A BILL

To provide for the defense of the environment, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Defense of the Envi-
- 5 ronment Act of 1997".

SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

- 2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that provisions that
- 3 reduce protection of the environment have been included
- 4 in legislation without adequate consideration and an op-
- 5 portunity for Members to vote on the provisions.
- 6 (b) Purpose.—The purposes of this Act are to—
- 7 (1) require Members of Congress to vote in the
- 8 House of Representatives and the Senate on provi-
- 9 sions included in legislation that reduce protection of
- the environment; and
- 11 (2) require the Office of Management and
- Budget to ensure that each department or agency
- makes available to Congress and the public informa-
- 14 tion to assist in assessing whether provisions in-
- cluded in legislation would reduce protection of the
- environment.

17 SEC. 3. APPLICABLE PROVISIONS.

- 18 (a) In General.—This Act shall apply to any provi-
- 19 sion in a bill, joint resolution, amendment, or conference
- 20 report before Congress that reduces protection of the envi-
- 21 ronment.
- 22 (b) Provisions Reducing Protection.—A provi-
- 23 sion shall be considered to reduce protection of the envi-
- 24 ronment if the provision meets the criteria of one or more
- 25 of the following paragraphs:

1	(1) Defense of Clean air and Water.—The
2	provision may allow increased pollution of ambient
3	air, indoor air, surface water, ground water, the
4	oceans, or other terrestrial or aquatic resources.
5	(2) Defense of national parks and public
6	LANDS.—The provision may—
7	(A) cause adverse impacts on the environ-
8	mental quality of national parks or other public
9	lands, including the effect of decreasing the
10	quantity or quality of outdoor educational or
11	recreational opportunities on such lands; or
12	(B) diminish protection of species that
13	may be endangered.
14	(3) Defense of Children's environmental
15	HEALTH.—The provision may increase children's ex-
16	posure to environmental contaminants and other en-
17	vironmental risks.
18	(e) Other Provisions.—A provision shall also be
19	considered to reduce protection of the environment if the
20	provision may have the effect of shielding any violators
21	of environmental laws from penalties or limiting judicial
22	review of agency action under the authority of any envi-
23	ronmental law.
24	(d) Baseline for Effects.—The baseline for de-
25	termining the effects of a provision described in subsection

- 1 (b) or (c) shall be the circumstances that would exist if
- 2 the provision were not enacted.

3 SEC. 4. DUTIES OF CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES.

- 4 (a) In General.—When a committee of the House
- 5 of Representatives or Senate or a committee of conference
- 6 reports a bill or joint resolution of public character that
- 7 includes any provision that reduces protection of the envi-
- 8 ronment, the report of the committee accompanying the
- 9 bill or joint resolution (or the statement of managers ac-
- 10 companying the conference report) shall contain each of
- 11 the following:
- 12 (1) An identification and description of any
- provision in the bill or joint resolution or conference
- report that reduces protection of the environment.
- 15 (2) A qualitative and, if practicable, a quan-
- titative assessment of the extent of the reduction in
- 17 protection of the environment.
- 18 (3) A description of the actions, if any, taken
- by the committee to avoid the reduction in protec-
- tion of the environment.
- 21 (4) Any statement received under section 5.

22 SEC. 5. DUTIES OF THE COMPTROLLER GENERAL.

- 23 (a) Statement.—For each bill or joint resolution of
- 24 a public character reported by any committee of the House
- 25 of Representatives or the Senate, and for each report by

- 1 a committee of conference, the Comptroller General of the
- 2 United States, upon a request of the committee or a ma-
- 3 jority of the members of the minority party or majority
- 4 party of the committee, shall, prior to the filing of the
- 5 report, prepare and submit to the committee a statement
- 6 assessing the extent to which the provisions of the bill,
- 7 joint resolution, or conference report reduce protection of
- 8 the environment.
- 9 (b) Assistance to Committees and Studies.—At
- 10 the request of any committee of the Senate or the House
- 11 of Representatives, the Comptroller General shall, to the
- 12 extent practicable, consult with and assist such committee
- 13 in assessing the extent to which the provisions of a bill,
- 14 joint resolution, or conference report reduce the protection
- 15 of the environment.
- 16 SEC. 6. DUTIES OF OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT OF BUDGET.
- 17 (a) In General.—The Director of the Office of
- 18 Management and Budget shall ensure that each depart-
- 19 ment or agency of the United States—
- 20 (1) collects and catalogs available information
- 21 that would assist in assessing whether any provision
- in a bill, joint resolution, amendment, or conference
- report before Congress would reduce protection of
- 24 the environment;

