CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of the Congress regarding the interference of the European Commission in the merger of the Boeing Company and McDonnell-Douglas.

Whereas the Boeing Company and McDonnell-Douglas have announced their merger;

- Whereas the Department of Defense has approved the merger as consistent with the national security of the United States;
- Whereas the Federal Trade Commission has found that the merger does not violate the antitrust laws of the United States;

Whereas the European Commission has consistently criticized and threatened the merger before, during, and after its consideration of the facts; and

Whereas the sole true reason for the European Commission criticism and imminent disapproval of the merger is to gain unfair competitive advantage for Airbus Industries, a government-owned aircraft manufacturer: Now, therefore, be it

1 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate 2 concurring), That it is the sense of Congress that—

(1) any disapproval by the European Commission of the merger of the Boeing Company and McDonnell-Douglas would constitute an unwarranted and unprecedented interference in a United State business transaction that would threaten thousands of American aerospace jobs; and

(2) the President should take such actions as he considers to be appropriate to protect United States interests in connection with this matter.

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
