of 3½ percent. There were 400,996 dividends amounting to \$6,137,542.68 paid during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935. The total dividends paid to date are 6,557,026, amounting to \$63,547,852.75.

Converted claims.—Through June 30, 1935, a total of 27,798 awards had been made on account of death and 10,232 by reason of permanent and total disability. These death awards involve the payment of insurance in the amount of \$156,502,153, of which \$118,027,676 was disbursed in lump-sum payments to 21,457 beneficiaries. Payments of converted insurance averaging \$35.43 monthly are being made to 9,445 permanently and totally disabled veterans.

During the calendar year 1934 awards were made to the beneficiaries of 2,702 deceased veterans, and 1,322 awards were made to veterans with permanent and total disabilities as compared with 2,805 and 1,499, respectively, during the calendar year 1933.

An analysis of the principal plans of insurance on which death claims were paid during the calendar year 1934 shows that 28 percent of the policies were ordinary life, 20 percent were 20-payment life, 16 percent 20-year endowment, and 17 percent 5-year convertible term. Of the policies on which disability claims were paid during the same period, 25 percent were 5-year convertible term, 29 percent were ordinary life, 18 percent 20-payment life, and 13 percent were 20-year endowment.

Term and automatic claims.—The disbursements for term and automatic insurance during this year totaled \$100,355,246, and to date \$1,824,407,684, which is \$1,370,282,810 in excess of the \$454,124,874 received in premiums.

On June 30, 1935, monthly installments of term insurance were being paid to 12,616 permanently and totally disabled veterans and to the beneficiaries of 125,364 deceased veterans, as compared with

12,976 disability and 127,551 death awards on June 30, 1934. The decrease in the number of death awards is due to the operation of section 303 of the World War Veterans' Act, which provides for the payment in lump sum of the commuted value of the unpaid installments upon the death of the beneficiary named in the policy. These lump-sum payments totaled \$9,062,042 during this year and \$162,108,-159 to date. In addition, \$1,494,887 was paid during this year on 342 compromise cases authorized under Public, No. 78, Seventy-third Congress, June 16, 1933, of which 254 were disability and 88 death.

Permanent total disability payments averaging \$47.58 per month are being made on insurance valued at \$104,401,349. The States having the largest number of veterans receiving these payments are as follows: California, 1,088; New York, 1,076; Pennsylvania, 686, Illinois, 622; and Massachusetts, 531. An analysis of the disabilities for which term insurance is being paid discloses that neuropsychiatric diseases are the disabling cause in 47 percent of the awards, tuberculosis in 27 percent, and general medical and surgical conditions in 26 percent. To date 25,207 disability awards have been terminated—21,280 by death, 3,673 by recovery, and 254 for other reasons. Approximately 57 percent of the terminations by recovery and 68 percent of the terminations by death were in the tuberculous group.

It is interesting to note that of the 125,364 death claims on which installments are now being paid, 109,644, or 87 percent, of the veterans died prior to the official closing date of the World War, July 2, 1921. These payments are being made to 72,541 parents, 20,507 widows, 2,236 children, and 30,080 other beneficiaries. The largest number of death awards have been made in the following States: New York, 11,578; Pennsylvania, 9,063; and Illinois, 6,941.

Payments of automatic insurance (provided for those who were permanently and totally disabled or who died within 120 days after entrance into service and before making application for term insurance) are being made to 300 permanently and totally disabled veterans, of who 197, or 66 percent, are suffering from neuropsychiatric diseases; 60, or 20 percent, from tuberculosis; and 43, or 14 percent, from general medical and surgical conditions. In the cases of 6,892 deceased veterans, this insurance is being paid to their beneficiaries, classified as follows: 5,807 parents, 587 widows, and 498 children.

FINANCE

The actual net disbursements for all purposes (including adjustments on lapsed appropriations) for the activities under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1935, aggregate \$618,522,341.50. Of this amount \$8,605,908.69 was disbursed during July and August 1934 for the payment of annuities and refunds under the civil service and Canal Zone retirement laws, which functions were transferred on September 1, 1934, to the Civil Service Commission in accordance with Executive Orders 6,670 and 6,731, issued pursuant to the provisions of section 2 title III, of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, "An act to maintain the credit of the United States Government."

