<sup>2</sup> On March 4, 1929, President Hoover nominated William D. Mitchell, of Minnesota, to fill the place left vacant by the retirement of Attorney General Sargent. The nomination was confirmed by the Senate the same day and Mr. Mitchell took the oath of office the following day.

<sup>3</sup> On May 8, 1929, President Hoover nominated Charles E. Hughes, Jr., of New York, as Solicitor General, to succeed Mr. Mitchell, resigned. The nomination was confirmed by the Senate on May 27, 1929, and Mr. Hughes took the oath of office on June 1, 1929.
