## **JOINT RESOLUTION**

Designating Monday, January 3, 2000, as the day for the observance of the New Year's Day holiday in that year.

- Whereas the problem commonly referred to as the "Year 2000 computer problem" may undermine the ability of computers to function correctly, and cause a disruption in business, government, and other important services; and
- Whereas January 1, 2000, occurs on a Saturday, and hence, in accordance with applicable provisions of law, the New Year's Day holiday would, but for this resolution, be observed on Friday, December 31, 1999: Now, therefore, be it
  - 1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives
  - 2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

- 1 That, in order to provide the public and technology profes-
- 2 sionals with an additional day, prior to the start of the
- 3 workweek, to begin repairs on failed computer systems
- 4 caused by the Year 2000 computer problem, the New
- 5 Year's Day holiday in the year 2000 shall be deemed to
- 6 occur on January 3, 2000 (rather than the date that
- 7 would otherwise apply under section 6103(a) of title 5,
- 8 United States Code).
