A BILL

To require a separate, unclassified statement of the aggregate amount of budget outlays for intelligence activities.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Intelligence Budget
- 5 Accountability Act of 1997".

1 SEC. 2. PURPOSE.

- 2 It is the purpose of this Act to require the publication
- 3 of the aggregate intelligence budget figure to provide a
- 4 more thorough accounting of Government expenditures as
- 5 required by article I, section 9, clause 7 of the Constitu-
- 6 tion.

7 SEC. 3. FINDINGS.

- 8 The Congress finds that—
- 9 (1) article I, section 9, clause 7 of the Constitu-
- tion states that "No Money shall be drawn from the
- 11 Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations
- made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account
- of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public
- Money shall be published from time to time.";
- 15 (2) during the Cold War the United States did
- not provide to the American people a "regular State-
- ment and Account of the . . . Expenditures" for
- intelligence activities;
- 19 (3) the failure to provide to the American peo-
- 20 ple a statement of the total amount of expenditures
- on intelligence activities prevents them from partici-
- pating in an informed, democratic decision concern-
- ing the appropriate level for such expenditures; and
- 24 (4) the Report of the Commission on the Roles
- and Capabilities of the United States Intelligence
- Community recommended the disclosure of "the

1	total amount of money appropriated for intelligence
2	activities during the current fiscal year and the total
3	amount being requested for the next fiscal year".
4	SEC. 4. ANNUAL STATEMENT OF THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF
5	INTELLIGENCE EXPENDITURES FOR THE
6	PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR.
7	Section 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code, is
8	amended by adding at the end thereof the following new
9	paragraph:
10	"(31) a separate, unclassified statement of the
11	appropriations and proposed appropriations for the
12	current fiscal year, and the amount of appropria-
13	tions requested for the fiscal year for which the
14	budget is submitted, for national and tactical intel-
15	ligence activities, including activities carried out
16	under the budget of the Department of Defense to
17	collect, analyze, produce, disseminate, or support the
18	collection of intelligence.".
