CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of Congress that the 2004 Summer Olympic Games be held in Cape Town, South Africa.

Whereas the Olympic Games have never been held on the continent of Africa;

Whereas Africa, with 53 countries and with a population of more than 720 million people, is ready to receive its first Olympic Games;

- Whereas South Africa ended years of apartheid control in 1994 and elected a government committed to democracy and the national unity of all its citizens;
- Whereas South Africa continues to promote national reconciliation among all South Africans, and recognizes the capacity of sports to unify the nation;
- Whereas South Africa has adopted a constitution as the supreme law of the land and through it guarantees democratic values, social justice, fundamental human rights, and economic opportunities for all;
- Whereas Cape Town, South Africa, is a modern city with a history, beauty, and attractions to keep the world and visitors captivated for years to come; and
- Whereas South Africa's President, Nelson Mandela, who serves as the honorary President of the Cape Town 2004 Olympic bid, has endorsed Cape Town's bid for the 2004 Summer Olympic Games: Now, therefore, be it
