A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the Army to set aside the conviction of Dr. Samuel A. Mudd by a military commission in 1865 for aiding, abetting, and assisting the conspirators who assassinated President Abraham Lincoln.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 The Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) On June 29, 1865, Dr. Samuel A. Mudd of
- 6 the State of Maryland was convicted by a military
- 7 commission in Washington, D.C., of aiding, abetting,

- and assisting the conspirators who assassinated
 President Abraham Lincoln.
- 2) The conviction of Dr. Mudd was based on evidence of guilt that fell so far short of meeting the prosecution's burden of proof that such conviction amounted to a denial of due process of law which was so extreme as to constitute fundamental unfairness.
- 9 (3) Because the conviction of Dr. Mudd was not 10 based on sufficient evidence and resulted in a denial 11 of due process of law, the Secretary of the Army 12 should set aside the conviction.

13 SEC. 2. DIRECTION TO SET ASIDE CONVICTION.

The Secretary of the Army shall set aside the conviction of Dr. Samuel A. Mudd of the State of Maryland that was entered on June 29, 1865, for aiding, abetting, and assisting the conspirators who assassinated President Abraham Lincoln.
