UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

S.J. RES. 84 (ORDER NO. 293) AND S.J. RES. 86 (ORDER NO. 290)

1.—Ordered, That notwithstanding the provisions of the Congressional Review Act, S.J. Res. 86, a joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "Air Plan Approval; South Dakota; Regional Haze Plan for the Second Implementation Period," and S.J. Res. 84, a joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services relating to "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act; Market Integrity and Affordability," remain in status quo through January 16, 2026. 3.—Ordered, That with respect to the entered motion to reconsider the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 2882, a bill making continuing appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (Oct. 9, 2025.)

S. 2806 (ORDER NO. 161)