The actual net disbursements from each appropriation of the Veterans' Administration (including adjustments on lapsed appropriations) during the fiscal period were as follows:

The amount shown under the appropriation "Adjusted service-certificate fund" represents disbursements on certificates matured by death of veterans, including \$8,844,950.34 deducted from payment of matured certificates on account of loans previously made from adjusted service-certificate fund (plus accrued interest from date of loan to death of veterans); and \$31,027.75 interest paid the United States Government life-insurance fund due to rate allowed in excess of amount charged veterans under the act of July 21, 1932. Further, the amount shown for the appropriation "Administration, medical, hospital, and domiciliary services" includes net disbursements of \$710,413.59 from allotments made to other Government agencies for the care and treatment of Veterans' Administration beneficiaries and to the Treasury Department and Civil Service Commission for activities transferred thereto. The amount shown under the appropriation "Printing and binding" includes an allotment of \$1,969.99 to the Treasury Department in connection with the transfer of disbursing activities to that agency.

LEGAL ACTIVITIES

LEGISLATION

During this fiscal year there were 4,569 bills introduced in Congress pertaining to veterans' benefits, many of which had for their purpose material changes in the existing laws affecting veterans' relief. In accordance with the request of members and committees of Congress, 88 drafts of proposed bills and 58 resumes concerning the rights of veterans and their dependents were prepared. The veterans' regulations promulgated by the President prior to March 20, 1935, were drafted following consideration of preliminary drafts covering different proposals. One hundred and ninety-nine reports were furnished

committees of Congress on pending legislation and 135 reports were furnished to individual members. Thirty-four reports were furnished the Bureau of the Budget and the President regarding proposed legislation submitted to the latter for approval.

New legislation.—Public Resolution No. 1, Seventy-fourth Congress, January 28, 1935, clarified the term "disagreement" as defined in section 19 of the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, providing that the denial of a claim for insurance by any employee or agency of the Veterans' Administration heretofore or hereafter designated therefor by the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs, shall constitute a disagreement for the purpose of a suit for insurance under the said section 19.

Public Resolution No. 3, Seventy-fourth Congress, enacted February 13, 1935, by section 2 (b) thereof, amends section 21 of the Independent Offices Appropriation Act, 1935, insofar as it applies to the reduction by 5 per centum of the pension of veterans and/or their dependents for service in wars prior to April 21, 1898. Section 18 of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, March 20, 1933, had provided a 10 per centum reduction in these cases for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934. The Independent Offices Appropriation Act, 1935, Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, March 28, 1934, made the reduction identical with that provided for Federal employees. Reduction was changed to 5 per centum as of July 1, 1934. Public Resolution No. 3 eliminated any further reduction in these cases and Federal employees' cases effective April 1, 1935. By the act of June 16, 1933 (Public, No. 78, 73d Cong.), for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934, the pensions under private relief acts were reduced by the same percentage as Government employees, continued for the fiscal year 1935 by the act of March 28, 1934 (Public, No. 141, 73d Cong.), and terminated effective April 1, 1935, by Public Resolution No. 3, February 13, 1935.

Public, No. 2, Seventy-fourth Congress, February 2, 1935, "An act making appropriations for the Executive Office and sundry independent executive bureaus, boards, commissions, and offices for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936, and for other purposes", included no material changes in the laws providing direct benefits for veterans. However, due to liberalizing legislation, particularly Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, March 28, 1934, and Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, June 28, 1934, the appropriation for direct benefits was increased.

There was included in the act a provision appropriating and making generally available for hospital and domiciliary facilities the remaining balances of money previously authorized for that purpose by the acts of April 23, 1928 (45 Stat. 447), February 20, 1929 (45 Stat. 1248), and February 26, 1929 (45 Stat. 1308), totaling \$925,000. This act also made generally available for hospital and domiciliary facilities the unexpended balance of the appropriations made pursuant to the authorization contained in the act approved July 3, 1930 (46 Stat. 852).

Public, No. 21, "First Deficiency Appropriation Act, fiscal year 1935", March 21, 1935, carried \$94,650,000 additional for veterans' benefits and provided for payment of certain miscellaneous judgments and authorized claims in specified amounts.

