6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 7 As used in this Act:
- 8 (1) The term "historic site" means the Thomas
- 9 Cole National Historic Site established by section 4
- of this Act.
- 11 (2) The term "Hudson River artists" means
- 12 artists who were associated with the Hudson River
- school of landscape painting.
- 14 (3) The term "plan" means the general man-
- agement plan developed pursuant to section 6(d).
- 16 (4) The term "Secretary" means the Secretary
- of the Interior.
- 18 (5) The term "Society" means the Greene
- 19 County Historical Society of Greene County, New
- 20 York, which owns the Thomas Cole home, studio,
- and other property comprising the historic site.

1 SEC. 3. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

- 2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
- 3 (1) The Hudson River school of landscape
- 4 painting was inspired by Thomas Cole and was char-
- 5 acterized by a group of 19th century landscape art-
- 6 ists who recorded and celebrated the landscape and
- 7 wilderness of America, particularly in the Hudson
- 8 River Valley region in the State of New York.
- 9 (2) Thomas Cole is recognized as America's
- most prominent landscape and allegorical painter of
- the mid-19th century.
- 12 (3) Located in Greene County, New York, the
- Thomas Cole House, also known as Thomas Cole's
- 14 Cedar Grove, is listed on the National Register of
- 15 Historic Places and has been designated as a Na-
- tional Historic Landmark.
- 17 (4) Within a 15 mile radius of the Thomas Cole
- House, an area that forms a key part of the rich
- cultural and natural heritage of the Hudson River
- Valley region, significant landscapes and scenes
- 21 painted by Thomas Cole and other Hudson River
- artists, such as Frederic Church, survive intact.
- 23 (5) The State of New York has established the
- Hudson River Valley Greenway to promote the pres-
- ervation, public use, and enjoyment of the natural

1	and cultural resources of the Hudson River Valley
2	region.
3	(6) Establishment of the Thomas Cole National
4	Historic Site will provide opportunities for the illus-
5	tration and interpretation of cultural themes of the
6	heritage of the United States and unique opportuni-
7	ties for education, public use, and enjoyment.
8	(b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
9	(1) to preserve and interpret the home and stu-
10	dio of Thomas Cole for the benefit, inspiration, and
11	education of the people of the United States;
12	(2) to help maintain the integrity of the setting
13	in the Hudson River Valley region that inspired ar-
14	tistic expression;
15	(3) to coordinate the interpretive, preservation,
16	and recreational efforts of Federal, State, and other
17	entities in the Hudson Valley region in order to en-
18	hance opportunities for education, public use, and
19	enjoyment; and

(4) to broaden understanding of the Hudson River Valley region and its role in American history and culture.

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1 SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF THOMAS COLE NATIONAL HIS-

- 2 TORIC SITE.
- 3 (a) Establishment.—There is established, as an af-
- 4 filiated area of the National Park System, the Thomas
- 5 Cole National Historic Site in the State of New York.
- 6 (b) Description.—The historic site shall consist of
- 7 the home and studio of Thomas Cole, comprising approxi-
- 8 mately 3.4 acres, located at 218 Spring Street, in the vil-
- 9 lage of Catskill, New York, as generally depicted on the
- 10 boundary map numbered TCH/80002, and dated March
- 11 1992.
- 12 SEC. 5. RETENTION OF OWNERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT OF
- 13 HISTORIC SITE BY GREENE COUNTY HISTORI-
- 14 CAL SOCIETY.
- 15 The Greene County Historical Society of Greene
- 16 County, New York, shall continue to own, manage, and
- 17 operate the historic site.
- 18 SEC. 6. ADMINISTRATION OF HISTORIC SITE.
- 19 (a) Applicability of National Park System
- 20 Laws.—The historic site shall be administered by the So-
- 21 ciety in a manner consistent with this Act and all laws
- 22 generally applicable to units of the National Park System,
- 23 including the Act of August 25, 1916 (16 U.S.C. 1 et seq.;
- 24 commonly known as the National Park Service Organic
- 25 Act), and the Act of August 21, 1935 (16 U.S.C. 461 et

- 1 seq.; commonly known as the Historic Sites, Buildings,2 and Antiquities Act).
- 3 (b) Cooperative Agreements.—

- (1) Assistance to society.—The Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements with the Society to preserve the Thomas Cole House and other structures in the historic site and to assist with education programs and research and interpretation of the Thomas Cole House and associated landscapes.
 - (2) Other assistance.—To further the purposes of this Act, the Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements with the State of New York, the Society, the Thomas Cole Foundation, and other public and private entities to facilitate public understanding and enjoyment of the lives and works of the Hudson River artists through the provision of assistance to develop, present, and fund art exhibits, resident artist programs, and other appropriate activities related to the preservation, interpretation, and use of the historic site.

(c) Artifacts and Property.—

(1) Personal property generally.—The Secretary may acquire personal property associated with, and appropriate for, the interpretation of the historic site.

- 1 (2) Works of art.—The Secretary may acquire works of art associated with Thomas Cole and other Hudson River artists for the purpose of dis-
- play at the historic site. 5 (d) GENERAL MANAGEMENT PLAN.—Within two complete fiscal years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall develop a general manage-8 ment plan for the historic site with the cooperation of the Society. Upon the completion of the plan, the Secretary 10 shall provide a copy of the plan to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate and the Committee on Resources of the House of Representatives. The plan shall include recommendations for regional wayside exhibits, to be carried out through cooperative agreements 14 15 with the State of New York and other public and private
- 18 seq.; commonly known as the National Park System Gen-19 eral Authorities Act).

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1 SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 2 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
- 3 as are necessary to carry out this Act.
