# H. R. 1336

To amend the Adult Education Act to authorize the Secretary of Education to make grants to States to provide support services to participants in adult education programs.

Mr. Smith of Texas (for himself, Mr. Roemer, Mrs. Roukema, and Mr. Watt of North Carolina) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workorce

# A BILL

To amend the Adult Education Act to authorize the Secretary of Education to make grants to States to provide support services to participants in adult education programs.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 The Congress makes the following findings:
- 5 (1) There are approximately 46,100,000 adults
- 6 16 years of age or older who are not in school, are
- 7 without a high school diploma, or who score in the

- lowest 2 levels of the National Adult Literacy Survey.
  - (2) Only 9 percent of those 46,100,000 illiterate adults are served by available adult education programs nationwide.
    - (3) Participation in adult education programs should be increased to 25 percent.
    - (4) Increased participation will result in a drop in the number of individuals on public assistance and an increase in the number of individuals who are gainfully employed.
    - (5) Studies show that literacy levels are strongly correlated with educational attainment, income, and employment status.
    - (6) An Ohio University economist has estimated that adult illiteracy costs Americans more than \$175,000,000,000 per year through lost income and tax revenue, higher unemployment, more crime, and higher training costs for business and industry.
    - (7) The Department of Education has reported that individuals who successfully complete adult education programs are likely to use support services, and that the availability of support services is a substantial predictor of enrollee classroom attendance.

- 1 (8) Studies show that the most influential vari-
- able in a child's participation and success in school
- 3 is parental educational level.

#### 4 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF GRANT PROGRAM.

- 5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Adult Education Act (20
- 6 U.S.C. 1201 et seq.) is amended by inserting after section
- 7 373 the following:

## 8 "SEC. 374. GRANTS FOR SUPPORT SERVICES.

- 9 "(a) In General.—The Secretary may make grants
- 10 on the basis of a competitive review process to States for
- 11 the purpose of providing support services to adults en-
- 12 rolled in, or desiring to enroll in, adult education pro-
- 13 grams, services, or activities, who otherwise would be un-
- 14 able to do so. Such support services may include child
- 15 care, transportation, or any other service that the Sec-
- 16 retary determines is consistent with this section.
- 17 "(b) Number of Grants.—The Secretary may
- 18 make not more than ten, 3 year grants under this section.
- 19 "(c) APPLICATIONS.—To apply for a grant under this
- 20 section, a State shall submit an application to the Sec-
- 21 retary in accordance with the procedures established by
- 22 the Secretary.
- 23 "(d) EVALUATION.—The Secretary shall, through
- 24 contracts with nongovernmental entities, provide for a cu-

- 1 mulative review of the progress and effectiveness of at
- 2 least five grants made under this section.
- 3 "(e) Reports to Congress.—The Secretary shall
- 4 submit an interim report to the Congress concerning the
- 5 results of the evaluations conducted under subsection (d),
- 6 not later than the end of the second year in which the
- 7 Secretary makes grants under this section. The Secretary
- 8 shall submit a final report to the Congress concerning
- 9 such subject not later than the end of the third year for
- 10 which the Secretary makes grants under this section.
- 11 "(f) Funding.—
- 12 "(1) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—
- 13 For the purpose of carrying out this section, there
- are authorized to be appropriated \$12,000,000 for
- each of the fiscal years 1998 through 2000. No
- amount may be expended to carry out the provisions
- of this section in any fiscal year unless the amount
- appropriated for such fiscal year pursuant to section
- 19 313 equals or exceeds the amount appropriated pur-
- suant to such section for fiscal year 1997.
- 21 "(2) Set-aside for evaluation.—Of the
- amounts appropriated under paragraph (1) for a fis-
- cal year, the Secretary shall reserve not more than
- 24 17 percent for carrying out subsection (d).".