Public, No. 37, Seventy-fourth Congress, April 15, 1935, providing for aviation cadets in the Naval Reserve and Marine Corps Reserve, directs that during the period of active duty, aviation cadets are to be issued Government life insurance in the amount of \$10,000, the premiums on which are to be paid out of current appropriations. Further provision is made that upon discharge or completion of active duty, aviation cadets are to have the option of continuing such policies at their own expense. Section 7 of the law directs that the premiums on the life insurance are to be paid from the current appropriations "Naval Reserve" and "Pay, Marine Corps", respectively.

Public, No. 117, June 7, 1935, provides for the transfer of certain lands (part of the former Whipple Barracks Military Reserve) from the Veterans' Administration to the Department of the Interior for the benefit of Yavapai Indians, Arizona.

The Veterans' Administration, in keeping with the direction of the President concerning the study of regulations issued under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, and amendment of such regulations when the results of application thereof demonstrated the need of such amendment, recommended to the President the issuance of certain amendments to the Veterans' regulations. The President issued six regulations all amending provisions incorporated in the prior regulations. These are:

1. Veterans' Regulation No. 10 (d), February 5, 1935, repealed the provision requiring reduction of 50 percent of pension or emergency officers' retirement pay as to persons resident in foreign countries, which reductions were being made only in cases being paid under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress. Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, March 28, 1934, eliminated such reduction as to benefits payable under that act.

2. Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (f), February 8, 1935, provides for pensions of 75 percent of the amount being paid on March 19, 1933, to persons who served between August 13, 1898, and July 4, 1902, who left the continental United States under orders for military or naval service in Guam, Cuba, or Puerto Rico between those dates, or the widow of such person, as long as she remains unmarried, and/or dependents of such person.

3. Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (g), March 19, 1935, generally increased the rates of pensions payable under the veterans' regulations to widows and children of veterans where death cause is shown to be service connected. As to war-time cases, widows 50 to 65 years of age receive an increase of \$5 per month, and widows over 65 years of age receive an increase of \$10 per month. The additional amount for children is increased generally with an additional increase for children over 10 years of age. An increase was also authorized with reference to children where there is no widow. The rates of pension to widows and children of Regular Establishment veterans under the regulations were established at approximately three-fourths of the new rates payable in war cases. Provision was also made in this regulation for the payment of pension to dependents of any incompetent veteran who disappears, where the veteran at the time of disappearance was in receipt of pension for service-connected disability under the regulations. This authority is similar to that contained in the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended.

4. Veterans' Regulation No. 2 (d), March 19, 1935, extended from 6 months to 1 year the period in which claimants are permitted to submit evidence pertaining to a claim pursuant to the request of the Veterans' Administration, in the event of failure of which pension may not be paid by virtue of the application then of record. A new paragraph was added to part I of Veterans' Regulation No. 2 (a) to provide that where a claim has been finally disallowed, a subsequent claim on the same factual basis, if supported by new and material evidence, shall have the attributes of a new claim. This permitted consideration of a new claim where, under existing regulations, the prior claim could not be reopened.

Paragraph IV, subparagraph (b) of part I of Veterans' Regulation No. 2 (a), was amended to eliminate the requirement that as to dependent parents, the dependency must arise within 10 years subsequent to the death of the veteran.

5. Veterans' Regulation No. 6 (d), March 19, 1935, authorized the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs to continue hospital and domiciliary care to those persons properly admitted under the laws in effect prior to March 20, 1933, until such time as discharge of such persons could be accomplished without jeopardizing their health or life. The previous regulation covered only hospital care.

6. Veterans' Regulation No. 10 (e), March 19, 1935, enlarged the definition of the term "veteran of any war" to include those persons who served in the military or naval service of the United States between August 13, 1898, and July 4, 1902, both dates inclusive, and who left the continental United States under orders for military or naval service in Guam, Cuba, or Puerto Rico between such dates. This amendment grants benefits as war veterans, including hospitalization and domiciliary care in facilities of the Veterans' Administration, to persons who were brought within the purview of the regulations for pension purposes by Veterans' Regulation No. 1 (f) already explained.

The following legislation enacted after the termination of the fiscal year but during the first session of the Seventy-fourth Congress is considered of sufficient importance to be included in this report.

Public, No. 196, July 3, 1935, provides for the transfer of certain lands (part of the reservation occupied by the Veterans' Administration facility, Outwood, Ky.) in Hopkins County, Ky., to the State of Kentucky for State park purposes.

