CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of the Congress that all parties to the multiparty peace talks regarding Northern Ireland should condemn violence and fully integrate internationally recognized human rights standards and adequately address outstanding human rights violations as part of the peace process.

Whereas multiparty talks regarding Northern Ireland attended by representatives of the British and Irish Governments and representatives elected from political parties in Northern Ireland are underway for the first time since the partition of Ireland in 1922 creating a momentous opportunity for progress on human rights concerns;

Whereas human rights violations and the lack of accountabil		
ity by those responsible for such violations have been per sistent features of the conflict in Northern Ireland; and		
Whereas more than 3,000 people have died and thousand		
more have been injured as a result of the political vio-		
lence in Northern Ireland since 1969: Now, therefore, be		
it		
1 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senat

3 (1) the Congress condemns the violence com		
4 mitted on all sides of the conflict in Northern Ire		
5 land as illegal, unjust, and inhumane;		
6 (2) the Congress commends the leadership in		
both the British and Irish Governments and forme

9 Chairman of the multiparty talks, for fostering a		
10 new environment in which human rights concern		
11 may be addressed and an agreement may be reached		
expeditiously through inclusive talks with respect to		
Northern Ireland; and		
14 (3) it is the sense of the Congress that—		
15 (A) all parties should reject violence and		
work diligently through democratic, peaceful		
means to reach a just and lasting peace in		
Northern Ireland;		
19 (B) human rights should be protected for		

all citizens and any peace agreement in North-

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1	ern Ireland must recognize the state's obliga-
2	tion to protect human rights in all cir-
3	cumstances; and
4	(C) there are a number of measures which
5	can be taken immediately that would remedy
6	abusive human rights policies and build con-
7	fidence in the peace process, such as acting
8	upon the Standing Advisory Commission on
9	Human Rights (SACHR) report and rec-
10	ommendations put forth by other human rights
11	organizations.
