Mr. Gekas introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Commerce

A BILL

To establish a commission to recommend a strategy for the global eradication of disease.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Commission
- 5 for the New National Goal: The Advancement of Global
- 6 Health Act".
- 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 8 The Congress makes the following findings:

- 1 (1) During the 20th century the United States 2 led the world in defeating totalitarianism and com-3 munism.
- 4 (2) The United States also led the world in 5 spreading and establishing democracy in every re-6 gion.
- 7 (3) The end of global conflict and the end of 8 the Cold War, now guaranteed by the power and 9 leadership of the United States, allow the Nation to 10 establish new goals for the 21st century.
- 11 (4) The United States, the world leader in the 12 research, development, and production of tech-13 nologies, medicines, and methodologies utilized to 14 prevent and cure disease, has the human and natu-15 ral resources to dedicate itself to the new national 16 goal of the global eradication of disease.

17 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.

- 18 There is established a commission to be known as the
- 19 "National Commission for the New National Goal: The
- 20 Advancement of Global Health" (in this Act referred to
- 21 as the "Commission").

22 SEC. 4. DUTIES OF COMMISSION.

- The Commission shall recommend to the Congress a
- 24 national strategy for coordinating governmental, aca-

- 1 demic, and public and private health care entities for the
- 2 purpose of the global eradication of disease.

3 SEC. 5. MEMBERSHIP.

- 4 (a) Membership of the Commission.—The Com-
- 5 mission shall consist of individuals who are of recognized
- 6 standing and distinction and who possess the dem-
- 7 onstrated capacity to discharge the duties imposed on the
- 8 Commission, and shall include representatives of the pub-
- 9 lic, private, and academic areas whose capacity is based
- 10 on a special knowledge or expertise in medical research
- 11 or related areas.
- 12 (b) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
- 13 shall be composed of 13 members appointed as follows:
- 14 (1) The Secretary of Health and Human Serv-
- ices (or the Secretary's delegate).
- 16 (2) The Chairman of the Federal Trade Com-
- mission.
- 18 (3) 3 Members of the Senate appointed jointly
- by the President of the Senate and the President
- pro tempore. Not more than 2 members appointed
- 21 under this paragraph may be of the same political
- 22 party.
- 23 (4) 3 Members of the House of Representatives
- appointed by the Speaker of the House of Rep-
- resentatives. Not more than 2 members appointed

- under this paragraph may be of the same politicalparty.
- 3 (5) 2 individuals appointed by the President, by 4 and with the advice and consent of the Senate, from 5 among individuals who are not officers or employees 6 of any government and who are specially qualified to 7 serve on the Commission by virtue of their edu-8 cation, training, or experience.
- 9 (6) 3 individuals appointed by the President 10 from among individuals who will represent the views 11 of recipients of health services. Not more than 1 12 member appointed under this paragraph may be an 13 officer or employee of the Federal Government.
- (c) CONTINUATION OF MEMBERSHIP.—If a member was appointed to the Commission as a Member of Congress, and the member ceases to be a Member of Congress, that member may continue as a member for not longer than the 30-day period beginning on the date that member ceases to be a Member of Congress.
- 20 (d) Terms.—Each member shall be appointed for the21 life of the Commission.
- 22 (e) Basic Pay.—Members shall serve without pay.
- 23 (f) Quorum.—7 members of the Commission shall
- 24 constitute a quorum but a lesser number may hold hear-
- 25 ings.

- 1 (g) Chairperson; Vice Chairperson.—The Chair-
- 2 person and Vice Chairperson of the Commission shall be
- 3 designated by the President at the time of the appoint-
- 4 ment.
- 5 (h) Meetings.—The Commission shall meet monthly
- 6 or at the call of a majority of its members.

7 SEC. 6. POWERS OF COMMISSION.

- 8 (a) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commission
- 9 may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold hear-
- 10 ings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony, and
- 11 receive evidence as the Commission considers appropriate.
- 12 (b) Powers of Members and Agents.—Any mem-
- 13 ber or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the
- 14 Commission, take any action which the Commission is au-
- 15 thorized to take by this section.
- 16 (c) Obtaining Official Data.—The Commission
- 17 may secure directly from any department or agency of the
- 18 United States information necessary to enable it to carry
- 19 out this Act. Upon request of the Chairperson or Vice
- 20 Chairperson of the Commission, the head of that depart-
- 21 ment or agency shall furnish that information to the Com-
- 22 mission.
- 23 (d) Gifts, Bequests, and Devises.—The Commis-
- 24 sion may accept, use, and dispose of gifts, bequests, or
- 25 devises of services or property, both real and personal, for

- 1 the purpose of aiding or facilitating the work of the Com-
- 2 mission. Gifts, bequests, or devises of money and proceeds
- 3 from sales of other property received as gifts, bequests,
- 4 or devises shall be deposited in the Treasury and shall be
- 5 available for disbursement upon order of the Chairperson
- 6 or Commission. For purposes of Federal income, estate,
- 7 and gift taxes, property accepted under this subsection
- 8 shall be considered as a gift, bequest, or devise to the
- 9 United States.
- 10 (e) Mails.—The Commission may use the United
- 11 States mails in the same manner and under the same con-
- 12 ditions as other departments and agencies of the United
- 13 States.
- 14 (f) Administrative Support Services.—Upon the
- 15 request of the Commission, the Administrator of General
- 16 Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reimburs-
- 17 able basis, the administrative support services necessary
- 18 for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities under
- 19 this Act.
- 20 (g) Contract Authority.—The Commission may
- 21 contract with and compensate government and private
- 22 agencies or persons for administrative and other services,
- 23 without regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes
- 24 (41 U.S.C. 5).

1 SEC. 7. REPORTS.

- 2 (a) Interim Reports.—The Commission may sub-
- 3 mit to the President and the Congress interim reports as
- 4 the Commission considers appropriate.
- 5 (b) Final Report.—The Commission shall transmit
- 6 a final report to the President and the Congress not later
- 7 than 12 months after the date of enactment of this Act.
- 8 The final report shall contain a detailed statement of the
- 9 findings and conclusions of the Commission, together with
- 10 its recommendations for legislative, administrative, or
- 11 other actions, as the Commission considers appropriate.
- 12 SEC. 8. TERMINATION.
- The Commission shall terminate 30 days after sub-
- 14 mitting its final report pursuant to section 7.
- 15 SEC. 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.
- 16 This Act shall take effect 60 days after the date of
- 17 its enactment.
- 18 SEC. 10. BUDGET ACT COMPLIANCE.
- 19 Any spending authority (as defined in subparagraphs
- 20 (A) and (C) of section 401(c)(2) of the Congressional
- 21 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 651(c)(2) (A) and (C)))
- 22 authorized by this Act shall be effective only to such extent
- 23 and in such amounts as are provided in appropriation
- 24 Acts.

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
