Mr. Roth (for himself, Mr. Hagel, Mr. Thomas, Mr. Kerry, and Mr. Akaka) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Finance

## A BILL

To grant normal trade relations status to the People's Republic of China on a permanent basis upon the accession of the People's Republic of China to the World Trade Organization.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 Congress makes the following findings:
- 5 (1) The People's Republic of China is currently
- 6 engaged in negotiations to accede to the World
- 7 Trade Organization (referred to in this Act as the
- 8 "WTO").

- (2) In order to accede to the WTO, the People's Republic of China must agree, within the context of a Working Party composed of all interested WTO members, including the United States, to abide by the terms of existing WTO agreements. The People's Republic of China must separately commit, in the context of bilateral negotiations with individual WTO members, to opening its market to the goods, services, and investment of its prospective WTO trading partners, including the United States.
  - (3) In the course of negotiations with the People's Republic of China regarding WTO accession, the United States will have the opportunity to ensure that the People's Republic of China assumes the obligations of all other WTO members and makes specific commitments to ensure that United States goods and services and investment are afforded market access in the People's Republic of China substantially equivalent to the access that the People's Republic of China's goods and services and investment are afforded in the United States market.
  - (4) The People's Republic of China is the world's 10th largest trading country. It is the fastest growing major economy not currently subject to the

1	obligations, disciplines, and market access commit-		
2	ments of the WTO.		
3	(5) It is in the interest of the United States to		
4	secure the People's Republic of China's membership		
5	in the WTO in order to ensure that—		
6	(A) the markets of the People's Republic		
7	of China are significantly opened to United		
8	States trade and investment;		
9	(B) the People's Republic of China as-		
10	sumes the market-oriented disciplines of the		
11	WTO; and		
12	(C) trade disputes with the People's Re-		
13	public of China will be resolved within the mul-		
14	tilateral resolution mechanisms provided by the		
15	WTO.		
16	(6) Opening the markets of the People's Repub-		
17	lic of China also represents the surest means of re-		
18	ducing the current imbalance in United States trade		
19	with the People's Republic of China.		
20	(7) Because the People's Republic of China is		
21	a nonmarket economy, it is subject to title IV of the		
22	Trade Act of 1974, which permits the extension of		
23	normal trade relations status for 1-year periods. Un-		
24	less the People's Republic of China is specifically re-		

moved from the limitations of title IV of the Trade

1	Act of 1974, the People's Republic of China will a			
2	receive uncond	ditional most-favored-na	tion trade	
3	treatment from the United States.			

(8) In the absence of any reservation or derogation, the United States is obligated, under the agreement establishing the WTO and agreements concluded under the auspices of the WTO, to confer unconditional most-favored-nation trade treatment to every other WTO member.

### 10 SEC. 2. TERMINATION OF APPLICATION OF TITLE IV OF 11 THE TRADE ACT OF 1974 TO THE PEOPLE'S 12 REPUBLIC OF CHINA UPON THE PEOPLE'S 13 REPUBLIC OF CHINA'S ACCESSION TO THE 14

WTO.

15 On the date on which the People's Republic of China becomes a member of the WTO, to the extent consistent 16 17 with the United States' consent to the protocol of acces-18 sion, the provisions of title IV of the Trade Act of 1974 19 shall cease to apply to that country and products of the People's Republic of China shall be afforded nondiscrim-20 inatory treatment.