Public, No. 214, July 23, 1935, authorizes the transfer of certain lands in Rapides Parish, La., to the State of Louisiana for the purpose of a State highway across a portion of the Federal property occupied by the Veterans' Administration facility, Alexandria, La.

Public, No. 260, August 12, 1935, "Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, Fiscal Year 1935", authorizes \$21,250,000 to be used by the Administrator with the approval of the President for extending any of the facilities under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration or for any of the purposes set forth in sections 1 and 2 of the Act approved March 4, 1931 (46 Stat. 1550), said amount to remain available until expended.

Public, No. 262, August 12, 1935, is a law of major importance designed to safeguard the estates of insane veterans, and of minor children or incompetent dependents of veterans under guardianship and resulted from an investigation and study of guardianship matters

by the Congress. This survey, which was undertaken last spring by the Committee on War Veterans' Legislation, House of Representatives, disclosed that in some instances persons charged with the financial management of insane veterans' estates were not properly exercising the duties of their office, had made unwise investments, were not making proper accountings to the court which had appointed them and as a result were jeopardizing the funds belonging to the veteran, or other beneficiary under guardianship. The Veterans' Administration supplied the investigating subcommittee with extensive evidence in this connection. The new guardianship law empowers the Administrator to exercise closer supervision of the estates of insane veterans, and minor and incompetent dependents, who are receiving monetary benefits from the Government on account of military service performed by the veteran. The law applies to veterans of all wars, as well as former members of the Regular Establishment. It also contains a provision exempting from taxation monetary benefits paid to veterans and dependents except as to property purchased out of such funds. Further, it more clearly defines the offenses of embezzlement and misappropriation by guardians and prescribes more drastic remedies and penalties.

Public, No. 269, August 13, 1935, provides, "That all laws in effect on March 19, 1933, granting pensions to veterans of the Spanish-American War, including the Boxer Rebellion and the Philippine Insurrection, their widows and dependents, are hereby reenacted into law and such laws shall be effective from and after the date of the approval of this act." Section 2 provides, "That all acts and parts of acts in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed."

Public, No. 307, August 23, 1935, authorizes payment of claims for unauthorized emergency treatment of World War veterans under the provisions of section 202 (9), World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, wherein claim was duly filed prior to March 20, 1933.

Public, No. 309, August 23, 1935, authorizes an exchange of certain property rights now vested in the United States at Veterans' Administration facility, Perry Point, Md., for certain property and rights of the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. in that vicinity.

Public, No. 312, August 23, 1935, extends the benefits of hospital and domiciliary care to former members of the Regular Establishment who have been pensioned on account of service-connected disability, the law previously requiring discharge for disabilities incurred in line of duty.

This law also contains a provision for the time within which applications for benefits under the World War Adjusted Compensation Act, as amended, may be filed. Applications formerly had to be made before January 2, 1935, and were invalid if filed after that date. Under the terms of the new law claims may be filed at any time prior to January 2, 1940.

Public, No. 328, August 26, 1935, adds certain lands to the Pisgah National Forest in the State of North Carolina, which were acquired by the United States on December 19, 1927, for the use of the Veterans' Administration. However, it is provided that the tract shall be so managed as to conserve and protect the water thereon, which water shall remain available for the use of the Veterans' Administration.

Public, No. 344, August 26, 1935, extends the period of the World War to April 1, 1920, for those persons who served with the United States military forces in Russia for the purpose of payment of pension for disability not shown to have been incurred in military or naval service.

It also provides that "veterans who entered active military service subsequent to November 11, 1918, and who served with the United States military forces in Russia prior to April 2, 1920, and their dependents, shall be entitled to the benefits of Public Law No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, provided they meet the other requirements thereof."

