A BILL

To ensure that the Federal Government adheres to its commitment to State and local governments to share in the expense of educating children with disabilities.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "Better IDEA Act".
- 5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 6 Congress finds the following:
- 7 (1) The Individuals with Disabilities Education
- 8 Act provides that Federal, State, and local govern-

- ments share in the expense of educating children with disabilities and authorizes the Federal Government to pay up to 40 percent of the national average per pupil expenditure for children with disabilities.
 - (2) In each of the past 3 years, the Federal Government has appropriated only approximately 10 percent of the maximum State grant allocation amount to educate children with disabilities under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
 - (3) The high costs of educating children with disabilities, coupled with the failure of the Federal Government to meet fully its obligation under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, drain school resources and jeopardize the quality of instruction for all students.
 - (4) The Federal Government's failure to appropriate the maximum State grant allocation to educate children with disabilities under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act represents a massive unfunded Federal mandate on the States.
 - (5) Significant increases in Federal funds to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act will allow local governments more flexibility in spending limited education funds.
