

SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 28, 1982

ORDERED:

1. That the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure be, and they hereby are, amended by including therein amendments to Rule 4 as hereinafter set forth:

2. That the foregoing amendments to the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure shall take effect on August 1, 1982, and shall govern all civil proceedings thereafter commenced and, insofar as just and reasonable, all proceedings then pending.

3. That THE CHIEF JUSTICE be, and he hereby is, authorized to transmit to the Congress the foregoing amendments to the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure in accordance with the provisions of Section 2072 of Title 28, United States Code.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

ARTICLE I

SECTION 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or add to the Rules and Regulations of the foregoing Elections.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin at Noon on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law provide for another Day within the same Year.

Section 6. The Congress shall be held at the City of Washington, District of Columbia, and when not in Session, the Judges of the Supreme Court may adjourn to such City as they shall determine.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as to the Form of such Bills. No Bill shall be passed by Congress until after it shall have passed twice by the Senate and House of Representatives respectively, with some Alterations to be agreed to by a Majority of both of them on two successive Days.
