# A BILL

To authorize the extension of nondiscriminatory treatment (most-favored-nation treatment) to the products of the People's Republic of China.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 Congress makes the following findings:
- 5 (1) The United States extends most-favored-na-
- 6 tion treatment to almost all of its trading partners.
- 7 (2) Since extension of most-favored-nation sta-
- 8 tus to the People's Republic of China in 1979, trade

3	(3) The United States is working with the Peo-

- (3) The United States is working with the People's Republic of China to draft a commercially acceptable Protocol of Accession under which the People's Republic of China would accede to the World Trade Organization.
- (4) Extension of permanent most-favored-nation treatment to the People's Republic of China would enable the United States to avail itself of all rights under the World Trade Organization with respect to the People's Republic of China, and would result in greater market access, job creation, and fairness in trade once the Protocol is completed.
