A BILL

To award a congressional gold medal to the late James Cagney.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, SECTION 1. FINDINGS. 4 Congress finds the following: 5 (1) James Cagney was one of the most talented and popular stars of the American screen, exemplify-6 7 ing in the characters he portrayed the indomitable 8 spirit and deep patriotism of all Americans in gen-9 eral, and New Yorkers in particular. 10 (2) James Cagney's film career had numerous

- 5 (3) During the Second World War, James Cag-6 ney devoted a great deal of his considerable talent 7 and energy in support of the war effort by volunteer-8 ing for the USO and by serving as president of the 9 Screen Actors Guild and as chairman of the Holly-
- 11 (4) James Cagney coordinated the appearances 12 of more than 25,000 of his fellow Hollywood stars 13 and joined them in USO tours to entertain Amer-14 ican servicemen and women both in the United 15 States and abroad, including tours at military bases 16 in England where he performed up to 12 shows a 17 day in spite of the possibility of German air raids.
 - (5) James Cagney's vital role in organizing and overseeing the Hollywood Victory Caravan, which sold more than \$12,000,000,000 in war bonds, had an immeasurable and crucial impact on the United States victory in the Second World War.

23 SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

24 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The President is 25 authorized to present, on behalf of the Congress, to the

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- 1 family of the late James Cagney a gold medal of appro-
- 2 priate design, in recognition of his great patriotism and
- 3 his contribution to American culture.
- 4 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the
- 5 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
- 6 of the Treasury shall strike a gold medal with suitable em-
- 7 blems, devices, and inscriptions to be determined by the
- 8 Secretary.
- 9 (c) Gifts and Donations.—
- 10 (1) In General.—The Secretary of the Treas-
- 11 ury may accept, use, and disburse gifts or donations
- of property or money to carry out this section.
- 13 (2) Appropriation authorized.—No amount
- is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this
- 15 section.
- 16 SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.
- 17 The Secretary of the Treasury may strike and sell
- 18 duplicates in bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant
- 19 to section 2 under such regulations as the Secretary may
- 20 prescribe, at a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof,
- 21 including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery, and
- 22 overhead expenses, and the cost of the gold medal.
- 23 SEC. 4. STATUS OF MEDALS.
- 24 The medals struck pursuant to this Act are—

1	(1) national medals, for purposes of chapter 51
2	of title 31, United States Code; and
3	(2) numismatic items, for purposes of section
4	5134 of such title.
5	SEC. 5. TRANSFER OF ANY PROFIT TO LIBRARY OF CON-
6	GRESS.
7	The Secretary of the Treasury shall transfer, from
8	the Numismatic Public Enterprise Fund to the Library
9	of Congress, an amount equal to the amount by which the
10	sum of any gifts and donations received by the Secretary
11	in accordance with section $2(c)(1)$ and any proceeds from
12	the sale of duplicate medals pursuant to section 3 exceeds
13	the total amount of the costs incurred by the Secretary
14	in carrying out this Act.

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
