Mr. ROYCE introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Government Reform and Oversight

A BILL

To establish a Second National Blue Ribbon Commission to Eliminate Waste in Government.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Second National Blue
- 5 Ribbon Commission to Eliminate Waste in Government
- 6 Act".
- 7 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT.
- 8 There is established a commission known as the Sec-
- 9 ond National Blue Ribbon Commission to Eliminate

- 1 Waste in Government (in this Act referred to as the
- 2 "Commission").
- 3 SEC. 3. DUTIES.
- 4 (a) IN GENERAL.—It shall be the duty of the Com-
- 5 mission—
- 6 (1) to conduct a private sector survey on man-
- 7 agement and cost control in the Federal Govern-
- 8 ment;
- 9 (2) to conduct in-depth reviews of the oper-
- ations of the executive agencies;
- 11 (3) to review existing Government Accounting
- Office (GAO), Congressional Budget Office (CBO),
- and inspector general reports and other existing gov-
- 14 ernmental and nongovernmental recommendations
- for reducing waste including recommendations from
- the President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Con-
- trol, and based on this review periodically submit to
- the President and Congress a list of those rec-
- ommendations with estimated savings the Commis-
- sion determines are most significant and shall in-
- 21 clude in the report a determination of whether the
- recommendation can be implemented by Executive
- order or whether it requires legislative action; and
- 24 (4) to submit to the President and the Congress
- recommendations for improving the budget process,

- 1 management and reducing waste and costs in the 2 Federal Government.
- 3 (b) Particular Areas To Be Examined.—In ful-
- 4 filling the duties described in subsection (a), the Commis-
- 5 sion shall identify and address—
- 6 (1) opportunities for increased efficiency and 7 reduced costs in the Federal Government that can 8 be realized by executive action or legislation;
- 9 (2) areas in the Federal Government where 10 managerial accountability can be enhanced and ad-11 ministrative control can be improved;
- 12 (3) specific Federal programs that have accom-13 plished their objectives and ought to be terminated;
- 14 (4) specific Federal program services that could 15 be provided at a lower cost by the private sector;
- 16 (5) specific reforms of the budget process that
 17 would yield savings, increase accountability and effi18 ciency, and enhance public confidence in the budget
 19 process; and
- 20 (6) specific areas in the Federal Government 21 where further study can be justified by potential sav-22 ings.
- 23 SEC. 4. MEMBERSHIP.
- 24 (a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
- 25 shall be composed of 12 members appointed as follows:

- 1 (1) 12 individuals appointed by the President 2 from among individuals who are not officers or em-3 ployees of any government and who are especially 4 qualified to serve on the Commission by virtue of 5 their education, training, or experience.
- 6 (2) The majority leader and minority leader of
 7 the Senate, as well as the Speaker and minority
 8 leader of the House of Representatives may submit
 9 recommendations to the President concerning ap10 pointments to the Commission.
- 11 (3) Not more than 6 members of the Commis-12 sion shall be of the same political party.
- 13 (b) CONTINUATION OF MEMBERSHIP.—If an individ-
- 14 ual is appointed to the Commission, and later becomes an
- 15 officer or employee of a government, such individual may
- 16 continue as a member of the Commission for not longer
- 17 than the 30-day period beginning on the date such individ-
- 18 ual becomes such an officer or employee.
- 19 (c) Appointment of Members.—Appointments
- 20 shall be made not later than 30 days after the date of
- 21 enactment of this Act.
- (d) TERMS.—Each member shall be appointed for the
- 23 life of the Commission.

- 1 (e) Vacancies.—A vacancy in the Commission shall
- 2 be filled within 30 days in the manner in which the origi-
- 3 nal appointment was made.
- 4 (f) Compensation.—
- 5 (1) Rates of Pay.—Except as provided in
- 6 paragraph (2), members of the Commission shall
- 7 serve without pay.
- 8 (2) Travel expenses.—Each member of the
- 9 Commission shall receive travel expenses, including
- per diem in lieu of subsidence, in accordance with
- sections 5702 and 5703 of title 5, United States
- 12 Code.
- 13 (g) Quorum.—5 members of the Commission shall
- 14 constitute a quorum, but a lesser number may hold hear-
- 15 ings.
- 16 (h) Chairperson.—The Chairperson of the Com-
- 17 mission shall be elected by the members from among the
- 18 members.
- 19 (i) Meeting.—The Commission shall meet at least
- 20 once each month at the call of the Chairperson of the
- 21 Commission.
- 22 SEC. 5. STAFF AND SUPPORT SERVICES.
- 23 (a) Director.—The Commission shall have a Direc-
- 24 tor appointed by the Chairperson of the Commission and
- 25 paid by a rate determined by the Commission.

- 1 (b) STAFF.—With the approval of the Commission,
- 2 the Director of the Commission may appoint personnel as
- 3 the Director considers appropriate.

4 SEC. 6. POWERS.

- 5 (a) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commission
- 6 may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold hear-
- 7 ings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony, and
- 8 receive evidence as the Commission considers appropriate.
- 9 (b) Delegation of Authority.—Any member or
- 10 agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the Com-
- 11 mission, take any action which the Commission is author-
- 12 ized to take by this section.
- 13 (c) Information.—The Commission may secure di-
- 14 rectly from any Federal agency information necessary to
- 15 enable it to carry out this Act. Upon request of the chair-
- 16 person of the Commission, the head of the Federal agency
- 17 shall furnish the information to the Commission.
- 18 (d) Contract Authority.—The Commission may
- 19 contract with and compensate government and private
- 20 agencies or persons for supplies or services without regard
- 21 to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes (41 U.S.C. 5).
- 22 SEC. 7. REPORTS.
- 23 (a) Periodic Reports.—Pursuant to section
- 24 3(a)(3), the Commission shall issue periodic reports to the
- 25 President and the Congress.

- 1 (b) Final Report.—Not later than the expiration
- 2 of the 24-month period beginning on the date of enact-
- 3 ment of this Act, the Commission shall submit to the
- 4 President and the Congress a final report setting forth
- 5 the finding and conclusions of the Commission and specific
- 6 recommendations for legislative and administrative actions
- 7 that the Commission determines to be appropriate.

8 SEC. 8. TERMINATION.

- 9 The Commission shall terminate not later than the
- 10 expiration of the 30-day period beginning on the date on
- 11 which the Commission submits its final report under sec-
- 12 tion 7(b).

13 SEC. 9. FUNDING.

- 14 The Commission is to be funded, staffed and
- 15 equipped, to the extent practicable and permitted by law,
- 16 by the private sector without cost to the Federal Govern-
- 17 ment. To accomplish this objective, it is expected that the
- 18 Secretary of Commerce will engage in a joint project, with
- 19 a nonprofit organization, pursuant to section 1 of Public
- 20 Law 91–412 (15 U.S.C. 1525), for the purpose of provid-
- 21 ing support for the Commission as described in section
- 22 5 and section 6 of this Act.