INTERPRETATIVE LAW

During this year there were rendered approximately 1,044 formal and precedent opinions covering all phases of the pension laws, the War Risk Insurance Act, as amended, the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, the World War Adjusted Compensation Act, as amended, the Emergency Officers' Retirement Act, the Civil Service Retirement Act, Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress (an act to maintain the credit of the United States Government), Public, No. 78, Seventy-third Congress (an act making appropriations for the Executive Office and sundry independent executive bureaus, boards, commissions, and offices, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, and for other purposes), Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress (Independent Offices Appropriation Act for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935), Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress (an act to compensate widows and children of persons who died while receiving monetary benefits for disabilities directly incurred in or aggravated by active military or naval service in the World War), and general questions arising in connection with the administration of these laws. An analysis of these opinions discloses that 117 pertained to pensions, 98 settled compensation rights, 138 related to insurance benefits, 93 related to medical treatment, domiciliary care, and hospitalization in veterans' hospitals, 65 related to adjusted compensation, 14 to emergency officers' retirement, 6 to retirement under the Civil Service Retirement Act, 8 related to claims of creditors, 27 to questions on burial, 228 to questions of marriage and divorce, 36 to legitimacy of children, 34 pertained to furnishing information, 56 related to recognition of attorneys and attorneys' fees, and 124 to questions of administration, contracts, property damage, subrogation and other miscellaneous matters.

Civil litigation.—During the year there were reviewed 1,025 judgments in suits for insurance under section 19, World War Veterans' Act, as amended. Thirty-three suits not under section 19 were disposed of as follows: 3 suits filed in the Court of Claims, 1 for balance due on contract, dismissed; 1 to recover compensation, dismissed; and 1 to recover pension money, judgment for plaintiff; 10 mandamus suits, 9 dismissed; 1 discontinued; 4 damage suits against administration officials, 3 dismissed and 1 judgment for defendant; 2 subrogation suits for personal injuries, 1 dismissed and 1 discontinued; 3 recovery suits, 2 to recover insurance, 1 judgment for defendant and 1 judgment for codefendants and against the United States; 1 to recover on contract, judgment for plaintiff; 2 suits for declaratory judgments to establish the rights of an illegitimate child,

both dismissed; 4 injunction suits, 2 judgments for plaintiff, 1 judgment for defendant, 1 dismissed; 1 suit against the United States to recover on adjusted-service certificate, judgment for defendant; 3 civil service retirement suits transferred to the Civil Service Commission and 1 suit to test the constitutionality of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, dismissed.

Criminal prosecution.—The Veterans' Administration cooperates with the several investigating agencies of the Government in developing the facts concerning possible violations of law. The evidence in cases developed solely by the Veterans' Administration is submitted to the Department of Justice with a brief of the facts and law for the consideration of the appropriate United States attorney. Cases developed in cooperation with the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice or the Secret Service Division of the Treasury Department are by those agencies submitted to the appropriate United States attorneys. The Veterans' Administration, however, cooperates with the United States attorneys in the further handling of the cases upon request of the Department of Justice.

When requested by the Department of Justice, the Veterans' Administration prepares tentative forms of indictments covering offenses committed in connection with Veterans' Administration activities and cooperates in making a research of the laws. The major portion of the offenses involved are covered by penal provisions within the several acts administered by the Veterans' Administration, but where these statutes do not cover the particular offense, the case is prepared under the appropriate provision of the Federal Criminal Code or other applicable Federal penal statute.

There were pending in the Veterans' Administration on June 30, 1934, 302 cases which were in the course of consideration and investigation. During the fiscal year 626 complaints of violations of laws were received, considered, and investigated, which with the number on hand, made a total of 928 cases. Two hundred and sixty-seven of these cases were submitted to the Department of Justice for consideration of United States attorneys and 442 were closed without reference to the Department of Justice on account of the lack of evidence, expiration of the period of the statute of limitations, and so forth. A total of 219 cases remained in the course of investigation on June 30, 1935.

There were pending in the Department of Justice on June 30, 1934, a total of 450 cases. There were submitted during the fiscal year 267 cases, making a total of 717 cases. Of these, 398 were disposed of by the Department of Justice, leaving a balance on June 30, 1935, of 319 cases.

The 398 cases were disposed of as follows:

In explanation it may be stated that the 212 cases closed by the Department of Justice were cases wherein it was believed that, on account of the mitigating circumstances, a successful prosecution

might not be obtained. Nevertheless, there having been a *prima facie* showing of guilt, the Veterans' Administration took the position that the proper enforcement branch of the Government should consider the evidence.

GUARDIANSHIP

During this fiscal year the congressional investigation begun under House bill 409, Seventy-third Congress was completed and the committee recommended a bill (H. R. 3979) intended to strengthen the guardianship program, to define more clearly the offense of embezzlement, and to make uniform application of such provisions—as well as that pertaining to exemptions—to the various types of benefits paid. This bill was approved August 12, 1935, Public, No. 262, Seventy-fourth Congress.

