Mr. DEWINE introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Labor and Human Resources

A BILL

To provide assistance for poison prevention and to stabilize the funding of regional poison control centers.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Poison Control Center
- 5 Enhancement and Awareness Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) Each year more than 2,000,000 poisonings
- 9 are reported to poison control centers throughout
- the United States. More than 90 percent of these

- poisonings happen in the home. 53 percent of poisoning victims are children younger than 6 years of age.
- (2) Poison centers are life-saving and cost-effec-5 tive public health services. For every dollar spent on 6 poison control centers, \$7 in medical costs are saved. 7 The average cost of a poisoning exposure call is 8 \$31.28, while the average cost if other parts of the 9 medical system are involved is \$932. Over the last 10 2 decades, the instability and lack of funding has re-11 sulted in a steady decline in the number of poison 12 control centers in the United States. Currently, 13 there are 75 such centers.
 - (3) Stabilizing the funding structure and increasing accessibility to poison control centers will increase the number of United States residents who have access to a certified poison control center, and reduce the inappropriate use of emergency medical services and other more costly health care services.

20 SEC. 3. DEFINITION.

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- In this Act, the term "Secretary" means the Sec-

1 SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL TOLL-FREE

- 2 NUMBER.
- 3 (a) In General.—The Secretary shall provide co-
- 4 ordination and assistance to regional poison control cen-
- 5 ters for the establishment of a nationwide toll-free phone
- 6 number to be used to access such centers.
- 7 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
- 8 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
- 9 \$2,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999 through
- 10 2001.
- 11 SEC. 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONWIDE MEDIA CAM-
- PAIGN.
- 13 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish a
- 14 national media campaign to educate the public and health
- 15 care providers about poison prevention and the availability
- 16 of poison control resources in local communities and to
- 17 conduct advertising campaigns concerning the nationwide
- 18 toll-free number established under section 4.
- 19 (b) CONTRACT WITH ENTITY.—The Secretary may
- 20 carry out subsection (a) by entering into contracts with
- 21 1 or more nationally recognized media firms for the devel-
- 22 opment and distribution of monthly television, radio, and
- 23 newspaper public service announcements.
- (c) Authorization of Appropriations.—There is
- 25 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
- 26 \$600,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999 through 2003.

(a) REGIONAL POISON CONTROL CENTERS.—The

1 SEC. 6. ESTABLISHMENT OF A GRANT PROGRAM.

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3	Secretary shall award grants to certified regional poison
4	control centers for the purposes of achieving the financial
5	stability of such centers, and for preventing and providing
6	treatment recommendations for poisonings.
7	(b) Other Improvements.—The Secretary shall
8	also use amounts received under this section to—
9	(1) develop standard education programs;
10	(2) develop standard patient management pro-
11	tocols for commonly encountered toxic exposures;
12	(3) improve and expand the poison control data
13	collection systems; and
14	(4) improve national toxic exposure surveillance.
15	(c) Certification.—Except as provided in sub-
16	section (d), the Secretary may make a grant to a center
17	under subsection (a) only if the center has been certified
18	by a professional organization in the field of poison con-
19	trol, and the Secretary has approved the organization as
20	having in effect standards for certification that reasonably
21	provide for the protection of the public health with respect
22	to poisoning.
23	(d) Waiver of Certification Requirements.—
24	(1) In general.—The Secretary may grant a
25	waiver of the certification requirement of subsection
26	(a) with respect to a noncertified poison control cen-
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- 1 ter that applies for a grant under this section if such
- 2 center can reasonably demonstrate that the center
- 3 will obtain such a certification within a reasonable
- 4 period of time as determined appropriate by the Sec-
- 5 retary.
- 6 (2) Renewal.—The Secretary may only renew
- 7 a waiver under paragraph (1) for a period of 3
- 8 years.
- 9 (e) Supplement not Supplant.—Amounts made
- 10 available to a poison control center under this section shall
- 11 be used to supplement and not supplant other Federal,
- 12 State, local or private funds provided for such center.
- 13 (f) Maintenance of Effort.—A poison control
- 14 center, in utilizing the proceeds of a grant under this sec-
- 15 tion, shall maintain the expenditures of the center for ac-
- 16 tivities of the center at a level that is equal to not less
- 17 than the level of such expenditures maintained by the cen-
- 18 ter for the fiscal year preceding the fiscal year for which
- 19 the grant is received.
- 20 (g) Matching Requirement.—The Secretary may
- 21 impose a matching requirement with respect to amounts
- 22 provided under a grant under this section if the Secretary
- 23 determines appropriate.
- 24 (h) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
- 25 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,

- 1 \$25,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999 through
- 2 2001.

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