- 1 (2) coordinates, organizes and facilitates the 2 availability of such information for use by Congress;
- 3 and
- 4 (3) ensures that such information is readily
- 5 available to the Comptroller General for purposes of
- 6 fulfilling duties under section 5 of this Act or for
- 7 other purposes.
- 8 (b) Public Availability.—The Director of the Of-
- 9 fice of Management and Budget shall ensure that each
- 10 department or agency of the United States makes infor-
- 11 mation collected and cataloged pursuant to subsection (a)
- 12 readily available to the public.
- 13 SEC. 7. LEGISLATION SUBJECT TO POINT OF ORDER.
- 14 (a) IN GENERAL.—It shall not be in order in the
- 15 House of Representatives or the Senate to consider any
- 16 bill, joint resolution, or conference report that is reported
- 17 by a committee unless the committee has complied with
- 18 section 4.
- 19 (b) Procedure in the House of Representa-
- 20 TIVES.—It shall not be in order in the House of Rep-
- 21 resentatives to consider a rule or order that waives the
- 22 application of subsection (a).

1 SEC. 8. DEBATE ON PROVISIONS REDUCING PROTECTION.

- 2 (a) Amendment of House Rules.—Rule XVI of
- 3 the Rules of the House of Representatives is amended by
- 4 adding at the end the following:
- 5 "(11) Notwithstanding the adoption of any rule or
- 6 motion to limit or close debate it shall always be in order,
- 7 as question of high privilege, to move to strike from any
- 8 bill, joint resolution, or amendment any provision that re-
- 9 duces protection of the environment (within the meaning
- 10 of section 3 of the Defense of the Environment Act of
- 11 1997). Such motion shall take precedence over a motion
- 12 for the previous question on such bill, joint resolution, or
- 13 amendment and it shall be in order to debate any such
- 14 motion for 40 minutes, one-half of such time shall be given
- 15 to debate in favor of, and one-half of such times in opposi-
- 16 tion to, such motion.".
- 17 (b) VOTE IN SENATE.—Notwithstanding the adop-
- 18 tion of any rule or motion to limit or close debate it shall
- 19 always be in order, as question of high privilege in the
- 20 Senate, to move to strike from any bill, joint resolution,
- 21 amendment, or conference report any provision that re-
- 22 duces protection of the environment (within the meaning
- 23 of section 3 of the Defense of the Environment Act of
- 24 1997). Such motion shall take precedence over a motion
- 25 for the previous question on such bill, joint resolution,
- 26 amendment, or conference report, and it shall be in order

1	to debate any such motion for 40 minutes, one-half of such
2	time shall be given to debate in favor of, and one-half of
3	such times in opposition to, such motion.
4	(c) Conference Reports and Senate Amend-
5	MENTS.—
6	(1) Conference reports.—Clause (4) of
7	Rule XXVIII of the Rules of the House of Rep-
8	resentatives is amended as follows:
9	(A) In subsection (a) after "if such matter
10	has been offered as an amendment in the
11	House" by inserting "or containing any provi-
12	sion that reduces protection of the environment
13	(within the meaning of section 3 of the Defense
14	of the Environment Act of 1997)".
15	(B) In subsections (a), (b), and (c), by
16	striking out "nongermane matter" in each place
17	it appears and inserting "matter or provision".
18	(2) Senate amendments.—Clause (5) of Rule
19	XXVII of the Rules of the House of Representatives
20	is amended as follows:
21	(A) In subsection (a) after "if such matter
22	had been offered as an amendment in the
23	House" by inserting "or that reduces protection
24	of the environment (within the meaning of sec-

1	tion 3 of the Defense of the Environment Act
2	of 1997)".
3	(B) In subsections (a), (b), and (c), by
4	striking out "nongermane matter" in each place
5	it appears and inserting "matter or provision".
6	(d) Exercise of Rulemaking Powers.—The pro-
7	visions of this section and sections 4 and 7 are enacted
8	by Congress—
9	(1) as an exercise of the rulemaking power of
10	the House of Representatives and the Senate, re-
11	spectively, and as such they shall be considered as
12	part of the rules of such House, respectively, and
13	such rules shall supersede other rules only to the ex-
14	tent that they are inconsistent therewith; and
15	(2) with full recognition of the constitutional
16	right of either House to change such rules (so far
17	as relating to such House) at any time, in the same
18	manner, and to the same extent as in the case of
19	any other rule of each House.
20	SEC. 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Act shall take effect on the date of enactment. 21