In the meantime, the regulations concerning guardianship were modified (service letter, Oct. 11, 1934) in such manner as to make the program more definite with respect to investments, bonds, and exemptions.

The important controversies investigated by the subcommittee at Marion, Ind., Chicago, Ill., and Detroit, Mich., have been adjusted. Judgments were secured at Marion and Detroit for the full amount of the illegal investments, with a lien on the securities; and at Chicago a settlement for cash was arrived at and suit was dismissed. Recovery at Marion amounted to \$210,000; at Chicago (Foreman bank) \$190,000; at Detroit the amount actually realized will depend upon sale of the securities which will not be had for some time. These recoveries will be reflected in the next annual report as payments made to the guardians and accounted for by them.

As of June 30, 1935, there were 83,562 beneficiaries under guardianship, of whom 38,793 were incompetent and 44,769 were minors, under 70,789 fiduciaries.

Guardians' accounts were secured and disposed of as follows: Approved, 65,958; disapproved, 4,809, of which 3,694 were adjusted; pending 4,213. It was necessary to suspend payments for failure to account properly in 2,354 cases. Five hundred and forty-eight accounts were filed on citations procured. Exceptions were filed to 1,809 accounts, 820 of which were sustained by the courts; 261 disallowed; remainder pending. Prosecution for alleged criminal action was recommended in 179 case, while 12 additional cases were under investigation. Excessive fees or commissions were charged in 1,020 cases, in 653 of which recovery of excess was made, and in 191 of which recovery was disallowed, remainder pending.

A summary of accounts of fiduciaries filed during this fiscal year follows: Receipts, \$36,257,511.57; commissions allowed guardians, \$1,203,117.70, of which \$21,137.96 was recovered as being excessive and \$7,496.63 was allowed by the courts over protest; fees allowed attorneys for guardians, \$548,250.84, of which \$15,806.14 was recovered as being excessive and \$5,543.70 was allowed by the courts over protest; value of estates, \$129,232,778.51, of which \$102,130,970.66 was invested in accordance with State law (legal investments), \$1,809,088.37 was not invested in accordance with State law (illegal investments), and \$25,292,719.48 was deposited in banking institutions; amount embezzled and/or misappropriated \$190,169.39; amount lost on deposits \$16,502.78; and amount lost on investments, \$84,806.59.

The reported estimated value of services to beneficiaries during this year was \$1,662,061.73, computed as follows:

Funds escheated under section 21 (3) of the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended (sec. 7, Public, No. 2, 73d Cong.), were recovered to the amount of \$10,752.16, part of which included recoveries of pension moneys paid to guardians of pensioners who died leaving no heirs, on the theory of a failure of trust, there being no specific statute providing for escheat in such cases until the act of August 12, 1935 (Public, No. 262, 74th Cong.). Other recoveries (overpayments, etc.) amounted to \$5,997.95, which funds were returned to the Treasury.

PERSONNEL

On June 30, 1935, there were on the rolls of the Veterans' Administration 34,040 employees (exclusive of those on a per diem and per hour basis) whose aggregate gross annual salaries including allowances totaled \$56,348,934, as compared with 33,582 employees and \$55,810,584 in annual salaries on June 30, 1934, an increase of 458 employees and \$538,350 in annual salaries during this fiscal period. The value of the annual roll on June 30, 1934, includes the full amount of authorized salaries without regard to the legislative reduction in effect at that time.

During this fiscal period the employees in central office decreased from 5,072 to 4,801, while those at field stations increased from 28,510 to 29,239. The increase at field stations was due principally to the operation of additional accommodations at some 11 locations, the reopening of the hospital at Dwight, Ill., and the staffing of new facilities at Roanoke, Va., and San Francisco, Calif.

In making new appointments and in effecting discontinuances, the policy of extending preference to ex-service employees has been carefully followed. The same preference has been extended in filling vacancies occurring in staff positions. At the close of this year 71.69 percent of the male and 12.64 percent of the female employees on the rolls of the Veterans' Administration were ex-service, while 50.71 percent of the total personnel had such status.

The foregoing figures include member employees in Veterans' Administration facilities used principally for domiciliary care. On June 30, 1935, there were 1,580 member employees receiving aggregate gross annual salaries of \$758,040.
