An Act

To prevent disruption of the structure and functioning of the Government by ratifying all reorganization plans as a matter of law.

Oct. 19, 1984
[H.R. 6225]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

Government organization and employees.

SECTION 1. The Congress hereby ratifies and affirms as law each reorganization plan that has, prior to the date of enactment of this Act, been implemented pursuant to the provisions of chapter 9 of title 5, United States Code, or any predecessor Federal reorganization statute.

SEC. 2. Any actions taken prior to the date of enactment of this Act pursuant to a reorganization plan that is ratified and affirmed by section 1 shall be considered to have been taken pursuant to a reorganization expressly approved by Act of Congress.

CHAPTER 501—REWARDS FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING TERRORIST ACTS

With respect to acts of terrorism primarily within the jurisdiction of the United States, the Attorney General may reward any individual who furnishes information—
(1) leading to the arrest or conviction, in any country, of any individual or individuals for the commission of an act of terrorism against a United States person or United States property;
or
(2) leading to the arrest or conviction, in any country, of any individual or individuals for conspiring or attempting to commit an act of terrorism against a United States person or property;
or
(3) leading to the prevention, detection, or avoidance of terrorism of an act of terrorism against a United States person or property.
