AN ACT

To withhold voluntary proportional assistance for programs and projects of the International Atomic Energy Agency relating to the development and completion of the Bushehr nuclear power plant in Iran, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.** 4 This Act may be cited as the "Iran Nuclear Proliferation Prevention Act of 1998". SEC. 2. FINDINGS. 6 7 The Congress makes the following findings: 8 (1) Iran remains the world's leading sponsor of 9 international terrorism and is on the Department of 10 State's list of countries that provide support for acts 11 of international terrorism. 12 (2) Iran has repeatedly called for the destruc-13 tion of Israel and Iran supports organizations, such 14 as Hizballah, Hamas, and the Palestine Islamic 15 Jihad, which are responsible for terrorist attacks 16 against Israel. 17 (3) Iranian officials have stated their intent to 18 complete at least three nuclear power plants by 2015 19 and are currently working to complete the Bushehr 20 nuclear power plant located on the Persian Gulf 21 coast. 22 (4) The United States has publicly opposed the 23 completion of reactors at the Bushehr nuclear power

plant because the transfer of civilian nuclear tech-

- nology and training could help to advance Iran's nuclear weapons program.
 - (5) In an April 1997 hearing before the Subcommittee on Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs
 of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, the former Director of the Central Intelligence
 Agency, James Woolsey, stated that through the operation of the nuclear power reactor at the Bushehr
 nuclear power plant, Iran will develop substantial expertise relevant to the development of nuclear weapons.
 - (6) Construction of the Bushehr nuclear power plant was halted following the 1979 revolution in Iran because the former West Germany refused to assist in the completion the plant due to concerns that completion of the plant could provide Iran with expertise and technology which could advance Iran's nuclear weapons program.
 - (7) Iran is building up its offensive military capacity in other areas as evidenced by its recent testing of engines for ballistic missiles capable of carrying 2,200 pound warheads more than 800 miles, within range of strategic targets in Israel.
- 24 (8) In January 1995 Iran signed a 25 \$780,000,000 contract with the Russian Federation

- for Atomic Energy (MINATOM) to complete a VVER-1000 pressurized-light water reactor at the Bushehr nuclear power plant.
 - (9) In March of 1998, Russia confirmed its intention to complete work on the two reactors at the Bushehr nuclear power plant and agreed in principle to the construction of two more reactors at the Bushehr site.
 - (10) At least one reactor could be operational within a few years and it would subsequently provide Iran with substantial expertise to advance its nuclear weapons program.
 - (11) Iran ranks tenth among the 105 nations receiving assistance from the technical cooperation program of the International Atomic Energy Agency.
 - (12) Between 1995 and 1999, the International Atomic Energy Agency has provided and is expected to provide a total of \$1,550,000 through its Technical Assistance and Cooperation Fund for the Iranian nuclear power program, including reactors at the Bushehr nuclear power plant.
 - (13) The United States provides annual contributions to the International Atomic Energy Agency which total more than 25 percent of the annual

- assessed budget of the Agency and the United States also provides annual voluntary contributions to the Technical Assistance and Cooperation Fund of the Agency which total approximately 32 percent (\$16,000,000 in 1996) of the annual budget of the program.
 - (14) The United States should not voluntarily provide funding for the completion of nuclear power reactors which could provide Iran with substantial expertise to advance its nuclear weapons program and potentially pose a threat to the United States or its allies.
 - (15) Iran has no need for nuclear energy because of its immense oil and natural gas reserves which are equivalent to 9.3 percent of the world's reserves and Iran has 73,000,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas, an amount second only to the natural gas reserves of Russia.

- 4 SEC. 4. ANNUAL REVIEW BY SECRETARY OF STATE OF PRO-
- 5 GRAMS AND PROJECTS OF THE INTER-
- 6 NATIONAL ATOMIC ENERGY AGENCY; UNITED
- 7 STATES OPPOSITION TO PROGRAMS AND
- 8 PROJECTS OF THE AGENCY IN IRAN.
- 9 (a) Annual Review.—
- 10 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of State shall
- 11 undertake a comprehensive annual review of all pro-
- grams and projects of the International Atomic En-
- ergy Agency in the countries described in section
- 14 307(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22)
- 15 U.S.C. 2227(a)) and shall determine if such pro-
- 16 grams and projects are consistent with United
- 17 States nuclear nonproliferation and safety goals.
- 18 (2) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the
- date of the enactment of this Act and on an annual
- basis thereafter for 5 years, the Secretary shall pre-
- 21 pare and submit to the Congress a report containing
- 22 the results of the review under paragraph (1).
- 23 (b) Opposition to Certain Programs and
- 24 Projects of International Atomic Energy Agen-
- 25 CY.—The Secretary of State shall direct the United States

- 1 representative to the International Atomic Energy Agency
- 2 to oppose the following:
- 3 (1) Programs of the Agency that are deter-
- 4 mined by the Secretary under the review conducted
- 5 under subsection (a)(1) to be inconsistent with nu-
- 6 clear nonproliferation and safety goals of the United
- 7 States.
- 8 (2)(A) Technical assistance programs or
- 9 projects of the Agency designed to develop or com-
- plete the Bushehr nuclear power plant in Iran.
- 11 (B) Subparagraph (A) shall not apply with re-
- spect to programs or projects of the Agency that
- provide for the discontinuation, dismantling, or safe-
- 14 ty inspection of nuclear facilities or related mate-
- rials, or for inspections and similar activities de-

- ons by Iran.

18 SEC. 5. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.

- 19 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
- 20 date of the enactment of this Act and on an annual basis
- 21 thereafter for 5 years, the Secretary of State, in consulta-
- 22 tion with the United States representative to the Inter-
- 23 national Atomic Energy Agency, shall prepare and submit
- 24 to the Congress a report that—

- 1 (1) describes the total amount of annual assist-2 ance to Iran from the International Atomic Energy 3 Agency, a list of Iranian officials in leadership positions at the Agency, the expected timeframe for the 5 completion of the nuclear power reactors at the 6 Bushehr nuclear power plant, and a summary of the 7 nuclear materials and technology transferred to Iran 8 from the Agency in the preceding year which could 9 assist in the development of Iran's nuclear weapons 10 program; and
 - (2) contains a description of all programs and projects of the International Atomic Energy Agency in each country described in section 307(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2227(a)) and any inconsistencies between the technical cooperation and assistance programs and projects of the Agency and United States nuclear nonproliferation and safety goals in these countries.
- 19 (b) Additional Requirement.—The report re-20 quired to be submitted under subsection (a) shall be sub-21 mitted in an unclassified form, to the extent appropriate, 22 but may include a classified annex.

23 SEC. 7. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS.

It is the sense of the Congress that the United States 25 Government should pursue internal reforms at the Inter-

- 1 national Atomic Energy Agency that will ensure that all
- 2 programs and projects funded under the Technical Co-
- 3 operation and Assistance Fund of the Agency are compat-
- 4 ible with United States nuclear nonproliferation policy and
- 5 international nuclear nonproliferation norms.
