A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of Education to make grants to institutions of higher education for demonstration projects to ensure equal educational opportunity in postsecondary education for individuals with learning disabilities.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Learning Differences
- 5 Act of 1998".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:

- (1) Disability is a natural part of the human experience and encompasses physical, mental, and cognitive impairments. The term "learning disabil-ity" refers to a number of specific learning disabil-ities, such as dyslexia. These disorders may manifest themselves in an imperfect ability to listen, think, speak, read, write, spell, reason, or perform mathe-matical calculations. Learning disabilities tend to en-dure from childhood into adulthood.
 - (2) 2,600,000 of the 5,100,000 children with disabilities served under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act in elementary and secondary education are children with learning disabilities.
 - (3) About 2 percent of all undergraduate students nationwide report having a learning disability. Different teaching strategies are needed to enable them to develop their talents and perform up to their capacity.
 - (4) A greater number of individuals with learning disabilities can benefit from postsecondary education, and contribute more fully to society and the economy, with adequate and appropriate programs, services, adaptations, and accommodations.
 - (5) Civil rights laws protect individuals with disabilities, including individuals with learning dis-

- abilities, in postsecondary education, and institutions of higher education require assistance to comply with these laws.
- 4 (6) Exemplary institutions of higher education 5 dedicated to meeting the needs of individuals with 6 learning disabilities exist and can serve as a national 7 resource for other institutions in educating these 8 students.
- 9 (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are as follows:
- 11 (1) To assist model institutions of higher edu-12 cation with demonstrated prior experience in serving 13 individuals with learning disabilities.
- 14 (2) To demonstrate and disseminate programs, 15 services, adaptations, accommodations, strategies, 16 and approaches to teaching individuals with disabil-17 ities in postsecondary education.

18 SEC. 3. PROGRAM AUTHORITY.

- 19 (a) In General.—The Secretary of Education may 20 award grants to, and enter into contracts and cooperative 21 agreements with, not more than 5 institutions of higher
- 21 agreements with, not more than 3 institutions of ingher
- 22 education that are described in section 4 for demonstra-
- 23 tion projects to develop, test, and disseminate, in accord-
- 24 ance with section 5, methods, techniques, and procedures

- 1 for ensuring equal educational opportunity for individuals
- 2 with learning disabilities in postsecondary education.
- 3 (b) AWARD BASIS.—Grants, contracts, and coopera-
- 4 tive agreements shall be awarded on a competitive basis.
- 5 (c) AWARD PERIOD.—Grants, contracts, and cooper-
- 6 ative agreements shall be awarded for a period of 3 years.

7 SEC. 4. ELIGIBLE ENTITIES.

- 8 Entities eligible to apply for a grant, contract, or co-
- 9 operative agreement under this Act are institutions of
- 10 higher education (as defined in section 1201 of the Higher
- 11 Education Act of 1956) with demonstrated prior experi-
- 12 ence with meeting the postsecondary educational needs of
- 13 individuals with learning disabilities.

14 SEC. 5. REQUIRED ACTIVITIES.

- 15 A recipient of a grant, contract, or cooperative agree-
- 16 ment under this Act shall use the funds received under
- 17 this Act to carry out each of the following activities:
- 18 (1) Developing or identifying innovative, effec-
- 19 tive, and efficient approaches, strategies, supports,
- 20 modifications, adaptations, and accommodations that
- enable individuals with learning disabilities to fully
- 22 participate in postsecondary education.
- 23 (2) Synthesizing research and other information
- related to the provision of services to individuals
- 25 with learning disabilities in postsecondary education.

- 1 (3) Conducting training sessions for personnel 2 from other institutions of higher education to enable 3 them to meet the special needs of postsecondary stu-4 dents with learning disabilities.
 - (4) Preparing and disseminating products based upon the activities described in paragraphs (1) through (3).
- 8 (5) Coordinating findings and products from 9 the activities described in paragraphs (1) through 10 (4) with other similar products and findings through 11 participation in conferences, groups, and profes-12 sional networks involved in the dissemination of 13 technical assistance and information on postsecond-14 ary education.

15 SEC. 6. PRIORITY.

The Secretary of Education shall ensure that, to the extent feasible, there is a national geographic distribution of grants, contracts, and cooperative agreements awarded under this Act throughout the States, except that the Secretary may give priority to a historically Black college or university that satisfies the requirements of section 4.

1 SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 2 There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
- 3 this Act \$10,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999

4 through 2001.
