

MR. JUSTICE JOHNSON.

ORDER OF COURT.

MR. BUTLER, the Attorney-General for the United States, having moved the court, in pursuance of the third resolve contained in the subjoined proceedings of the bar and officers of this court, to have said proceedings entered on the records of the court, Mr. Chief Justice MARSHALL remarked as follows: "The sentiments of respectful affection just expressed for our deceased brother, are most grateful to myself and to all my brethren. We too condole with you; and in ordering the resolutions to be recorded, we indulge our own feelings, not less than the feelings of those who make the application."

Whereupon, it is considered and ordered by the court, that the said proceedings of the bar and officers be entered upon the minutes, and which are as follows, to wit:

"At a meeting of the members of the bar of the Supreme Court of the United States, and of the officers of the court, held in the supreme court room, in the city of Washington, on Monday, January 12th, 1835,

"Benjamin F. Butler, Attorney-General of the United States, was appointed chairman, and Richard Peters, reporter of the court, was appointed secretary.

"On motion of Mr. Jones, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"The Hon. WILLIAM JOHNSON, senior associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, having departed this life during the late vacation of the court, and the members of this bar, and the officers of the court, entertaining the most grateful and lively remembrance of his eminent talents and learning, and of his many and shining virtues as a judge and a man, and lamenting his loss with a sincerity and depth of feeling corresponding with their esteem for the public and private character of the deceased, have—

"Resolved, that, as a token of their sentiments, they will wear the usual badge of mourning during the residue of the term.

"Resolved, that the chairman communicate to the bereaved family of the deceased, the esteem and consideration in which the virtues and talents of Mr. Justice JOHNSON were held by the bar and officers of this court, and assure them of their sincere sympathy in the loss which they, the court, and the country, have sustained in his death.

"On motion of Mr. Ogden:

"Resolved, that the Attorney-General, in behalf of the bar and officers of this court, do respectfully move the court, that the foregoing resolutions may be entered on the minutes of the court."
