Authorizing biennial expenditures by committees of the Senate.

3 SECTION 1. This resolution may be cited as the "Om4 nibus Committee Funding Resolution for 1997 and
5 1998.".
6 AGGREGATE AUTHORIZATION
7 SEC. 2. (a) In carrying out its powers, duties, and
8 functions under the Standing Rules of the Senate, and
9 under the appropriate authorizing resolutions of the Sen-

10 ate, there is authorized for the period March 1, 1997,

- 1 through September 30, 1998, in the aggregate of
- 2 \$50,569,779 and for the period March 1, 1998, through
- 3 February 28, 1999, in the aggregate of \$51,903,888 in
- 4 accordance with the provisions of this resolution, for all
- 5 Standing Committees of the Senate, for the Committee on
- 6 Indian Affairs, the Special Committee on Aging, and the
- 7 Select Committee on Intelligence.
- 8 (b) Each committee referred to in subsection (a) shall
- 9 report its findings, together with such recommendations
- 10 for legislation as it deems advisable, to the Senate at the
- 11 earliest practicable date, but not later than February 28,
- 12 1998, and February 28, 1999, respectively.

- pliance or noncompliance of such corporations, com-
- panies, or individuals or other entities with the rules,
- regulations, and laws governing the various govern-
- 20 mental agencies and its relationships with the public;
- (B) the extent to which criminal or other im-
- proper practices or activities are, or have been, en-
- gaged in the field of labor-management relationships
- or in groups or organizations of employees or em-
- 25 ployers, to the detriment of interests of the public,

(C) organized criminal activities which may operate in or otherwise utilize the facilities of interstate or international commerce in furtherance of any transactions and the manner and extent to which, and the identity of the persons, firms, or corporations, or other entities by whom such utilization is being made, and further, to study and investigate the manner in which and the extent to which persons engaged in organized criminal activity have infiltrated lawful business enterprise, and to study the adequacy of Federal laws to prevent the operations of organized crime in interstate or international commerce; and to determine whether any changes are required in the laws of the United States in order to protect the public against such practices or activities;

(D) all other aspects of crime and lawlessness within the United States which have an impact upon or affect the national health, welfare, and safety; including but not limited to investment fraud schemes, commodity and security fraud, computer fraud, and
